#### AN ACT

Relating to the financial administration of the Oregon Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists; and declaring an emergency.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

<u>SECTION 1.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$1,519,084 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Oregon Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists.

SECTION 2. This 2015 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2015 Act takes effect July 1, 2015.

#### AN ACT

Relating to the financial administration of the State Board of Psychologist Examiners; and declaring an emergency.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

<u>SECTION 1.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$1,301,464 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the State Board of Psychologist Examiners.

<u>SECTION 2.</u> This 2015 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2015 Act takes effect July 1, 2015.

CHAPTER .....

#### AN ACT

Relating to state financial administration; creating new provisions; amending section 5, chapter 25, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5017); repealing section 3, chapter 303, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5528); and declaring an emergency.

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

<u>SECTION 1.</u> In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Emergency Board, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$30,000,000 for the purposes for which the Emergency Board lawfully may allocate funds.

<u>SECTION 2.</u> (1) In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Emergency Board, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$120,000,000, to be allocated to state agencies for state employee compensation changes for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015.

(2) If any of the moneys appropriated by subsection (1) of this section are not allocated by the Emergency Board prior to December 1, 2016, the moneys remaining on that date become available for any purpose for which the Emergency Board lawfully may allocate funds.

<u>SECTION 3.</u> In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Department of Revenue, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$3,935,414 for the core system replacement project.

SECTION 4. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$25,929,440 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for the core system replacement project, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and reimbursements from federal service agreements, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in this section, collected or received by the Department of Revenue.

<u>SECTION 5.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Revenue by section 1 (7), chapter 596, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5035), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, is increased by \$3,684,413 for capital debt service and related costs for outstanding general obligation bonds sold pursuant to Article XI-Q of the Oregon Constitution for the core system replacement project.

<u>SECTION 6.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$375,000 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses for costs of issuance of general obligation bonds sold pursuant to Article XI-Q

of the Oregon Constitution from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and reimbursements from federal service agreements, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in this section, collected or received by the Department of Revenue for capital debt service and related costs for the core system replacement project.

<u>SECTION 7.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$1,880,000 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for the property valuation system, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and reimbursements from federal service agreements, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in this section, collected or received by the Department of Revenue.

<u>SECTION 8.</u> In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Department of Revenue, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$71,843, which may be expended for capital debt service and related costs for outstanding general obligation bonds sold pursuant to Article XI-Q of the Oregon Constitution for the property valuation system.

<u>SECTION 9.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$80,000 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses for costs of issuance of general obligation bonds sold pursuant to Article XI-Q of the Oregon Constitution from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and reimbursements from federal service agreements, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in this section, collected or received by the Department of Revenue for capital debt service and related costs for the property valuation system.

<u>SECTION 10.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$15,209,670 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for the child support enforcement automated system in the child support enforcement automated program, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and reimbursements from federal service agreements, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in this section, collected or received by the Department of Justice.

SECTION 11. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Justice by section 1 (7), chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5516), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, is increased by \$2,407,587 for capital debt service and related costs for outstanding general obligation bonds sold pursuant to Article XI-Q of the Oregon Constitution for the child support enforcement automated system in the debt service and related costs program.

SECTION 12. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$205,330 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses for costs of issuance of general obligation bonds sold pursuant to Article XI-Q of the Oregon Constitution from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and reimbursements from federal service agreements, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in this section, collected or received by the Department of Justice for capital debt service and related costs for the child support enforcement automated system in the debt service and related costs program.

<u>SECTION 13.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$29,997,991 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for the child support enforcement automated system in the child support enforcement automated program, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds, collected or received by the Department of Justice.

<u>SECTION 14.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Justice by section 1 (4), chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5516), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, is increased by \$240,550 for the Crime Victims' Services Division for the Oregon Crime Victims Law Center.

<u>SECTION 15.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 1 (1), chapter 595, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5034), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Public Employees Retirement System, is increased by \$509,960 for administrative and operating expenses related to chapter 506, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 370), and chapter 326, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 3495).

<u>SECTION 16.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 1 (4), chapter 303, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5528), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the State Parks and Recreation Department, is increased by \$98,740 for the purposes of direct services.

<u>SECTION 17.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (3), chapter 303, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5528), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from lottery moneys allocated from the Parks and Natural Resources Fund to the State Parks and Recreation Department, is increased by \$1,770,000 for park development.

<u>SECTION 18.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (4), chapter 303, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5528), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from lottery moneys allocated from the Parks and Natural Resources Fund to the State Parks and Recreation Department, is increased by \$58,314 for direct services.

<u>SECTION 19.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (5), chapter 303, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5528), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from lottery moneys allocated from the Parks and Natural Resources Fund to the State Parks and Recreation Department, is increased by \$362,326 for community support and grants.

SECTION 20. Section 3, chapter 303, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5528), is repealed.

<u>SECTION 21.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 4 (1), chapter 303, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5528), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds collected or received by the State Parks and Recreation Department, is reduced by \$970,000 for park development.

<u>SECTION 22</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 4 (3), chapter 303, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5528), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds collected or received by the State Parks and Recreation Department, is increased by \$70,425 for community support and grants.

<u>SECTION 23.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (1), chapter 335, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5037), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds collected or received by the Department of State Lands for Common School Fund programs is increased by \$161,488 for Environmental Protection Agency grant funds.

<u>SECTION 24.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Oregon Military Department by section 1 (2), chapter 594, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5032), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for operations, is increased by \$89,563 for additional operations and maintenance positions.

<u>SECTION 25.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 3 (1), chapter 594, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5032), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds, other than those described in section 2, chapter 594, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5032), collected or received by the Oregon Military Department is increased by \$358,253 for additional operations and maintenance positions.

<u>SECTION 26.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission by section 1, chapter 606, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5506), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, is increased by \$5,000,000 for Justice Reinvestment Initiative grants.

<u>SECTION 27.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2, chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5513), for operations, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and federal funds from the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development for contract services, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in section 2, chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5513), collected or received by the Housing and Community Services Department, is increased by \$10,000,000 for energy assistance payments.

<u>SECTION 28.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Veterans' Affairs by section 1 (2), chapter 616, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5539), is increased by \$500,000 for payments to counties pursuant to ORS 406.310 and 406.462.

<u>SECTION 29.</u> In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Oregon Military Department, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$250,000, which may be expended for the Oregon Military Museum.

<u>SECTION 30.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Oregon Health Authority by section 1 (1), chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5526), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for programs, is increased by \$160,000 for the development and operation of a donated dental services program.

SECTION 31. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Oregon Health Authority by section 1 (1), chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5526), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for programs, is increased by \$200,000 for the Senior Farm Direct Nutrition Program.

<u>SECTION 32.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Oregon Health Authority by section 1 (1), chapter \_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5526), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for programs, is increased by \$100,000 for the Women, Infants and Children Farm Direct Nutrition Program.

<u>SECTION 33.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Oregon Health Authority by section 1 (1), chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5526), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for programs, is increased by \$600,000 for school-based health centers.

SECTION 34. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Oregon Health Authority by section 1 (1), chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5526), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for programs, is increased by \$10,000,000 for grants to safety net providers.

<u>SECTION 35.</u> (1) In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Emergency Board, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$40,000,000, to be allocated to the Oregon Health Authority or the Department of Human Services for caseload costs or other budget challenges that the agency is unable to mitigate.

(2) If any of the moneys appropriated by subsection (1) of this section are not allocated by the Emergency Board prior to December 1, 2016, the moneys remaining on that date become available for any purpose for which the Emergency Board lawfully may allocate funds.

SECTION 36. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 6, chapter 668, Oregon Laws 2013, for the biennium ending June 30, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses by the Public Employees' Benefit Board from the Public Employees' Revolving Fund for benefit plan premiums and self-insurance is increased by \$45,000,000.

<u>SECTION 37.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Long Term Care Ombudsman by section 1 (1), chapter 408, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5521), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, general program and services provided to care facility residents, is increased by \$100,000.

<u>SECTION 38.</u> (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Human Services by section 1 (2), chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5026), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for child welfare, self-sufficiency and vocational rehabilitation services, is increased by \$800,000 for foster care pilot programs.

(2) Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 3 (2), chapter \_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5026), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds, excluding federal funds described in section 2, chapter \_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5026), collected or received by the Department of Human Services, for child welfare, self-sufficiency and vocational rehabilitation services, is increased by \$160,000 for foster care pilot programs.

<u>SECTION 39.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Human Services by section 1 (2), chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5026), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for child welfare, selfsufficiency and vocational rehabilitation services, is increased by \$500,000 for a Temporary Assistance for Needy Families pilot project.

<u>SECTION 40.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Human Services by section 1 (3), chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5026), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for aging and people with disabilities and intellectual/developmental disabilities programs, is increased by \$350,000 for the Home Care Commission.

SECTION 41. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Human Services by section 1 (2), chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5026), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for child welfare, selfsufficiency and vocational rehabilitation services, is increased by \$400,000 for food programs.

<u>SECTION 42.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Human Services by section 1 (2), chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5026), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for child welfare, selfsufficiency and vocational rehabilitation services, is increased by \$150,000 for the Hunger Task Force.

<u>SECTION 43.</u> (1) In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Emergency Board, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$10,700,000, to be allocated to state agencies for compensation changes driven by collective bargaining for workers who are not state employees.

(2) If any of the moneys appropriated by subsection (1) of this section are not allocated by the Emergency Board prior to December 1, 2016, the moneys remaining on that date become available for any purpose for which the Emergency Board lawfully may allocate funds.

<u>SECTION 44.</u> (1) In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Emergency Board, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, out of the

General Fund, the amount of \$100,000, to be allocated to the Department of Human Services for provider compliance activities.

(2) If any of the moneys appropriated by subsection (1) of this section are not allocated by the Emergency Board prior to December 1, 2016, the moneys remaining on that date become available for any purpose for which the Emergency Board lawfully may allocate funds.

<u>SECTION 45.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (2), chapter \_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5002), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for food safety, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, and including federal funds for contract services, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in section 2, chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5002), collected or received by the State Department of Agriculture, is increased by \$320,000.

<u>SECTION 46.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (3), chapter \_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5002), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for natural resources, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, and including federal funds for contract services, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in section 2, chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5002), collected or received by the State Department of Agriculture, is increased by \$1,672,496.

<u>SECTION 47.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Environmental Quality by section 1 (3), chapter 593, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5018), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for land quality, is increased by \$280,000.

SECTION 48. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (1), chapter 593, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5018), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for air quality, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, the proceeds of bonds for the Orphan Site Account and federal funds from congestion mitigation and air quality grants, drinking water protection, beach bacteria monitoring, laboratory accreditation and woodstove grants and for smoke monitoring laboratory services, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in section 2, chapter 593, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5018), collected or received by the Department of Environmental Quality, is increased by \$110,092.

<u>SECTION 49.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 7 (2), chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5540), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for grants, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds collected or received by the Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board is increased by \$200,000.

<u>SECTION 50.</u> In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Higher Education Coordinating Commission, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$300,000, which may be expended for the establishment of a wrestling program at Eastern Oregon University.

SECTION 54. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (7), chapter \_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5502), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for enterprise goods and services, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and federal funds received from charges, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in section 2, chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5502), collected or received by the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, is increased by \$293,314.

<u>SECTION 55.</u> (1) In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Emergency Board, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$2,000,000, to be allocated to the Department of Justice for the defense of criminal convictions.

(2) If any of the moneys appropriated by subsection (1) of this section are not allocated by the Emergency Board prior to December 1, 2016, the moneys remaining on that date become available for any purpose for which the Emergency Board lawfully may allocate funds.

<u>SECTION 61.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 3 (4), chapter \_\_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5531), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for administrative services, agency support, criminal justice information services and the office of the State Fire Marshal, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds collected or received by the Department of State Police is increased by \$1,163.

<u>SECTION 81.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$1,542,827 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from bond proceeds and other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Higher Education Coordinating Commission from the proceeds of lottery bonds for the purposes of a grant to the Linn Benton Community College for the Advanced Transportation Technology Center.

<u>SECTION 82</u> (1) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Commission on Judicial Fitness and Disability by section 1 (1), chapter 633, Oregon Laws 2013, for the biennium ending June 30, 2015, for administration, is decreased by \$5,000.

(2) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Commission on Judicial Fitness and Disability by section 1 (2), chapter 633, Oregon Laws

2013, for the biennium ending June 30, 2015, for extraordinary expenses, is increased by \$5,000.

SECTION 83. <u>SECTION 88.</u> For the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, expenditures of proceeds by the Oregon Department of Administrative Services from state bonds issued during the period beginning July 1, 2013, and ending June 30, 2015, for the benefit of a public university, pursuant to agreements between the department and a public university, are not limited.

<u>SECTION 89.</u> For the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, expenditures of proceeds by the Higher Education Coordinating Commission from state bonds issued during the period beginning July 1, 2013, and ending June 30, 2015, for the benefit of a public university, pursuant to agreements between the commission and a public university are not limited.

<u>SECTION 90.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the following amounts are established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limits for payment of expenses from bond proceeds and other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, for the following purposes:

Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 1 (5), chapter 303, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5528), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for the lottery bond proceeds for the Main Street Revitalization Grant program, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the State Parks and Recreation Department, is increased by \$2,500,000.

SECTION 94. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 1 (2), chapter 303, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5528), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for the lottery bond proceeds for the Willamette Falls Riverwalk, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the State Parks and Recreation Department, is increased by \$7,500,000.

SECTION 95. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 1 (2), chapter 303, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5528), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for the costs of issuance of the lottery bonds issued for the Renew Forest Park project, the Main Street Revitalization Grant program and the Willamette Falls Riverwalk project, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the State Parks and Recreation Department, is increased by \$216,804.

<u>SECTION 96.</u> In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Oregon Military Department, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$434,833, which may be expended for capital debt service and related costs for outstanding general obligation bonds sold pursuant to Article XI-Q of the Oregon Constitution for the Joint Forces Headquarters facility.

<u>SECTION 97.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$153,000 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses for the costs of issuance of general obligation bonds sold pursuant to Article XI-Q of the Oregon Constitution from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and reimbursements from federal service agreements, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in this section, collected or received by the Oregon Military Department for the capital debt service and related costs program.

<u>SECTION 98.</u> In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Oregon Youth Authority, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$3,115,428, which may be expended for capital debt service and related costs for outstanding general obligation bonds sold pursuant to Article XI-Q of the Oregon Constitution for the 10-Year Strategic Facilities Plan.

<u>SECTION 99.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$1,055,565 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses for the costs of issuance of general obligation bonds sold pursuant to Article XI-Q of the Oregon Constitution from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and reimbursements from federal service agreements, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in this section, collected or received by the Oregon Youth Authority for the capital debt service and related costs program.

SECTION 100. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$254,568 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses for the costs of issuance of general obligation bonds sold pursuant to Article XI-Q of the Oregon Constitution from fees, moneys or other revenues, including

Miscellaneous Receipts and reimbursements from federal service agreements, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in this section, collected or received by the Department of Corrections for the capital debt service and related costs program.

<u>SECTION 101.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the State Department of Agriculture by section 1 (1), chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5002), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, is increased by \$30,000 for wolf depredation compensation and financial assistance grant program.

<u>SECTION 102.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the State Department of Agriculture by section 1 (2), chapter \_\_\_\_. Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5002), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, is increased by \$25,000 for predator control.

<u>SECTION 103.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the State Department of Fish and Wildlife by section 1 (2), chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5511), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, is increased by \$25,000 for predator control.

<u>SECTION 104.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$585,000 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for the costs of issuance of bonds for affordable housing, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and reimbursements from federal service agreements, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in this section, collected or received by the Housing and Community Services Department.

<u>SECTION 105.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$20,307,817 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for financing construction of housing for individuals with mental illness or addiction disorders and the costs of issuance of bonds, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Housing and Community Services Department.

<u>SECTION 106.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2, chapter \_\_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5513), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses for operations from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and federal funds from the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development for contract services, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in section 2, chapter \_\_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5513), collected or received by the Housing and Community Services Department, is increased by \$2,551,972 for preservation of existing affordable housing and cost of issuance.

<u>SECTION 107.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (1), chapter \_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5526), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, tobacco tax receipts, provider taxes, Medicare receipts and federal funds for indirect cost recovery, Supplemental Security Income recoveries, Women, Infants and Children Program food rebates, the Coordinated School Health Program, the Edward Byrne Memorial State and Local Law Enforcement Assistance Grant Program, homeland security and emergency preparedness and response services, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in section 2, chapter \_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled Senate Bill 5526), collected or received by the Oregon Health Authority, for programs, is increased by \$137,152 for the Pesticide Analytical and Response Center.

<u>SECTION 108.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Education by section 2 (5), chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5016), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, is increased by \$500,000 for leadership training programs.

<u>SECTION 109.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Education by section 2 (7), chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5016), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, is increased by \$700,000 for relief nurseries.

SECTION 110. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Education by section 2 (4), chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5016), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, is increased by \$3,300,000 for the farm-to-school program.

<u>SECTION 111.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 5 (12), chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5040), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and federal funds received as reimbursement from the United States Department of Transportation, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in section 5, chapter \_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5040), collected or received by the Department of Transportation is increased by \$45,000,000 for the Connect Oregon VI program.

<u>SECTION 112.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 5 (14), chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5040), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and federal funds received as reimbursement from the United States Department of Transportation, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in section 5, chapter \_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5040), collected or received by the Department of Transportation is increased by \$10,000,000 for Coos Bay Rail Link.

SECTION 113. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 5 (17), chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5040), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and federal funds received as reimbursement from the United States Department of Transportation, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in section 5, chapter \_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5040), collected or received by the Department of Transportation is increased by \$1,354,734 for bond issuance costs.

<u>SECTION 114.</u> In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Department of Human Services, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$1,437,494 for the statewide adult abuse data and report writing system.

<u>SECTION 115.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$3,300,000 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for the statewide adult abuse data and report writing system, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and reimbursements from federal service agreements, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in this section, collected or received by the Department of Human Services.

<u>SECTION 116.</u> Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$55,000 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses for the costs of issuance of general obligation bonds sold pursuant to Article XI-Q of the Oregon Constitution from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and reimbursements from federal service agreements, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in this section, collected or received by the Department Human Services for the capital debt service and related costs program.

<u>SECTION 117.</u> In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Department of Human Services, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$839,543, which may be expended for capital debt service

and related costs for outstanding general obligation bonds sold pursuant to Article XI-Q of the Oregon Constitution for the statewide adult abuse data and report writing system.

<u>SECTION 118.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Transportation by section 1, chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5040), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for the Public Transit Division's Elderly and People with Disabilities Transportation Program, is increased by \$130,000.

SECTION 119. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$126,210,000 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from bond proceeds and other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Department of Education from the proceeds of Article XI-P general obligation bonds for the purposes of matching grants to school districts for capital costs associated with acquisition, construction, improvement, remodeling, furnishing, equipping, maintenance or repair and the costs of issuance of the bonds.

<u>SECTION 120.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the State Forestry Department by section 1 (1), chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5019), is increased by \$809,377 for sage grouse habitat protection and improvement.

<u>SECTION 121.</u> In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the State Department of Fish and Wildlife, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$500,000 for sage grouse habitat protection and improvement.

<u>SECTION 122.</u> In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Higher Education Coordinating Commission, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$62,300 for use by Oregon Solutions at Portland State University to staff the Task Force on the Willamette Falls Navigation Canal and Locks.

<u>SECTION 123.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Human Services by section 1 (3), chapter \_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2015 (Enrolled House Bill 5026), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for aging and people with disabilities and intellectual/developmental disabilities programs, is increased by \$1,800,000 for options counseling.

<u>SECTION 124.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the authorized appropriations and expenditure limitations for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for the following agencies and programs are changed by the amounts specified:

Relating to state financial administration; and declaring an emergency.

#### Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

<u>SECTION 1.</u> (1) Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 4 (1), chapter 694, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds collected or received by the Oregon Business Development Department, is increased by \$61,227 for business, innovation and trade.

(2) Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (1), chapter 694, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Oregon Business Development Department, is increased by \$443,641 for business, innovation and trade.

(3)(a) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Oregon Business Development Department by section 1 (2), chapter 694, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for debt service, is decreased by \$1,328,407.

(b) Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$1,330,500 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Oregon Business Development Department, for general obligation bond debt service.

(4) Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$400,000 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from lottery moneys allocated from the Administrative Services Economic Development Fund to the Oregon Business Development Department, for Infrastructure Finance Authority for redevelopment of the Port of Port Orford Cannery Building.

(5) Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 3 (6), chapter 694, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from lottery moneys allocated from the Administrative Services Economic Development Fund to the Oregon Business Development Department for Infrastructure Finance Authority, is increased by \$260,514 for administration of seismic rehabilitation grants.

(6) Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$100,000 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of ex-

penses from lottery moneys allocated from the Administrative Services Economic Development Fund to the Oregon Business Development Department, for Infrastructure Finance Authority for a Willamette Valley Intermodal Hub Feasibility Study.

(7) Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$200,000 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from lottery moneys allocated from the Administrative Services Economic Development Fund to the Oregon Business Development Department, for business, innovation and trade for the Oregon Wave Energy Trust.

(8) Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the amount of \$1 is established for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Oregon Business Development Department, for business, innovation and trade for the American Manufacturing Innovation District.

SECTION 2. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 5 (1), chapter 759, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds, other than those described in sections 6 and 9, chapter 759, Oregon Laws 2015, collected or received by the Department of Education, for operations, is increased by \$7,130,223 for a charter schools grant.

<u>SECTION 3.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Education by section 2 (4), chapter 759, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, to be distributed as grants-in-aid, for program costs and to purchase services for breakfast and summer food programs, is decreased by \$51,458.

<u>SECTION 4.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Education by section 1 (1), chapter 759, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for operations, is increased \$51,458 for breakfast and summer food program administration.

SECTION 5. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 5 (1), chapter 759, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds, other than those described in sections 6 and 9 of chapter 759, Oregon Laws 2015, collected or received by the Department of Education for operations, is increased by \$1,160,860 for child nutrition grants.

SECTION 6. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 7 (3), chapter 759, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of grants-in-aid, program costs, and purchased services from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Department of Education for programs other than those specified in sections 4 and 9, chapter 759, Oregon Laws 2015, is increased by \$515,200 for all other grants for the increase in the number of number of students participating in the Hospital Program.

SECTION 7. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (1), chapter 658, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training for operations, is increased by \$959,000 for developing and disseminating research-based community policing skills through the Oregon Center for Policing Excellence.

<u>SECTION 8.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the State Forestry Department by section 1 (1), chapter 809, Oregon Laws 2015, for

the biennium beginning on July 1, 2015, is increased by \$23,115,122 for the payment of emergency firefighting costs associated with the 2015 forest fire season.

SECTION 9. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (2), chapter 809, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and including federal funds from the United States Forest Service for fire protection and for research projects, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in section 2, chapter 809, Oregon Laws 2015, collected or received by the State Forestry Department, is increased by \$56,334,408 for the payment of emergency firefighting costs associated with the 2015 forest fire season.

<u>SECTION 10.</u> Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Emergency Board by section 5 (1), chapter 809, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for allocation to the State Forestry Department fire protection expenses, is decreased by \$2,054,823.

SECTION 11. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 1 (1), chapter 329, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds, collected or received by the Oregon Department of Aviation, is increased by \$265,000 to purchase grant management software.

SECTION 12. (1) Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 5 (2), chapter 761, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and federal funds received as reimbursement from the United States Department of Transportation, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in section 5, chapter 761, Oregon Laws 2015, collected or received by the Department of Transportation, is increased by \$6,231,467 for repair, response and clean-up expenses incurred during the 2015 fire season in Oregon.

(2) Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 5 (11), chapter 761, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and federal funds received as reimbursement from the United States Department of Transportation, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in section 5, chapter 761, Oregon Laws 2015, collected or received by the Department of Transportation, is increased by \$32,257 for state government service charges.

(3) Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 6 (3), chapter 761, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds other than those described in section 5, chapter 761, Oregon Laws 2015, collected or received by the Department of Transportation, is increased by \$106,176 for state government service charges.

(4) Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 5 (11), chapter 761, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and federal funds received as reimbursement from the United States Department of Transportation, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in section 5, chapter 761, Oregon Laws 2015, collected or received by the Department of Transportation, is decreased by \$23,884 for state government service charges.

(5) Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 5 (13), chapter 761, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and federal funds received as reimbursement from the United States Department of Transportation, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds

not described in section 5, chapter 761, Oregon Laws 2015, collected or received by the Department of Transportation, is decreased by \$315 for state government service charges.

(6) Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 6 (4), chapter 761, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds other than those described in section 5, chapter 761, Oregon Laws 2015, collected or received by the Department of Transportation, is decreased by \$395 for state government service charges.

(7) Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 5 (14), chapter 761, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and federal funds received as reimbursement from the United States Department of Transportation, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in section 5, chapter 761, Oregon Laws 2015, collected or received by the Department of Transportation, is decreased by \$7,423 for state government service charges.

(8) Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 6 (5), chapter 761, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds other than those described in section 5, chapter 761, Oregon Laws 2015, collected or received by the Department of Transportation, is decreased by \$105,544 for state government service charges.

(9) Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 5 (15), chapter 761, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and federal funds received as reimbursement from the United States Department of Transportation, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in section 5, chapter 761, Oregon Laws 2015, collected or received by the Department of Transportation, is decreased by \$635 for state government service charges.

(10) Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 6 (6), chapter 761, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from federal funds other than those described in section 5, chapter 761, Oregon Laws 2015, collected or received by the Department of Transportation, is decreased by \$237 for state government service charges.

SECTION 13. Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 5 (17), chapter 761, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and federal funds received as reimbursement from the United States Department of Transportation, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in section 5, chapter 761, Oregon Laws 2015, collected or received by the Department of Transportation, is decreased by \$1,354,734 for bond issuance costs.

SECTION 14. <u>SECTION 41.</u> (1) In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Emergency Board, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$3,000,000, to be allocated to the Department of Corrections for activating units at the Deer Ridge Correctional Institution to accommodate unexpected increases in the male prison population.

Notwithstanding any other law limiting expenditures, the limitation on expenditures established by section 2 (11), chapter 654, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, as the maximum limit for payment of expenses from fees, moneys or other revenues, including Miscellaneous Receipts and federal funds received from charges, but excluding lottery funds and federal funds not described in section 2, chapter 654, Oregon Laws 2015, collected or received by the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, for principal and interest payments for outstanding Article XI-O bonds, is increased by \$55,000 for the cost of issuing bonds.

SECTION 113. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of State Police by section 1 (4), chapter 696, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for administrative services, agency support, criminal justice information services and the office of the State Fire Marshal, is increased by \$1,000,000 for increased capacity in the Firearms Instant Check System program.

<u>SECTION 114</u> In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropriated to the Secretary of State, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$347,900 for replacement of the Oregon Elections System for Tracking and Reporting Election Night Reporting module.

SECTION 115. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Department of Environmental Quality by section 1 (1), chapter 593, Oregon Laws 2015, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, for air quality, is increased by \$2,500,000, for activities related to industrial emissions of air toxics.

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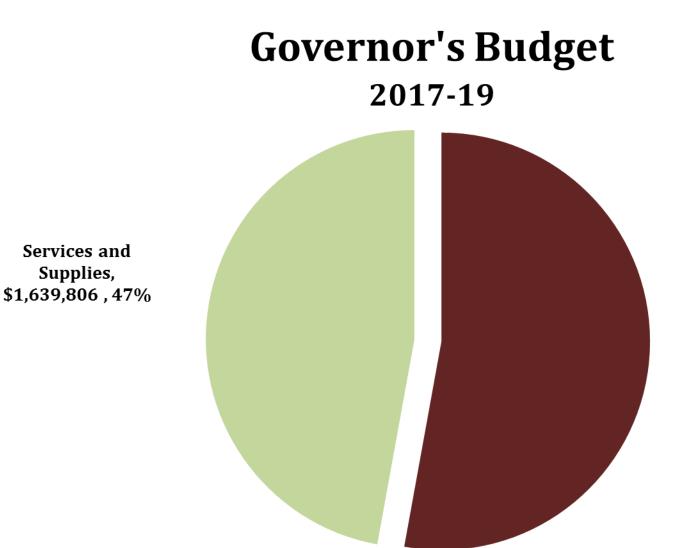

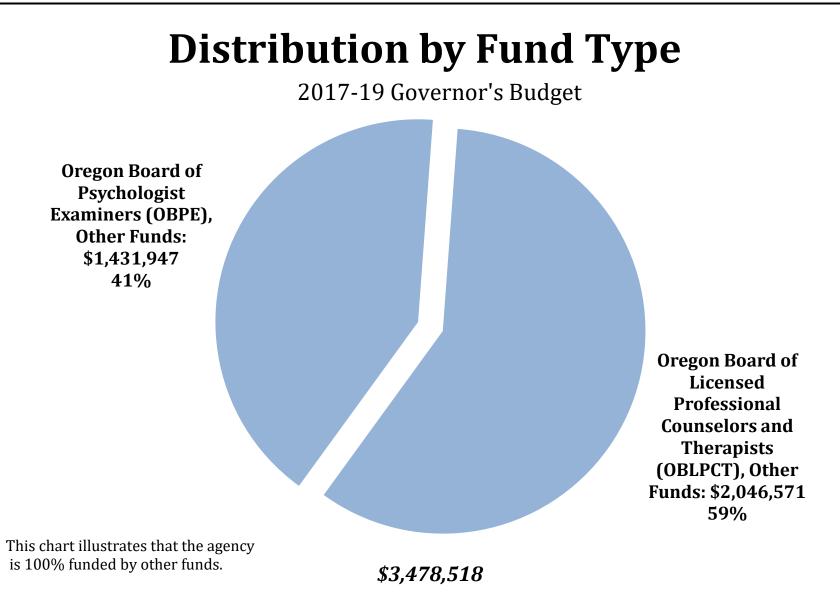
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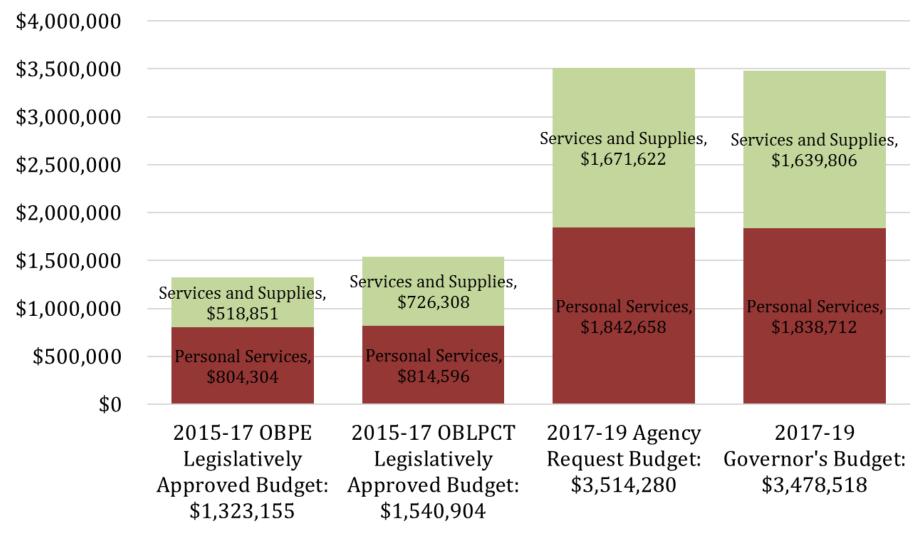

## **MISSION STATEMENT & STATUTORY AUTHORITY**

On passage of House Bill 2319, the Mental Health Regulatory Agency (MHRA) will oversee two boards that regulate mental health professions in the State: the Oregon Board of Psychologist Examiners (OBPE) and the Oregon Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists (OBLPCT). MHRA's mission is to protect and benefit the public's health and safety by promoting quality and ethical practice in mental health, and by creating and enforcing high standards for education, training, and examination to ensure that only qualified professionals administer mental health services to Oregon consumers.

### <u>Oregon Board of Psychologist Examiners – Mission and Description of the Board</u>

The mission of the Oregon Board of Psychologist Examiners (OBPE) is to promote, preserve, and protect the public health and welfare by ensuring the ethical and legal practice of psychology. OBPE was created for the purpose of determining the qualifications of applicants to practice psychology in Oregon, and issuing and renewing licensees. The Board investigates complaints of professional misconduct made against licensees, and is also charged with safeguarding the people of the State of Oregon from the dangers of unqualified and improper practice of psychology.

Practicing psychology means rendering or offering to render supervision, consultation, evaluation or therapy services to individuals, groups or organizations for the purpose of diagnosing or treating behavioral, emotional or mental disorders. It is unlawful to practice psychology or represent oneself as a psychologist without first being properly licensed by the OBPE. To "represent oneself as a psychologist" means to use any terminology, title or description of services incorporating the words "psychology," "psychological," "psychotherapy," or "psychologist," or to offer or render to individuals or to groups of individuals services included in the practice of psychology.

The Board consists of nine members. Six members are licensed psychologists and three members are from the general public, not associated with the profession. All members are appointed by the Governor to three-year terms and confirmed by the Senate. The Board hires staff to administer all official business. The Board meets bimonthly, usually at its offices in Salem. Decisions are made in open public meetings where guests are encouraged to attend.

The Board is 100% supported by "Other Funds" generated from licensing fees and civil penalties. Board program areas operate under one budget and include:

Applications: Annually, the Board processes approximately 150 applications for licensure. This process includes verification of education, work experience, other credentials, references, and a fingerprint-based national criminal background check. The Board

reviews and approves 40-50 psychologist resident supervision contracts per year, allowing licensure candidates to complete the required post-doctoral supervised work experience in Oregon.

- Examinations: The Board approves candidate eligibility to take the national written examination (the Examination for Professional Practice in Psychology, or EPPP) and an Oregon Jurisprudence Examination (OJE) developed by the Board. The OJE is administered monthly. Annually, approximately 125 candidates take the OJE.
- Licensing: The Board processes approximately 1,800 license renewals biennially to psychologists (doctorate level) and psychologist associates (master's level). In 2010, the Board streamlined its procedures by implementing biennial birth month licensure renewals. This has contributed to stabilizing the Board's cash flow. Additionally, the Board issues about 25 limited permits annually.
- Continuing Education: Licensees are required to obtain 40 hours of continuing education (CE) activities every two years, including four hours devoted to professional ethics and four hours in cultural competency training. New licensees must complete seven hours of pain management education within their first two-year renewal period. Licensees attest to having met the CE requirements at renewal, and each calendar year the Board selects a random 20% of renewing licensees for an audit. Audited licensees must provide complete proof of CE activities.
- Consumer Protection: Through its investigative staff and its review of complaints, the Board investigates complaints relating to the unethical, unprofessional, or unlicensed practice of psychology. Licensee complaints include alleged breach of ethics, confidentiality violations, inappropriate relationships with clients, negligence, incompetence, alcohol or drug use, mental health issues, failure to report abuse of vulnerable individuals, or providing false information on application for license or renewal. Allegations of sexual misconduct are especially demanding on the Board's time and resources. The Board receives approximately 60-80 complaints per year. Complaints are typically reported to the Board; however, on occasion the Board will initiate investigations when it becomes aware of alleged unethical or illegal behavior of licensees and those practicing psychology without a license. In general, after the investigation is complete, an investigator provides a final written report to the Board for its review. After evaluation of the facts and issues, the Board decides whether to dismiss the case or to take steps towards issuing a sanction. When discipline is ordered, the Board's Executive Director works with the Attorney General's office to notify the respondent about the Board's intent to impose discipline. The respondent has an opportunity to appeal the Board's notice through a contested case hearing process before an administrative law judge. Frequently, the Board and the Attorney General's office work together to explore the option of negotiating a settlement before scheduling a case hearing. The range of discipline may include refusal to issue or renew a license, issuance of a reprimand, suspension or revocation of a license, imposition of a civil penalty, or requirement for additional training or supervision.

### Oregon Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists – Mission and Description of the Board

The mission of the Oregon Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists is to protect the health and well-being of Oregon citizens by setting a strong, ethical standard of practice through the regulation of Licensed Professional Counselors and Licensed Marriage and Family Therapists. Elements of the Board's role are depicted below. The Board operates under the authority of ORS 675.705 – 675.835, the enabling legislation; ORS 676.160 – 676.405, reporting obligations of health related licensing boards; and OAR Chapter 833.

The Board was established in 1989 to ensure that only qualified individuals are licensed to practice as Licensed Professional Counselors (LPCs) and Marriage and Family Therapists (LMFTs) in Oregon. The Board is responsible for the licensure and regulation of LPCs and LMFTs, and registered LPC and LMFT interns who are pursuing post-master's degree supervised work experience to meet the licensure requirements.

The Board consists of eight members. Three members are LPCs, two are LMFTs, one is a university graduate school faculty member, and two are members are from the general public, not associated with the profession. All members are appointed by the Governor to three-year terms and confirmed by the Senate. The Board hires staff to administer all official business. The Board meets bimonthly, usually at its offices in Salem. Decisions are made in open public meetings where guests are encouraged to attend.

The Board is 100% supported by "Other Funds" generated from licensing fees and civil penalties. Board program areas operate under one budget and include:

- Applications: Annually, the Board processes approximately 700 applications for licensure. This process includes verification of education, work experience, other credentials, references, and a fingerprint-based national criminal background check. The Board registers approximately 450 interns per year, allowing licensure candidates to complete the required post-master's supervised work experience in Oregon.
- Examinations: The Board approves candidate eligibility to take an approved nationally-administered competency examination and an Oregon laws and rules exam developed by the Board. Passage of the laws and rules exam the final step before a candidate becomes licensed.
- Licensing: The Board processes approximately 4,000 license renewals and 1,000 intern registration renewals annually. Most licensees and interns renew online.

- Continuing Education: Licensees are required to obtain 40 hours of continuing education (CE) activities every two years, including six hours devoted to professional ethics and four hours in cultural competency training. The Board selects a random 20% of licensees for an audit at renewal. Audited licensees must provide complete proof of CE activities.
- Consumer Protection: Through its investigative staff and its review of complaints, the Board investigates complaints relating to the unethical, unprofessional, or unlicensed practice of psychology. Licensee complaints include alleged breach of ethics, confidentiality violations, inappropriate relationships with clients, negligence, incompetence, alcohol or drug use, mental health issues, failure to report abuse of vulnerable individuals, or providing false information on application for license or renewal. Allegations of sexual misconduct are especially demanding on the Board's time and resources. The Board receives approximately 100-120 complaints per year. ### **Environmental Factors**

The Agency incorporates the following environmental factors in developing and implementing its strategic plan and budget:

• <u>Population Growth/Migration</u>

As the state population continues to grow, the demand for qualified practitioners in the professions regulated by the Boards continues to grow as well.

### • <u>Performance Measurement</u>

The statewide initiative to quantify government performance and its effect on the state's quality of living provides the Boards with an effective mechanism to measure its progress in key performance areas, based on the Boards' mission and goals.

### • <u>Regulatory Streamlining</u>

Statewide efforts to make regulation simpler, faster and cheaper for business form the backdrop that influences much of the Boards' decision-making process in determining how to best provide services that reduce barriers to practice while retaining public protection standards.

### • Economic Conditions

While the Boards are funded solely by licensee fees and penalties and do not receive general or lottery funds, general statewide economic conditions affect Boards' operations. Changes to the structure of funding and delivery of health and mental health care may have significant impact on the mental health professions.

### <u>Professional Development</u>

Rapid developments in the professions regulated by the Agency provide an ongoing challenge to "stay ahead of the curve" and to respond quickly and effectively to clarify scope of practice questions for both practitioners and the public. There will be a heightened need for trained practitioners in health and mental wellness fields in the future.

## AGENCY STRATETIC PLAN

### 2015-17 Accomplishments

The ground work has been laid for the implementation of the "Budget Merger" (restructuring) for the two Boards to be administered under one Agency. Please see below for more information.

The Oregon Board of Psychologist Examiners (OBPE) changed the educational rules for psychologist licensure, as part of its work to strengthen the education requirements and to conform to national standards. The rule amendment modified the definition of approved doctoral program in psychology. To avoid harming any current students at the time of this change, the Board is phasing out its acceptance of doctoral degrees in psychology from programs at regionally accredited or provincially/territorially chartered institutions but which are not accredited by the American Psychological Association (APA) or Canadian Psychological Association (CPA). Degrees from programs at regionally accredited in his or her program prior to July 22, 2014 and applies by July 22, 2019; or 2) the program submitted an application to the APA or CPA for accreditation prior to the date the applicant's degree was conferred, and has been granted a site visit by the APA or CPA.

In August of 2015, the Oregon Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists (OBLPCT) established a Laws and Rules Committee (LRC) to begin the ominous task of reviewing the Oregon Administrative Rules (OARs), Chapter 833. The Education Committee (EC) was also formed, and tasked with pre-reviewing and making recommendations to the LRC regarding rule sections related to education and training. From November of 2015 through May of 2016, the Committees held 13 public meetings to go through the various rule sections piece by piece and identify needed changes. The Committees reported their progress to the Board during its meetings of December 2015, February 2016, and April 2016. At the June 3, 2016 Board meeting the LRC presented two "packages" of recommended rule changes, and the Board voted to approve these proposed rules to be noticed to the public (filed June 10, 2016). On August 5, 2016, the Board will vote to file the permanent rules, which will:

- Reduce redundant language, resulting in an 18% reduction in the number of words.
- Establish an inactive license, consistent with other health-related licensing boards.
- Streamline and better organize the rules to make them clearer to stakeholders and more straightforward to administer.
- Clarify vague language, consistent with the State's "Plain Language" policies.
- Remove the complicated five-year supervisor registry renewal requirement, and instead implements a CE requirement of three clock hours of supervision-related training for supervisors.

- Implement the streamlined statewide uniform fitness determination process and criminal records administrative rules, as mandated by HB 3168 (2013) and HB 2250 (2015).
- Clarify and amend requirements and processes for examination, rulemaking, contested case hearings, application and reapplication, information to be provided to the Board, continuing education, and investigations.
- Add a requirement that licensees complete four clock hours of cultural competency continuing education during each two-year reporting period, in accordance with HB 2611 (2013).

Additionally, both Boards have streamlined their work through increased usage of committees. Both have begun the process of creating a paperless office and maximizing usable office square footage. Both Boards have implemented SB 230 (2015) which required them to collaborate with the Oregon Health Authority (OHA) and adopt rules that will require renewing licensees to provide specified information (the Health Care Workforce Data Questionnaire) and pay a fee established by OHA.

OBPE, OBLPCT, and the Board of Licensed Social Workers (BLSW), established a joint Licensure Exemption Workgroup (LEW) tasked with reviewing the licensure exemptions and considering whether to recommend changes. The LEW has recommended, and each board has approved, to move forward with a jointly sponsored legislative concept for the 2017 session that will remove the "Counselor Education Exemption" from BLPCT statute (HB 2361).

## Short-Term Board Objectives

- Implement "Budget Merger" (administrative restructuring). Beginning in October of 2013, the Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists (OBLPCT) and the Board of Psychologist Examiners (OBPE; collectively "Boards") entered into an Interagency Agreement to establish a Pilot Project to share the same Executive Director and Management Analyst. The Boards agreed to cooperate and share resources but maintain their independence as health regulatory boards. The Pilot Project was renewed to continue for the 2015-17 biennium. During the 2015-17 budget development, the Boards agreed to develop a plan for a more permanent arrangement for presentation during the 2017-19 biennium. Accordingly, the Boards have evaluated the results of the pilot project and determined, with the support of the Governor's Office and the Chief Financial Office, to bring the budgets of the Boards under one agency to be titled "Mental Health Regulatory Agency" pursuant to HB 2319. Implementation of this reorganization includes:
  - Increasing administrative efficiencies by determining and implementing the most effective use of resources.

- Training new staff members, and increasing focus on cross-training for all staff.
- Simplifying accounting processes through resource sharing and cost allocation.
- Streamlining operations and aligning processes between agencies, including implementation of the same database programs.
- Establish a new Board database. The Boards have determined to replace their outdated and dysfunctional databases with a new online multifunctional database. The database is more secure and user friendly, and comes with new capabilities that will allow the Agency to operate more efficiently. Implementation will include:
  - Working with the database vendor to effectively transfer data and determine necessary database functions.
  - New online applications and license renewals that will help to reduce staff processing times and avoid repetitive and manual data entry.
  - New licensee and consumer ability to order and pay for information requests online.
  - Improved procedures for application, renewal and investigation, resulting in enhanced customer service.
- **Co-locate and maximize office space.** Implementation will include:
  - Relocating the Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists to an office space next to the Board of Psychologist Examiners.
  - The Agency will determine the most efficient layout for flow and delivery of services, and become better situated for the Boards to share resources.
  - Continuation and completion of the Boards' project to scan and digitally store all licensure and disciplinary files, and to establish a "paperless" office. This will reduce the square footage of office space currently used to store paper files and allow more room for Agency growth.
- **Improve the Disciplinary Supervision Process (OBPE).** The Board has established a subcommittee to review and recommend improvements to the procedures for licensees under supervision as a result of Board order. The subcommittee is tasked with:
  - Revising form letters and explanatory materials to be clearer and more informative for the licensee and supervisor.
  - Creating a "registry" pool of potential licensee disciplinary supervisors, denoting training, experience, and specialty supervision areas.
  - Reviewing statewide and national trends in supervision.
  - Developing disciplinary supervision training and materials.

## Improve the website and Board forms (OBLPCT).

- Develop updated materials needed following the Board's rule overhaul.
- Improve website readability and flow, and ensure plain language standards are utilized.
- Create new explanatory materials, such as FAQs, to help reduce the volume of calls and emails received by staff.

The Agency's other objectives for 2017-2019 include continuing to build on existing programs and activities shown to provide measurable and meaningful results while identifying new ways to improve the Boards' positive effect on consumers and the professions it regulates.

## **CRITERIA FOR 2017-19 BUDGET DEVELOPMENT**

The Agency focused on the costs of operating the Boards professionally and successfully to ensure the protection of Oregon's public and supporting the Excellence in State Government. The Agency reviewed and evaluated the cost of Board operations, the need to ensure performance measure excellence, and the ability to meet the long-term and short-term goals of the Boards. Below is a brief discussion of the criteria used in the 2017-19 Board budget development process.

### **Cost of Board Operations**

The Agency based the 2017-19 budget on the costs associated with operating the Boards to ensure the protection of Oregon's public. The budget was reviewed to meet the needs of the agency and its stakeholders. Primary costs are related to staffing and office space needed to meet the increasing workload as a result of the growing number of licensure applications received, license renewals processed, and complaints submitted to the Board.

### **Performance Measure Excellence**

The Agency budgeted for the resources needed to ensure the achievement of performance measure excellence.

### Long Term and Short Term Goals

The Agency took into account the Boards' long-term and short-term goals in the 2017-19 Budget.

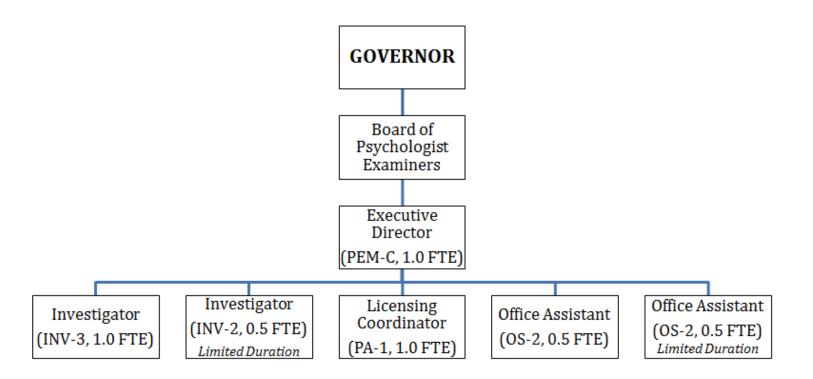

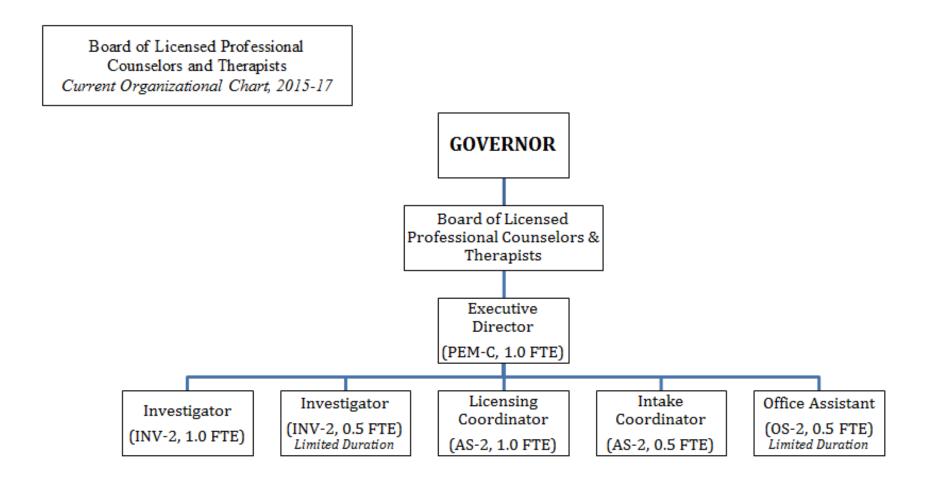

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### **REVENUE FORECAST NARRATIVE (107BF02)**

#### Sources

The Agency is wholly Other Funds supported from licensing fees, applications, examinations, and other miscellaneous sources, including civil penalties and sales of publications. Interest earned on agency funds accrues to the General Fund and thus does not constitute an income source for the agency. The Agency supports two similar programs: the Oregon Board of Psychologist Examiners (OBPE) and the Oregon Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists.

### **General Limitations on Use**

OBPE's revenues are funds dedicated under ORS 675.140 to carry out its administrative and regulatory functions. ORS 675.115 requires OBPE not to establish fees or charges in excess of the cost for which the fee or charge is established. OBPLCT's revenues are funds dedicated under ORS 675.805 to carry out the administrative and regulatory functions of the Board. ORS 675.785(3) grants the OBLPCT authority to establish non-refundable fees through administrative rules.

### Basis for 2015-2017 Biennium Revenue Estimates

The revenue forecast is predominantly based on a conservative assumption of growth in the number of licensees. The criminal background check fees are entirely a pass-through item, offset by the equivalent amount to be paid by the Board to OSP, but are still counted as expenditures and charged against the Boards' expenditure limitations. Approximately 97% of OBPE's revenue, and 99% of OBLPCT's revenue, is derived from fees paid by licensees, interns and applicants for renewals, permits, applications and examinations. The remainder is revenue received from civil penalties paid by licensees, applicants and unlicensed persons practicing in violation of the law, and miscellaneous service charges.

  - o Laws and administrative rules: \$5

During 2017-19, OBPE is projected to renew 1965 licenses, receive 334 new licensure applications, assess 33 delinquent fees, register 259 jurisprudence exam candidates, and issue 61 limited permits. These represent an expected 4% annual increase based on a ten-year history of average annual growth rates in the licensee base.

Following is OBLPCT's fee schedule for the 2015-17 biennium:

- Application for Licensure (includes criminal background check fee): \$222.25
- Initial License: \$125
- Annual License Renewal:
  - o Without criminal background check: \$125
  - With criminal background check: \$172.25

- Annual Intern Registration Renewal:
  - Without criminal background check: \$80
  - With criminal background check; \$127.25
- Restoration fee: \$50
- Duplicate license or certificate of licensure: \$5
- Verification of licensure or examination scores for applicant or licensee to other licensing or certifying agencies: \$10

During 2017-19, OBLPCT is projected to issue 811 initial licensees, renew 7218 licenses and 2,158 internships, receive 2,070 new licensure applications, and assess 238 delinquent fees. These represent an expected 7% annual increase based on a ten-year history of average annual growth rates in licensees and interns.

### **Proposed Changes in Revenue Sources or Fees**

This 2017-19 Governor's Budget includes a Policy Option Package (#101) that will increase BLPCT licensure and internship renewal fees by \$40. This proposed fee change is projected to increase revenue by \$320,600 for the biennium.

### **Proposals for New Legislation**

1) HB 2361: Counselor Education Exemption (OBLPCT, OBPE & the Oregon Board of Licensed Social Workers)

The Boards propose to eliminate the "Counselor Education Exemption" of ORS 675.825(4), which exempts from the licensure requirement to practice counseling or marriage and family therapy individuals who lack the education required to become licensed. The Exemption states that the Oregon Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists (OBLPCT) statutes do not prevent these unqualified individuals from practice that includes assessing, diagnosing and treating mental, emotional or behavioral disorders. The exemption restricts the OBLPCT's ability to protect the public from the unqualified and improper practice of professional counseling and marriage and family therapy, posing a risk of harm to public consumers of mental health services.

### 2) HB 2319: Budget Merger (OBLPCT & OBPE)

Beginning in October of 2013, the Oregon Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists and the State Board of Psychologist Examiners ("Boards") entered into an Interagency Agreement to establish a Pilot Project to share the same Executive Director and Management Analyst. The Boards agreed to cooperate and share resources but maintain their independence as health regulatory boards. The Pilot Project was renewed to continue for the 2015-2017 biennium.

The Boards have now evaluated the results of the Pilot Project and determined, with the support of the Governor's Office and the Chief Financial Office, to bring the budgets of the Boards under one agency to be titled "Mental Health Regulatory Agency." This will help to increase administrative efficiency, simplify accounting processes, and help to streamline operations for the Boards who are seeing an everincreasing volume of licensees and investigations. Each Board will maintain its separate revenues and expenses through separate appropriations under one budget.

### 3) HB 2328: Board Name Change (OBPE)

The Board of Psychologist Examiners proposes to change its name to "Oregon Board of Psychology." The Board has found that its agency name is cumbersome and reflects an antiquated notion of the Board's function. It may also confuse the public. The Board no longer administers the national exam (EPPP) and has transitioned from an oral to a written jurisprudence exam. The mission of the Board is much broader than examination: to promote, preserve, and protect the public health and welfare by ensuring the ethical and legal practice of psychology. Similarly, the Oregon Board of Medical Examiners changed its name to the Oregon Medical Board (SB 147, 2007), effective 2008. OMB noted the trend in other states to eliminate the word "examiners."

### 4) HB 2329: Disciplinary Cost Assessment (OBPE)

The Board of Psychologist Examiners proposes to add the authority to impose disciplinary costs on respondents who have been assessed Board sanction. OBPE has faced ever increasing expenses associated with the disciplinary process, including attorney general and office of administrative hearing fees; however, the agency does not have the authority to assess disciplinary costs as do other health-related boards (medical, dentistry, social work, counselors and therapists, chiropractic, massage therapists, etc.). In addition, it is common practice for frivolous cases to be disputed without second thought or consequence. The legal costs of defending the Board's action, including the hearing itself, falls primarily on the licensees of the Board and can amount to upwards of \$100,000 or more.

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### **ESSENTIAL PACKAGES**

#### **Purpose:**

The essential packages and current adjustments are needed to bring the base budget to current service level and represent the cost for continuing legislatively adopted programs for 2017-2019. Note: these essential packages relate to the Oregon Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists. The essential packages for the Oregon Board of Psychologist Examiners may be found in that budget document.

### 010 - Vacancy Factor and Non-PICS Personnel Service

This package includes budget savings reasonably expected during the 2017-19 biennium from staff turnover, and inflation adjustments for unemployment assessments, overtime, temporary employees, shift differentials and mass transit taxes. The total for this essential package is (\$2,822).

### 022 - Phased-Out Programs and One-Time Costs

This package includes program programs funded for less than 24 months during the 2015-17 biennium (phase-ins), programs that will be suspended during the 2017-19 biennium (phase-outs), and other one-time costs. The Board is phasing out Services and Supplies costs associated with two 2015-17 limited duration positions: Investigator 2 (0.5 FTE) and Office Specialist 2 (0.5 FTE). The total for this essential package is (\$35,956).

### 031 - Standard Inflation

This package includes the cost of goods and services adjusted for anticipated inflation. For the 2017-19 biennium, the standard inflation factor is 3.7%, and includes services and supplies, non-PICS personal services costs, capital outlay, and some special payments. The non-state employee personnel costs (contract providers) rate, as applied to the Professional Services line item, is 4.1%. The total for this essential package is \$53,616.

### 032 - Above Standard Inflation

This package includes the amount above standard inflation for Other Services and Supplies. The total for this essential package is \$54,380.

### 091 - Statewide Adjustment DAS Chgs

This package adjusts Department of Administrative Service fees from the ARB based on new estimated charges for services for telecommunications, data processing and other services and supplies. The total for this essential package is (\$14,694).

#### 092 - Statewide AG Adjustment

This package adjusts Attorney General Rates from the published price list at ARB of \$198/hour to \$185/hour in the Governor's Budget. The total for this essential package is (\$20,801).

### POLICY OPTION PACKAGE 100 - "BUDGET MERGER" - MOVING A122 INTO A108

### **Purpose:**

Beginning in October of 2013, the Oregon Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists (OBLPCT) and the Oregon Board of Psychologist Examiners (OBPE; collectively "Boards") entered into an Interagency Agreement to establish a Pilot Project to share the same Executive Director and Management Analyst. The Boards agreed to cooperate and share resources but maintain their independence as health regulatory boards. The Pilot Project was renewed to continue for the 2015-2017 biennium. During the budget development process for the 2015-17 biennium, the DAS budget analyst presented that the Boards would bring forth a plan for merging the budget of the two boards for the 2017-19 biennium, and this was favorably discussed by legislators in subcommittee. The Boards have now evaluated the results of the Pilot Project and in light of its success have determined, with the support of the Governor's Office and the Chief Financial Office, to bring the budgets of the Boards under one agency to be titled "Mental Health Regulatory Agency."

This package is the companion to HB 2319, which proposes to merge the budgets of the Boards, and to Policy Option Package 101-Budget Balancing, which covers personnel and facility changes associated with this proposal.

### How Achieved:

This "budget merger" proposal will restructure the administration of the Boards under one agency. Each Board will continue to operate independently under their respective statutory authorities, and will maintain separate revenues and expenses through separate appropriations under one budget. This proposal will promote cost avoidance through increased administrative efficiency, simplified accounting processes, and streamlined operations for the Boards who are seeing an ever-increasing volume of licensees and investigations. Centralizing tasks such as budgeting, personnel and state reporting requirements will allow agency management to increase focus on mission-focused responsibilities. This administrative merger is consistent with the June 2012 Secretary of State Audit Report on Boards and Commissions in that it promotes better accountability and oversight of and by board members, proper stewardship of resources, and increased ability to utilize internal controls such as segregation of critical financial and personnel functions- without merging the boards. The Boards' ability to work more effectively and efficiently will result in improved customer service and enhanced ability to protect the public.

The Boards have met with representatives from the Department of Administrative Services Chief Financial Office, Labor Relations, Shared Financial Services, the Governor's Office, and the Department of Justice to discuss the implications of this proposal and strategies for implementation. The Boards discussed the planning of this reorganization during several public meetings, and have voted in favor of moving forward the proposal. Implementation will be more straightforward because the Boards have been operating under a combined

management structure and resource sharing strategy pursuant to the Pilot Project since 2013. This concept will allow for the introduction of additional opportunities for efficiencies including shared staff duties, eliminating redundant functions, cross-training, agency preparedness for staff absences and turnover, and further resource sharing.

### **Staffing Impact:**

This proposal requires some reorganization of current Board staffing, as described in Policy Option Package 101- Budget Balancing.

### **Quantifying Results:**

This proposal will allow the agency to meet the following strategic plan goals:

- Streamline Board operations
- Maximize administrative efficiency
- Optimize staffing and facilities to meet resource needs

The agency will review trends in key performance measures, particularly customer satisfaction and board best practices ratings, in order to quantify the results if this proposal is approved. Additionally, the agency will review processing times for complaints and licensure applications each year.

### **Revenue Source:**

The funding source is 100% Other Funds from licensing-related fees. This package does not anticipate changes in revenues or expenditures; it moves the entire budget of OBPE (122) into Mental Health Regulatory Agency (108).

The Board of Psychologist Examiners' budget is proposed to be reestablished under the Oregon Mental Health Regulatory Agency pursuant to HB 2319. Please refer to that budget document for Policy Option Packages 101-105 affecting this Board.

### **POLICY OPTION PACKAGE 101 – BUDGET BALANCING**

### **Purpose:**

This package is the companion to HB 2319 and Policy Option Package 100- Budget Merger, which propose to merge the budgets of the Board of Psychologist Examiners (OBPE) and the Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists (OBLPCT; collectively "Boards"). It will request changes in staffing and facilities, and fee increases for OBLPCT.

### How Achieved:

### <u>Staffing</u>

This proposal includes the following additional positions necessary to support agency functions.

### Investigator 2 (1.0 FTE)

During the 2015-17 biennium, each Board was granted a 0.5 FTE Investigator 2 position, with the intention to hire one shared full time investigator. It is requested that this position be reestablished as a permanent position. This will help the agency meet its strategic goals of timely complaint investigation processing and optimal customer satisfaction to those who have filed complaints and respondents subject to complaints. Investigators, who are facing an ever increasing number of investigation requests, must dedicate significant time to each case to ensure that Board members have sufficient information to take appropriate action based on the facts. The Investigator 2 performs several critical functions, including:

• Investigations: Evaluate complaints submitted to the Board to identify legal issues and determine jurisdiction. Research and apply statues, rules, interpretations, agency policies, case law, and related federal law to allegations contained in complaints. Determine plan of inquiry that includes interviewing witnesses and gathering written information. Serve subpoenas when needed to access information critical to investigation. Prepare letters, collections notices, and compliance agreements. Negotiate settlement / resolution with respondents and their representatives in coordination with the Executive Director (ED) and Assistant Attorney General (AAG). Analyze medical bills, records, notes and specialized documents pertaining to the practice of counseling, therapy, psychology and other mental health records. Prepare accurate and detailed written reports summarizing investigations, findings and recommendations as requested by the Board. Review legal documents consisting of Default Orders, Stipulated Orders, Final Orders, Corrective Action Agreements, Addendums, Notices of Intent, and Amended Notices of Intent. Analyze Licensees' responses and prepare for interviews requiring thorough knowledge and insight into the individual. Provide written reports for the Board's AAG to ensure accuracy of public legal documents. Coordinate the Consumer Protection Committee, including creating agendas, submitting preliminary investigative reports, and seeking advice

as needed. Analyze and summarize information gathered; write investigative reports that address each alleged violation and any new issues that arise during the investigation. Maintain contact with any contract Board investigators; assist with contractor investigations and review, edit and compile reports and documents to ensure thoroughness and completeness as necessary. Present investigation report to the Board, answer Board questions, and ensure that the full report is sufficient to be used as evidence in administrative hearings and in court. Provide oral and written testimony as necessary during contested case hearings and appeals.

- Compliance Enforcement, Reporting and Tracking: Enter disciplinary information into Board's licensing database. Use licensing database to track complaints and develop reports. Report final adverse licensure actions to the National Practitioner Databank (NPDB). Monitor collection of civil penalties. Track delinquent accounts. Send notices when payments are past due. Refer overdue accounts to Department of Revenue for collection. Maintain files and update database. Ensure accurate recordkeeping. Analyze and evaluate complaints on an ongoing basis in order to plan and prioritize the timely processing of a large caseload. Develop and complete special studies about compliance or noncompliance with agency rules, policies. Develop reports that portray information about the Board's complaint process. Create discipline reports for the Board website. Serve as agency Law Enforcement Data Systems (LEDS) representative. Monitor agency compliance with the Criminal Justice Information System (CJIS) security policies and procedures. Ensure accurate reporting of public compliance actions taken by the Board. Maintain accurate complaint and investigations statistics and report as requested. Maintain and organize case files and organize in compliance with public records law. Review supervisory reports and track compliance of individuals who have been disciplined by the Board. Raise concern and act quickly when appropriate, to protect the public from harm. Develop other reports as needed.
- Other Important Functions: Process criminal background checks of license applicants and licensees. Review background check results and identify criminal behavior that may lead to denial of a license or an investigation. Provide assistance and training to Board staff and Board members about investigation process and confidentiality. Identify and recommend changes in policy and procedures related to investigations and compliance issues to improve clarity and enforceability. Serve as point of contact for calls from the public regarding statutes and rules related to ethics, code of conduct, and the licensing requirements. Respond to compliance-related public records requests and subpoenas. Provide guidance and explain laws, rules and procedures to the Board's constituents. Attend various Board meetings as needed and related to compliance actions, rules and laws. Develop, recommend and implement policies and procedures necessary to ensure compliance with State rules and statutes, as approved by the ED. Compose articles for the Board newsletter.

### Office Specialist 2 (1.5 FTE)

During the 2015-17 biennium, each Board was granted a 0.5 FTE Office Specialist 2 position. It is requested that these positions be reestablished as permanent positions, and also that an additional 0.5 FTE permanent Office Specialist 2 position be granted. This will

help the agency meet its strategic goals of optimal customer satisfaction to stakeholders. This position provides essential administrative support to other agency staff and management, and is the front-line customer service representative. The Office Specialist 2 performs several important functions, including:

- Administrative Support: Prepare and distribute board and committee meeting packets. Post and distribute public meeting notices. Coordinate bi-monthly board meeting logistics, including signage; catering; set up and break-down. Create event entries and ensure accuracy of the Agency external and shared calendars. Coordinate all travel logistics; including airline and lodging reservations; and ground transportation, as needed. Prepare Travel Expense Detail Sheet for board member and staff travel reimbursements. Prepare monthly board member Per Diem Report and submit for approval. Log and run database report for checks received. Maintain accounts receivable records and submit reports to DAS. Prepare bi-weekly check vouchers for payment. Coordinate Agency SPOTS card account, ensuring applicable requirements are met. Coordinate with vendors and IT contractor to establish email and phone accounts, setup computers and iPads, and obtain office equipment for new Board members and staff.
- General Office Duties: Answer the phone and respond to emails; answer general inquiries from the public, licensees and applicants; transfer calls or emails to other staff or management as needed. Maintain office filing systems in accordance with office policies and procedures. Prepare paperwork for scanning; scan and save documents to the correct location. Monitor for completeness and accuracy. Procure office goods and services; maintain office supply cabinets and supply room. Prepare and send basic correspondence, forms and other requests for information such as verifications and mailing lists. Provide all incoming mail functions: sort, date stamp, and refer incoming mail to appropriate staff. Prepare regular and certified mailings, process outgoing mail, create certificates of service as needed. Update and maintain licensee and applicant information changes in database. Support the licensing and investigative programs by performing various clerical functions, including copying, labeling, filing, and scheduling. Organize agency newsletter; assemble articles and help edit. Periodically update a desk manual of duties & procedures.
- Application Processing: Create and maintain accurate applicant record information, and update the applicant checklist and database as documents are received. Monitor incoming application and renewal materials. Report missing items, inconsistencies, or other documentation issues to the Licensing Coordinator. Respond to general questions regarding the licensure process, explaining OBPE administrative rules as able, and referring difficult questions to other office staff or the Operations Manager. Update and maintain licensee and applicant information changes in database.

### Administrative Specialist 2 (0.5 FTE)

The Agency requests an additional 0.5 FTE permanent Administrative Specialist 2 position (there is currently 1.5 FTE for this position) to support the agency's strategic goals of optimal customer satisfaction to stakeholders by ensuring timely processing of

license renewals and issuance of new licenses to qualified individuals. This position is critical to the agency's licensing program, with functions including:

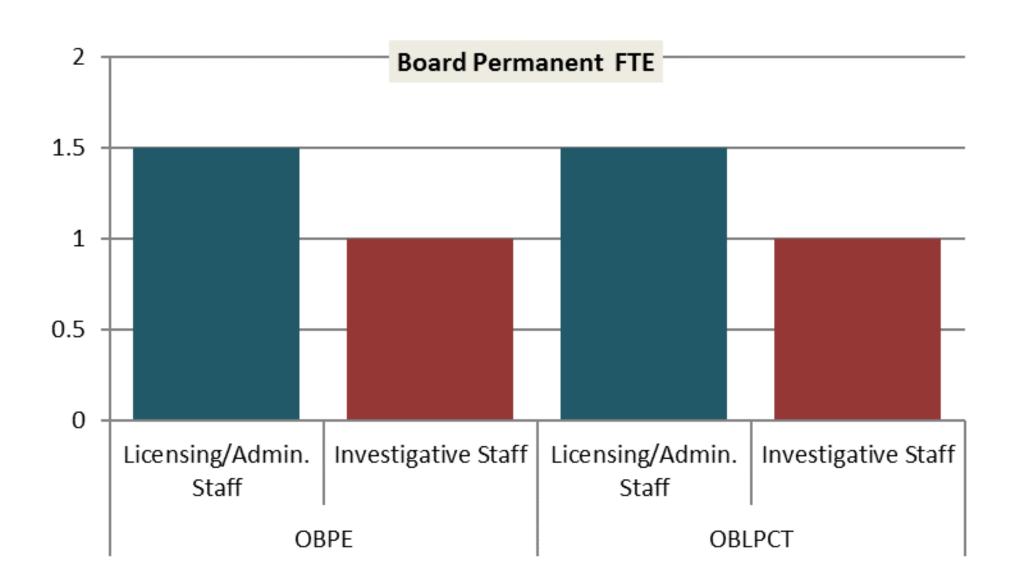
- Licensing: Perform final application file review once examination requirements are complete. Determine if applicant meets the criteria for licensure. If everything is in order, issue a license and update database. Prepare a report of new licensee information for Board review and ratification at each meeting. Review and approve requests for licensure status changes (active, inactive, retired, etc.), including reactivation. Calculate prorated residual licensing fees and continuing education requirements based on reactivation date, and update database. Create wall certificates and duplicate licenses.
- Renewals: Send monthly renewal notices for licensees and interns coming due. Ensure notices are timely and accurate. Run daily database import of online renewals, confirm payments and submit info updates, in coordination with IT contractor. Refer compliance issues such as "yes" responses to character and fitness questions or failure to designate a records custodian. Notify licensees/interns of incomplete renewal materials received, or missing or incorrect fee amount provided. Notify licensees/interns of late renewals and reapplication; impose delinquent fees. Ensure statuses are updated and accurate in the database. Archive files on expiration. Issue renewal licenses as appropriate. Update database and print licenses.
- Examinations: Determine examination(s) needed for licensure pursuant to OAR. Register eligible candidates for competency examinations on request. Notify applicants when the Law and Rules Exam and initial licensure fee are the last items needed for licensure. Email to applicants the instructions, exam, and form. Grade Law and Rules Exams and notify candidates of score. Monitor applicants' compliance with the rule requirements, including deadlines to attempt or pass exams. Notify applicants of impending deadlines. Refer potential violations to the Operations Manager. Monitor and recommend changes in exam items.
- Continuing Education: Monitor CE reported at license renewal and follow-up if needed. Randomly select licensees for CE audit using the database in even-numbered years. Ensure renewal notice includes notification of audit requirements and accurate instructions. Review CE reports and evidence of completion for compliance with OAR Chapter 833 Division 80. Notify licensees of incomplete submissions and give time to provide missing documentation. Approve and notify licensees of acceptable submissions. Prepare reports describing deficient or questionable submissions for Board or committee review, in coordination with the Operations Manager.
- Administrative Support: Monitor and recommend changes in policies, procedures, systems, forms, and website materials to the Operations Manager as needed to ensure the efficient flow of information and delivery of services. Communicate directly with licenses, interns, applicants, and members of the public to clarify requirements for licensure, renewal, examination, and CE; required documentation; and status. Maintain an accurate record of correspondence. Run credit card deposit reports and send to accounting. Coordinate with IT contractor as needed. Submit refund requests pursuant to OBLPCT Refund Policy. Create licensing-related newsletter articles. Help edit newsletters. Update database with information pertaining to applicants, interns and licensees. Prepare paperwork for scanning; scan and save documents to the correct location. Monitor for completeness and accuracy.

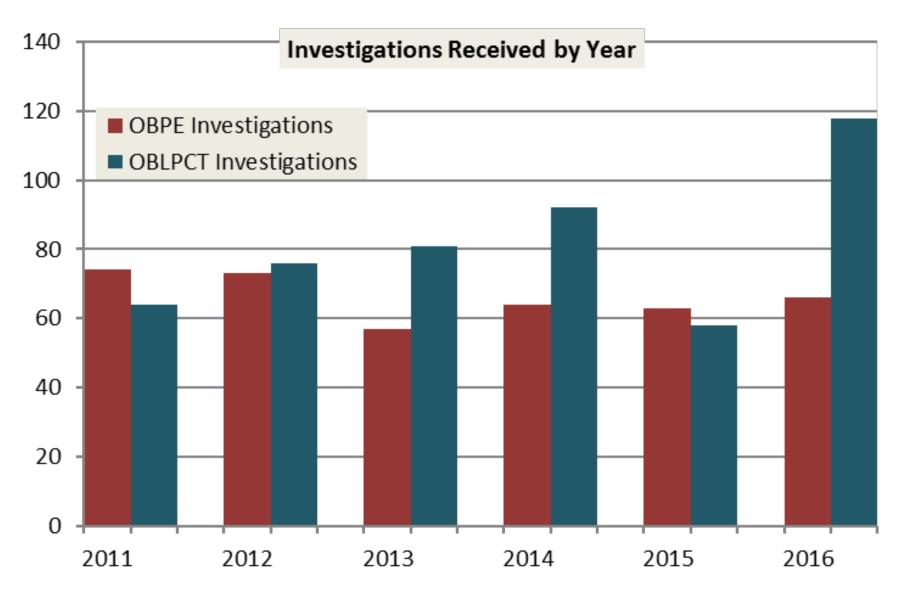
### Office Assistant 2 (1.0 FTE)

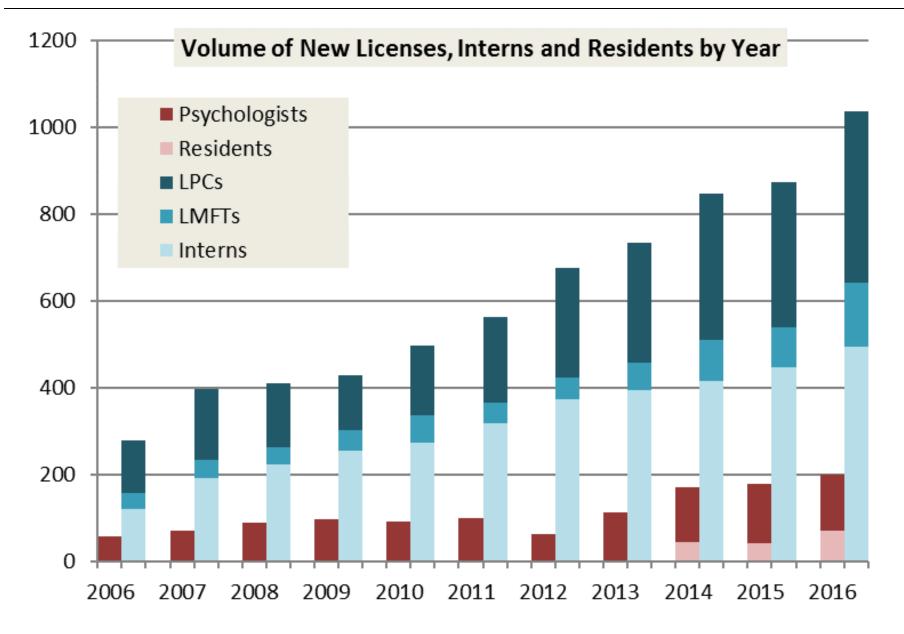
The Agency requests one permanent part-time Office Specialist 2 position to help the agency meet its strategic goals of optimal customer satisfaction to stakeholders. This position provides important administrative support to the agency, which allows other staff to focus on their specific mission-focused tasks. The primary purpose of this position is to perform a variety of general clerical tasks to establish and maintain a paperless office, and to support licensure and compliance documentation and archiving. The Administrative Specialist 2's specific functions include:

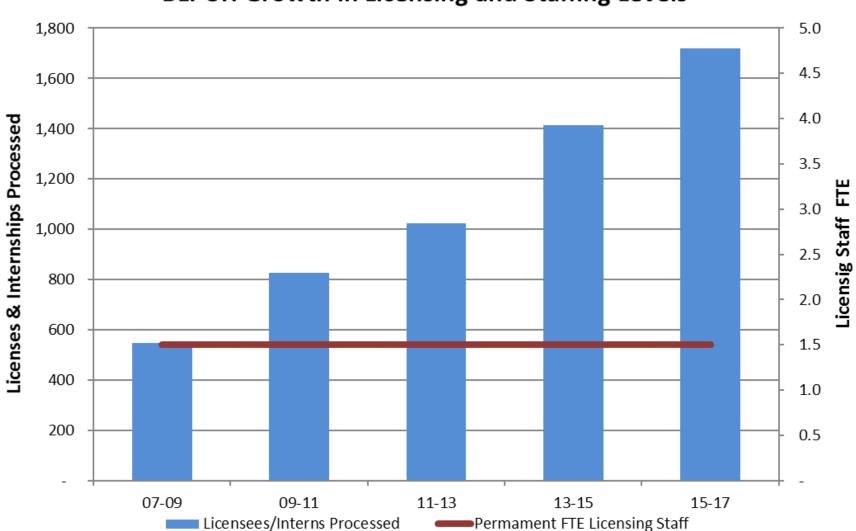
- Document Scanning and Processing: Prepare, scan, and catalogue agency records in accordance with the Document Scanning and Storage Policy. Review scanned images for quality. Maintain the archiving and retention records. Identify naming conventions and metadata for electronic archiving. Name and save scanned electronic records in the appropriate location and under the appropriate retention schedule. Verify data and update database as documents are scanned.
- General Clerical Duties: File documents in accordance with office policies and procedures. Send basic correspondence as directed. Enter basic licensing and complaint data into the OBLPCT database. Operate copy machines, fax machine, and other office equipment and ensure paper trays are filled. Assist Office Specialist with Board and committee meeting preparation and set-up.

The following graphics demonstrate the Boards' significant increases in volume of applications and complaint investigations, while staffing levels have remained mostly the same.









## **BLPCT: Growth in Licensing and Staffing Levels**

The number of new Licensed Professional Counselor (LPC) and Licensed Marriage and Family Therapists (LMFTs) licensees issued has been increasing by an average of 14.1% per year over the last ten years. Also during this time, the number of psychologist licenses issued each year has increased by an average 12.2%, and the number of LPC and LMFT Interns registered increased by an average 16.1% per year. The number of new licenses and interns each year has more than tripled in the past 10 years for BLPCT, yet during this time this Board has maintained only 1.5 FTE permanent licensing staff. The number of investigations received by the Boards each year reached 184 in 2016, a 33% increase from the 138 received just five years prior in 2011. The Boards have been utilizing limited duration positions, temporary staff, and overtime work from current staff in order to meet these growing demands.

These additional requested positions will allow the agency to better manage the workload and improve services provided to customers. Staffing resources will be allocated based on work volume: 35% to OBPE, and 65% to OBLPCT.

This proposal also includes some reclassifications to support the new Agency structure:

### Agency Management

Between the two Boards, there are two Executive Director (Principal Executive/Manager C) positions. The agency request to reclassify one of these positions to an Executive Director (Principal Executive/Manager D) to administer both Boards, and one of these positions to an Operations Manager (Operations and Policy Analyst 3) to support the Executive Director and Agency operations, with duties including:

• Policy Analysis and Legislative Coordination: Formulate legislative and policy strategy and advise the Executive Director on the implications of different policy options. Design operational procedures and systems to support policy direction, assessing risks and benefits. Plan and coordinate operational improvement projects. Recommend, develop and implement changes in policy, procedure, and administrative rule based on legislative or judicial action or analysis of legislative intent. Develop policy options from legislative changes for the Boards' consideration. Collaborate with representatives from other state agencies, legislative offices and the public. Assist the Executive Director in development and implementation of the Agency Budget. Analyze Agency position and develop financial projections, policy option packages, and fiscal impacts. Recommend fee changes. Review, track and analyze legislation at the state and federal levels that may affect regulated professions or Boards and evaluate impact to programs and operations. Plan needed changes in operations and procedures. Perform research, present proposals, and recommend legislative changes. Draft language for legislative bills. Develop background materials, work with Executive Director to coordinate the legislative process, and provide testimony before legislative committees regarding Agency related bills. Identify the need for changes, research and write administrative rules. Serve as the Agency's Administrative Rules Coordinator. Manage workgroups, stakeholder advisory committees, and public hearings. Identify the impact of rule changes and coordinate implementation. Identify legislative and executive intent through research of laws and court decisions related to the Agency's regulated professions. Coordinate findings with Agency legal counsel. Manage research projects to analyze Agency policy and operations, and summarize findings and recommendations. Ensure compliance

with state and federal reporting requirements and facilitate audits. Develop state mandated plans, including affirmative action, information security, and risk reports. Attend Board and committee meetings and present policy issues, research, and trends in the regulated professions. Interpret and explain regulations, policies and procedures to Agency staff, board members, legislators, and the public. Represent the Boards before state and national associations and universities by explaining Board policies and procedures.

- Program Management/Personnel Supervision: Coordinate and lead planning initiatives for the boards, and develop Agency strategic plan in consultation with the Executive Director and boards. Supervise Agency licensing and administrative staff. Manage the licensing programs by assigning work, establishing and monitoring work procedures consistent with agency policy, establishing work schedules, and overseeing work in order to meet established goals, objectives and target dates. Interview and recommend hiring of licensing and administrative staff to the Executive Director, evaluate supervisee performance, and recommend personnel actions such as promotions, transfers, disciplinary action, and termination to ensure adequate and competent staffing. Monitor supervisees' work performed to ensure compliance with applicable laws, rules, policies and procedures, adequate customer service, and current and accurate data entry into the database. Serve as liaison between licensing staff and compliance staff to ensure timely mutual requests for information. Coordinate agency accounting and debt collection policies and procedures. Provide support to staff to ensure that training needs are met. Develop and budget annual training needs. Provide mentoring and conduct annual performance reviews of licensing and administrative staff. Make recommendations for merit increases or decreases and discipline and/or employee discharge to the Executive Director. Monitor staff workload and make recommendations to the Executive Director for staffing increases/decreases.
- Operational Research and Evaluation: Evaluate the effectiveness of systems and programs throughout the Agency, including ٠ licensing, license renewal, examination, intern/resident programs, investigations, and enforcement, for each board and program overseen by the Agency. Evaluate program operations and services of the regulated Boards. Through consultation with the Executive Director, coordinate planning initiatives and develop processes for systematic organizational improvement. Recommend and plan actions to improve compliance with board policy and state regulations and program goals. Collaborate with Executive Director on strategic planning to formulate long-range objectives, short-term operational goals and implementation plans for Agency administration. Develop procedures, and evaluate allocation of resources between various programs. Participate on committees of the Boards or stakeholder groups to gather information or plan studies to evaluate key performance data. Lead research studies that evaluate each Board's compliance with state and federal reporting requirements for administrative performance and national reporting of board actions against licensees. Recommend refinement and development of operating procedures based on results of studies. Design and oversee the collection of data for organizational surveys, including key performance measures and targets. Collect, analyze, and report survey results. Track and monitor performance against target measures and recommend policy and operational changes. Prepare reviews and research findings and recommend actions needed to improve boards' efficiency and effectiveness. Consult with and facilitate discussions with Executive Director about system efficiency or operational needs to coordinate systems of multiple state

health licensing boards. Collaborate with information systems contractor and program staff to evaluate existing systems and plan enhancements. Coordinate the transition to a new database and automated business systems including online orders and payments, application, and renewals. Monitor websites to ensure accuracy and availability of information. Direct improvements. Analyze the operational process of the two boards to identify common and disparate goals and objectives. Recommend enhancements to or revisions of existing systems.

• Project Management: Plan operational improvement projects and comprehensive research studies; identify project scope, required training and resources. Recommend project budget to the Executive Director. Identify opportunities and risks and design risk mitigation strategies. Coordinate with Executive Director and contract expert to prepare contracts, statements of work, and interagency or intergovernmental agreements. Develop contracts for consultation, investigators, and trainers. Collaborate with staff and stakeholders and follow contracting guidelines to develop contractor statement of work, timelines, cost; obtain bids from contractors. Administer project contracts and coordinate project team and activities; monitor and evaluate contractor performance. Monitor contract progress and compliance. Monitor and track project schedule and key performance. Recommend planning changes to the Executive Director in response to unforeseen changes or unexpected results.

### Investigative Staff

The Agency requests to reclassify one Investigator 3 position to an Investigator 2 position, pursuant to review and recommendation by the Chief Human Resource Office, and to add lead work responsibilities to one Investigator 2 position.

### <u>Facilities</u>

This package includes additional funding to allow OBPE and OBLPCT to co-locate and maximize office space. The agency will determine the most efficient layout for flow and delivery of services, and become better situated for the Boards to share resources. This will also provide additional space for new staff, and allow the agency room to expand.

### Fee Increase, OBLPCT

This proposal includes a \$40 increase for OBLPCT's annual licensee and intern renewals. The fee for LMFTs and LPCs will increase from \$125 to \$165 per year, and the fee for Registered Interns will increase from \$80 to \$120 per year. These increases are necessary to support the staffing and facilities changes described in this package. Additionally, these fees have not changed since 2002; at that time they increased by \$45 for renewing licensees (from \$80 to \$125) and \$40 for renewing interns (from \$40 to \$80).

### **Staffing Impact:**

This package reestablishes two limited duration positions, Investigator 2 (1.0 FTE) and Office Specialist 2 (1.0 FTE), as permanent positions. It also adds two new positions, Office Assistant 2 (1.0 FTE) and Administrative Specialist 2 (0.5 FTE). It reclassifies one Investigator 3 (1.0 FTE) position to an Investigator 2 (1.0 FTE) position, and adds lead work responsibilities to one Investigator 2 (1.0 FTE) position.

### **Quantifying Results:**

This proposal will allow the agency to meet the following strategic plan goals:

- Streamline Board operations
- Maximize administrative efficiency
- Optimize staffing and facilities to meet resource needs

The agency will review trends in all key performance measures, particularly customer satisfaction and board best practices ratings, in order to quantify the results if this proposal is approved. Additionally, the agency will review processing times for complaints and licensure applications each year.

### **Revenue Source:**

The total requested ongoing limitation increase is \$57,878 in Services and Supplies, in addition to position authority and funding of \$452,024 in Personal Services, for 2017-19.

The funding source for the Agency is 100% Other Funds from licensing-related fees. This package adds \$320,600 in revenue to the BLPCT appropriation resulting from the fee increase, and also allows the Agency to maintain continued increases in other current revenue sources.

### **POLICY OPTION PACKAGE 102 – DATABASE AND IT PROF. SVCS**

### **Purpose:**

Currently, each Board under the new proposed Agency is using a separate archaic and often malfunctioning database to support their licensing and investigation functions. The Agency proposes to implement a new online database, in coordination with its Strategic Technology Officer of the State Chief Information Office.

### How Achieved:

The eLITE Licensing System is administered by BES Technologies, and is available through a master contract with the State. This system has recently been successfully implemented by five other Oregon State licensing boards. Agency staff and management have received multiple demonstrations of the program by the vendor, and have discussed its functionality with other agencies who have implemented it. It has been determined that this new online multifunctional database will meet the Agency's needs. It is more secure and user friendly, replaces the functions of current databases, and comes with new capabilities that will allow the Agency to operate more efficiently. This includes the new online applications and license renewals that will help to reduce staff processing times and avoid repetitive and manual data entry; new licensee and consumer ability to order and pay for information requests online; and improved interface and capabilities for application, renewal and investigation data, resulting in enhanced customer service. Additionally, shared staff will no longer need to use two differently structured and varyingly functional databases.

### **Staffing Impact:**

This package does not impact staffing.

### **Quantifying Results:**

This proposal will allow the Agency to meet the following strategic plan goals:

- Streamline Board operations
- Maximize administrative efficiency
- Provide optimal customer service

The Agency will review trends in key performance measures, particularly customer satisfaction ratings, in order to quantify the results if this proposal is approved. Additionally, the Agency will review qualitative feedback from staff regarding database usage.

### **Revenue Source:**

The total requested ongoing limitation increase is \$104,328 in Services and Supplies for 2017-19. The funding source for the Agency is 100% Other Funds from licensing-related fees. This package does not anticipate changes in revenues.

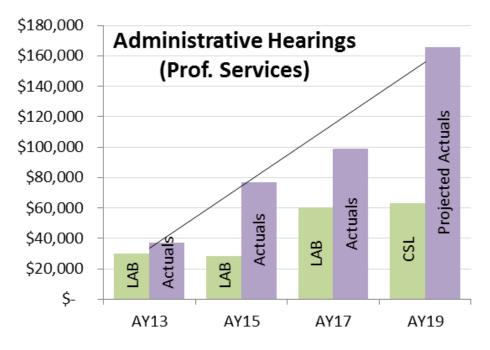

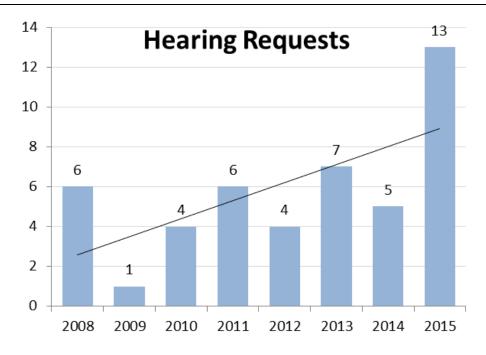
### **Purpose:**

The Board of Psychologist Examiners has seen ever increasing expenses associated with administrative hearings (professional services). It has consistently required more funding than what was provided for in the current service level (CSL) estimates, which carries into the legislatively approved budget. This needs to be corrected. When the Board proposes to sanction a licensee, applicant, or other person practicing in violation of the law, the person has the right to request a hearing pursuant to the Administrative Procedures Act. The Board has seen an increase in the number of respondents requesting a hearing. Hearings are an important part of due process, and upholding Board actions are a crucial component of Boards primary function to safeguard the people of the State of Oregon from the dangers of unqualified and improper practice of psychology.

### How Achieved:

This package proposes to provide the Agency with expenditure limitation sufficient to fund its administrative hearings.





### **Staffing Impact:**

This package does not impact staffing.

### **Quantifying Results:**

This proposal supports the Agency's mission to protect the public. Without necessary funding, the Agency may face settling or closing cases that involve harm to the public. The agency anticipates this funding will be sufficient to meet the contested case hearing demands for the 2017-19 biennium.

### **Revenue Source:**

The total requested ongoing limitation increase is \$103,022 in Services and Supplies for 2017-19. The funding source for the Agency is 100% Other Funds from licensing-related fees. This package does not anticipate changes in revenues. Note- the expenditures associated with this package apply only to the Board of Psychologist Examiners' budget appropriation.

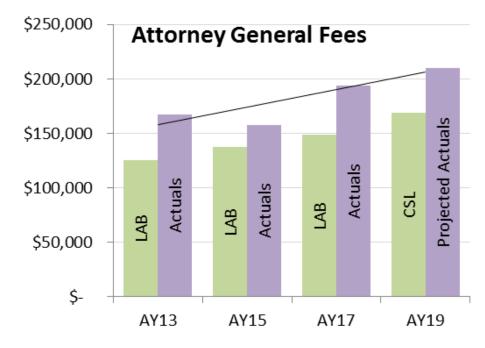
## **POLICY OPTION PACKAGE 104 – ATTORNY GENERAL FEES**

It has consistently required more funding that what was provided for in the current service level (CSL) estimates, which carries into the legislatively approved budget. This needs to be corrected. Representation by the Attorney General's Office is crucial when the Board proposes to sanction a licensee, applicant, or other person practicing in violation of the law, particularly when the person requests a hearing or appeals. Additionally, the AG advises Agency operations, laws, rules and policies to ensure the Boards remain in compliance and correctly interpret and apply their mandates to protect the public. The Board has seen an increase in the number of investigations, respondents requesting a hearing, and other matters requiring the AG's advice.

### How Achieved:

This package proposes to provide the Agency with expenditure limitation sufficient to fund its Attorney General Fees.



### Staffing Impact:

This package does not impact staffing.

### **Quantifying Results:**

This proposal supports the Agency's mission to safeguard the people of the State of Oregon from the dangers of unqualified and improper practice of psychology. Without necessary funding, the Agency may face settling or closing cases that involve harm to the public. The agency anticipates this funding will be sufficient to meet the attorney general fees needed for the 2017-19 biennium.

### **Revenue Source:**

The total requested ongoing limitation increase is \$38,604 in Services and Supplies for 2017-19. The funding source for the Agency is 100% Other Funds from licensing-related fees. This package does not anticipate changes in revenues. Note- the expenditures associated with this package apply only to the Board of Psychologist Examiners' budget appropriation.

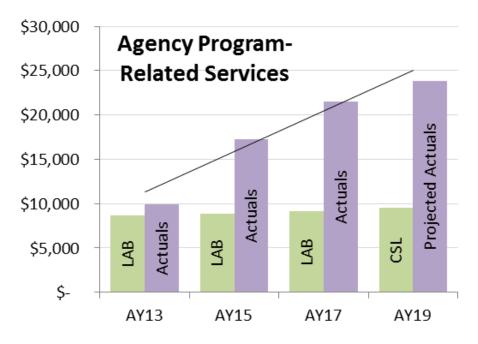
## **POLICY OPTION PACKAGE 105 – OSP BACKGROUND CHECKS**

### **Purpose:**

The Board of Psychologist Examiners requires fingerprint-based criminal background checks for all applicants for licensure. The Current Service Level (CSL) for Agency Program Related Services and Supplies reflects the standard inflation rate (for this biennium, 3.7%); however, the number of applicants for licensure received each year-which directly corresponds to the number of background checks performed- has been increased by an average 11.1% per year over the last ten years. Therefore, the CSL has not kept up with the expenditures required to maintain this program. Applicants pay to the Agency the actual cost to have the background check performed, and the Agency then makes payment to the Oregon State Police, making this a pass-through; however, this still must be budgeted within the Agency's expenditure limitation.

### How Achieved:

This package proposes to provide the Agency with expenditure limitation sufficient to fund its criminal background checks.



### **Staffing Impact:**

This package does not impact staffing.

### **Quantifying Results:**

This proposal supports the Agency's mission to protect the public health and welfare by ensuring the good moral character of applicants to practice psychology in the State. The Agency anticipates this funding will be sufficient to cover the criminal background checks needed for the 2017-19 biennium.

#### **Revenue Source:**

The total requested ongoing limitation increase is \$14,351 in Services and Supplies for 2017-19. The funding source for the Agency is 100% Other Funds from licensing-related fees. 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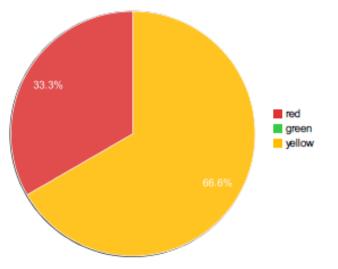

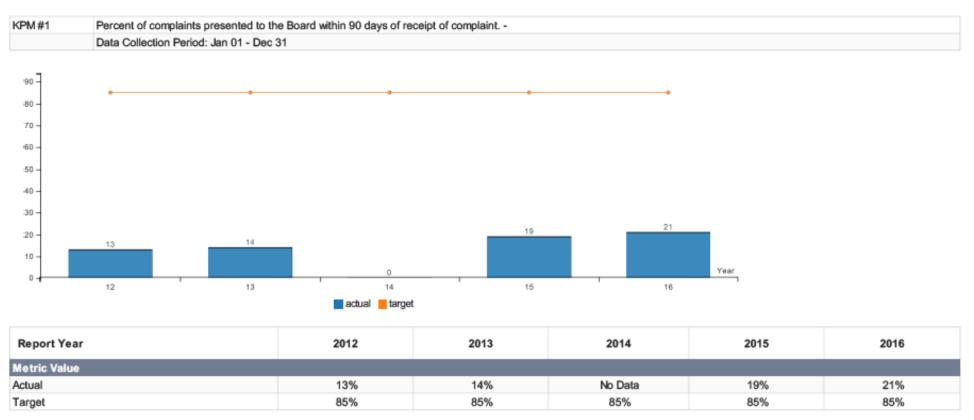

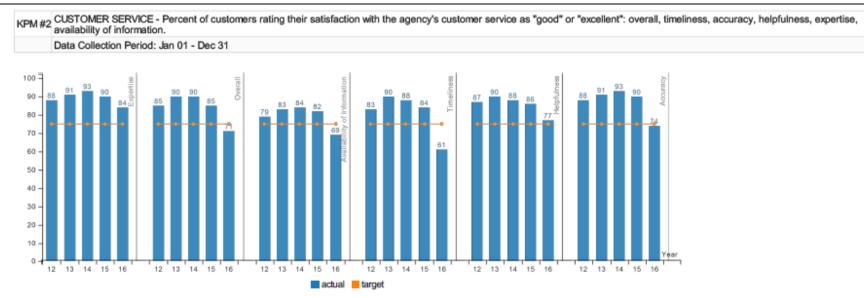


#### How Are We Doing

The percent of complaints presented to the Board within 90 days has remained relatively consistent over the past five years; however it is significantly below the target. In 2016, the 21% of investigations were completed within the desired timeframe, which is a two-point improvement from 2015.

#### Factors Affecting Results

The Board's target is very ambitious; Oregon law allows 120 days from the time the complaint is received until presentation of the investigation report to the Board. There are many factors affecting our ability to present investigations within 90 days, including the need for additional investigative staff, complexity of cases, traveling time, coordinating witness interviews, coordinating licensee and attorney schedules for interviews, waiting for necessary records to be submitted, and emergency cases that take staff resources away from older cases. The Board meets bimonthly, so timing is often a factor. Also, the board has seen significant increases in the number of license applications and licensees; the number of complaints received has increased by an average of 6% per year over the past five years.

How Are We Doing

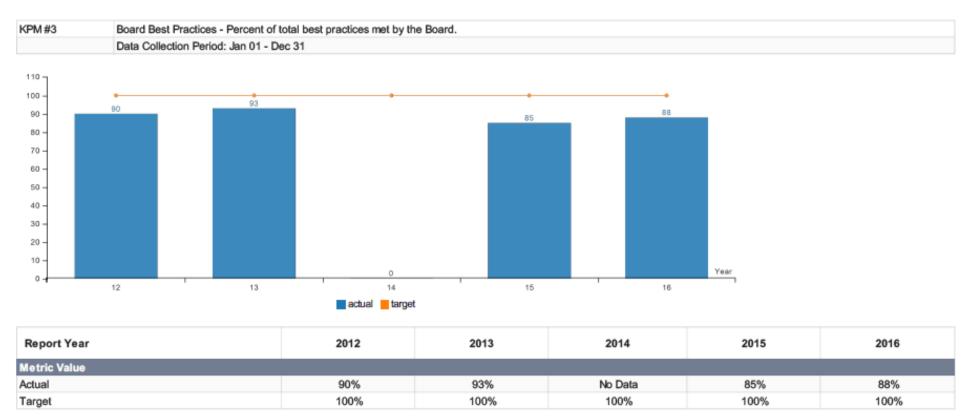
The Board exceeded its targets in the areas of expertise and helpfulness of staff, but fell below target in the areas of overall customer satisfaction, accuracy, availability of information, and timeliness.

Overall Customer Satisfaction has decreased by 14 points over the last five years, from 85% in 2012 and 2015 to 71% in 2016. From 2015 to 2016, Accuracy decreased by 16 points (74%). Helpfulness decreased by nine points (77%), but remains two points above target. Expertise decreased by six points (84%), but remains nine points above target and is the Board's highest ranking area. Timeliness decreased by 23 points (61%), and finally, Availability of Information decreased by 13 points (69%).

#### Factors Affecting Results

The Board has experienced some staff and management turnover during the end of 2015 through the beginning of 2014, not very long before the survey was sent out to stakeholders. Staffing shortages created some backlog in Board delivered services, and likely affected the survey results. Indeed, the lowest scoring area was timeliness of services, which experienced a 23 point reduction from the prior year.

Additionally, sometimes stakeholders who have experienced an adverse enforcement action or do not agree with laws or rules that the Board is charged with enforcing or the policy direction of the Board will respond "poor" to each satisfaction area, regardless of their experience with agency staff.



#### How Are We Doing

The Board achieved an 85% score in 2015 and an 88% score in 2016, representing a three-point improvement; however, this remains below the target. The particular areas cited as needing improvement were Board member training and Board member review of the budget.

#### Factors Affecting Results

Board management continues to look for opportunities for improved performance and increased transparency, regardless of the Board members' reports of success. Board staff sends materials with this survey to help clarify the survey questions and explain how they directly relate to agency operations; however, members report on their perceptions of best practices which could reflect aspirational rather than actual performance levels. NOTE: This survey was not administered 2014; therefore there is no data for the agency to report for this year.

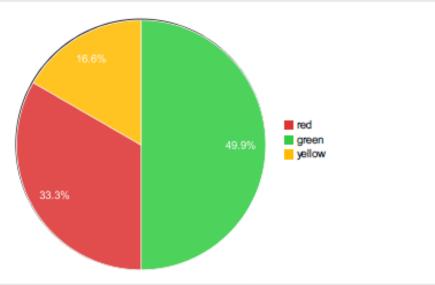

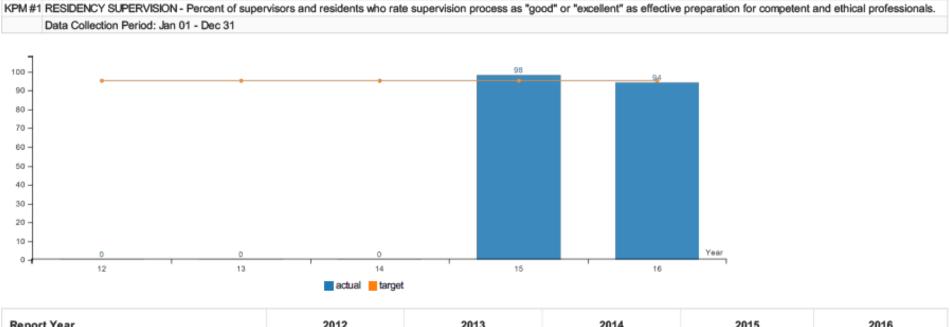

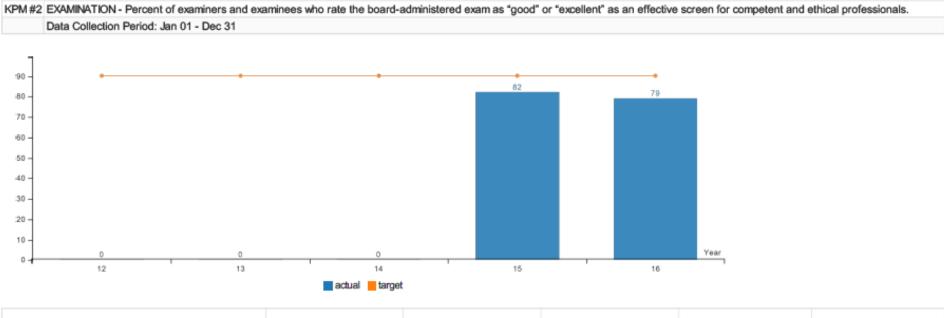

#### How Are We Doing

In 2016, 94% of supervisor and residents who responded to the survey rated the supervision process as "good" or "excellent" as effective preparation for competent and ethical professionals. This is just below the Board's target of 95%, and is a three-point decrease from the 98% result of the last survey administration in 2015. The 10-year average result during the years this survey was administered is 92%.

#### Factors Affecting Results

This measure is affected by the quantity and quality of available residency sites and supervisors in the state. The Board continues to look for opportunities to improve the quality of the residency experience for both residents and supervisors, regardless of the success of the program. NOTE: This survey was not administered 2012/2014; therefore, there is no data for the agency to report for these years.



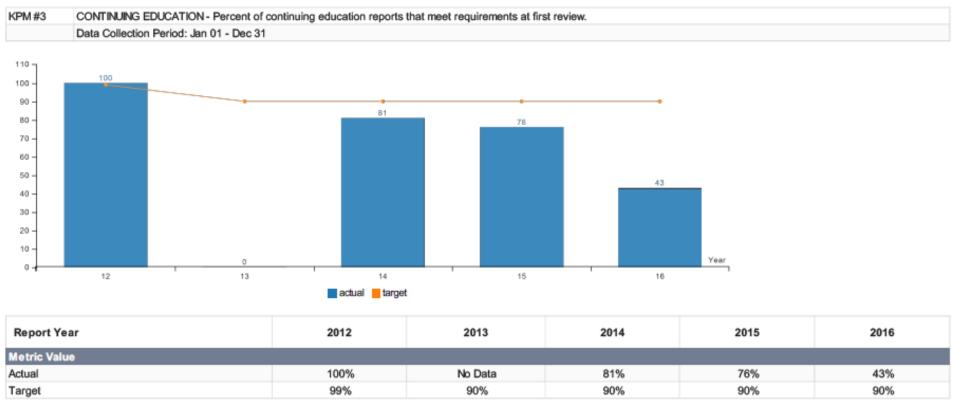

#### How Are We Doing

In 2016, 79% of examinees rated the Jurisprudence Exam as "good" or "excellent" as an effective screen for competent and ethical professionals. This fails short of the Board's goal of 90%, and is a three-point decrease from the 82% rate achieved in 2015.

#### Factors Affecting Results

There are some examinees that question whether any examination can be an effective screen for competence and/or ethical practice. The agency continues to look for ways to improve the quality of the examination content and process. 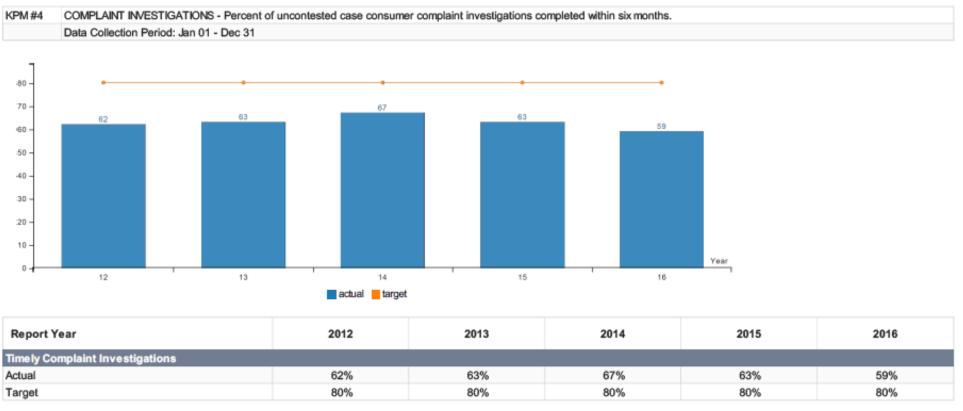

In 2016, 43% of continuing education reports met the requirements at first review. This falls significantly short of the Board's goal of 90%, and is a decrease from the 76% rate achieved in 2015.

#### Factors Affecting Results

For various reasons, a number of licensees audited each period will be found to not be in compliance with the continuing education requirements on first review. Some licensees will not fully understand how to apply the criteria for what is acceptable education, the categorical limitations, what is acceptable documentation of completion, or how to fill out the forms. Most errors/omissions are corrected upon follow/up with the licensee. The Board strives to respond quickly and completely to licensees' inquiries about the CE requirements, and to keep the website updated with clear forms, explanatory materials, and helpful FAQs. With increased outreach to licensees about acceptable continuing education and reporting, the Board desires these numbers to trend in a higher direction, reflecting licensees' understanding of the requirements. Additionally, the results will vary with the thoroughness of the reviewer. NOTE: In 2013 there was no continuing education audit completed because of the Board's transition to biennial birth month renewals in 2011.

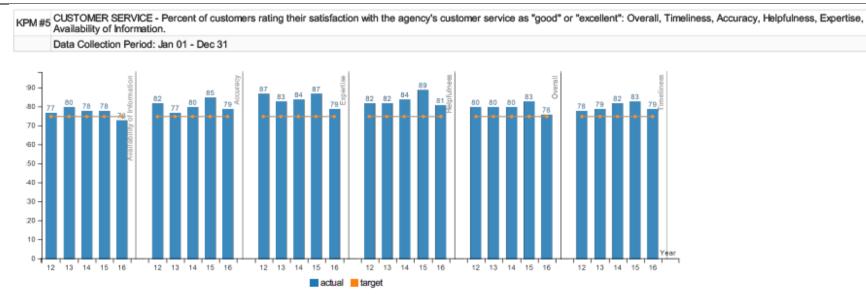


#### How Are We Doing

The time for the Board to complete investigations has remained relatively consistent over the past five years; however it is below the target. In 2016, the 59% of investigations were completed within the desired timeframe.

#### Factors Affecting Results

The Board strives to complete complaint investigations within six months, however there are many factors affecting our ability to complete investigations. These include the need for additional investigative staff, complexity of cases, traveling time, coordinating witness interviews, coordinating licensee and attorney schedules for interviews, waiting for necessary records to be submitted, and emergency cases that take staff resources away from older cases. The Board meets bimonthly, so timing is often a factor as well.

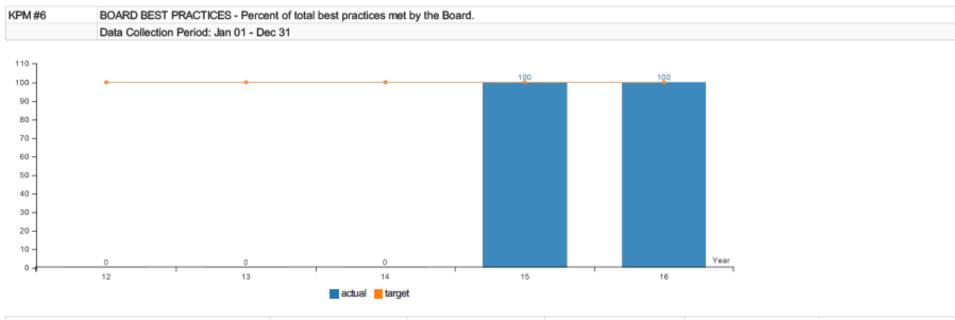
How Are We Doing

The Board exceeded its targets in the areas of overall customer satisfaction, accuracy, expertise, helpfulness, and timeliness; but fell short by one point its target for availability of information.

Overall Customer Satisfaction has decreased by four points over the last five years, from 80% in 2012-2014 to 76% in 2016. From 2015 to 2016, Accuracy decreased by six points (79%), but remains one point above the ten-year average score (78%). Helpfulness decreased by eight points (81%), but remains three points above the ten-year average score (78%). Expertise decreased by eight points (79%), but remains two points above the ten-year average score (81%). Timeliness decreased by four point (79%), but remains one point above the ten-year average score (78%). Expertise score (78%). Finally, Availability of Information decreased by five points (73%).

#### Factors Affecting Results

The Board has experienced some staff and management turnover, which may have affected the survey results. Sometimes stakeholders who have experienced an adverse enforcement action or do not agree with laws or rules that the Board is charged with enforcing or the policy direction of the Board will respond "poor" to each satisfaction area, regardless of their experience with agency staff. However, the agency has consistently put a high priority on customer service, which is reflected in the results.

#### How Are We Doing

In 2015 and 2016, the Board achieved a 100% score in each best practice area surveyed. This meets the target.

#### Factors Affecting Results

Board management continues to look for opportunities for improved performance and increased transparency, regardless of the Board members' reports of success. Board staff sends materials with this survey to help clarify the survey questions and explain how they directly relate to agency operations; however, members report on their perceptions of best practices which could reflect aspirational rather than actual performance levels. NOTE: This survey was not administered 2012/2014; therefore there is no data for the agency to report for these years.

### **AUDITS RESPONSE REPORT**

There has been one performance audit by the Secretary of State finished in the 2013-15 or 2015-17 biennia to date.

#### Health Professional Regulatory Boards: General Review (March 2014)

#### Summary

The objective of this audit was to determine if the governance and delivery of services provided by Oregon's health professional regulatory boards can be improved to better promote the quality of health services, and protect the public health, safety and welfare. The Secretary of State performed broad scale audit work to examine the management efforts of the 17 autonomous boards in the areas of professional licensing, complaint-handling and investigation, and governance. The Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists and the Board of Psychologist Examiners were included in this audit.

#### Audit Findings

The survey found that in general, boards have policies and procedures in place to address their core functions and appear to be actively engaged in promoting quality health services through their efforts. It verified that activities were performed and processes were in place at the 17 autonomous boards, but because of the broad scale of the audit, it did not evaluate how well each process was carried out. The survey found that most boards perform initial criminal background checks of applicants, except for the Veterinary, Occupational Therapy, and Speech

Pathology and Audiology Boards. Of the boards that do initial background checks, most perform a national fingerprint-based FBI check. However, most boards do not conduct subsequent checks upon renewal, and some professionals have never been checked.

The survey examined the complaint-handling, investigative and disciplinary processes of the boards. It found that most boards documented and informed board members of complaints received, and followed procedures for investigating them. Most boards had investigators on staff or under contract to investigate complaints, some of whom had expertise in the health profession. Boards generally separate the investigative process from the disciplinary decision making process. Boards receive assistance from the Attorney General's Office, and a process for licensees to contest board decisions is available through the Office of Administrative Hearings. Disciplinary decisions are reported as required by state and federal law.

The survey also examined the governance structures and processes of health professional regulatory boards. Studies indicate there is no single most effective governance model to achieve a board's objectives. A third of states have governance structures where boards operate

as autonomous agencies. Other states have structures with varying degrees of board collaboration with a central agency and several states have centralized licensing agencies that limit boards to an advisory capacity. Health professional regulatory boards are responsible for developing policy and enforcing regulations. The survey found that board members were actively engaged on key matters such as licensing, complaint investigations and discipline, and practice-related issues. In addition, boards delegate many functions to the executive director and staff to carry out, and provide feedback on their efforts. For example, 16 chairpersons reported that they conduct annual evaluations of the executive director. The survey found that the boards made reasonable efforts to demonstrate transparency through website content, newsletters, and outreach efforts. This content informs licensing applicants, practitioners, and the public.

To assess board efforts, the 2009 Legislature required boards undergo a periodic peer review. The five board reviews completed to date identified board strengths and made recommendations for improvement. The Legislature provides some board oversight, as it establishes priorities and sets public policy through the state's budget process. However, boards reported they have experienced difficulty in receiving legislative approval to increase staff and the associated fees to handle increases in workload. The boards use various methods to obtain specialized services and support. For example, boards rely upon the Attorney General's Office for legal services, and many use the Department of Administrative Services for payroll and purchasing. In addition, 12 of the boards share a location with at least one other board, which allows them to share space and facilitates collaboration. Nonetheless, some benefits could result from more state sponsored training for board members and a stronger operational connection to the Governor's Office.

#### Recommendation

The survey recommended that boards give further consideration to background check policies for professionals who handle drugs or interact with vulnerable populations. In addition, it recommended the Governor consider more operational support and board member training on roles and responsibilities.

#### Agency Response

The Secretary of State's Office reached out the OBPE and OBLPCT in October of 2016 requesting a report from each board regarding implementation of the recommendation from the 2014 audit. OBPE reported as follows:

<u>November 2, 2016.</u> Since the time of the Audit, the Board of Psychologist Examiners has given further consideration to background check policies for professionals who interact with vulnerable populations (our licensees and residents). Therefore, we have indicated above that we have fully implemented this recommendation.

The Board has taken the following actions:

• On July 24, 2015 the Board adopted an "Applicant Character and Fitness Review Policy." This provides staff and Board members with thorough, clear, and consistent procedure for processing and reviewing applicant issues such as disclosed and

undisclosed arrests and convictions revealed in the criminal background check report, and other character and fitness issues such as investigations and disciplinary proceedings.

• On September 27, 2016 the Board filed a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking Hearing. The proposed amendment modifies the Board's rule regarding criminal records checks and fitness determinations. It updates criminal records check procedures and implements the statewide uniform fitness determination process and criminal records administrative rules, per HB 3168 (2013) and HB 2250 (2015). This includes factors the Board considers as part of fitness determination, how a subject individual may appeal an adverse determination, confidentiality of criminal offender information, and consequence for failure to comply per law. This rulemaking is pending Board approval once the public comment period has ended, expected January 20, 2017.

OBLPCT reported as follows:

<u>November 2, 2016.</u> Since the time of the Audit, the Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists has given further consideration to background check policies for professionals who interact with vulnerable populations (our licensees and interns). Therefore, we have indicated above that we have fully implemented this recommendation.

The Board has taken the following actions:

- On October 2, 2015 the Board adopted an "Applicant Character and Fitness Review Policy." This provides staff and Board members with thorough, clear, and consistent procedure for processing and reviewing applicant issues such as disclosed and undisclosed arrests and convictions revealed in the criminal background check report, and other character and fitness issues such as investigations and disciplinary proceedings.
- On April 1, 2016 the Board filed a permanent administrative rule amendment that removed the requirement that licensed professional counselors, licensed marriage and family therapists, and registered interns complete a fingerprint-based criminal records check at least once every five years. Now, fingerprinting is required of all applicants for licensure and/or internship, and of those under investigation when the Board determines it is needed.
- On August 8, 2016 the Board filed a permanent administrative rule amendment that modified the Board's rule regarding criminal records checks and fitness determinations. It updated criminal records check procedures and implemented the statewide uniform fitness determination process and criminal records administrative rules, per HB 3168 (2013) and HB 2250 (2015). This includes factors the Board considers as part of fitness determination, how a subject individual may appeal an adverse determination, confidentiality of criminal offender information, and consequence for failure to comply per law.

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#### A. Agency Mission and Objectives

The Oregon Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists (OBLPCT) was created for the purpose of examining and licensing persons in Oregon who engage in the practice of professional counseling and marriage and family therapy. The Board is also charged with safeguarding the people of the State of Oregon from the dangers of unqualified and improper practice of these professions.

Professional counseling means assessment, diagnosis or treatment of mental, emotional or behavioral disorders involving the application of mental health counseling or other psychotherapeutic principles and methods in the delivery of services to individuals, couples, children, families, groups or organizations. Marriage and family therapy means the assessment, diagnosis or treatment of mental, emotional or behavioral disorders involving the application of family systems or other psychotherapeutic principles and methods in the delivery of services to individuals, couples, children, families, groups or organizations.

It is unlawful to practice professional counseling or marriage and family therapy, or to represent oneself as a licensed professional counselor (LPC) or licensed marriage and family therapist (LMFT), without first being properly licensed by the OBLPCT.

The Board consists of eight members- three are LPCs, two are LMFTs, one is from the faculty of Oregon program that trains persons to become LPCs or LMFTs, and two are from the general public, not associated with the profession. All members are appointed by the Governor to three-year terms and confirmed by the Senate. The Board hires staff to administer all official business. The Board meets in even-numbered months, typically at its offices in Salem. The Board is funded solely from application and licensure fees, collection of civil penalties assessed for violations of statute or rule, and other miscellaneous fees. Decisions are made in open public meetings where guests are encouraged to attend.

The Board carries out its mission of consumer protection by setting clear education, experience and exam standards for licensing; establishing a code of ethics by which licensees must abide; imposing discipline for unethical, negligent or illegal practice; and requiring licensees to provide each client with a professional disclosure statement. Through the examination of applicants, the Board accomplishes its legislative mandate to establish standards of service and training and educational qualifications for the rendering of ethical mental health services in Oregon. Because the Board believes that regular continuing education ensures the highest quality of professional services to the public, the Board requires that all LPCs and LMFTs complete forty hours of continuing education biennially, with a minimum of four in the professional ethics. The Board protects consumers by promptly investigating all complaints made concerning either the unethical or unlicensed practice of professional counseling and marriage and family therapy in Oregon.

The statutory authority of the Board is contained in Oregon Revised Statutes 675.705 to 675.835, and Chapter 676 (Health Professions Generally). The Board's Oregon

Administrative Rules are located in Chapter 833. LPCs and LMFTs, as public officials, are required to follow state requirements for reporting the abuse of children, the elderly, and adults with mental illness, and the unprofessional conduct of other health care professionals, subject to psychotherapist-patient privilege as established by Oregon law.

#### B. Affirmative Action Policy Statement

The Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists is committed to achieving a work force that represents the diversity of Oregon's population and to providing fair and equal employment opportunities. Additionally, all applicants and employees are protected from coercion, intimidation, interference, or discrimination for filing a complaint or assisting in an investigation under this policy.

The Board will not discriminate or tolerate discrimination against any employee because they are a member of, apply to be a member of, perform, has performed, applied to perform or have an obligation to perform service in a uniformed service (ORS 659A.082).

The Board will provide an environment for each applicant and employee that is free from sexual harassment, as well as harassment and intimidation on account of individual's race, color, religion, gender, sex, sexual orientation, marital status, national origin, age, familial status or disability.

#### **Complaint Process regarding Discrimination or Harassment**

The complaint procedure provides a method of resolving complaints involving violation of the Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists' nondiscrimination

policy within the agency. Employees, applicants and eligibles are encouraged to use the complaint process. Retaliation, coercion, reprisal, or intimidation against a person who has filed a complaint either internally or through an outside enforcement agency or other legal channels or serving as a witness is prohibited.

a. Informal Complaint Process

An employee may notify the Executive Director of an issue or concern regarding discrimination in order to raise awareness or put the agency on alert without filing a formal complaint. In these situations:

- The employee may ask the Executive Director to keep the matter and identity of the employee confidential. (The agency will comply with the request, if possible.)
- The employee will sign documentation stating that he/she wishes his/her identity to remain confidential.
- iii. The discussion will be documented.
- iv. The Affirmative Action Representative will review the information and maintain confidentially of the employee's identity when it is determined that action is necessary to correct the problem or to prevent a reoccurrence in similar situations.
- b. <u>Internal Complaint Process</u>
  - Any individual who believes he/she has been subjected to unlawful discriminatory actions may file a complaint within 30 calendar days of the alleged incident.
  - Represented employees may file a complaint either through the Collective Bargaining Agreement grievance procedure or by using the procedures provided by the agency.
  - iii. An employee may submit a written complaint to the Executive Director that explains the basis for the complaint, identifies the alleged discriminating party or parties and the date the discriminatory action(s) occurred, and specifies the relief requested.
  - iv. The Executive Director will review/investigate the complaint and provide the complaint written notification of the findings within 30 days. If additional time is needed for investigating the allegations or to issue a report of the findings, the agency will notify the employee in writing of the need for additional time.
  - If the investigation substantiates the complaint, appropriate corrective action will be initiated, including discipline if warranted.

#### c. <u>External Complaint Process</u>

If an employee is not satisfied with the complaint process within the agency and wishes to appeal an agency decision, the employee may contact one of the organizations listed below. Nothing in this policy prevents any person from filing a grievance in accordance with the Collective Bargaining Agreement, or from filing a formal complaint with the Bureau of Labor and Industries (BOLI) or Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC). However, some collective bargaining agreements may require an employee to choose between the complaint procedure outlined in the agency's guideline for filing a BOLI or EEOC complaint.

#### C. Affirmative Action Summary Statement

#### a. Affirmative Action 2015-17 Objectives

i. Goals Set and Met

The goals set by the State Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists' Affirmative Action Plan for the 2015-17 biennium were:

- 1. Use the exit survey when and if we have staff turnover.
- Reach out to minority and people of color to recruit candidates when positions are vacant.
- Our goal is to ensure that the Board, the agency staff, and licensed mental health practitioners take active steps to increase their knowledge about cultures and the growing diversity of Oregon's population and to ensure that they provide culturally appropriate services.
- Continue the activities and policies set during the 2009-11 and 2011-13 biennia.
- Continue inclusion of diversity, affirmative action, and cultural competency language in administrative rules, policy, academic graduate level training, and review of Oregon graduate counseling and marriage and family therapy programs.
- Encourage employees to attend the Governor's Affirmative Action Office informational trainings.
- Continue to work with the Governor's office to identify diverse applicants for board appointment.

#### Examples:

- Representatives of the Board from DAS Human Resources attended the AA/Diversity and Inclusion meeting sponsored by the Governor's office on June 15, 2016.
- Board staff is scheduled to attend the all-day 2016 Diversity and Inclusion Conference for State of Oregon Employees on September 14, 2016.
- 3. The Board is currently collaborating with the Oregon Health Authority (OHA) to implement House Bill 2611 (2013), which provided that certain agencies, including the Board, may implement a requirement that licensees complete cultural competency training. On August 10, 2016, the Board filed a notice of proposed rulemaking hearing that includes a proposal to adopt

an administrative rule that requires LPCs and LMFTs to complete four hours of education dedicated to cultural competency within each biennial reporting period. After reviewing public comment, the Board will vote on whether to adopt the permanent rule on October 7, 2016.

- 4. The Board employs a total of 4.5 FTE, including 3.5 FTE permanent and 1.0 FTE limited duration staff as authorized for the 2015-17 biennium. 4.0 FTE (89%) consists of individuals from protected classes, representing an increase of 1.5 FTE from the prior biennium. The Board employs 3 veterans.
- 5. During the 2015-17 biennium, the Board has hired 3.0 FTE new staff, 83% representing protected classes. The Board's recruitment efforts, in close partnership with the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, Enterprise Human Resource Services unit, continue to be consistent with the agency's affirmative action goals and objectives.
- In March of 2015, the Board hired a new Executive Director whose job description includes developing and implementing the Board's Affirmative Action/ EEOC policy and requirements.
- The two longest retained staff members (1.5 FTE) represent protected classes, with a combined total of 28 years with the Board.
- 8. In June of 2015, the Board's Executive Director created a workout-of-class assignment opportunity for an employee from a protected class to develop the employee's career skills while performing higher level duties for a limited period. This employee is also participating in the Leadership Oregon 2016 program for public service leadership skills development; this program incorporates cultural competency training.
- 9. The Board continues to survey all applicants for tracking and reporting language and race statistics. Diversity data is stored in the Board database and can be queried for various types of information. This has enabled Board staff to assist consumers in searching for culturally competent services or healthcare providers who speak particular languages or belong to specific racial or ethnic groups.
- ii. Goals Set and Not Expected to Meet
  - Build cultural competence/diversity into every Board meeting agenda.

While the topic was built into a majority of Board meetings, it was not built into every Board meeting.

#### b. <u>Affirmative Action 2017-19 Objectives</u>

The goals set by the State Board of Licensed Professional Counselors and Therapists Affirmative Action for the 2017-19 biennium are:

- Continue to post the Board's Diversity & Inclusion/Affirmative Action Statement on the Board's website, provide it to new board member upon appointment and employees upon hire, and encourage staff to review and discuss questions or concerns with their supervisor.
- The Executive Director will continue to be evaluated by the Board annually for adherence to the Statement.
- Continue to identify the Agency as an Equal Opportunity/Affirmative Action employer and include the statement, "THE BOARD OF LICENSED PROFESSIONAL COUNSELORS AND THERAPISTS IS AN EQUAL OPPORTUNITY, AFFIRMATIVE ACTION EMPLOYER COMMITTED TO WORK FORCE DIVERSITY" in the Board's recruitment announcements and advertisements.
- Continue to provide information and opportunities for staff to participate in diversity training and multi-cultural events.
- 5. Periodically review the results of the Statewide Exit Survey administered by HR to separating employees as required by Executive Order 08-18, and discuss any concerns or trends. As employees change agencies or separate from state employment, the Board is interested in how employees view their tenure and what information and suggestions they can provide related to their experience. If the analysis identifies a negative opinion regarding the agency's workplace environment, the Board will use this information as an opportunity to make changes to improve the work environment for the current employees, and improve job satisfaction.
- 6. Continue to develop strategies to recruit, retain and promote a diverse staff. The Board recognizes the value of individual and cultural difference and creates a work environment where talents and abilities are valued.
- Continue to work with the Governor's office to identify diverse applicants for board appointment.
- Revise, as needed, recruitment and promotion policies and criteria for exceptions that provide the opportunity for the Board to recruit a more diverse population and also provide appropriate advancement opportunities for incumbents, including a focus on the retention of women and minorities.
- 9. Continue the focus on developing a work environment that is attractive to a diverse pool of applicants, retains employees, and is accepting and respectful of employees' differences. A welcoming environment is created a number of ways - by sharing e-mail activity notices from the Governor's Affirmative Action Office, posting posters on the employee bulletin board, encouraging employees to share their thoughts and ideas, responding to issues quickly and efficiently, etc. Respectful workplace behaviors will be expected and enforced.

It will further allow for cross-training to accommodate key employee absence and develop employees' skill sets.
- 14. Continue to look for opportunities to incorporate trainings and special project assignments in order for employees to acquire new skills for succession planning and to provide resources for employees to encourage their career development in state service, as is reasonably practicable to do.
