Dear Joint Ways and Means Subcommittee on Capital Construction

Advanced Research Corporation is in full support of Oregon Coast Community College's planned new Workforce Education and Resiliency Center at their Newport campus.

Advanced Research is a small technology firm in Newport specializing in applications involving the Global Positioning System (GPS), actively developing technology applications used in Oregon's fisheries, the Pacific Northwest and the Gulf of Mexico. It has partnered with Oregon State University, NOAA, and fishermen to develop applications. Much of its work has included student interns, which helped develop the Pacific Fish Trax information kiosk used by New Seasons, and the Fish Trax Marketplace mobile app providing seafood traceability information to consumers.

OCCC's new Workforce Education building will help to address critical workforce gaps in Lincoln County and the surrounding region. Envisioned career focused education programs for new facility align well with our county workforce gaps in living wage jobs, essential to the economic and civic vitality of our region. These programs include Emergency Preparation & Management; Maritime Technicians; Applied Technology (Trades); and P-12 Teacher Education.

We are also strongly in support of the secondary role of the building, to serve as a resiliency and recovery center for Lincoln County south of the Yaquina bridge in the event of a catastrophic event. The building itself, along with the trained professionals and students that may be at the college at the time of an event, could be essential in immediate and longer term recovery. This is the type of visionary and collaborative thinking envisioned in the Oregon Resilience Plan (2013), which states *planning for reconstruction and recovery must be done now to provide a strategic vision for restoring the economy and livability of the Oregon coast.*
