WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

Requires court to impose, and not suspend, minimum sentence for individual convicted of fleeing officer at speeds 30 mph over posted speed or through certain areas.

ISSUES DISCUSSED:

EFFECT OF AMENDMENT:

No amendment.

BACKGROUND:

Under current Oregon law, an individual fleeing or attempting to elude a police officer in a motor vehicle can be charged with a Class C felony. A person convicted of a Class C felony is subject to a sentence of up to five years in confinement and a maximum fine of \$125,000. ORS 161.605(3) and 161.625(1)(d). However, individuals convicted of Class C felonies often serve substantially less time than the five-year maximum.

House Bill 2826 requires courts to impose, and not suspend, a minimum sentence of imprisonment when an individual is convicted of a Class C felony for fleeing or attempting to elude a police officer while traveling at least 30 miles over the speed limit. Under HB 2826, a minimum sentence is also required if the fleeing individual drives through a residential or business district or school zone. A first conviction for this crime would result in a minimum of 30 days imprisonment, a second conviction would result in a minimum sentence of 60 days imprisonment, and any subsequent convictions would result in at least 90 days imprisonment.
