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OCAPIA Testimony in Support of SB 147 COFA Oral Health Care May 1st, 2017, Hearing Room E, 3:00pm House Health Care Committee

Chair Rep. Greenlick, Vice Chairs Rep. Nosse, and Rep. Hayden, and Reps Alonso Leon, Buehler, Hack, Kennemer, Keny-Guyer, and Malstrom:

The Oregon Commission on Asian and Pacific Islander Affairs supports SB 147, which directs Department of Consumer and Business Services (DCBS) to develop and report with recommendations to Legislative Assembly, for a program to reimburse costs of oral health care for low-income individuals residing in Oregon under Compact of Free Association (COFA) treaty. This law builds on HB 2522, the COFA Health bill in 2015 that set the ground work for COFA citizens to get covered by the Oregon Health Plan.

The U.S. has conducted nuclear testing in the COFA countries for decades, which has negatively impacted the COFA economies. In the past decade COFA citizens have left their home nations at a high rate due to their poor economies. Many COFA citizens are now living in the United States, where although they are legally allowed to work, they are not U.S. citizens.

Poverty is a driver of health disparities in Oral Health. The correlation between poverty and oral health disparities is documented in the Center for Disease Control and Prevention's Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS). Nearly 18% of all Micronesians in the U.S. live in poverty compared to the U.S. average of 12%.

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The goal of SB 147 to study the oral health care for low-income COFA Oregonians can be done at a minimal fiscal impact to Oregon. OCAPIA commissioners have participated in the previous policy development process and will continue to contribute in the policy development that will reduce health disparities in Oregon.
