Speech Delivered by Kameron Goetz--Future Business Leaders of America-National Public Speaking II Competition, 2016

A little over two centuries ago a nation of men rose up, and threw off the yoke of oppression that had been thrust upon them by a far away monarch. In acquiring their freedom and breaking their bonds, many men laid down their lives. Today, it is because of their sacrifice that we are free. But this freedom must be continually fought for in order to keep it. As members of FBLA, we strive to develop character, prepare for useful citizenship, and foster patriotism. At a minimum, every citizen of the United States should have similar goals. However, some have set and achieved much higher goals, while consequently paying a higher price. Today, I am going to tell you of one such person, and of the price he paid.

There was a small town farm boy who grew up right here in Washington State. You could call him the ``All-American Kid.'' He was a hard worker, a good student, and an exceptional athlete. Once this All-American Kid graduated from high school, he was faced with an All-American decision. Join the Army or follow his mother's advice to settle down and get married to his high school sweetheart. As much as he wanted to please his mother, he chose the Army. He quickly adapted to his new life, becoming an excellent soldier--1st in his class at Basic Training. Once his training was complete, the All-American Kid was shipped off to a far away war, in a far away land, called Vietnam.

In the sweltering jungles of Southeast Asia, he came face to face with the monsters of war. He saw things that no man, let alone any boy, should ever see. Then he came home. The All-American Kid had a Bronze Star on his chest for valor, the physical scars of three separate combat wounds, and the demons that accompanied the atrocities he had witnessed. He was a hero, but was not treated as such. As he stepped back onto U.S. soil for the first time in months, the All-American kid was spit on and berated. He was called a `butcher,'' a `rapist,'' and a `baby killer.''

The All-American rushed past the names and moved on. The demons he brought back with him were pushed deep down, far away. He settled down, got married, started a family, and became a successful businessman. Life was great on the outside. But on the inside, everything was much worse. His demons had never left him. For years they clawed, and ripped, and tore away at his very soul. And he fought, and he fought,

down in Washington, started a family, and became a $\operatorname{successful}$

businessman. However, as is far too common, Mr. Long returned from the

Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) for much of his civilian life.

Tragically, on February 3, 2014, David Wayne Long took his own life $\,$

after a decades-long battle with PTSD.

our brave men and women serving in the Armed Forces return home from

their time at war. Our veterans have made great sacrifices to ensure

a debt of gratitude that can never be repaid. However, we must ensure

that our nation's service-members receive the best care and treatment

available, and we must also dedicate ourselves to supporting causes and

heroes as their own personal health battles continue. Kameron's speech,

as well as his dedication to helping our nation's troops and veterans,

has inspired me and many people around the country to give back and

Forces, past and present, who have sacrificed so much in service to our country. The speech Kameron gave to FBLA is truly moving

and he fought back with everything he had. Finally, after years of fighting, he lost the fight. On February 3, 2014, my grandfather, David Wayne Long, the All-American Kid, succumbed to his demons. He committed suicide.

58,000 men and women lost their lives under a Vietnam sky. An additional 100,000 came home, only to take their lives under their own roofs. Every day, twenty-two veterans kill themselves. With that number, we are losing 8,000 veterans a year. They are all suffering from the same common disease. This disease is Post Traumatic Stress Disorder, or more commonly known as PTSD. PTSD won't let you move on from what you have seen, heard, or done in traumatic circumstances. It eats at you, slowly deteriorating your very will to live. It cannot be cured, it cannot be stopped. But it can be treated. Foundations such as the Wounded Warrior Project are dedicated to helping men and women of the United States Armed Forces, past and present, recover from the physical and mental wounds of war. Specifically for those suffering with mental afflictions, the people at WWP take them in and simply love on them. They make them feel appreciated. Now this is key, because one of the worst fears for every soldier is not the fear of death. It is the fear that they will come home and the people, who they would have died for on a daily basis, do not care.

The Wounded Warrior Project can't help veterans alone. They need support, and they need partners. We need to be that support, and we need to be those partners, because it is the men and women who have served our country for generations that have upheld our freedom. I am ready to stand up and give back. Rise up with me. Let's all give back. Let's give back to those who gave.

There is a unique initiative taking shape in eastern Oregon. The partners include Oregon naturopathic physicians Dr. John Winters, Dr. Jim Massey, and Dr. Sussanna Czeranko, as well as academic and administrative leaders at NUNM. There is also a successful, entrepreneurial seafood producer from Texas called DyneAquaculture, pioneers in land-based, sustainable, recirculating aquaculture systems (RAS) to produce seafood protein. Add to this remarkable group the visionary husband and wife team, David and Lee Manuel. David Manuel is one of America's most famous bronze sculptors. His masterpieces are in collections across America and beyond. Lee Manuel is an indefatigable project manager, entrepreneur, and community leader. In the past thirteen years, they and their family and the La Grande community have resurrected the abandoned, derelict Hot *Lake Sanatorium* long known as the "Mayo Clinic of the West". Finally, and central to the dream is a committed veterans support association called **The Warrior Bonfire Program**, serving disabled combat veterans through outdoor-oriented bonding events that enable the healing process. These outstanding volunteers share Colonel Bickel's call and vision that the time is now to take action to help wounded veterans.

The project all these players are championing is called **the Veterans Restorative Care Center** (VRCC) and it is rising in the beautiful Blue Mountains surrounding Hot Lake Springs, just outside La Grande, Oregon, 170 miles from Boise and 260 miles from Portland. The VRCC will be a powerful and enduring enhancement in health care for our veterans and an enriching educational venue for naturopathic medical students.

Tragically, 22 veterans commit suicide each day, year over year. **We must do something about it.**American veterans return home suffering a large number of health issues, ranging among physical



injury and chronic disease, diabetes, cardiovascular disease, anxiety, depression, traumatic brain injury, suicide ideation, and more. The toll is great on our soldiers and their supportive and loving families. The VRCC will do something about it.

The Veterans Health Administration (VHA), established by President Abraham Lincoln, today operates one of the world's largest health care systems, but is ill-equipped, overwhelmed, and ineffective for treating thousands of returning soldiers, many of whom are over-medicated as they face their personal health crisis feeling alone, undervalued, and underappreciated. The VRCC will do something about it.

National University of Natural Medicine (NUNM), the oldest fully accredited naturopathic medical university in North America and a leader in natural medicine education, training, and research, is endorsing the efforts to create a unique and replicable program to renew and restore hope and healing for veterans. Our naturopathic graduates are primary care physicians who are trained to use conventional medicines as well as natural medicines such as food as medicine, botanical medicine, counseling, hydrotherapy, spinal manipulations, and massage, to name a few. Our Chinese medicine graduates also use natural healing techniques such as qi gong, acupuncture, shiatsu, and botanical medicine.

NUNM will provide medical staff, offer our unique healing modalities, and bring many accomplished faculty and alumni to help with the program to restore veterans and their families to health. We will offer our medical students, research, nutrition, and integrative mental health graduate students the opportunity to receive advanced training focused on the care of veterans on site through monthly rotations, supervised by resident physicians and highly accomplished faculty.

The NUNM clinical operations at VRCC will be self-sustaining, like our overall university structure. We are (and have been for 61 years) a private, non-profit university receiving no state government funding. We operate two primary teaching clinics and nine community clinics in Portland. Our revenues are derived from 660 students' tuition, NIH funded research grants, fee for service by some 35,000-patients, donations from alumni and friends, and partnerships with local, national, and international businesses.

We encourage you to support the startup of the VRCC at Hot Lake Springs by setting aside \$2M of funding for this project. Your support will trigger a cascade of activity, the beginning of it all: the building be owned by the Warrior Bonfire Program, and the next phase of fund raising can begin in earnest with a beginning clinical operation date to follow and the creation of some 110 jobs an annual payroll of \$5M in eastern Oregon.

Thank you for your service to the citizens of Oregon and for your support in building a state that is a leading the way to restore hope and a brighter, healthier future for its veterans and their families. **Together, let's do something about it.**







The Veterans Restorative Care Center (VRCC) project is a collaboration amongst four key partners to develop and provide unique and much-needed physical, mental, emotional and spiritual health services to America's veteran community.

This \$42 million project is anticipated to create 110 direct new jobs and retain 15 jobs while supporting a \$5 million annual payroll in rural eastern Oregon.

Why the VRCC Project?

This project is needed on two levels: 1) service to veterans, and 2) economic development.

Service to Veterans

First and foremost, the Veterans Restorative Care Center (VRCC) is committed to meeting the needs of America's veterans. It is estimated that 22 veterans commit suicide each day in America. Another 75 veterans in America attempt suicide unsuccessfully each day. In total, well over 125,000 American veterans have taken their own lives since 9/11--nearly twice the number killed in action in Vietnam.

Tragically, many American veterans return home suffering a large number of health issues ranging from physical injury and chronic disease, diabetes, cardiovascular disease, anxiety, depression, traumatic brain injury, suicide ideation and more. The toll is great on America's soldiers and their supportive and loving families.

The Veterans Health Administration (VHA), established by President Abraham Lincoln, today operates one of the world's largest healthcare systems but is ill-equipped, overwhelmed, and ineffective for treating thousands of returning soldiers, many of whom are over-medicated as they face their personal health crisis feeling alone, undervalued, and underappreciated. In short, the United States is facing a crisis in its obligation to meet the needs of its veterans.

Economic Development

A total of 110 jobs are forecasted to be created and 15 jobs retained from the full build-out of the projected \$42 million investment. These jobs will all be located in rural eastern Oregon. It is estimated that the total payroll generated by these jobs equals \$5 million annually. The bulk of the economic activity will be at Hot Lake, but, as the table begins to show, businesses throughout Union County will benefit from the economic activity created at the VRCC.

Consistent with Local Planning. 
