## Impact Explanation:

This measure makes several changes to provisions involving driver license suspensions, permits and hardship permits. First, it eliminates probationary driving permits. Probationary driving permits are issued to people who have their licenses revoked as habitual offenders. The measure also standardizes the various requirements for a hardship permit. Hardship permits are issued to people with suspended licenses for a variety of reasons, such as getting to and from work.
Finally, it eliminates several types of driving privilege suspensions, such as suspensions for littering or a minor using identification to misrepresent his or her age to purchase alcohol. SB 693 also specifies that these changes are applicable to hardship permits, driving privilege suspensions or revocations issued on or after the effective date of this Act. This will result in approximately five thousand fewer reinstatement a year and about 200 fewer hardship permits.
