

"In conducting this research, we found that as primary care expenditures increase, spending for specialty care, emergency department and inpatient care generally decrease," said Neal Wallace, professor in the <u>OHSU-PSU School of Public Health</u>. "This is consistent with the goals of the PCPCH model and demonstrate that a focus on primary care can reduce overall health care costs."

The <u>PCPCH Program</u> is the foundation of Oregon's coordinated care model. The report released today is the first study in the country to look so comprehensively at the impact of PCPCH programs on health care costs.

The findings demonstrate that the state's PCPCH Program has fostered progress toward the goals of improving health, creating better health and lowering costs. The evidence shows that PCPCH-designated clinics are providing care that results in greater effectiveness and efficiency within both the primary care system and the larger health care system.

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
