# **A-Engrossed** House Bill 2763

Ordered by the House April 18 Including House Amendments dated April 18

## **SUMMARY**

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

[Establishes Accomplished Teaching Program within Department of Education to encourage and assist teachers in earning national board certification. Establishes Accomplished Teaching Program Fund.]

[Declares emergency, effective July 1, 2017.]

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Authorizes Teacher Standards and Practices Commission to disburse moneys from National Board Certification Fund for reimbursement of certain costs related to national board certification of teachers. Expands sources of moneys for fund, including distributions from

Network of Quality Teaching and Learning. Directs commission to renew, without charge, license of educator who is certified by national professional organization for teaching standards. Directs commission to submit to legislative committees of Legislative Assembly report

related to national board certification of teachers.

3	Whereas teachers play a critical role in preparing students to achieve the high academic stan-
4	dards expected under the Oregon Educational Act for the 21st Century; and

7	Whereas the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards was created to improve the

15	board certification have improved the learning outcomes of students, especially minority and low-

17	Whereas currently only one percent of the licensed teachers in this state have achieved national
18	board certification; and
19	Whereas this state should aspire to having at least 10 percent of its licensed teachers achieve
20	national board certification; and
21	Whereas it is the intent of the Legislative Assembly to provide incentives for teachers to seek
22	national board certification and to reward teachers who demonstrate teaching excellence by at-

2 Whereas it is the intent of the Legislative Assembly to increase the number of national board

3 certified teachers in this state to five percent of all public school teachers by 2022; now, therefore,

4 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. ORS 342.122 is amended to read:

6 342.122. (1) There is created the National Board Certification Fund, separate and distinct from 7 the General Fund. Interest earned on moneys in the National Board Certification Fund shall be 8 credited to the fund.

9 (2) The National Board Certification Fund shall include any state or federal moneys made 10 available to the fund, including moneys appropriated by the Legislative Assembly, moneys 11 distributed to the fund under ORS 342.950 and federal moneys made available to improve 12 teacher quality through professional development. The Teacher Standards and Practices Com-13 mission may accept from any source any grant, donation or gift of money or other valuable thing 14 made to the commission for purposes of the [National Board Certification] fund.

(3) Moneys credited to the National Board Certification Fund are continuously appropriated to the commission for the purposes set forth in subsections (4) and (5) of this section. The commission may draw checks or orders upon the State Treasurer in making disbursements from the fund for the purposes stated in this subsection.

(4) Moneys in the National Board Certification Fund shall be used to encourage at least 150
public school teachers [and administrators] in this state to apply for and attain certification each
biennium through the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards or any other national
professional organization for teaching standards designated by the Teacher Standards and Practices
Commission.

(5) The Teacher Standards and Practices Commission may disburse moneys from the National Board Certification Fund to applicants for assistance with the direct costs of seeking and obtaining national board certification, including reimbursement for the costs of each of the components necessary for certification and reimbursement for costs related to participating in a cohort for certification. [The commission shall manage the fund in a manner that provides support, but does not pay for all the costs of any one application. Additionally, the commission shall manage the fund to provide continuous support to as many applicants as possible.]

(6) The Teacher Standards and Practices Commission shall adopt rules that govern the dis bursement of moneys from the National Board Certification Fund consistent with this section.

valid for an additional 120 days, provided the educator has made a timely application, as determined
by the commission, for renewal prior to the expiration date on the license.

(6) In addition to the fee required by subsection (1) of this section for the issuance of an educator license, the commission shall collect a fee not to exceed \$300 for the reinstatement of a license
that has been suspended or revoked by the commission for gross neglect of duty or gross unfitness
under ORS 342.175.

(7) In addition to the fee required by subsection (1) of this section for the issuance of an educator license, the commission shall collect a fee not to exceed \$200 for the issuance of any emergency license through an expedited process at the request of any school district, public charter school or education service district that seeks to employ the applicant. The fee shall be paid by the school district, public charter school or education service district.

(8) Fees established under this section shall cover, but not exceed, the full cost of administrative
 expenses incurred by the commission during any biennium.
