SB 868, from my interpretation, looks as though it would completely do away with due process. From my understanding, a person would be guilty and have to then prove their innocence.

SB 797, again from my interpretation, gives no deadline as to when a determination need be made. This, in the wrong hands, could essentially allow for an indefinite suspension of a transfer. In this day and age, a 3 day period is more than sufficient for this information to be attained. If it is not, then might I suggest making it a specific time frame, say 7-10 day? Would we allow such ambiguity if we were buying a car? (Which incidentally kill more people per year than guns.)

SB 764, has some very good points to it, such as further education and adding live fire to the process of obtaining a Concealed Carry License, but its other areas are so ambiguous that to not iron them out, would be a disservice to all involved.

I would ask that you oppose these bills in their current forms, until they can be rewritten by members from both sides of the argument.
