SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Requires snowmobiles and certain all-terrain vehicles to cross highway at intersection or more than 100 feet from intersection.

Permits [road authority] Oregon Transportation Commission to authorize person [in remote areas] to operate all-terrain vehicle within portion of state highway right of way designated all-terrain vehicle highway access route.

Establishes All-Terrain Vehicle **Highway** Access Routes Advisory Committee. Directs Oregon Transportation Commission to designate all-terrain vehicle **highway** access routes **on state highways** throughout state after consultation with advisory committee.

Provides exemption from vehicle equipment requirements if person is crossing portion of highway right of way designated as all-terrain vehicle **highway** access route.

5	SECTION 1. ORS 821.190 is amended to read:
6	821.190. (1) A person commits the offense of unlawful operation of an off-road vehicle on a
7	highway or railroad if the person operates a vehicle described in subsection (2) of this section in
8	any of the following described areas:
9	(a) On or across the paved portion, the shoulder, inside bank or slope of any highway, on or

across the median of any divided highway or on or across any portion of a highway right of wayunder construction.

23 (5) The offense described in this section, unlawful operation of an off-road vehicle on a highway

2 SECTION 2. ORS 821.200 is amended to read:

821.200. This section establishes exemptions from the limitations placed on the use of
snowmobiles and all-terrain vehicles under ORS 821.190. The prohibitions and penalties under ORS
821.190 do not apply when a snowmobile or all-terrain vehicle that qualifies for the exemption from
equipment requirements under ORS 821.010 is being operated as described under any of the following:

8 (1) A person may lawfully cross a highway or railroad right of way while operating a 9 snowmobile or all-terrain vehicle if the person complies with all of the following:

(a) The crossing must be made at an angle of approximately 90 degrees to the direction of the
 highway or railroad right of way.

12 (b) The crossing must be made at a place where no obstruction prevents a quick and safe 13 crossing.

(c) The vehicle must be brought to a complete stop before entering the highway or railroad rightof way.

(d) The operator of the vehicle must yield the right of way to vehicles using the highway orequipment using the railroad tracks.

(e) The crossing of a railroad right of way must be made at an established public railroadcrossing.

20 (f) The crossing of a highway must be made at **a highway intersection or at** a place that is 21 more than 100 feet from any highway intersection.

(g) If the operator of a snowmobile is under 12 years of age, a person who is 18 years of age
or older must accompany the operator either as a passenger or as the operator of another
snowmobile that is in proximity to the younger operator.

(2) A snowmobile or all-terrain vehicle may be lawfully operated upon a highway under any ofthe following circumstances:

(a) Where the highway is completely covered with snow or ice and has been closed to motorvehicle traffic during winter months.

(b) For purposes of loading or unloading when such operation is performed with safety and
 without causing a hazard to vehicular traffic approaching from either direction on the highway.

31 (c) Where the highway is posted to permit snowmobiles or all-terrain vehicles.

(d) In an emergency during the period of time when and at locations where snow upon thehighway renders travel by automobile impractical.

34 (e) When traveling along a designated snowmobile or all-terrain vehicle trail.

(3) It shall be lawful to operate a snowmobile or all-terrain vehicle upon a railroad right of way
 under any of the following circumstances:

37 (a) Where the right of way is posted to permit the operation.

38 (b) In an emergency.

(c) When the snowmobile or all-terrain vehicle is operated by an officer or employee or author ized contractor or agent of a railroad.

(d) The desire of the local community to allow all-terrain vehicle highway access routes 10 cross portions of state highway rights of way for purposes of highway or trail 11 to 12 connectivity, access to recreational areas and promoting tourism. (e) Consistency with local all-terrain vehicle use on city streets and county roads adja-13 cent to the portions of state highway rights of way. 14 15 (f) Safety. The owner or operator of a vehicle is exempt, as provided by this section, from finan-39 cial responsibility requirements if the vehicle involved in the accident, sought to be registered or 40 operated is any of the following: 41 (1) An antique vehicle issued permanent registration under ORS 805.010. 42 (2) A farm trailer. 43 (3) A farm tractor. 44 (4) An implement of husbandry. 45

10 SECTION 9. ORS 807.020 is amended to read:

11 807.020. A person who is granted a driving privilege by this section may exercise the driving 12 privilege described without violation of the requirements under ORS 807.010. A grant of driving 13 privileges to operate a motor vehicle under this section is subject to suspension and revocation the 14 same as other driving privileges granted under the vehicle code. This section is in addition to any 15 exemptions from the vehicle code under ORS 801.026. The following persons are granted the de-16 scribed driving privileges:

(1) A person who is not a resident of this state or who has been a resident of this state for less
than 30 days may operate a motor vehicle without an Oregon license or driver permit if the person
holds a current out-of-state license issued to the person. For the purpose of this subsection, a person
is a resident of this state if the person meets the residency requirements described in ORS 807.062.
To qualify under this subsection, the person must have the out-of-state license or driver permit in
the person's possession. A person is not granted driving privileges under this subsection:

(a) If the person is under the minimum age required to be eligible for driving privileges under
 ORS 807.060;

(b) During a period of suspension or revocation by this state or any other jurisdiction of driving
privileges or of the right to apply for a license or driver permit issued by this state or any other
jurisdiction; or

(c) That exceed the driving privileges granted to the person by the out-of-state license or driverpermit.

(2) A person in the Armed Forces of the United States may operate a motor vehicle without an
Oregon license or driver permit if the person is operating a motor vehicle in the course of the
person's duties in the Armed Forces.

(3) A person without a license or driver permit may operate a road roller or road machinery
 that is not required to be registered under the laws of this state.

(4) A person without a license or driver permit may temporarily operate, draw, move or propel
 a farm tractor or implement of husbandry.

(5) A person without a license or driver permit may operate a motor vehicle to demonstrate driving ability during the course of an examination administered under ORS 807.070 for the purpose of qualifying for a license or driver permit. This subsection only applies when an authorized examiner is in a seat beside the driver of the motor vehicle.

(6) Driving privileges for snowmobiles are exclusively as provided in ORS 821.150.

42 (7) Driving privileges for Class I all-terrain vehicles are exclusively as provided in ORS
43 821.170, unless a person is operating a Class I all-terrain vehicle on an all-terrain vehicle
44 highway access route that is designated by the Oregon Transportation Commission as open
45 to all-terrain vehicles.

1 (8) Driving privileges for Class III all-terrain vehicles are exclusively as provided in ORS 2 821.172, unless a person is operating a Class III all-terrain vehicle on an all-terrain vehicle 3 highway access route that is designated by the commission as open to all-terrain vehicles.

(9) Driving privileges for Class IV all-terrain vehicles are exclusively as provided in ORS
821.176, unless a person is operating a Class IV all-terrain vehicle on an all-terrain vehicle
highway access route that is designated by the commission as open to all-terrain vehicles.

7 (10) A person without a license or driver permit may operate a golf cart in accordance with an
8 ordinance adopted under ORS 810.070.

9 (11) The spouse of a member of the Armed Forces of the United States on active duty who is 10 accompanying the member on assignment in this state may operate a motor vehicle if the spouse 11 has a current out-of-state license or driver permit issued to the spouse by another state in the 12 spouse's possession.

(12) A person who is a member of the Armed Forces of the United States on active duty may operate a motor vehicle if the person has a current out-of-state license or driver permit in the person's possession that is issued to the person by the person's state of domicile or by the Armed Forces of the United States in a foreign country. Driving privileges described under this subsection that are granted by the Armed Forces apply only for a period of 45 days from the time the person returns to the United States.

(13) A person who does not hold a motorcycle endorsement may operate a motorcycle if theperson is:

(a) Within an enclosed cab; or

(b) Operating a vehicle designed to travel with three wheels in contact with the ground at speeds of less than 15 miles per hour.

(14) A person may operate a bicycle that is not an electric assisted bicycle without any grantof driving privileges.

(15) A person may operate an electric assisted bicycle without a driver license or driver permit
 if the person is 16 years of age or older.

(16) A person may operate a motor assisted scooter without a driver license or driver permit if
the person is 16 years of age or older.

30 (17) A person who is not a resident of this state or who has been a resident of this state for less 31 than 30 days may operate a motor vehicle without an Oregon license or driver permit if the person is at least 15 years of age and has in the person's possession a current out-of-state equivalent of a 32Class C instruction driver permit issued to the person. For the purpose of this subsection, a person 33 34 is a resident of this state if the person meets the residency requirements described in ORS 807.062. A person operating a motor vehicle under authority of this subsection has the same privileges and 35is subject to the same restrictions as a person operating under the authority of a Class C instruction 36 37 driver permit issued as provided in ORS 807.280.

(18) A person may operate an electric personal assistive mobility device without any grant of
 driving privileges if the person is 16 years of age or older.
