WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

Requires a coordinated care organization (CCO) governing body to include a representative from at least one dental care organization that serves the members of that CCO. Provides that individuals be nominated by a dental care organization and that the representative be selected by the CCO. Declares an emergency, effective on passage.

ISSUES DISCUSSED:

- Provisions of the measure
- Relationship between coordinated care organizations and dental care organizations (DCOs)
- Concerns about prescriptive language
- Need for DCOs to have flexibility
- Need for collaborative approach
- Proposed amendments

EFFECT OF AMENDMENT:

Specifies that individuals be nominated by a dental care organization and the representative is selected by the CCO.

BACKGROUND:

A coordinated care organization (CCO) is a network of all types of health care providers (physical health care, addictions and mental health care and sometimes dental care providers) who have agreed to work together in their local communities to serve people who receive health care coverage under the Oregon Health Plan (OHP). CCOs are focused on prevention and helping people manage chronic conditions, such as diabetes. Currently, there are 16 CCOs operating in communities throughout Oregon. CCOs have the flexibility to support new models of care that are patient-centered and team-focused, and to help reduce health disparities. Additionally, CCOs have flexibility within their budgets to provide services alongside today's OHP medical benefits with the goal of better health, better care and lower costs for the population they serve.
