Introduced and printed pursuant to House Rule 12.00. Pre-session filed (at the request of House Interim Committee on Judiciary)

## SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Makes nonsubstantive and technical changes in Oregon law. Corrects grammar and punctuation. Deletes obsolete provisions. Conforms language to existing statutes and legislative style.

9 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

10 **SECTION 1.** ORS 174.535 is amended to read:

11 174.535. It is the policy of the Legislative Assembly to revise sections from Oregon Revised  
12 Statutes and Oregon law periodically in order to maintain accuracy. However, nothing in chapter  
13 740, Oregon Laws 1983, chapter 565, Oregon Laws 1985, chapter 158, Oregon Laws 1987, chapter  
14 171, Oregon Laws 1989, chapters 67 and 927, Oregon Laws 1991, chapters 18 and 469, Oregon Laws  
15 1993, chapter 79, Oregon Laws 1995, chapter 249, Oregon Laws 1997, chapter 59, Oregon Laws 1999,  
16 chapter 104, Oregon Laws 2001, chapter 14, Oregon Laws 2003, chapter 22, Oregon Laws 2005,  
17 chapter 71, Oregon Laws 2007, chapter 11, Oregon Laws 2009, chapter 9, Oregon Laws 2011, chapter

21 chapters 67 and 927, Oregon Laws 1991, chapters 18 and 469, Oregon Laws 1993, chapter 79, Oregon  
22 Laws 1995, chapter 249, Oregon Laws 1997, chapter 59, Oregon Laws 1999, chapter 104, Oregon

2       **SECTION 2.** ORCP 69 C is amended to read:

3       C Motion for order of default.

4       C(1) The party seeking default must file a motion for order of default. That motion must be ac-  
5       companied by an affidavit or declaration to support that default is appropriate and contain facts  
6       sufficient to establish the following:

7       C(1)(a) that the party to be defaulted has been served with summons pursuant to Rule 7 or is  
8       otherwise subject to the jurisdiction of the court;

9       C(1)(b) that the party against whom the order of default is sought has failed to appear by filing  
10       a motion or answer, or otherwise to defend as provided by these rules or applicable statute;

11       C(1)(c) whether written notice of intent to appear has been received by the movant and, if so,  
12       whether written notice of intent to apply for an order of default was filed and served at least 10  
13       days, or any shortened period of time ordered by the court, prior to filing the motion;

14       C(1)(d) whether, to the best knowledge and belief of the party seeking an order of default, the  
15       party against whom judgment is sought is or is not incapacitated as defined in ORS 125.005, a minor,  
16       a protected person as defined in ORS 125.005, or a respondent as defined in ORS 125.005; and

17       C(1)(e) whether the party against whom the order is sought is or is not a person in the military  
18       service, or stating that the movant is unable to determine whether or not the party against whom  
19       the order is sought is in the military service as required by [Section] **section** 201(b)(1) of the  
20       Servicemembers Civil Relief Act, 50 [App. U.S.C. §521] **U.S.C. App. 521**, as amended.

21       C(2) If the party seeking default states in the affidavit or declaration that the party against  
22       whom the order is sought:

23       C(2)(a) is incapacitated as defined in ORS 125.005, a minor, a protected person as defined in ORS  
24       125.005, or a respondent as defined in ORS 125.005, an order of default may be entered against the  
25       party against whom the order is sought only if a guardian ad litem has been appointed or the party  
26       is represented by another person as described in Rule 27; **or**

27       C(2)(b) is a person in the military service, an order of default may be entered against the party  
28       against whom the order is sought only in accordance with the Servicemembers Civil Relief Act.

29       C(3) The court may grant an order of default if it appears the motion and affidavit or declaration  
30       have been filed in good faith and good cause is shown that entry of such an order is proper.

33       **SECTION 3.** ORS 87.196 is amended to read:

34       87.196. (1)(a) A lien claimant that forecloses by sale a lien created under ORS 87.152 to 87.162  
35       shall give notice of the foreclosure sale by first class, registered or certified mail. The following  
36       apply:

37       (A) The lien claimant shall give notice to all persons that have filed a financing statement in  
38       the office of the Secretary of State, or in the office of the appropriate county officer of the county  
39       in which the sale is held, to perfect a security interest in the chattel to be sold.

40       (B) Notwithstanding subparagraph (A) of this paragraph, if the chattel to be sold at the fore-  
41       closure sale is a chattel, other than part of the motor vehicle inventory of a dealer issued a vehicle  
42       dealer certificate under ORS 822.020, for which the Department of Transportation has issued a cer-  
43       tificate of title under ORS 803.045, for which the State Marine Board requires a certificate of title  
44       under ORS 830.810 or for which the Oregon Department of Aviation requires a certificate of regis-  
45       tration under ORS 837.040, the lien claimant needs to give notice only to persons that the certificate

1 of title or certificate of registration indicates have a security interest or lien in the chattel.

2 (C) The lien claimant shall give notice under this paragraph at least 30 days before the fore-  
3 closure sale, but if the lien claimant claims a lien under ORS 87.152, the lien claimant shall give the  
4 notice required by this subsection:

5 (i) Not later than the 20th day after the date on which the storage charges begin;

6 (ii) Not later than the 30th day after the date on which the services provided are completed, if  
7 no storage charges are imposed; or

8 (iii) At least 15 days before the foreclosure sale if the lien is for the cost of removing, towing  
9 or storing a vehicle that a person who holds a certificate issued under ORS 819.480 has appraised  
10 at a value of \$1,000 or less.

11 (b) A lien claimant that gives notice of a foreclosure sale for chattel described in paragraph  
12 (a)(B) of this subsection shall include with the notice a copy of an invoice, work or repair order,  
13 authorization for towing, official form that authorizes a law enforcement agency to impound the  
14 chattel or any other record or document that is evidence of the basis for the lien.

15 (2) A person who is entitled to receive notice under subsection (1) of this section may discharge  
16 the lien and preserve the person's security interest in the chattel by paying the lien claimant the  
17 amount of the lien claim and reasonable expenses the [person] **lien claimant** actually incurs in  
18 foreclosing the lien claim. If the person does not discharge the lien before the day of the foreclosure  
19 sale, the foreclosure sale extinguishes the person's security interest in the chattel even if the person  
20 does not receive notice under subsection (1) of this section.

21 (3) If a lien claimant does not give notice in accordance with subsection (1) of this section to  
22 a person that claims a security interest or lien on the chattel sold at a foreclosure sale, the lien  
23 claimant is liable to the person for a sum equal to the fair market value of the chattel sold at the  
24 foreclosure sale or the amount due to the person under the security agreement or lien at the time  
25 of the foreclosure sale, whichever amount is less. The secured party or other lien claimant may re-  
26 cover the sum and reasonable attorney fees by an action at law.

28 **SECTION 4.** ORS 110.675 is amended to read:

29 110.675. In applying and construing this [uniform act] **chapter**, consideration must be given to  
30 the need to promote uniformity of the law with respect to its subject matter among states that enact  
31 [it] **the Uniform Interstate Family Support Act**.

32 **NOTE:** Adjusts references in conformance with legislative style.

33 **SECTION 5.** ORS 130.315 is amended to read:

34 130.315. (1) Whether or not the terms of a trust contain a spendthrift provision:

35 (a) During the lifetime of the settlor, the property of a revocable trust is subject to claims of  
36 the settlor's creditors.

37 (b) A creditor or assignee of the settlor of an irrevocable trust may reach the maximum amount  
38 that can be distributed to or for the settlor's benefit. If an irrevocable trust has more than one  
39 settlor, the amount the creditor or assignee of a particular settlor may reach may not exceed the  
40 settlor's interest in the portion of the trust attributable to that settlor's contribution.

41 (c) If a trust was revocable at the settlor's death, the property of the trust becomes subject to  
42 creditors' claims as provided in ORS 130.350 to 130.450 when the settlor dies. The payment of claims  
43 is subject to the settlor's right to direct the priority of the sources from which liabilities of the  
44 settlor are to be paid.

45 (d) Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraph (b) of this subsection, the assets of an irrev-

1 ovable trust may not be subject to the claims of an existing or subsequent creditor or assignee of  
2 the settlor, in whole or in part, solely because of the existence of a discretionary power granted to  
3 the trustee by the terms of the trust or any other provision of law to pay the amount of tax owed  
4 directly to the taxing authorities or to reimburse the settlor for any tax on trust income or principal  
5 that is payable or has been paid by the settlor under the law imposing the tax.

6 (2) For the purpose of creditors' claims, the holder of a power of withdrawal is treated in the  
7 same manner as the settlor of a revocable trust to the extent property of the trust is subject to the  
8 power. The provisions of this subsection apply to the holder of a power of withdrawal only during  
9 the period that the power may be exercised.

10 (3) Upon the lapse, release or waiver of a power of withdrawal, the property of the trust that  
11 is the subject of the lapse, release or waiver becomes subject to claims of creditors of the holder  
12 of the power only to the extent the value of the property exceeds the [*greater*] **greatest** of:

13 (a) The amount specified in section 2041(b)(2) or 2514(e) of the Internal Revenue Code, as in ef-  
14 fect on December 31, 2012;

15 (b) The amount specified in section 2503(b) of the Internal Revenue Code, as in effect on De-  
16 cember 31, 2012; or

17 (c) Twice the amount specified in section 2503(b) of the Internal Revenue Code, as in effect on  
18 December 31, 2012, if the donor was married at the time of the transfer to which the power of  
19 withdrawal applies.

20 (4) The assets of an irrevocable trust that are attributable to a contribution to an inter vivos  
21 marital deduction trust described in section 2523(e) or (f) of the Internal Revenue Code, as in effect  
22 on December 31, 2012, after the death of the spouse of the settlor of the inter vivos marital de-  
23 duction trust shall be deemed to have been contributed by the settlor's spouse and not by the settlor.

24 (5) The assets of an irrevocable trust for the benefit of a person, including the settlor, are not  
25 subject to claims of creditors of the settlor to the extent that the property of the trust is subject  
26 to a presently exercisable general power of appointment held by a person other than the settlor.

27 (6) Subsections (2) and (3) of this section do not apply to a person other than a settlor who is  
28 a beneficiary of a revocable or irrevocable trust and who is also a trustee of the trust, if the power  
29 to withdraw for the person's own benefit is limited by an ascertainable standard.

31 **SECTION 6.** ORS 130.805 is amended to read:

32 130.805. (1) A trustee who commits a breach of trust is liable to the beneficiaries affected for  
33 the [*greater*] **greatest** of:

34 (a) The amount of damages caused by the breach;

35 (b) The amount required to restore the value of the trust property and trust distributions to  
36 what they would have been had the breach not occurred; or

37 (c) The profit the trustee made by reason of the breach.

38 (2) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, if more than one trustee is liable to the  
39 beneficiaries for a breach of trust, a trustee is entitled to contribution from the other trustee or  
40 trustees. In determining the amount of contribution, the court shall consider the degree of fault of  
41 each trustee and whether any trustee or trustees acted in bad faith or with reckless indifference to  
42 the purposes of the trust or the interests of the beneficiaries. A trustee who received a benefit from  
43 the breach of trust is not entitled to contribution from another trustee to the extent of the benefit  
44 received.

1        **SECTION 7.** ORS 131.915 is amended to read:

2        131.915. As used in ORS 131.915 to 131.925:

3        (1) “Law enforcement agency” means:

4        (a) The Department of State Police;

5        (b) The Department of Justice;

6        (c) A district attorney’s office; and

7        (d) Any of the following that maintains a law enforcement unit as defined in ORS 181A.355:

8        (A) A political subdivision or an instrumentality of the State of Oregon.

9        (B) A municipal corporation of the State of Oregon.

10       (C) A tribal government.

11       (D) A university.

12       (2) “Law enforcement officer” means:

13       (a) A member of the Oregon State Police;

14       (b) A sheriff, constable, marshal, municipal police officer or reserve officer or a police officer  
15 commissioned by a university under ORS 352.121 or 353.125;

16       (c) An investigator of a district attorney’s office if the investigator is or has been certified as  
17 a law enforcement officer in this or any other state;

18       (d) An investigator of the Criminal Justice Division of the Department of Justice;

19       (e) A humane special agent as defined in ORS 181A.345;

20       (f) A judicial marshal of the Security and Emergency Preparedness Office of the Judicial De-  
21 partment who is appointed under ORS 1.177 and trained pursuant to ORS 181A.540;

25       (3) “Profiling” means that a law enforcement agency or a law enforcement officer targets an  
26 individual for suspicion of violating a provision of law based solely on the real or perceived factor  
27 of the individual’s age, race, ethnicity, color, national origin, language, gender, gender identity,  
28 sexual orientation, political affiliation, religion, homelessness or disability, unless the agency or of-  
29 ficer is acting on a suspect description or information related to an identified or suspected violation  
30 of a provision of law.

31       (4) “Sexual orientation” has the meaning given that term in ORS 174.100.

34       **SECTION 8.** ORS 171.580 is amended to read:

35       171.580. (1) There is created a Joint Legislative Audit Committee consisting of the cochairs of  
36 the Joint Committee on Ways and Means, members of the House of Representatives appointed by  
37 the Speaker and members of the Senate appointed by the President.

38       (2) The committee has a continuing existence and may meet, act and conduct its business during  
39 sessions of the Legislative Assembly or any recess thereof and in the interim between sessions.

40       (3)(a) The term of a member shall expire upon **the earlier of:**

41       (A) The date of the convening of the odd-numbered year regular session of the Legislative As-  
42 sembly next following the commencement of the member’s term[.]; **or**

43       (B) **The date of the convening of an organizational session of the odd-numbered year**  
44 **regular session of the Legislative Assembly next following the commencement of the**  
45 **member’s term.**

1       **(b)** When a vacancy occurs in the membership of the committee in the interim between [*odd-*  
2 *numbered year regular sessions*] **an odd-numbered year regular session and the earlier of the**  
3 **date of the convening of the next following odd-numbered year regular session or the date**  
4 **of the convening of an organizational session of the next following odd-numbered year regu-**  
5 **lar session**, until such vacancy is filled, the membership of the committee shall be considered not  
6 to include the vacant position for the purpose of determining whether a quorum is present and a  
7 quorum is a majority of the remaining members.

8       (4) Members of the committee shall receive an amount equal to that authorized under ORS  
9 171.072 from funds appropriated to the Legislative Assembly for each day spent in the performance  
10 of their duties as members of the committee or any subcommittee thereof in lieu of reimbursement  
11 for in-state travel expenses. However, when engaged in out-of-state travel, members shall be entitled  
12 to receive their actual and necessary expenses therefor in lieu of the amount authorized by this  
13 subsection. Payment shall be made from funds appropriated to the Legislative Assembly.

14       (5) The committee may not transact business unless a quorum is present. A quorum consists of  
15 a majority of committee members from the House of Representatives and a majority of committee

25       171.852. (1) There is hereby created a Joint Legislative Committee on Information Management  
26 and Technology. The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall  
27 appoint the members of the committee.

28       (2) The committee has a continuing existence and may meet, act and conduct its business during  
29 sessions of the Legislative Assembly or any recess thereof, and in the interim between sessions.

30       (3)(a) The term of a member shall expire upon **the earlier of:**

31       **(A)** The date of the convening of the odd-numbered year regular session of the Legislative As-  
32 sembly next following the commencement of the member's term[.]; **or**

33       **(B) The date of the convening of an organizational session of the odd-numbered year**  
34 **regular session of the Legislative Assembly next following the commencement of the**  
35 **member's term.**

36       **(b)** When a vacancy occurs in the membership of the committee in the interim between [*odd-*  
37 *numbered year regular sessions*] **an odd-numbered year regular session and the earlier of the**  
38 **date of the convening of the next following odd-numbered year regular session or the date**

45 of their duties as members of the committee or any subcommittee thereof in lieu of reimbursement

1 for in-state travel expenses. However, when engaged in out-of-state travel, members shall be entitled  
2 to receive their actual and necessary expenses therefor in lieu of the amount authorized by this  
3 subsection. Payment shall be made from funds appropriated to the Legislative Fiscal Office.

14 173.191. (1)(a) The Legislative Counsel Committee shall consist of the Speaker of the House of  
15 Representatives, the President of the Senate, members of the House appointed by the Speaker and  
16 members of the Senate appointed by the President. The Speaker of the House of Representatives and  
17 the President of the Senate may each designate from among the members of the appropriate house  
18 an alternate to exercise powers as a member of the committee.

19 **(b)** The appointing authorities shall appoint members of a new committee within 30 days after  
20 **the earlier of:**

21 **(A)** The date of the convening of [each] an odd-numbered year regular session of the Legislative  
22 Assembly[.]; **or**

23 **(B) The date of the convening of an organizational session of the odd-numbered year**  
24 **regular session of the Legislative Assembly.**

25 (2)(a) The term of a member of the committee shall expire upon **the earlier of:**

26 **(A)** The date of the convening of the odd-numbered year regular session of the Legislative As-  
27 sembly next following the member's appointment[.]; **or**

28 **(B) The date of the convening of an organizational session of the odd-numbered year**  
29 **regular session of the Legislative Assembly next following the member's appointment.**

30 **(b)** Vacancies occurring in the membership of the committee shall be filled by the appointing  
31 authority.

32 (3) The committee has a continuing existence and may meet, act and conduct its business during  
33 the sessions of the Legislative Assembly or any recess thereof, and in the interim period between  
34 sessions but the committee has no authority to affect the rules of either house.

35 (4) The Legislative Counsel Committee may appoint advisory committees or subcommittees. Ex-  
36 cept as otherwise provided in this subsection, individuals other than members of the Legislative  
37 Assembly may serve on such advisory committees or subcommittees. A member of such committee  
38 or subcommittee who is not a member of the Legislative Assembly shall be compensated and reim-  
39 bursed in the manner provided in ORS 292.495. An advisory committee or subcommittee appointed  
40 to assist the Legislative Counsel Committee in review of state agency rules may consist only of two  
41 or more members of the Legislative Assembly.

42 (5) The Legislative Counsel Committee may not transact business unless a quorum is present.  
43 A quorum consists of a majority of committee members from the House of Representatives and a  
44 majority of committee members from the Senate.

1 from the House of Representatives and a majority of committee members from the Senate.

3 **SECTION 11.** ORS 173.215 is amended to read:

4 173.215. (1) The expiration of the terms of members of the Legislative Counsel Committee, as  
5 provided by ORS 173.191, does not affect the employment of any individual filling a position previ-  
6 ously approved by the committee.

7 (2) *[After the convening of the Legislative Assembly in an odd-numbered year regular session]*

8 **Upon the expiration of the terms of members** and until the newly appointed Legislative Counsel  
9 Committee provides otherwise, the Legislative Counsel may employ and fix the compensation of in-  
10 dividuals the Legislative Counsel considers necessary for the effective conduct of the work super-  
11 vised or managed by the Legislative Counsel.

12 (3) Notwithstanding ORS 173.111 and 173.200, if a vacancy occurs in the position of Legislative  
13 Counsel after the *[convening of the Legislative Assembly in an odd-numbered year regular session]*  
14 **expiration of the terms of members** and before the appointment of **members of a new** Legislative  
15 Counsel Committee, the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives  
16 may jointly select a Legislative Counsel who has the qualifications set forth in ORS 173.200. The  
17 Legislative Counsel selected by the President and the Speaker serves at their pleasure at a salary  
18 jointly fixed by the President and the Speaker that does not exceed the salary last fixed by the  
19 committee. The President and Speaker may act in lieu of the Legislative Counsel Committee under  
20 ORS 293.335 in designating the Legislative Counsel they select to approve disbursements and in fil-  
21 ing the statement of designation. After appointment of a Legislative Counsel Committee, the Legis-  
22 lative Counsel selected under this subsection serves at the pleasure of the committee and the  
23 committee may exercise power and authority over the Legislative Counsel as if the Legislative  
24 Counsel had been selected by the committee.

26 **SECTION 12.** ORS 173.730 is amended to read:

29 (n) Convenience fees as defined in ORS 182.126 and established by the State Chief Information  
30 Officer under ORS 182.132 (3) and recommended by the Electronic Government Portal Advisory  
31 Board.

32 (3)(a) Fees temporarily decreased for competitive or promotional reasons or because of unex-  
33 pected and temporary revenue surpluses may be increased to not more than their prior level without  
34 compliance with subsection (1) of this section if, at the time the fee is decreased, the state agency  
35 specifies the following:

36 (A) The reason for the fee decrease; and

37 (B) The conditions under which the fee will be increased to not more than its prior level.

38 (b) Fees that are decreased for reasons other than those described in paragraph (a) of this sub-

1 (a) Maintains a head office or branch in this state in the capacity of an insured institution or  
2 trust company; and

3 (b) Complies with ORS 295.008.

4 (3) "Business day" means a day other than a federal or State of Oregon legal holiday or a day  
5 other than a day on which offices of the State of Oregon are otherwise authorized by law to remain  
6 closed.

7 (4) "Closed depository" means a depository that is subject to a loss.

8 (5) "Credit union depository" means a credit union as defined in ORS 723.006 or a federal credit  
9 union if:

10 (a) The shares and deposits of the credit union or federal credit union are insured by the Na-  
11 tional Credit Union Share Insurance Fund;

12 (b) The credit union or federal credit union maintains a head office or branch in this state in  
13 the capacity of a credit union or federal credit union; and

14 (c) The credit union or federal credit union complies with ORS 295.008.

15 (6) "Custodian" means one of the following institutions that a depository designates for the  
16 depository's own account:

17 (a) The Federal Home Loan Bank designated to serve this state, or a branch of the Federal  
18 Home Loan Bank; or

19 (b) An insured institution, trust company or credit union that:

20 (A) Is authorized to accept deposits or transact trust business in this state;

21 (B) Complies with ORS 295.008; and

22 (C) Has been approved by the State Treasurer to serve as a custodian, if the State Treasurer  
23 has approved custodians under ORS 295.008.

24 (7) "Custodian's receipt" or "receipt" means a document issued by a custodian that describes the  
25 securities that a depository deposited with the custodian to secure public fund deposits.

26 (8) "Depository" means a bank depository or a credit union depository.

27 (9) "Financial institution outside this state" means a financial institution, as defined in ORS  
28 706.008, that is not an extranational institution, as defined in ORS 706.008, and is not a bank de-  
29 pository or credit union depository, as defined in this section.

30 (10) "Insured institution" means an insured institution as defined in ORS 706.008.

31 (11) "Loss" means the issuance of an order by a regulatory or supervisory authority or a court  
32 of competent jurisdiction that:

33 (a) Restrains a depository from making payments of deposit liabilities; or

34 (b) Appoints a receiver for a depository.

35 (12) "Maximum liability" means a sum equal to 10 percent of the greater of:

36 (a) All uninsured public funds deposits held by a depository, as shown on the date of the  
37 depository's most recent treasurer report; or

38 (b) The average of the balances of uninsured public funds deposits on the last two immediately  
39 preceding treasurer reports.

40 (13) "Minimum collateral requirement" for a depository on any given date means a sum equal  
41 to:

42 (a) For a well capitalized depository that the State Treasurer has not required to increase the  
43 depository's collateral pursuant to ORS 295.018, 10 percent of the *[greater]* **greatest** of:

44 (A) All uninsured public funds held by the depository, as shown on the most recent treasurer  
45 report;

1 (B) The average of the balances of uninsured public funds held by the depository, as shown on  
2 the last two immediately preceding treasurer reports; or

3 (C) An amount otherwise prescribed in ORS 295.001 to 295.108.

4 (b) For a well capitalized depository that the State Treasurer required to increase the  
5 depository's collateral pursuant to ORS 295.018, the percentage the State Treasurer required pur-  
6 suant to ORS 295.018 multiplied by the *[greater]* **greatest** of:

7 (A) All uninsured public funds held by the depository, as shown on the most recent treasurer  
8 report;

9 (B) The average of the balances of uninsured public funds held by the depository, as shown on  
10 the last two immediately preceding treasurer reports; or

11 (C) An amount otherwise prescribed in ORS 295.001 to 295.108.

12 (c) For an adequately capitalized depository or an undercapitalized depository, 110 percent of  
13 the greater of:

14 (A) All uninsured public funds held by the depository; or

15 (B) The average of the balances of uninsured public funds held by the depository, as shown on  
16 the last two immediately preceding treasurer reports.

17 (14) "Net worth" means a depository's total risk-based capital, as shown on the immediately  
18 preceding report of condition and income, and may include capital notes and debentures that are  
19 subordinate to the interests of depositors.

20 (15) "Pledge agreement" means a written agreement among an insured institution, trust company  
21 or credit union, the State Treasurer and a custodian that pledges the securities the insured institu-  
22 tion, trust company or credit union deposits with the custodian as collateral for deposits of  
23 uninsured public funds that the insured institution, trust company or credit union holds. The board  
24 of directors or loan committee of the insured institution, trust company or credit union must ap-  
25 prove the agreement and must continuously maintain the agreement as a written record of the in-

41 and municipal bonds; or

42 (B) Having once been rated in accordance with subparagraph (A) of this paragraph, are ruled  
43 to be eligible securities for the purposes of ORS 295.001 to 295.108, notwithstanding the loss of the

45 (d) Bonds of a county, city, school district, port district or other public body in the United States

1 that are payable from or secured by ad valorem taxes and that meet the rating requirement or are  
2 ruled to be eligible securities as provided in paragraph (c) of this subsection;

3 (e) Bonds of a county, city, school district, port district or other public body that are issued  
4 pursuant to the Constitution or statutes of the State of Oregon or the charter or ordinances of a  
5 county or city within the State of Oregon, if the bonds meet the rating requirement or are ruled to

7 (f) With the permission of the State Treasurer and in accordance with rules the State Treasurer

41 (b) "Uninsured public funds" or "uninsured public funds deposits" does not include public funds  
42 deposited in a certificate of deposit or time deposit under ORS 295.004 (1) or public funds that an  
43 Oregon depository arranges to deposit into an insured deposit account under ORS 295.004 (2).

44 (25) "Value" means the current market value of securities.

45 (26) "Well capitalized" means a depository that the depository's primary federal regulatory au-

1 thority has classified as well capitalized.

4 295.048. (1) Notwithstanding ORS 295.046, a depository may not permit the aggregate of  
5 uninsured public funds deposits on deposit with the depository from all public officials to exceed at

7 (a) 100 percent of the value of the depository's net worth, if the depository is an undercapital-  
8 ized depository;

9 (b) 150 percent of the value of the depository's net worth, if the depository is an adequately  
10 capitalized depository;

11 (c) 200 percent of the value of the depository's net worth, if the depository is a well capitalized  
12 depository;

13 (d) For a bank depository, 30 percent of the total aggregate uninsured public funds deposits of  
14 all public officials in all bank depositories as reported in the most recent notice the bank depository  
15 received from the State Treasurer; or

16 (e) For a credit union depository, 30 percent of the total aggregate uninsured public funds de-

12 310.140. (1) The Legislative Assembly finds that Article XI, section 11b, of the Oregon Consti-  
 13 tution, was drafted by citizens and placed before the voters of the State of Oregon by initiative pe-  
 14 tition. Article XI, section 11b, of the Oregon Constitution, uses terms that do not have established  
 15 legal meanings and require definition by the Legislative Assembly. Article XI, section 11b, of the  
 16 Oregon Constitution, was amended by Article XI, section 11 (11), of the Oregon Constitution. This  
 17 section is intended to interpret the terms of Article XI, section 11b, of the Oregon Constitution, as  
 18 originally adopted and as amended by Article XI, section 11 (11), of the Oregon Constitution, con-  
 19 sistent with the intent of the people in adopting these provisions, so that the provisions of Article  
 20 XI, section 11b, of the Oregon Constitution, may be given effect uniformly throughout the State of  
 21 Oregon, with minimal confusion and misunderstanding by citizens and affected units of government.

29 (B) "Actual cost" includes, but is not limited to, the costs of labor, materials, supplies, equip-  
 30 ment rental, property acquisition, permits, engineering, financing, reasonable program delinquencies,  
 31 return on investment, required fees, insurance, administration, accounting, depreciation, amorti-  
 32 zation, operation, maintenance, repair or replacement and debt service, including debt service pay-  
 33 ments or payments into reserve accounts for debt service and payment of amounts necessary to meet  
 34 debt service coverage requirements.

35 (b) "Assessment for local improvement" means any tax, fee, charge or assessment that does not  
 36 exceed the actual cost incurred by a unit of government for design, construction and financing of  
 37 a local improvement.

38 (c) "Bonded indebtedness" means any formally executed written agreement representing a  
 39 promise by a unit of government to pay to another a specified sum of money, at a specified date or  
 40 dates at least one year in the future.

41 (d)(A) "Capital construction" means, for bonded indebtedness issued prior to December 5, 1996,  
 42 and for the proceeds of any bonded indebtedness approved by electors prior to December 5, 1996,  
 43 that were spent or contractually obligated to be spent prior to June 20, 1997, the construction,  
 44 modification, replacement, repair, remodeling or renovation of a structure, or addition to a struc-  
 45 ture, that is expected to have a useful life of more than one year, and includes, but is not limited

1 to:

2 (i) Acquisition of land, or a legal interest in land, in conjunction with the capital construction  
3 of a structure.

4 (ii) Acquisition, installation of machinery or equipment, furnishings or materials that will be-  
5 come an integral part of a structure.

6 (iii) Activities related to the capital construction, including planning, design, authorizing, issu-  
7 ing, carrying or repaying interim or permanent financing, research, land use and environmental im-  
8 pact studies, acquisition of permits or licenses or other services connected with the construction.

9 (iv) Acquisition of existing structures, or legal interests in structures, in conjunction with the  
10 capital construction.

11 (B) "Capital construction," for bonded indebtedness issued on or after December 5, 1996, except  
12 for the proceeds of any bonded indebtedness approved by electors prior to December 5, 1996, that  
13 were spent or contractually obligated to be spent before June 20, 1997, has the meaning given that  
14 term in subparagraph (A) of this paragraph except as provided in subparagraphs (C) and (D) of this  
15 paragraph.

16 (C) "Capital construction" includes public safety and law enforcement vehicles with a projected  
17 useful life of five years or more.

18 (D) "Capital construction" does not include:

19 (i) Maintenance and repairs, the need for which could be reasonably anticipated;

20 (ii) Supplies and equipment that are not intrinsic to the structure; or

21 (iii) Furnishings, unless the furnishings are acquired in connection with the acquisition, con-  
22 struction, remodeling or renovation of a structure, or the repair of a structure that is required be-  
23 cause of damage or destruction of the structure.

24 (e)(A) "Capital costs" means costs of land and of other assets having a useful life of more than  
25 one year, including costs associated with acquisition, construction, improvement, remodeling, fur-  
26 nishing, equipping, maintenance or repair.

27 (B) "Capital costs" does not include costs of routine maintenance or supplies.

28 (f)(A) "Capital improvements" means, for bonded indebtedness issued prior to December 5, 1996,  
29 and for the proceeds of any bonded indebtedness approved by electors before December 5, 1996, that  
30 were spent or contractually obligated to be spent before June 20, 1997, land, structures, facilities,  
31 personal property that is functionally related and subordinate to real property, machinery, equip-  
32 ment or furnishings having a useful life longer than one year.

33 (B) "Capital improvements," for bonded indebtedness issued on or after December 5, 1996, except  
34 for the proceeds of any bonded indebtedness approved by electors prior to December 5, 1996, that  
35 were spent or contractually obligated to be spent before June 20, 1997, has the meaning given that  
36 term in subparagraph (A) of this paragraph except as provided in subparagraphs (C) and (D) of this  
37 paragraph.

38 (C) "Capital improvements" includes public safety and law enforcement vehicles with a projected  
39 useful life of five years or more.

40 (D) "Capital improvements" does not include:

41 (i) Maintenance and repairs, the need for which could be reasonably anticipated;

42 (ii) Supplies and equipment that are not intrinsic to the structure; or

43 (iii) Furnishings, unless the furnishings are acquired in connection with the acquisition, con-  
44 struction, remodeling or renovation of a structure, or the repair of a structure that is required be-  
45 cause of damage or destruction of the structure.

1 (g) "Direct consequence of ownership" means that the obligation of the owner of property to pay  
2 a tax arises solely because that person is the owner of the property, and the obligation to pay the  
3 tax arises as an immediate and necessary result of that ownership without respect to any other in-  
4 tervening transaction, condition or event.

5 (h)(A) "Exempt bonded indebtedness" means:

6 (i) Bonded indebtedness authorized by a specific provision of the Oregon Constitution;

7 (ii) Bonded indebtedness incurred or to be incurred for capital construction or capital improve-  
8 ments that was issued as a general obligation of the issuing governmental unit on or before No-  
9 vember 6, 1990;

10 (iii) Bonded indebtedness incurred or to be incurred for capital construction or capital im-  
11 provements that was issued as a general obligation of the issuing governmental unit after November  
12 6, 1990, with the approval of the electors of the issuing governmental unit prior to December 5, 1996;

13 (iv) Bonded indebtedness incurred or to be incurred for capital construction or capital im-  
14 provements if the issuance of the bonds is approved by voters on or after December 5, 1996, in an  
15 election that is in compliance with the voter participation requirements of Article XI, section 11 (8),  
16 of the Oregon Constitution, or if the issuance of the bonds is approved by voters on or after De-  
17 cember 4, 2008, in an election that is in compliance with the voter participation requirements of  
18 Article XI, section 11 (8), of the Oregon Constitution, as limited by Article XI, section 11k, of the  
19 Oregon Constitution; or

20 (v) Bonded indebtedness incurred or to be incurred for capital costs on or after January 1, 2011,  
21 if the issuance of the bonds is approved by voters in an election that is in compliance with the voter  
22 participation requirements of Article XI, section 11 (8), of the Oregon Constitution, as limited by  
23 Article XI, section 11k, of the Oregon Constitution.

24 (B) "Exempt bonded indebtedness" includes bonded indebtedness issued to refund or refinance  
25 any bonded indebtedness described in subparagraph (A) of this paragraph.

26 (i) "Incurred charge" means a charge imposed by a unit of government on property or upon a  
27 property owner that does not exceed the actual cost of providing goods or services and that can be  
28 controlled or avoided by the property owner because:

29 (A) The charge is based on the quantity of the goods or services used, and the owner has direct  
30 control over the quantity;

31 (B) The goods or services are provided only on the specific request of the property owner; or

32 (C) The goods or services are provided by the government unit only after the individual property

39 a local improvement upon the lots that have been benefited by all or a part of the improvement:

43 completion of the project; and

44 (C) For which the property owner may elect to make payment of the assessment plus appropriate

1 (k)(A) "Maintenance and repairs, the need for which could be reasonably anticipated" means  
2 activities, the type of which may be deducted as an expense under the provisions of the federal  
3 Internal Revenue Code, as defined in ORS 305.842, that keep the property in ordinarily efficient  
4 operating condition and that do not add materially to the value of the property nor appreciably  
5 prolong the life of the property.

6 (B) "Maintenance and repairs, the need for which could be reasonably anticipated" does not  
7 include:

8 (i) Maintenance and repair of property that is required by damage, destruction or defect in de-  
9 sign, or that was otherwise not reasonably expected at the time the property was constructed or  
10 acquired, or the addition of material that is in the nature of the replacement of property and that  
11 arrests the deterioration or appreciably prolongs the useful life of the property; and

12 (ii) Street and highway construction, overlay and reconstruction.

13 (L) "Projected useful life" means the useful life, as reasonably estimated by the unit of govern-  
14 ment undertaking the capital construction or capital improvement project, beginning with the date  
15 the property was acquired, constructed or reconstructed and based on the property's condition at  
16 the time the property was acquired, constructed or reconstructed.

17 (m) "Routine obligations of ownership" means a standard of operation, maintenance, use or care  
18 of property established by law, or if established by custom or common law, a standard that is rea-  
19 sonable for the type of property affected.

20 (n) "Single assessment" means the complete assessment process, including preassessment, as-  
21 sessment or reassessment, for any local improvement authorized by ORS 223.387 to 223.399 [*and*  
22 *223.680*], or a local ordinance or resolution that provides the procedure to be followed in making  
23 local assessments for benefits from a local improvement upon lots that have been benefited by all  
24 or part of the improvement.

25 (o) "Special benefit only to specific properties" shall have the same meaning as "special and  
26 peculiar benefit" as that term is used in ORS 223.389.

27 (c) "Group health insurer" means an insurer, a health maintenance organization or a health care
