House Bill 3431

Sponsored by Representative HAYDEN; Representative HUFFMAN

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Requires hospital that contracts or affiliates with coordinated care organization to provide hospital, oral and specialty care to low income children and veterans who meet specified criteria. Directs Oregon Health Authority to adopt rules to ensure that hospitals comply with requirements.

(e) Coordinating the delivery of physical health care, mental health and chemical dependency 14 15 services, oral health care and covered long-term care services. 16 (f) Engaging community members and health care providers in improving the health of the community and addressing regional, cultural, socioeconomic and racial disparities in health care 17 18 that exist among the coordinated care organization's members and in the coordinated care organization's community. 19 (2) In addition to the criteria specified in subsection (1) of this section, the authority must adopt 20by rule requirements for coordinated care organizations contracting with the authority so that: 2122(a) Each member of the coordinated care organization receives integrated person centered care

and services designed to provide choice, independence and dignity.

(b) Each member has a consistent and stable relationship with a care team that is responsiblefor comprehensive care management and service delivery.

(c) The supportive and therapeutic needs of each member are addressed in a holistic fashion,
using patient centered primary care homes, behavioral health homes or other models that support
patient centered primary care and behavioral health care and individualized care plans to the extent
feasible.

(d) Members receive comprehensive transitional care, including appropriate follow-up, when en tering and leaving an acute care facility or a long term care setting.

(e) Members receive assistance in navigating the health care delivery system and in accessing
community and social support services and statewide resources, including through the use of certified health care interpreters, as defined in ORS 413.550, community health workers and personal
health navigators who meet competency standards established by the authority under ORS 414.665
or who are certified by the Home Care Commission under ORS 410.604.

(f) Services and supports are geographically located as close to where members reside as possible and are, if available, offered in nontraditional settings that are accessible to families, diverse
communities and underserved populations.

(g) Each coordinated care organization uses health information technology to link services and
 care providers across the continuum of care to the greatest extent practicable and if financially vi able.

(h) Each coordinated care organization complies with the safeguards for members described inORS 414.635.

45 (i) Each coordinated care organization convenes a community advisory council that meets the

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criteria specified in ORS 414.627. 1 2 (j) Each coordinated care organization prioritizes working with members who have high health care needs, multiple chronic conditions, mental illness or chemical dependency and involves those 3 members in accessing and managing appropriate preventive, health, remedial and supportive care 4 and services to reduce the use of avoidable emergency room visits and hospital admissions. $\mathbf{5}$ (k) Members have a choice of providers within the coordinated care organization's network and 6 7 that providers participating in a coordinated care organization: (A) Work together to develop best practices for care and service delivery to reduce waste and 8 9 improve the health and well-being of members. 10 (B) Are educated about the integrated approach and how to access and communicate within the integrated system about a patient's treatment plan and health history. 11 12 (C) Emphasize prevention, healthy lifestyle choices, evidence-based practices, shared decision-13 making and communication. (m) Each coordinated care organization uses best practices in the management of finances, 2829contracts, claims processing, payment functions and provider networks. 30 (n) Each coordinated care organization participates in the learning collaborative described in 31 ORS 413.259 (3). 32(o) Each coordinated care organization has a governing body that includes: (A) Persons that share in the financial risk of the organization who must constitute a majority 33 34 of the governing body; 35(B) The major components of the health care delivery system; (C) At least two health care providers in active practice, including: 36 37 (i) A physician licensed under ORS chapter 677 or a nurse practitioner certified under ORS 38 678.375, whose area of practice is primary care; and (ii) A mental health or chemical dependency treatment provider; 39 (D) At least two members from the community at large, to ensure that the organization's 40 decision-making is consistent with the values of the members and the community; and 41 (E) At least one member of the community advisory council. 42 (p) Each coordinated care organization's governing body establishes standards for publicizing 43 the activities of the coordinated care organization and the organization's community advisory 44 councils, as necessary, to keep the community informed. 45

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1 (q) Each hospital contracting or affiliated with a coordinated care organization complies $\mathbf{2}$ with the requirements of section 2 of this 2017 Act. 3 (3) The authority shall consider the participation of area agencies and other nonprofit agencies in the configuration of coordinated care organizations. 4 $\mathbf{5}$ (4) In selecting one or more coordinated care organizations to serve a geographic area, the authority shall: 6 7(a) For members and potential members, optimize access to care and choice of providers; 8 (b) For providers, optimize choice in contracting with coordinated care organizations; and

9 (c) Allow more than one coordinated care organization to serve the geographic area if necessary 10 to optimize access and choice under this subsection.

11 (5) On or before July 1, 2014, each coordinated care organization must have a formal contractual

relationship with any dental care organization that serves members of the coordinated care organization in the area where they reside.

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
