Testimony of Charles Sams, Communication Director Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation House Committee on Agriculture and Natural Resources HB 2405

February 9, 2017

Chairman Clem and members of the Committee, for the record, my name is Charles F. Sams III. I am the Communications Director for the Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation. I am also a Navy veteran, having served on active duty from 1988-1992 and in the reserves from 1992-1995.

CTUIR is one of two treaty Tribes in the State of Oregon. And I am pleased to be here on behalf of the Tribe to speak in support of House Bill 2405.

American Indians serve in the armed forces in greater numbers per capita than any other ethnic group, and they have served with distinction in every major conflict for over 200 years. Our Tribe alone has record of over 650 veterans who have served the United States since the Indian Wars to present day.

Oregon's tribes honor community members who serve in the military in many ways, including with veterans memorials. The Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation built Nixyaawii Warrior Memorial in 1996. It is an important public gathering place for veterans in our part of Oregon.

In 2015, we applied for a State Parks grant for veteran and war memorials to: Increase ADA accessibility; Restore weathered plaques and walls; Improve security lighting; Upgrade outdated electrical; Install security cameras; and Install post and cable fencing to reduce potential safety hazards.

The Umatilla Board of Trustees authorized matching funds.

After submitting the application, State Parks identified that Tribal governments were not eligible for the grants. They told us the veteran and war memorial funds were limited by statute to local governments. We have since learned that other tribes have run into this same challenge.

Tribal governments act, in many ways, like Oregon's local governments, we fulfill the roles of municipal, county, state and national government. Enrolled tribal members are proud citizens of Oregon and have served our nation. We believe these funds should be available to support all veterans in the State of Oregon.

We ask the House Ag & Natural Resources committee to support this bill and provide a "Do Pass" recommendation to your colleagues on the floor of the House of Representatives.
