Summary of -2 amendments to HB 2998 4/18/17

### Section 1 and 2: Foundational Curricula, Convening, and Timeline

- Community colleges and public universities shall be convened by the HECC to review the Oregon Transfer Module (OTM) and establish a transferable set of general education requirements
  - The OTM is Oregon's current framework for general education requirements. The OTM is not in statute and there is no guarantee for transfer or acceptance of credits towards a student's degree
- The result of this review shall be the creation of a foundational curricula (plural options depending on STEM or CTE pathways with specific general education requirements)
- Foundational curricula must be a minimum of 30 credits
- Guaranteed transfer between a community college and a public university (and subsequently between community college institutions). Further review included in the bill to identify whether the curricula should transfer between public universities as well (Section 8 (4))
- Foundational curricula must be available for students entering an Oregon community college by fall, 2018

## Section 3: Unified Transfer Agreements

- A unified transfer agreement (UTA) will be established for each major designated by the HECC.
- UTA will outline courses required to achieve a degree as a student begins at an Oregon community college and transfers to an Oregon public university.
- The UTA will guarantee:
  - Transfer without loss of academic credit so long as a student takes the courses outlined in UTA and receives the required grade
  - Courses will be applied to the student's major (as opposed to transferring as elective credit)
- UTA will include the 30 credits of a foundational curricula
- Agreements will outline 90 credits at an Oregon community college (including the foundational curricula) and the 90+ credits required at an Oregon public university
  - Students are guaranteed transfer to an Oregon public university with Junior status in their major, which ensures that they will only need to take the remaining credits necessary as students who began their studies at the public university
  - 90+ credits included as an option in case certain majors require more than 180 total credits or if the universities accrediting body
- Exceptions can be made for majors identified as having an 'optimal transfer point' meaning there is a benefit for the student to transfer to an Oregon public university prior to earning 90 credits at an Oregon community college.
  - For UTA containing optimal transfer point, students are guaranteed transfer with the same status as a student who began their course of study at a public university
- Focus of UTA will remain on
  - Reducing student debt
  - Increasing rate at which community college students who transfer to public universities receive bachelor's degree

- Maintain standards of intellectual and academic rigor across institutions
- Role of the HECC as convener:
  - HECC shall regularly convene faculty representative's (intent to have faculty do the work, not to have an open workgroup with students involved\*)
  - HECC has authority to determine the majors that will have transfer agreements and the priority by which they are completed
    - Consideration will include majors that have a high rate of transfer and;
    - Majors with high workforce demand
- UTA will be established at a rate of three per year, with the first three having a designated completion timeline

## Section 4: Timeline for First Three UTA

- 1<sup>st</sup> UTA will be established by December 1, 2018;
- 2<sup>nd</sup> UTA will be established by April 1, 2019;
- 3<sup>rd</sup> UTA will be established by December 1, 2019
- Reminder: Foundational curricula must be available by fall, 2018

## Section 5: Helping Students Identify a Pathway

- Community college students who inform their institution of intent to transfer, must be provided information on:
  - Potential major courses of study
  - List of existing UTA
- The community college must encourage the student to identify a potential major or UTA prior to completing 45 academic credits

#### Section 6: HECC Convening and Data Collection

- HEEC shall convene regularly representatives from Oregon community college and public universities to:
  - o Facilitate establishment of foundational curricula
  - Facilitate development and ensure continued alignment of UTA
    - Note that continued alignment is necessary to account for any changes that occur at institutions
    - Staffing will be provided by the HECC
    - Institutions shall be regularly informed about progress\*Students\*
- Number of academic credits successfully transferred in a major course of study outlined by a
  UTA by students transferring from an Oregon community college to a public university shall be
  reported to the HECC annually
- The HECC will report annually to the Legislature on whether existing UTA are meeting the goals set forth in section 3 (2) of this legislation

## Section 7: Advising

• Community colleges and public universities shall submit a single report to the legislature by June 1, 2018 regarding best practices for advising students about:

- o Foundational curricula
- o UTA
- Methods for identifying a major course of study
- Strategies and resources available to enhance student advising effectiveness and increasing student access to information about UTA
- Academic services with an emphasis on assisting students enrolled in courses with high rates of incompletion

# Section 8: Reporting

- The HECC shall report to the legislature no later than February 1, 2018:
  - Definition of 'lost academic credit'
  - o Typical number of lost academic credits by current students who transfer
  - Recommendation on whether more than one foundational curriculum should be established
  - Recommendation on whether foundational curriculum should transfer between public universities
  - o Identifies the initial major courses of study the first three UTA will be
