Testimony in support of SCR 2 June 13, 2017, 3pm, Hearing Room D House Committee on Rules

The Oregon Commission for Women supports Senate Concurrent Resolution 2 in recognizing the 2015 Oregon Women of Achievement for outstanding leadership and service to the people of Oregon.
