Re: HB 2101 – 14 Review of Public Records disclosure exemptions – Comments

The League of Women Voters supports transparency and efficiency in government. We support managing exemptions for public records request disclosure, as we have supported related public records bills this session: SB 106, addressing establishment of a Public Records Advocate and Council, and SB 481, addressing Public Records Policy.

This bill's carefully crafted protocol reflects comprehensive attention to detail from collaboration by a well-qualified and diverse group. Thorough consideration is given to:

- Review: establish and define a process to catalog the roughly 550 disparate exemptions from public records disclosure. The catalog would be administered under the Attorney General's purview. Any exemption management must be addressed statutorily and must go through the Legislature. Placing responsibility for this oversight with a legislative body is the most efficient and appropriate action.
- Supporting inclusion: cooperating with and inviting advice and comment from the Attorney General, Governor, and Secretary of State, who oversee other aspects of Public Records management, also the public, and any public entity.
- Concurrent management of new issues: "Open Government Impact Statements" will weigh impact of new concerns in the context of conformation to existing standards.

As we have consistently this session, we are weighing proposals in the context of our budget shortfall. Heavy costs are currently incurred for legal review of disclosure exemptions with public records requests. We must protect personal privacy and enhance public safety while striving for transparency and accountability in government. Since disclosure exemptions are currently not well organized, this requires exhaustive review. Organizing these exemptions, while maintaining on-going cataloguing, should markedly reduce costs and improve service.
