

HB 2682 STAFF MEASURE SUMMARY

WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

Allows the City of Portland to designate, by ordinance, the speed for a highway under its jurisdiction that is five miles per hour lower than the statutory speed, provided that the highway is located in a residential district, is not an arterial highway, and that the city provides the appropriate signage to alert drivers of the appropriate speed.

FISCAL: Minimal fiscal impact

REVENUE: No revenue impact

ISSUES DISCUSSED:

EFFECT OF AMENDMENT:

No amendment.

BACKGROUND:

Current law requires a city or county road authority to make a formal request to the Department of Transportation to make changes to designated speeds for highways under their jurisdictions. Along with the request, the road authority must provide certain findings to the Department to justify the change in designated speed.

For cities that contain a state highway within city limits, the city's road authority must make a request to the Department's Highway Division for a speed zone change. The request is forwarded to the District Manager, Regional Manager or State Traffic-Roadway Engineer to conduct a speed zone investigation and make a recommendation to grant or deny the request. The region traffic recommendation is sent to the Traffic-Roadway Section of the Highway Division for review by the Traffic-Roadway Section staff and then forwarded to the State-Traffic Roadway Engineer for review and approval. The local road authority is notified of the decision and is asked if they concur or not. If the local road authority concurs, a speed zone order is issued. If the road authority does not concur, the case is sent to the Speed Zone Review Panel to review the investigation and hear any additional objections. The Speed Zone Review Panel then issues a final decision.
