## Senate Bill 206

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## **SUMMARY**

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced.** 

Requires Higher Education Coordinating Commission to develop policy to permit faculty at community colleges to receive compensation from private or public resources.

## A BILL FOR AN ACT

- 2 Relating to community college faculty compensation.
- 3 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:
  - SECTION 1. Section 2 of this 2017 Act is added to and made a part of ORS chapter 341.
  - SECTION 2. (1) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission shall develop a policy to permit faculty at community colleges to receive compensation from private or public resources, including but not limited to income from:
    - (a) Consulting;

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- (b) Appearances and speeches;
- (c) Intellectual property conceived, reduced to practice or originated and therefore owned within the community college;
- (d) Providing services or other valuable consideration for a private corporation, individual or entity, whether paid in cash or in-kind, stock or other equity interest, or anything of value regardless of whether there is a licensing agreement between the community college and the private corporation, individual or entity; and
- (e) Performing public duties paid by private organizations, including institution corporate affiliates, that augments a faculty member's publicly funded salary.
  - (2) The policy developed under subsection (1) of this section:
- (a) Shall include standards governing faculty outside employment and activities, including potential conflict of interest as defined in ORS 244.020, and the public disclosure thereof, and procedures for reporting and hearing potential or actual conflict of interest complaints.
- (b) Shall be adopted by each community college district and apply to each community college.
- (c) May not authorize compensation, as described in subsection (1) of this section, that, in the commission's judgment, does not comport with the state policy for community colleges set forth in ORS 341.009.
- (3) Any compensation authorized under this section is considered lawful under ORS chapter 244 and is not considered an honorarium prohibited by ORS 244.042. If authorization or receipt of the compensation creates a potential conflict of interest, the faculty member shall report the potential conflict in writing in accordance with the policy adopted by the

commission. The disclosure is a public record subject to public inspection.

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
