Re: <u>HB 2830-2</u> – Bridge and CAT, Tax Reform **Support, pass this session**

The League of Women Voters believes that <u>efficient and economical government</u> requires competent personnel, the clear assignment of responsibilities, <u>adequate financing</u>, and coordination among the different agencies and levels of government. The League of Women Voters believes that government should be responsive to the will of the people and should maintain an <u>equitable and flexible system of taxation</u>.

As we wrote in our June 6 League of Women Voters Testimony, we continue to commend and appreciate this committee's bipartisan and bicameral work as you have thoughtfully considered Tax Reform this session. As presented in HB 2830-2, we support the "bridge" that would temporarily raise the current Corporate Income Tax Rate and the Corporate Minimum Tax for a period, until 2019. We support the opportunity for the Commercial Activities Tax (CAT) to be included in legislation this year with an effective date of 2019, allowing the Department of Revenue to prepare a smooth transition to the new CAT collection and to the reduced personal income tax rates for those with lower incomes. We also support a 2019 effective date for the CAT to allow businesses and their accountants to prepare for this transition. We support this simpler to implement, one-page tax reporting system.

We continue to advocate for the CAT, believing that it offers a more stable revenue flow than our current system, especially in economic downturns where our present tax system has resulted in a yo-yo of budget cutbacks and unpredictability for essential services provided by the state. We support rates for the CAT that will address Oregon's consistently insufficient revenue; *since 1990 when Measure 5 reduced property tax revenue for our K-12 schools and since initiatives, not tied to a funding source, have put demands on our current revenue streams.*

Finally, we acknowledge that some pyramiding will adversely impact those with very low incomes, who do not file tax returns and may be elderly or disabled, so we would support an adjustment mechanism to help very low income citizens remediate loss of income due to pyramiding.

We are grateful for your work and acknowledge the great external pressures in-play both for and against tax reform. We recognize that *you*, the Legislature, are the elected voice of the people of Oregon. We believe that the legislature is best place to solve complex problems, not in ballot measures. We believe that now is the time, this session, to pass a TAX REFORM bill.

Thank you for the opportunity to discuss this tax reform bill and the -2 amendment.
