House Bill 3400

Sponsored by Representative MALSTROM

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Limits requirements and standards insurer may establish for credentialing naturopathic physicians.

Takes effect on 91st day following adjournment sine die.

1 A BILL FOR AN ACT Relating to naturopathic physicians; creating new provisions; amending ORS 743B.407; and pre-2 scribing an effective date. 3 Whereas naturopathic physicians play an important role in the modern primary care workforce 4 in Oregon; and $\mathbf{5}$ Whereas naturopathic physicians play a role on the health care provider teams in modern pri-6 mary care clinical settings equivalent to physicians and should be entitled to equivalent compen-7 8 sation for their professional services; and Whereas naturopathic physicians often experience discrimination and arbitrary standards set by 9 insurers in credentialing; and 10 Whereas eliminating discrimination would result in increased access to primary care, improved 11 12 patient health outcomes and decreased costs to patients and to the Oregon health care system; now, 13therefore, 14 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon: SECTION 1. ORS 743B.407 is amended to read: 15 743B.407. (1) An insurer shall provide a naturopathic physician the choice of applying to be 16 17credentialed by the insurer as a primary care provider or as a specialty care provider. (2) To be credentialed by an insurer as a primary care provider, a naturopathic physician must 18 19 meet the credentialing requirements as established by the insurer. 20 (3)(a) An insurer may require that, to be credentialed by the insurer, a naturopathic physician provide proof of completion of the minimum educational requirements described in 2122ORS 685.060 and proof of active licensure under ORS chapter 685. 23(b) An insurer may establish additional quality standards for credentialing naturopathic physicians that are based solely on the standards that the insurer uses for the credentialing 2425of other health care practitioners. 26 (c) An insurer may not require a naturopathic physician to complete additional training for credentialing. 27 SECTION 2. Section 1 of this 2017 Act applies to contracts entered into, renewed or ex-28 29 tended on or after the effective date of this 2017 Act. 30 SECTION 3. This 2017 Act takes effect on the 91st day after the date on which the 2017 regular session of the Seventy-ninth Legislative Assembly adjourns sine die. 31
