

ACLU of Oregon Urges a Yes Vote on HB 3464

The American Civil Liberties Union of Oregon¹ supports HB 3464, which will strengthen Oregon's privacy protections for vulnerable immigrant communities and clarify information gathering and sharing with the federal government and Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE).

The ACLU of Oregon enthusiastically supports HB 3464 as a crucial opportunity for the State of Oregon to support the safety and health of all of Oregon's communities and to live up to our ideals as a welcoming and inclusive state. The ACLU has long been a strong advocate for the rights of immigrants, refugees and non-citizens, challenging unconstitutional laws and practices, and countering the myths upon which these laws are based.²

While the State of Oregon has no power to change federal policies or priorities, we can take steps to protect the privacy of our vulnerable immigrant communities. The decisions of the current federal administration to implement aggressive immigration policies have placed entire communities in great fear that families will be torn apart and individuals deported—oftentimes to places where their lives will be in danger. Many of our friends and neighbors are afraid to leave their homes or go to courthouses and government buildings, and many children are afraid to go to school.

We can also provide clear guidance to school administrators, judges, and other public entities about how to respond if ICE requests information, to ensure that we do everything within our abilities to protect our immigrant friends, family, and community members from excessive and aggressive federal overreach. HB 3464 will enable the Attorney General to provide this guidance.

For all these reasons, we urge you to vote yes on HB 3464.

² It was also because of these values that the ACLU of Oregon advocated for the successful passage in 1987 of ORS 181.850 (renumbered 181A.820), which prohibits local law enforcement from enforcing federal immigration laws that target people based on their race or ethnic origin when those individuals are not suspected of any criminal activity.
