## **ACLU of Oregon Urges a Yes Vote on SB 357**

The American Civil Liberties Union of Oregon<sup>1</sup> supports SB 357, which reduces penalties for entering or remaining unlawfully in or on public transit vehicle or public transit station as a manner of committing the crime of interfering with public transportation ("IPT").

**The ACLU of Oregon has concerns about transit fare enforcement policies and tactics.** We are particularly concerned that low-income individuals with limited means to pay fares and fines, who must ride public transit to take care of their basic needs, can potentially face serious criminal charges (Class A misdemeanor) for fare evasion.

**We also have concerns about racial disparities in transit enforcement.** We were dismayed to recently see data showing significant racial disparities in which riders who are caught without a ticket on MAX trains ultimately end up being banned from TriMet.<sup>2</sup>

**IPT is a redundant and excessive law, addressing conduct that is already covered by existing Oregon law that imposes a lighter and more proportional penalty.** Relevant to this bill, ORS 164.245 (Criminal Trespass) imposes a Class C misdemeanor for remaining unlawfully on a vehicle or premises.

**SB 357 is necessary legislation, despite recent changes related to TriMet enforcement.** We understand that Multnomah, Washington and Clackamas counties are no longer charging individuals for IPT for repeat fare evasion under a newly adopted policy. The option still remains on the books, however, and could be enforced if policy is changed. This policy change also does not apply to other counties in Oregon.

**We believe SB 357 is an important piece of much-needed reform of transit fare and enforcement policies.** We would also like to see increased access to public transit passes for low-income individuals, seniors, and people with disabilities, which we believe will greatly reduce fare evasion.

**For all of these reasons, we urge you to vote yes on SB 357.**
