RE:	SB 895

SB 895 vs. HB 3380 vs. HB 3078 – Impact on Oregon's female prison population:

SB 895 – The most targeted option. Includes broader range of qualifying criminal behavior, but does not specifically allow eligibility as a mitigating factor. The FSAP pilot was initiated in 2016. Since its inception 76 women and 22 men participated in the program. The gender ratio is 3.5 to 1. Expansion of FSAP is expected to increase the number of participants by ten.

HB 3380 – Also a targeted option. Does not include the broader range of qualifying criminal behavior. Allows judges to consider eligibility as a mitigating factor. As above, the gender ratio of participants is 3.5 to 1.

HB 3078 – Comprehensive sentencing reform package. Adjusts FSAP in the same manner as HB 3380. Additionally, it removes Theft 1 and ID Theft from the Ballot Measure 57 statutes and expands transitional leave at the end of the offender's sentence from 90 to 120 days. The FSAP changes, as above, affect females at a 3.5 to 1 ratio.

FSAP: 3.5 female to 1 male (2016/17: 76 females and 22 males)



Theft 1 and ID theft (CJC estimates): 1 female to 2.5 males (2019: 31 females and 82 males)



120-day transitional leave (CJC estimates): 1 female to 5 males (2019: 14 females and 69 males)
