Good afternoon, Chairman Doherty, and members of the House Committee on Education.

My name is Larae Ellenwood I'm 17 years old and I live in Portland, Oregon.

I am a citizen of the Nez Perce Nation, whose traditional homelands include our state of Oregon. I am also a descendent of the Blackfeet Nation in Montana and the Seneca Nation in New York.

I am here today as a high school student. I will be completing my Junior year at Cleveland High School later this week.

Thank you for hearing my testimony today. I am here to speak in support of Senate Bill 13.

I want to share with each of you my personal experience of attending schools in Montana, a state that had the first tribal nation curriculum mandate. I moved from Montana during my sophomore year, after attending schools there since the 1<sup>st</sup> grade.

Between 1<sup>st</sup> grade and my Sophmore year in high school, I had the privilege of attending schools that taught students about tribal sovereignty, history, culture, and science.

I have been told that this bill may not be approved by our state legislature because it includes the need for funding. I want to tell you that I believe Senate Bill 13 is a small investment with a large impact.
