

# C-Engrossed Senate Bill 229

Ordered by the House July 5  
Including Senate Amendments dated May 22 and House Amendments  
dated July 3 and July 5

Printed pursuant to Senate Interim Rule 213.28 by order of the President of the Senate in conformance with pre-session filing rules, indicating neither advocacy nor opposition on the part of the President (at the request of Secretary of State Jeanne P. Atkins)

## SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Removes requirement that person elected to county office provide county clerk with certificate of election.

Requires certain election documents to be filed electronically.

Changes certain ballot markings from "Presidential only" to "Federal only."

Alters certain filing deadlines.

Requires Secretary of State to establish process for modifying petition and prospective petition templates.

Requires that one copy of prospective initiative and referral petitions, rather than two copies, be sent to required officials.

Permits district attorney to make clerical corrections to ballot title for district measure.

Requires all estimates, portraits, statements and arguments for voters' pamphlet to be filed electronically.

Clarifies how candidates, principal campaign committees, political committees and petition committees may use amounts received as contributions.

Permits use of campaign moneys in connection with most legal proceedings relating to election laws.

Provides that person who fails to file required statement or certificate has 20 days from date notice is sent by Secretary of State to request hearing.

Provides that during recount, Secretary of State may select batches of ballots for hand count.

Changes date Secretary of State must advise county clerks of issues relating to recount from three days after date of general election to 15 days after date of general election.

Provides that county clerk shall begin hand counts for recount not later than 23rd day after election, rather than by 21st day after election.

Requires Secretary of State to design standard form for certified statement to be used when return identification envelope is returned unsigned.

Provides that Secretary of State, rather than county clerk, is responsible for signature verification for state candidate petitions.

Directs that *[any Act that passes both houses of Legislative Assembly during 2017 regular session]* **Enrolled House Bill 2391 (2017)**, if referred by referendum petition, be submitted to people at special election held on January 23, 2018. **Directs that Enrolled House Bill 2017 (2017), if referred by referendum petition, be submitted to people at special election held on same date as next primary election.** Prescribes method for creating ballot title and explanatory statement for *[any]* measure to be voted on at special election.

Declares emergency, effective on passage.

## A BILL FOR AN ACT

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Relating to elections; creating new provisions; amending ORS 204.020, 246.021, 247.420, 248.006, 248.007, 249.002, 249.005, 249.008, 249.064, 249.078, 249.735, 249.740, 249.865, 250.052, 250.065, 250.067, 250.075, 250.141, 250.175, 250.185, 250.275, 250.285, 251.065, 251.115, 251.255, 253.575, 254.115, 254.135, 254.431, 254.470, 254.515, 254.529, 254.565, 255.085, 255.145, 255.295, 260.043, 260.054, 260.055, 260.057, 260.078, 260.118, 260.232, 260.241, 260.407 and 260.715; repealing ORS 247.435; and declaring an emergency.

1 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

2 **SECTION 1.** ORS 204.020 is amended to read:

3 204.020. (1) The term of office of each officer elected pursuant to ORS 204.005 commences on the  
4 first Monday of January next following election to office.

5 (2) Before entering upon any elective office listed in ORS 204.005, the person [*elected*] **who has**  
6 **received a certificate of election** must qualify by filing with the county clerk of the county in  
7 which the person is elected the person's [*certificate of election, with an*] oath of office, [*indorsed*  
8 *thereon, and*] subscribed by the [*elected*] person, to the effect that the person will support the Con-  
9 stitution of the United States and of this state, and faithfully carry out the office being assumed.  
10 The person shall also give and file the undertaking provided for under subsection (3) of this section.

11 (3) A county governing body may require, by ordinance, for the filing by each officer under ORS  
12 204.005, prior to that officer assuming office, of an official undertaking with such surety as the  
13 governing body determines necessary or of an irrevocable letter of credit issued by an insured in-  
14 stitution, as defined in ORS 706.008, in either case in a reasonable amount with the county govern-  
15 ing body.

16 **SECTION 2.** ORS 246.021 is amended to read:

17 246.021. (1) Except as provided in ORS 247.012 and subsection (2) of this section, an election  
18 document and an accompanying payment of fees required to be filed with the Secretary of State,  
19 county clerk or other filing officer must be delivered to and actually received at the office of the  
20 designated officer not later than 5 p.m. of the day the document or fee is due or, if the day due is  
21 a Saturday, Sunday or holiday, on the next business day.

22 (2) If, at 5 p.m. of the day an election document is due, an individual is physically present in the  
23 office of the secretary, county clerk or other filing officer and in line waiting to deliver the docu-  
24 ment, the individual is considered to have begun the act of delivering the document and is permitted  
25 to file it.

26 (3) Except as provided in ORS 253.690, any election document required to be filed with the filing  
27 officer other than ballots, voter registration cards or petitions requiring signatures of electors may  
28 also be filed by means of an electronic facsimile transmission machine **or electronic mail**. If an  
29 election document is required to be filed by a specified time, the entire document must be received  
30 [*in*] **at** the office of the filing officer not later than 5 p.m. of the day the document is due or, if the  
31 day due is a Saturday, Sunday or holiday, on the next business day.

32 (4) Notwithstanding any provision of subsections (1) to (3) of this section, if a statement is re-  
33 quired to be filed electronically under ORS 260.057:

34 (a) The statement must be received electronically at the office of the Secretary of State not later  
35 than 11:59 p.m. of the day the statement is due or, if the day due is a Saturday, Sunday or holiday,  
36 on the next business day; and

37 (b) The Secretary of State may not accept the filing of the statement in any form other than an  
38 electronic format.

39 (5) As used in this section, "election document" includes, but is not limited to, a declaration of  
40 candidacy for nomination for public or political party office, completed nominating petitions, state-  
41 ments and portraits for voters' pamphlets, statements of election campaign contributions and  
42 expenditures, and initiative, referendum or recall petitions.

43 **SECTION 3.** ORS 247.420 is amended to read:

44 247.420. (1) A county clerk shall give a ballot marked "[*Presidential*] **Federal** only" to any per-  
45 son eligible under ORS 247.410 who personally appears in the office of the county clerk, completes

1 a registration card and verifies eligibility to vote under ORS 247.410.

2 (2) No person shall supply any information under subsection (1) of this section, knowing it to  
3 be false.

4 **SECTION 4.** ORS 254.515 is amended to read:

5 254.515. Ballots marked “[*Presidential*] **Federal** only” may be counted only for the offices for  
6 which the elector is entitled to vote. Votes on the ballot for other offices may not be counted.

7 **SECTION 5.** ORS 248.007 is amended to read:

8 248.007. (1) Subject to ORS 248.005, a major political party may organize and select delegates  
9 to national party conventions in any manner.

10 (2) The provisions of ORS 248.012 to 248.315 do not apply to a major political party if the party  
11 has notified the Secretary of State as provided in subsection (5) of this section that the party does  
12 not intend to be subject to the provisions of ORS 248.012 to 248.315. References to precinct com-  
13 mitteepersons in any provisions of ORS chapters 246 to 260 do not apply to a party described in this  
14 subsection.

15 (3) ORS 248.012 to 248.315 apply only to a major political party that has notified the Secretary  
16 of State as provided in subsection (5) of this section that the political party intends to be subject  
17 to the provisions of ORS 248.012 to 248.315. References to precinct committeepersons in any pro-  
18 visions of ORS chapters 246 to 260 shall apply to a party described in this subsection. If a major  
19 political party fails to notify the Secretary of State under this subsection, the party shall be con-  
20 sidered subject to the provisions of ORS 248.012 to 248.315.

21 (4) A major political party shall notify the Secretary of State as provided in subsection (5) of this  
22 section if the party does not intend to be subject to the provisions of ORS 248.012 to 248.315 except  
23 that the party intends to elect precinct committeepersons. If a party notifies the Secretary of State  
24 under this subsection, the party shall elect precinct committeepersons only as provided in ORS  
25 248.015 and shall elect precinct committeepersons in the same manner in all precincts in this state.

26 (5) Not later than the [274<sup>th</sup>] **271st** day before the date of the primary election, a major political  
27 party shall notify the Secretary of State in writing whether or not the party intends to be subject  
28 to the provisions of ORS 248.012 to 248.315 or whether the party intends to elect precinct com-  
29 mitteepersons under subsection (4) of this section. If the major political party does not intend to be  
30 subject to the provisions of ORS 248.012 to 248.315 or intends to elect precinct committeepersons  
31 under subsection (4) of this section, the party shall file with the Secretary of State, at the same time  
32 notice is given under this subsection, a copy of its organizational documents setting forth the man-  
33 ner in which its officers and managing committees are selected or any other manner in which it  
34 conducts its affairs.

35 (6) In each even-numbered year, a major political party shall file with the Secretary of State a  
36 statement indicating that the party is operating subject to ORS 248.012 to 248.315 or a copy of  
37 current organizational documents setting forth the manner in which its officers and managing com-  
38 mittees are selected or any other manner in which it conducts its affairs. Material described in this  
39 subsection shall be filed [on the 274<sup>th</sup>] **between the 271st and the 277th** day before the third  
40 Tuesday in May of each odd-numbered year.

41 (7) A major political party subject to the provisions of this section shall nominate candidates  
42 of the major political party, for other than political party office, at the primary election.

43 **SECTION 6.** ORS 248.006 is amended to read:

44 248.006. (1) An affiliation of electors becomes a major political party in this state and is qualified  
45 to make nominations at a primary election when a number of electors equal to at least five percent

1 of the number of electors registered in this state are registered as members of the party not later  
 2 than the 275th day before the date of a primary election. An affiliation of electors satisfying the  
 3 requirements of this subsection shall be subject to the provisions of ORS 248.007 on the date the  
 4 Secretary of State determines the registration requirements are satisfied.

5 (2) The number of electors described in subsection (1) of this section shall be calculated based  
 6 on the number of electors registered in this state and eligible to vote, as reported on the official  
 7 abstracts of the election, at the general election immediately preceding the deadline specified in  
 8 subsection (1) of this section.

9 (3) After an affiliation of electors becomes a major political party under subsection (1) of this  
 10 section, in order to maintain status as a major political party subject to ORS 248.007, the party must  
 11 satisfy the registration requirement of subsection (1) of this section not later than the 275th day  
 12 before each primary election.

13 (4) An affiliation of electors ceases to be a major political party if the registration requirements  
 14 of subsection (1) of this section are not satisfied by the 275th day before each primary election. The  
 15 affiliation of electors ceases to be a major political party on the date the Secretary of State deter-  
 16 mines that the registration requirement is not satisfied.

17 (5) When an affiliation of electors has not satisfied the registration requirement of subsection  
 18 (1) of this section for the first time, at the request of a representative of the affiliation of electors,  
 19 the Secretary of State shall determine not less than once each month whether at least five percent  
 20 of the number of eligible electors registered in this state are registered as members of the party.  
 21 After an affiliation of electors has qualified as a major political party, the Secretary of State shall  
 22 determine on the [274th] 271st day before each primary election whether the major political party  
 23 has satisfied the registration requirements described in subsection (3) of this section.

24 **NOTE:** Sections 7 through 13 were deleted by amendment. Subsequent sections were not re-  
 25 numbered.

26 **SECTION 14.** ORS 250.052 is amended to read:

27 250.052. (1)(a) For each state initiative, referendum or recall petition, the Secretary of State  
 28 shall prepare official templates of the cover and signature sheets for the petition. Except as pro-  
 29 vided in this section, templates of cover and signature sheets for state initiative and referendum  
 30 petitions are subject to the requirements of ORS 250.045. The templates of signature sheets to be  
 31 used by persons who are being paid to obtain signatures on the petition shall be a different color  
 32 from the sheets to be used by persons who are not being paid to obtain signatures on the petition.

33 (b) For each prospective petition for a state measure to be initiated the secretary shall prepare  
 34 official templates of the cover and signature sheets. The templates of signature sheets to be used  
 35 by persons who are being paid to obtain signatures on the prospective petition shall be a different  
 36 color from the sheets to be used by persons who are not being paid to obtain signatures on the  
 37 prospective petition. Each signature sheet for the prospective petition shall:

38 (A) Contain a notice describing the meaning of the color of the signature sheet; and

39 (B) If one or more persons will be paid for obtaining signatures of electors on the prospective  
 40 petition, contain a notice stating: "Some Circulators For This Prospective Petition Are Being  
 41 Paid." The notice shall be in boldfaced type and shall be prominently displayed on the sheet.

42 (2) A person obtaining signatures on a state initiative, referendum or recall petition or a pro-  
 43 spective petition for a state measure to be initiated may use only the cover and signature sheets  
 44 contained in the official templates prepared for the petition or prospective petition. A person who  
 45 is being paid to obtain signatures on the petition or prospective petition shall use the signature

1 sheet template designated for use by persons being paid to obtain signatures. A person who is not  
 2 being paid to obtain signatures on the petition or prospective petition shall use the signature sheet  
 3 template designated for use by persons who are not being paid to obtain signatures.

4 (3) The secretary shall issue templates for a petition or prospective petition only to a chief  
 5 petitioner of the petition or prospective petition or to an agent designated by a chief petitioner.

6 (4) The secretary shall issue official templates to a chief petitioner or designated agent not later  
 7 than:

8 (a) Three business days after the deadline for filing a petition under ORS 250.085 relating to a  
 9 ballot title certified by the Attorney General for the state initiative petition or, if a petition is filed  
 10 with the Supreme Court under ORS 250.085, three business days after the Supreme Court certifies  
 11 to the secretary [*of State*] a ballot title for the state initiative petition;

12 (b) Three business days after a prospective petition is filed under ORS 249.865 or 250.045 for a  
 13 state recall petition or state referendum petition; or

14 (c) Three business days after the chief petitioner files a statement with the secretary under ORS  
 15 250.045 (2) for a prospective petition for a state measure to be initiated.

16 (5) [*Not later than five business days after the deadline for the secretary to issue templates under*  
 17 *subsection (4) of this section,*] **The secretary by rule shall establish a process by which** a chief  
 18 petitioner of a state initiative, referendum or recall petition or a prospective petition for a state  
 19 measure to be initiated [*may submit to the secretary a written*] **may** request [*for*] **a** modification of  
 20 the templates **issued under subsection (4) of this section.** [*The secretary shall approve or disap-*  
 21 *prove the request not later than five business days after receiving the request. If the secretary disap-*  
 22 *proves the request, the secretary shall advise the chief petitioner in writing of the reasons for the*  
 23 *disapproval.*]

24 (6) In addition to the templates prepared under subsections (1) to (5) of this section, for each  
 25 state initiative, referendum or recall petition **or prospective petition**, the secretary shall prepare  
 26 an official electronic template of a signature sheet for the petition **or prospective petition.** A  
 27 template prepared under this subsection shall allow space for the signature of one elector. An  
 28 elector may print a copy of the electronic signature sheet for a petition **or prospective petition**,  
 29 sign the sheet and deliver the signed sheet to a chief petitioner or an agent designated by a chief  
 30 petitioner. Electronic templates described in this subsection are subject to the requirements of ORS  
 31 250.045, other than ORS 250.045 (6), (9) and (10).

32 (7) The secretary shall adopt rules prescribing the contents and method of production of official  
 33 templates required under this section.

34 **SECTION 15.** ORS 250.067 is amended to read:

35 250.067. (1) The Secretary of State, upon receiving a draft ballot title from the Attorney General  
 36 under ORS 250.065 or 250.075, shall provide reasonable statewide notice of having received the draft  
 37 ballot title and of the public's right to submit written comments as provided in this section. Written  
 38 comments concerning a draft ballot title may be submitted to the secretary not later than the 10th  
 39 business day after the secretary receives the draft title from the Attorney General. On the next  
 40 business day after the deadline for submitting comments, the secretary shall send a copy of all  
 41 written comments to the Attorney General. The secretary shall maintain a record of written com-  
 42 ments received.

43 (2)(a) If written comments are submitted to the secretary under subsection (1) of this section,  
 44 the Attorney General shall consider the comments and certify to the secretary either the draft ballot  
 45 title or a revised ballot title not later than the 10th business day after receiving the comments from

1 the secretary.

2 (b) If no written comments are submitted to the secretary, the Attorney General shall certify the  
3 draft ballot title not later than the [20th] **21st** business day after the secretary receives the draft  
4 title from the Attorney General. If the Attorney General determines that a draft ballot title de-  
5 scribed in this paragraph contains a clerical error, the Attorney General may correct the error be-  
6 fore certifying the corrected draft ballot title to the secretary.

7 (c) If the Attorney General determines that a ballot title certified under this subsection contains  
8 a clerical error, the Attorney General may correct the error and certify to the secretary a corrected  
9 ballot title not later than the 10th business day after the date the ballot title was certified.

10 (d) The secretary shall furnish the chief petitioner with a copy of each ballot title certified un-  
11 der this subsection.

12 (3) Unless the Supreme Court certifies a different ballot title, the latest ballot title certified by  
13 the Attorney General under subsection (2) of this section is the title to be printed in the voters'  
14 pamphlet and on the ballot.

15 (4) If a petition is filed with the Supreme Court as provided in ORS 250.085, the Secretary of  
16 State shall file with the Supreme Court a copy of the written comments received as part of the re-  
17 cord on review of the ballot title.

18 (5) The secretary by rule shall specify the means for providing reasonable statewide notice for  
19 submitting comments on a draft ballot title.

20 (6) As used in this section, "clerical error" means a typographical, arithmetical or grammatical  
21 error or omission that is evident from the text of the draft or certified ballot title or by comparison  
22 of the text of the draft or certified ballot title with a written explanation that was provided by the  
23 Attorney General and issued concurrently with the draft or certified ballot title.

24 **SECTION 16.** ORS 250.065 is amended to read:

25 250.065. (1) When a prospective petition for a state measure to be referred is filed with the  
26 Secretary of State, the secretary shall authorize the circulation of the petition using the final  
27 measure summary of the latest version of the printed, engrossed measure in lieu of the ballot title.  
28 On the next business day after the referendum petition has been filed containing the required num-  
29 ber of verified signatures, the Secretary of State shall send [*two copies*] **one copy** of the prospective  
30 petition to the Attorney General.

31 (2) When an approved prospective petition for a state measure to be initiated is filed with the  
32 Secretary of State, the secretary immediately shall send [*two copies*] **one copy** of it to the Attorney  
33 General.

34 (3) Not later than the fifth business day after receiving the [*copies*] **copy** of the prospective pe-  
35 tition for a state measure to be initiated, the Attorney General shall provide a draft ballot title for  
36 the state measure to be initiated and [*return*] **send** one copy of the [*prospective petition and the*]  
37 ballot title to the Secretary of State.

38 (4) Not later than the 10th business day after receiving the [*copies*] **copy** of the prospective pe-  
39 tition for a state measure to be referred, the Attorney General shall provide a draft ballot title for  
40 the state measure to be referred and [*return*] **send** one copy of the [*prospective petition and the*] draft  
41 ballot title to the Secretary of State.

42 **SECTION 17.** ORS 250.075 is amended to read:

43 250.075. (1) When the Legislative Assembly refers a measure to the people, a ballot title for the  
44 measure may be prepared by the assembly. The ballot title shall be filed with the Secretary of State  
45 when the measure is filed with the Secretary of State.

1 (2) If the title is not prepared under subsection (1) of this section, when the measure is filed  
 2 with the Secretary of State, the secretary shall send *[two copies]* **one copy** of the referred measure  
 3 to the Attorney General. Not later than the 30th day after the Legislative Assembly adjourns, the  
 4 Attorney General shall provide a draft ballot title for the measure. The Attorney General shall send  
 5 a copy of the draft ballot title to each member of the Legislative Assembly, and file with the Sec-  
 6 retary of State a copy of the *[referred measure and the]* draft ballot title and a certificate of mailing  
 7 of the draft ballot title to each member.

8 **SECTION 18.** ORS 250.175 is amended to read:

9 250.175. (1) When a prospective petition for a county measure to be referred is filed with the  
 10 county clerk, the clerk shall authorize the circulation of the petition containing the title of the  
 11 measure as enacted by the county governing body or, if there is no title, the title supplied by the  
 12 petitioner filing the prospective petition. The county clerk immediately shall send *[two copies]* **one**  
 13 **copy** of the prospective petition to the district attorney.

14 (2) Not later than the sixth business day after a prospective petition for a county measure to  
 15 be initiated is filed with the county clerk, the clerk shall send *[two copies]* **one copy** of it to the  
 16 district attorney if the measure to be initiated has been determined to be in compliance with section  
 17 1 (2)(d), Article IV, and section 10, Article VI of the Oregon Constitution, as provided in ORS  
 18 250.168.

19 (3)(a) Not later than the fifth business day after receiving the *[copies]* **copy** of the prospective  
 20 petition, and notwithstanding ORS 203.145 (3), the district attorney shall prepare a ballot title for  
 21 the county measure to be initiated or referred and *[return one copy of the prospective petition and]*  
 22 certify the ballot title to the county clerk.

23 (b) If the district attorney determines that a ballot title certified under this subsection contains  
 24 a clerical error, the district attorney may correct the error and certify to the county clerk a cor-  
 25 rected ballot title not later than the 10th business day after the date the ballot title was certified.

26 (c) A copy of the ballot title shall be furnished to the chief petitioner.

27 (4) Unless the circuit court certifies a different ballot title, the latest ballot title certified by the  
 28 district attorney under subsection (3) of this section is the title to be printed on the ballot.

29 (5)(a) The county clerk, upon receiving a ballot title for a county measure to be referred or in-  
 30 itiated from the district attorney or the county governing body, shall publish in the next available  
 31 edition of a newspaper of general circulation in the county a notice of receipt of the ballot title  
 32 including notice that an elector may file a petition for review of the ballot title not later than the  
 33 date referred to in ORS 250.195.

34 (b) In addition to publishing a notice as described in paragraph (a) of this subsection, the county  
 35 clerk may publish a notice on the county's website for a minimum of seven days.

36 (6) As used in this section, "clerical error" means a typographical, arithmetical or grammatical  
 37 error or omission that is evident from the text of the certified ballot title or by comparison of the  
 38 text of the ballot title with a written explanation that was provided by the district attorney and  
 39 issued concurrently with the certified ballot title.

40 **SECTION 19.** ORS 250.185 is amended to read:

41 250.185. (1) When the county governing body refers a measure to the people, a ballot title for  
 42 the measure may be prepared by the body. The measure and the ballot title prepared under this  
 43 subsection shall be filed at the same time with the county clerk.

44 (2) If the title is not prepared under subsection (1) of this section, when the measure is filed  
 45 with the county clerk, the clerk shall send *[two copies]* **one copy** to the district attorney. Not later

1 than the fifth business day after receiving the [copies] **copy**, the district attorney shall provide a  
2 ballot title for the measure and send a copy of it to the county governing body and the county clerk.

3 **SECTION 20.** ORS 250.275 is amended to read:

4 250.275. (1) When a prospective petition for a city measure to be referred is filed with the city  
5 elections officer, the officer shall authorize the circulation of the petition containing the title of the  
6 measure as enacted by the city governing body or, if there is no title, the title supplied by the  
7 petitioner filing the prospective petition. The city elections officer immediately shall send [two  
8 copies] **one copy** of the prospective petition to the city attorney.

9 (2) Not later than the sixth business day after a prospective petition for a city measure to be  
10 initiated is filed with the city elections officer, the officer shall send [two copies] **one copy** of it to  
11 the city attorney if the measure to be initiated has been determined to be in compliance with section  
12 1 (2)(d) and (5), Article IV of the Oregon Constitution, as provided in ORS 250.270.

13 (3)(a) Not later than the fifth business day after receiving the [copies] **copy** of the prospective  
14 petition, the city attorney shall provide a ballot title for the city measure to be initiated or referred  
15 and [return one copy of the prospective petition and] certify the ballot title to the city elections offi-  
16 cer.

17 (b) If the city attorney determines that a ballot title certified under this subsection contains a  
18 clerical error, the city attorney may correct the error and certify to the city elections officer a  
19 corrected ballot title not later than the 10th business day after the date the ballot title was certified.

20 (c) A copy of the ballot title shall be furnished to the chief petitioner.

21 (4) Unless the circuit court certifies a different ballot title, the latest ballot title certified by the  
22 city attorney under subsection (3) of this section is the title to be printed on the ballot.

23 (5)(a) The city elections officer, upon receiving a ballot title for a city measure to be referred  
24 or initiated from the city attorney or city governing body, shall publish in the next available edition  
25 of a newspaper of general distribution in the city a notice of receipt of the ballot title including

(b) As used in this subsection, "ballot return identification envelope" and "secrecy envelope" mean those envelopes used to return ballots to the county clerk.

43 **SECTION 55. (1)(a) If all or part of chapter \_\_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2017 (Enrolled House**  
 44 **Bill 2391), is referred to the people by petition under Article IV, section 1 (3)(b), of the**  
 45 **Oregon Constitution:**



1 (A) It shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at a special election  
2 held throughout this state on January 23, 2018; and

3 (B) A special election shall be held throughout this state on January 23, 2018, as provided  
4 in sections 55 to 61 of this 2017 Act.

5 (b) If all or part of chapter \_\_\_\_\_, Oregon Laws 2017 (Enrolled House Bill 2017), is re-  
6 ferred to the people by petition under Article IV, section 1 (3)(b), of the Oregon Constitution:

7 (A) It shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at a special election  
8 held throughout this state on the same date as the next primary election; and

9 (B) A special election shall be held throughout this state on the same date as the next  
10 primary election, as provided in sections 55 to 61 of this 2017 Act.

11 (2) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (3) or (4) of this section, ORS chapters 250,  
12 251 and 254 apply to an election held on a measure described in subsection (1) of this section.

13 (3) Notwithstanding ORS 250.035, 250.067, 250.075 (2) and 250.085, the ballot title for a  
14 measure described in subsection (1) of this section shall be prepared by the joint legislative  
15 committee created under section 60 of this 2017 Act and filed with the Secretary of State not  
16 later than the date set by the Secretary of State by rule. The word limits described in ORS  
17 250.035 (2) do not apply to a ballot title prepared by the joint legislative committee under this  
18 subsection. Unless modified under section 58 of this 2017 Act, the ballot title prepared by the  
19 committee under this subsection shall be the ballot title printed in the voters' pamphlet and  
20 printed on, or included with, the ballot.

21 (4) Notwithstanding ORS 251.205, 251.215, 251.225, 251.230 and 251.235, the explanatory  
22 statement to be printed in the voters' pamphlet for a measure described in subsection (1)  
23 of this section shall be prepared by the joint legislative committee created under section 60  
24 of this 2017 Act and filed with the Secretary of State not later than the date set by the  
25 Secretary of State by rule. Unless modified under section 59 of this 2017 Act, the explanatory  
26 statement prepared by the committee under this subsection shall be the explanatory state-  
27 ment printed in the voters' pamphlet.

28 (5) The committee may begin preparation of the ballot title or explanatory statement on  
29 the date that a prospective petition to refer a measure described in subsection (1) of this  
30 section is filed with the Secretary of State under ORS 250.045.

31 (6)(a) Arguments relating to a measure described in subsection (1) of this section may  
32 be filed with the Secretary of State under ORS 251.245 and 251.255, except that an argument  
33 must be filed not later than the date set by the Secretary of State by rule.

34 (b) Notwithstanding ORS 192.410 to 192.505 relating to public records, an argument filed  
35 under this subsection is exempt from public inspection until the fourth business day after  
36 the deadline for filing the argument.

37 (7) Notwithstanding the time frames set forth in ORS 250.125 and 250.127, the financial  
38 estimate committee created under ORS 250.125 shall prepare and file with the Secretary of  
39 State the estimates described in ORS 250.125 and, if the committee considers it necessary,  
40 a statement explaining the financial effects of the measure as described in ORS 250.125, ex-  
41 cept that the committee shall prepare and file the estimates or statements not later than  
42 the date set by the Secretary of State by rule. The financial estimate committee may begin  
43 preparation of the estimate or statement on the date that a prospective petition to refer a  
44 measure described in subsection (1) of this section is filed with the Secretary of State under  
45 ORS 250.045.

1 (8) Notwithstanding ORS 250.131 (2), the Supreme Court shall conduct a review under  
2 ORS 250.131 if a petition is filed not later than the date set by the Secretary of State by rule.

3 (9) As used in sections 55 to 61 of this 2017 Act, “measure” has the meaning given that  
4 term in ORS 250.005.

5 **SECTION 56.** (1) The Secretary of State shall cause to be printed in the voters’ pamphlet  
6 the number, ballot title and text of a measure described in section 55 of this 2017 Act and  
7 the financial estimate, explanatory statement and arguments relating to the measure. The  
8 Secretary of State shall also cause to be printed in the voters’ pamphlet any other material  
9 required by law. Notwithstanding ORS 251.026, the Secretary of State shall include in the  
10 voters’ pamphlet the information or statements described in ORS 251.026 that the Secretary  
11 of State considers applicable to the election on a measure described in section 55 of this 2017  
12 Act.

13 (2) For purposes of sections 55 to 61 of this 2017 Act, the election referred to in ORS  
14 251.295 is the special election held on the date specified in section 55 of this 2017 Act.

15 (3) If the measure described in section 55 (1)(a) of this 2017 Act is referred to the people  
16 by petition under Article IV, section 1 (3)(b), of the Oregon Constitution:

17 (a) Notwithstanding ORS 251.285 and subject to ORS 251.008, the measure referred to in  
18 this subsection shall be the only measure included in the voters’ pamphlet prepared for the  
19 special election held on January 23, 2018.

20 (b) Not later than the 10th day before the election, the Secretary of State shall cause the  
21 voters’ pamphlet to be mailed to each post-office mailing address in Oregon and may use any  
22 additional means of distribution necessary to make the pamphlet available to electors.

23 (c) In preparing the voters’ pamphlet for the special election to be held on January 23,  
24 2018, the Secretary of State is not required to comply with ORS chapter 279B relating to  
25 competitive bidding.

26 **SECTION 57.** (1) Notwithstanding the deadline in ORS 254.085, the Secretary of State  
27 shall prepare and deliver to each county clerk by the most expeditious means practicable a  
28 certified statement of a measure described in section 55 of this 2017 Act. The Secretary of  
29 State shall include with the statement the number, financial estimate and ballot title of the  
30 measure, and any other information required by law. The Secretary of State shall keep a  
31 copy of the statement.

32 (2) The county clerks shall print on the ballot the number, financial estimate and ballot  
33 title of the measure, along with any other material required by law. In lieu of printing the  
34 financial estimate, the summary portion of the ballot title or other material required by law  
35 on the ballot, a county clerk may include with the ballot the complete text of the ballot title,  
36 the financial estimate and any other material required by law.

37 **SECTION 58.** Notwithstanding ORS 250.085:

38 (1) Any elector dissatisfied with the ballot title for a measure described in section 55 of  
39 this 2017 Act prepared by the joint legislative committee created under section 60 of this 2017  
40 Act may petition the Supreme Court seeking a different ballot title. The petition shall state  
41 the reasons that the ballot title filed with the Secretary of State does not substantially  
42 comply with the requirements of ORS 250.035 and section 55 of this 2017 Act.

43 (2) The petition shall name the Attorney General as the respondent and must be filed not  
44 later than the fifth business day after the Legislative Assembly files the ballot title with the  
45 Secretary of State.

1 (3) An elector filing a petition under this section shall notify the Secretary of State in  
2 writing that the petition has been filed. The notice must be received in the office of the  
3 Secretary of State not later than 5 p.m. on the next business day following the day the pe-  
4 tition is filed.

5 (4) The Supreme Court shall review the ballot title for substantial compliance with the  
6 requirements of ORS 250.035 and section 55 of this 2017 Act.

7 (5) The review by the Supreme Court shall be conducted expeditiously to ensure the or-  
8 derly and timely conduct of the election at which the measure is to be submitted to the  
9 electors.

10 (6) If the Supreme Court determines that the ballot title prepared by the Legislative As-  
11 sembly substantially complies with the requirements of ORS 250.035 and section 55 of this  
12 2017 Act, the court shall certify the ballot title to the Secretary of State. If the Supreme  
13 Court determines that the ballot title prepared by the Legislative Assembly does not sub-  
14 stantially comply with the requirements of ORS 250.035 and section 55 of this 2017 Act, the  
15 court shall modify the ballot title and certify the ballot title to the Secretary of State or  
16 refer the ballot title to the Attorney General for modification.

17 (7) Not later than five business days after the Supreme Court refers a ballot title to the  
18 Attorney General for modification under this section, the Attorney General shall certify a  
19 modified ballot title to the Secretary of State. The modified ballot title is not subject to ju-  
20 dicial review.

21 **SECTION 59.** Notwithstanding ORS 251.235:

22 (1) Any person dissatisfied with the explanatory statement for a measure described in  
23 section 55 of this 2017 Act prepared by the joint legislative committee created under section  
24 60 of this 2017 Act may petition the Supreme Court seeking a different explanatory statement  
25 and stating the reasons the explanatory statement filed with the court is insufficient or un-  
26 clear.

27 (2) The court shall review the explanatory statement and certify an explanatory state-  
28 ment to the Secretary of State if the petition is filed and served as required in subsection  
29 (4) of this section not later than the fifth business day after the Legislative Assembly files  
30 the explanatory statement with the Secretary of State.

31 (3) Failure to file and serve the petition within the time prescribed in subsection (2) of  
32 this section precludes Supreme Court review and certification of an explanatory statement.  
33 If the court considers the petition, the court may allow oral argument. The review by the  
34 Supreme Court shall be conducted expeditiously to ensure the orderly and timely conduct of  
35 the election at which the measure is to be submitted to the electors. The explanatory  
36 statement certified by the court shall be the explanatory statement printed in the voters'  
37 pamphlet.

38 (4) At the time a person petitions the Supreme Court under subsection (1) of this section,  
39 the person also shall serve a copy of the petition on:

- 40 (a) The Attorney General;
- 41 (b) The Legislative Assembly; and
- 42 (c) The chief petitioners of the measure.

43 **SECTION 60.** (1) For each measure described in section 55 of this 2017 Act, a joint legis-  
44 lative committee consisting of three Senators and three Representatives shall be appointed  
45 to prepare the ballot title and explanatory statement for the measure.

1       **(2)(a) The President of the Senate shall appoint three members of a committee from**  
2 **among members of the Senate, two from the majority party and one from the minority party.**

3       **(b) The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall appoint three members of a com-**  
4 **mittee from among members of the House of Representatives, two from the majority party**  
5 **and one from the minority party.**

6       **SECTION 61.** **The Secretary of State shall adopt rules governing the procedures for con-**  
7 **ducting an election on a measure described in section 55 of this 2017 Act as may be necessary**  
8 **to implement sections 55 to 61 of this 2017 Act.**

9       **SECTION 62.** **ORS 247.435 is repealed.**

10       **SECTION 63.** **This 2017 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public**  
11 **peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2017 Act takes effect**  
12 **on its passage.**
