

**HB 2754 STAFF MEASURE SUMMARY**

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**WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:**

Requires newborn child with hearing loss be referred to a health care provider to be tested for congenital cytomegalovirus. Requires the Oregon Health Authority to educate health care professionals and diagnostic testing facilities through print materials on congenital cytomegalovirus including sign, symptoms and treatment options.

**EFFECT OF AMENDMENT:**

**BACKGROUND:**

Cytomegalovirus (CMV) is a herpes virus that infects individuals. The virus can remain dormant in the body, but can cause complications during pregnancy and for individuals with a weakened immune system. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) estimates that over 50 % of adults in the United States are infected by the age of 40. It affects males and females equally, at any age, and regardless of ethnicity. CMV infection can pass from the mother to the fetus during pregnancy. The CDC estimates that 1 in 150 newborns are infected with CMV at birth and that most of these infants will have no signs or symptoms. However, about 20 percent of them will develop symptoms or long-term health complications, including learning disabilities. Severe symptoms include vision and hearing loss, small head size, weakness and difficulty using muscles, coordination issues and seizures.

House Bill 2754 seeks to improve education, awareness and screening of newborns in Oregon for a viral infection, congenital cytomegalovirus.
