SUMMARY

Authorizes Commissioner of Bureau of Labor and Industries to require employer that is able to pay but has not paid wages to provide bond for a period of time determined by commissioner or cease conducting business until employer has provided bond. Authorizes commissioner to require employer that has not established or maintained regular payday to provide bond or cease conducting business until employer has provided bond.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

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A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to wages; amending ORS 652.125, 652.340 and 652.380; and declaring emergency.

4 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. ORS 652.125 is amended to read:

652.125. (1) If, upon complaint by an employee, and after investigation, it appears to the Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor and Industries that an employer [is failing to pay wages within five days of a payday scheduled by the employer,] has failed to establish or maintain a regular payday as required by ORS 652.120, the commissioner may require the employer to [give a bond in such amount as] provide a bond in an amount that the commissioner determines necessary, with sufficient surety, to [assure] ensure timely payment of wages due employees for [such] a future period [as] that the commissioner considers appropriate. In lieu of a bond, the commissioner may accept a letter of credit from an issuer approved by the commissioner, upon [such] terms and conditions and for [such] an amount [as] that the commissioner determines necessary to [assure] ensure timely payment of wages for [such] a future period [as] that the commissioner determines ap-

 - (4) If an employer fails to comply with the requirements of this section, the commissioner may commence an action in the circuit court of appropriate jurisdiction to enforce the provisions of subsection (3) of this section.

- 652.340. (1) If upon investigation by the Commissioner of the Bureau of 23 Labor and Industries, after taking assignments of any wage claims under 24 ORS 652.330, it appears to the commissioner that the employer is represent-25 ing to employees that the employer is able to pay wages for their services 26 and that the employees are not being paid for their services, the commis-27 sioner may require the employer to [give] provide a bond in [such sum as] 28 an amount that the commissioner deems reasonable and adequate in the 29 circumstances, with sufficient surety, conditioned that the employer will for 30 31 a [definite future period not exceeding six months] future period that the

- commissioner considers appropriate conduct business and pay employees in accordance with the laws of Oregon.
- (2) If an employer fails to provide the required bond within 10 days 3 after demand for [such bond the employer fails to provide the same, the com-4 missioner may commence a suit against the employer in the circuit court of 5 appropriate jurisdiction] the bond, the commissioner may commence an 6 administrative action to compel the employer to [furnish such] provide the 7 bond or cease doing business until the employer has done so. The employer 8 shall have the burden of proving the amount [thereof] of the required bond 9 to be excessive. 10
- (3) If the [court] commissioner finds that there is just cause for requir-11 ing [such] the bond and that the [same] bond is reasonably necessary or 12 appropriate to secure the prompt payment of the wages of the employees of 13 [such] the employer and the employer's compliance with ORS 652.310 to 14 652.414, the [court] commissioner shall issue an order subject to chal-15 lenge or appeal under ORS chapter 183 to enjoin [such] the employer from 16 doing business in this state until the requirement is met, or shall make 17 other, and may make further, appealable orders appropriate to compel com-18 pliance with the requirement. 19
 - (4) If an employer fails to comply with the requirements of this section, the commissioner may commence an action in the circuit court of appropriate jurisdiction to enforce the provisions of this section.
- **SECTION 3.** ORS 652.380 is amended to read:

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- 652.380. (1) The remedies provided by ORS 652.310 to 652.414 shall be additional to and not in substitution for and in no manner impair other remedies and may be enforced simultaneously or consecutively so far as not inconsistent with each other.
- 29 (2) No payment or tender after the filing of a criminal complaint or 30 commencement of any proceeding by the Commissioner of the Bureau of La-31 bor and Industries shall affect the liability therein of an employer for ex-

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penses, or prevent such employer from being subject to fine or forfeitures, or to the [giving] providing of bond under ORS 652.340.

SECTION 4. This 2017 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2017 Act takes effect on its passage.
