



Hemp



- In August 2016, the US Dept. of Agriculture, DEA and FDA issued a joint "Statement of Principles on Industrial Hemp."
- Oregon DOJ has interpreted the "Statement of Principles" to mean that hemp grown for CBD could be considered marijuana for purposes of the federal Controlled Substances Act.
- OLCC currently has no regulatory authority over industrial hemp. We are ready to work together with our partner agencies and the legislature to address this difficult issue.
