# House Bill 2503

Sponsored by Representative NATHANSON; Representatives BARNHART, NOSSE (at the request of Jaclyn Mahoney and Jennie Hawthorn-Mayes, co-founders of Daisy Chain) (Presession filed.)

### **SUMMARY**

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure as introduced.

Directs Health Licensing Office to issue lactation consultant and lactation educator licenses to qualified applicants. Requires lactation consultants and lactation educators to complete cultural competency and trauma-informed care continuing education courses. Imposes civil penalty for violation of licensure requirements.

Becomes operative January 1, 2018. Declares emergency, effective on passage.

4	Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:
5	SECTION 1. As used in sections 1 to 7 of this 2017 Act:
6	(1) "Lactation consultant" means a person licensed to practice lactation consultation.
7	(2) "Lactation consultation" means the clinical application of scientific principles and
8	evidence to provide care related to lactation to childbearing families. Lactation consultation
9	includes, but is not limited to:
10	(a) Client assessment through systematic collection of data;
11	(b) Data analysis;
12	(c) Creation of a care plan;
13	(d) Implementation of the care plan, including demonstration and instructions to clients
14	and communication with the clients' primary care provider;
15	(e) Evaluation of client outcomes;
16	(f) Problem identification and treatment;
17	(g) Recommendation and use of assistive devices; and
18	(h) Lactation education to childbearing families and to health care providers.
19	(3) "Lactation educator" means a person licensed to educate childbearing families about
20	lactation.
21	SECTION 2. The Health Licensing Office shall issue a lactation consultant license to an
22	applicant who:
23	(1) Is at least 18 years old;
24	(2) Submits sufficient proof, as determined by the office, that the applicant is:
25	(a) Certified by the International Board of Lactation Consultant Examiners, or its suc-
26	cessor organization, approved by the office by rule, as an International Board Certified
27	Lactation Consultant; and
28	(b) In good standing in any other states where the applicant is authorized as a lactation

consultant; 1 2 (3) Pays a licensure fee; and (4) Meets other qualifications required by the office by rule. 3 SECTION 3. The Health Licensing Office shall issue a lactation educator license to an 4 applicant who: 5 (1) Is at least 18 years old; 6 (2) Submits sufficient proof, as determined by the office, that the applicant: 7 (a) Successfully completed a breast-feeding education course recognized by the Lactation 8 9 Education Accreditation and Approval Review Committee, or its successor organization, approved by the office by rule; and 10 (b) Is in good standing in any other states where the applicant is authorized as a 11 12lactation educator; 13 (3) Pays a licensure fee; and (4) Meets other qualifications required by the office by rule. 14 15 SECTION 4. (1) A lactation consultant and a lactation educator shall complete continuing education related to: 16 (a) Cultural competency, approved by the Oregon Health Authority under ORS 413.450; 17and 18 19 (b) Trauma-informed care, through programs approved by the Health Licensing Office by rule. 20(2) The office shall adopt rules related to the continuing education described in sub-2122section (1) of this section. The rules shall include: 23(a) Approval of continuing education programs related to trauma-informed care; and (b) Requirements that lactation consultants and lactation educators: 94 (A) Complete initial cultural competency and trauma-informed care continuing education 25courses within one year of the date of initial licensure; and 2627(B) Complete additional cultural competency and trauma-informed care continuing education once every five years thereafter. 28SECTION 5. A lactation consultant and a lactation educator shall comply with the re-2930 spective standards of practice and professional responsibility for lactation consultants and 31 lactation educators that are adopted by rule by the Health Licensing Office under section 7 of this 2017 Act. 32SECTION 6. (1) A person may not practice lactation consultation, provide lactation edu-33 34 cation or assume or use any title, words or abbreviations, including but not limited to the title or designation "lactation consultant" or "lactation educator," that indicate that the 35person is authorized to practice lactation consultation or provide lactation education unless 36 37 the person is licensed under section 2 or 3 of this 2017 Act. 38 (2) Subsection (1) of this section does not prohibit: (a) A person licensed under the laws of this state in a profession or occupation other 39 than lactation consultation or lactation education from practicing lactation consultation or 40 providing lactation education in a manner incidental to the person's practice; 41 (b) The use of lactation consultation or lactation education as an integral part of an ed-42 43 ucation program; or (c) A person whose training and national certification attest to the person's preparation 44 and ability from practicing the profession or occupation in which the person is certified, if 45

the person does not represent that the person is a lactation consultant or lactation educator. 1 2 SECTION 7. (1) The Health Licensing Office shall adopt rules to: (a) Establish a process for issuing lactation consultant and lactation educator licenses; 3 (b) Establish licensure fees; 4 (c) Determine qualifications for applicants for initial licensure and licensure by 5 6 reciprocity; (d) Approve the certification issued by the International Board of Lactation Consultant 7 **Examiners;** 8 9 (e) Approve the breast-feeding education courses recognized by the Lactation Education Accreditation and Approval Review Committee; 10 (f) Develop and maintain a publicly available record of lactation consultants and lactation 11 12educators; and 13 (g) Establish standards of practice and professional responsibility for lactation consultants and lactation educators that reflect the standards established by the International 14 15 Board of Lactation Consultant Examiners and the Lactation Education Accreditation and **Approval Review Committee.** 16 (2) The office may adopt rules to: 1718 (a) Approve the International Board of Lactation Consultant Examiners and the Lactation Education Accreditation and Approval Review Committee or other organization, 19 20 or their successor organizations, as accrediting or certifying bodies if the organizations offer: (A) A process to evaluate candidates for certification or education; 2122(B) A grievance process for applicants or individuals authorized by the organization; and (C) A process for recertification or reauthorization; and 23(b) Other rules as necessary to carry out the provisions of sections 1 to 7 of this 2017 24 Act. 25SECTION 8. (1)(a) The Health Licensing Office is under the supervision and control of a director, who is responsible for the performance of the duties, functions and powers and for the organization 28of the office. 2930 (b) The Director of the Oregon Health Authority shall establish the qualifications for and ap-31 point the Director of the Health Licensing Office, who holds office at the pleasure of the Director 32of the Oregon Health Authority. (c) The Director of the Health Licensing Office shall receive a salary as provided by law or, if 33 34 not so provided, as prescribed by the Director of the Oregon Health Authority. (d) The Director of the Health Licensing Office is in the unclassified service. 35(2) The Director of the Health Licensing Office shall provide the boards and councils adminis-36 37 tered by the office with such services and employees as the office requires to carry out the office's duties. (1) Except as provided in subsection (3) of this section, and in addition to any other 18 penalty or remedy provided by law, the Health Licensing Office may impose a civil penalty not to 19 exceed \$5,000 for each violation of the following statutes and any rule adopted under the following 20 statutes:

- 21 (a) ORS 688.701 to 688.734 (athletic training);
- 22 (b) ORS 690.005 to 690.225 (cosmetology);
- 23 (c) ORS 680.500 to 680.565 (denture technology);
- 24 (d) Subject to ORS 676.616 and 687.445, ORS 687.405 to 687.495 (direct entry midwifery);

(e) ORS 690.350 to 690.410 (tattooing, electrolysis, body piercing, earlobe piercing, dermal im planting and scarification);

- 28 (g) ORS 688.800 to 688.840 (respiratory therapy and polysomnography);

(2) The office may take any other disciplinary action that it finds proper, including but not limited to assessment of costs of disciplinary proceedings, not to exceed \$5,000, for violation of any statute listed in subsection (1) of this section or any rule adopted under any statute listed in subsection (1) of this section.

42 (3) Subsection (1) of this section does not limit the amount of the civil penalty resulting from a
43 violation of ORS 694.042.

- 44 (4) In imposing a civil penalty under this section, the office shall consider the following factors:
- 45 (a) The immediacy and extent to which the violation threatens the public health or safety;

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(b) Any prior violations of statutes, rules or orders; 1 2 (c) The history of the person incurring a penalty in taking all feasible steps to correct any vio-3 lation; and (d) Any other aggravating or mitigating factors. 4 (5) Civil penalties under this section shall be imposed as provided in ORS 183.745. 5 (6) The moneys received by the office from civil penalties under this section shall be deposited 6 in the Health Licensing Office Account and are continuously appropriated to the office for the ad-7 ministration and enforcement of the laws the office is charged with administering and enforcing that 8 9 govern the person against whom the penalty was imposed. SECTION 12. (1) Sections 1 to 7 of this 2017 Act and the amendments to ORS 676.610, 10 676.622, 676.850 and 676.992 by sections 8 to 11 of this 2017 Act become operative on January 11 121, 2018. (2) The Health Licensing Office may take any action before the operative date specified 13 in subsection (1) of this section that is necessary to enable the office to exercise, on or after 14 15 the operative date specified in subsection (1) of this section, all of the duties, functions and powers conferred on the office by sections 1 to 7 of this 2017 Act and the amendments to 16 ORS 676.610, 676.622, 676.850 and 676.992 by sections 8 to 11 of this 2017 Act. 17 18 SECTION 13. This 2017 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public 19 peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2017 Act takes effect on its passage. 2021
