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SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure.

Modifies laws regarding establishment of parentage of child.

8 **Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:**

9 **SECTION 1. Section 2 of this 2017 Act is added to and made a part of ORS chapter 109.**

10 **SECTION 2. (1) Parentage may be established between a person and a child by:**

11 **(a) The person having given birth to the child;**

12 **(b) An un rebutted presumption of parentage under ORS 109.070;**

13 **(c) An adjudication of the person's maternity or paternity;**

14 **(d) Adoption of the child by the person;**

15 **(e) An effective acknowledgement of paternity by the man under ORS 109.070 or pursuant**
16 **to the laws of another state, unless the acknowledgement has been rescinded or successfully**
17 **challenged;**

18 **(f) Establishment of paternity by an administrative order issued pursuant to ORS chapter**
19 **416;**

20 **(g) Filiation proceedings; or**

21 **(h) Parentage being established or declared by another provision of law.**

22 **(2) A person is the mother of a child to whom the person gives birth.**

23 **SECTION 3. ORS 109.070, as amended by section 42, chapter 106, Oregon Laws 2016, is**
24 **amended to read:**

25 109.070. (1) The *[paternity]* **parentage** of a person *[may be established as follows]* **is rebuttably**
26 **presumed if:**

NOTE: Matter in **boldfaced** type in an amended section is new; matter *[italic and bracketed]* is existing law to be omitted.
New sections are in **boldfaced** type.

1 (a) [A man is rebuttably presumed to be the father of a child born to a woman if he and the woman
2 were married to each other] **The person is married to the birth mother** at the time of the child's
3 birth, without a judgment of separation, regardless of whether the marriage is void.

4 (b) [A man is rebuttably presumed to be the father of a child born to a woman if he and the woman
5 were married to each other] **The person is married to the birth mother** and the child is born
6 within 300 days after the marriage is terminated by death, annulment or dissolution or after entry
7 of a judgment of separation.

8 [(c) By the marriage of the parents of a child after the birth of the child, and the parents filing
9 with the State Registrar of the Center for Health Statistics the voluntary acknowledgment of paternity
10 form as provided for by ORS 432.098.]

11 [(d) By filiation proceedings.]

12 [(e) By filing with the State Registrar of the Center for Health Statistics the voluntary acknowl-
13 edgment of paternity form as provided for by ORS 432.098. Except as otherwise provided in subsections
14 (4) to (7) of this section, this filing establishes paternity for all purposes.]

15 [(f) By having established paternity through a voluntary acknowledgment of paternity process in
16 another state.]

17 [(g) By paternity being established or declared by other provision of law.]

18 (2) The [paternity] **parentage** of a child established under subsection (1)(a) or [(c)] **(4)(a)** of this
19 section may be challenged in an action or proceeding by [the husband or wife] **either spouse**. The
20 [paternity] **parentage** may not be challenged by a person other than [the husband or wife] **a spouse**
21 as long as the [husband and wife] **spouses** are married and **are** cohabiting, unless [the husband and
22 wife] **both spouses** consent to the challenge.

23 (3) If the court finds that it is just and equitable, giving consideration to the interests of the
24 parties and the child, the court shall admit evidence offered to rebut the presumption of [paternity]
25 **parentage** in subsection (1)[(a) or (b)] of this section.

26 (4) **The paternity of a person may be established by a voluntary acknowledgement as
27 follows:**

28 (a) **By the marriage of the parents of a child after the birth of the child, and the parents
29 filing with the State Registrar of the Center for Health Statistics the voluntary acknowl-
30 edgment of paternity form as provided by ORS 432.098.**

31 (b) **By filing with the State Registrar of the Center for Health Statistics the voluntary
32 acknowledgement of paternity form as provided under ORS 432.098. Except as otherwise
33 provided in subsections (5) and (8) of this section, a filing under this paragraph establishes
34 paternity for all purposes.**

35 (c) **By establishment of paternity through a voluntary acknowledgement of paternity in
36 another state.**

37 [(4)(a)] **(5)(a)** A party to a voluntary acknowledgment of paternity may rescind the acknowledg-
38 ment within the earlier of:

39 (A) Sixty days after filing the acknowledgment; or

40 (B) The date of a proceeding relating to the child, including a proceeding to establish a support
41 order, in which the party wishing to rescind the acknowledgment is also a party. For the purposes
42 of this subparagraph, the date of a proceeding is the date on which an order is entered in the pro-
43 ceeding.

44 (b) To rescind the acknowledgment, the party shall sign and file with the State Registrar of the
45 Center for Health Statistics a written document declaring the rescission.

1 [(5)(a)] **(6)(a)** A signed voluntary acknowledgment of paternity filed in this state may be chal-
2 lenged and set aside in circuit court at any time after the 60-day period referred to in subsection
3 [(4)] **(5)** of this section on the basis of fraud, duress or a material mistake of fact.

4 (b) The challenge may be brought by:

5 (A) A party to the acknowledgment;

6 (B) The child named in the acknowledgment; or

7 (C) The Department of Human Services or the administrator, as defined in ORS 25.010, if the
8 child named in the acknowledgment is in the care and custody of the department under ORS chapter
9 419B and the department or the administrator reasonably believes that the acknowledgment was
10 signed because of fraud, duress or a material mistake of fact.

11 (c) The challenge shall be initiated by filing a petition with the circuit court. Unless otherwise
12 specifically provided by law, the challenge shall be conducted pursuant to the Oregon Rules of Civil
13 Procedure.

14 (d) The party bringing the challenge has the burden of proof.

15 (e) Legal responsibilities arising from the acknowledgment, including child support obligations,
16 may not be suspended during the challenge, except for good cause.

17 (f) If the court finds by a preponderance of the evidence that the acknowledgment was signed
18 because of fraud, duress or material mistake of fact, the court shall set aside the acknowledgment
19 unless, giving consideration to the interests of the parties and the child, the court finds that setting
20 aside the acknowledgment would be substantially inequitable.

21 [(6)] **(7)** Within one year after a voluntary acknowledgment of paternity form is filed in this state
22 and if blood tests, as defined in ORS 109.251, have not been completed, a party to the acknowledg-
23 ment, or the department if the child named in the acknowledgment is in the care and custody of the
24 department under ORS chapter 419B, may apply to the administrator for an order for blood tests in
25 accordance with ORS 416.443.

26 [(7)(a)] **(8)(a)** A voluntary acknowledgment of paternity is not valid if, before the party signed
27 the acknowledgment:

28 (A) The party signed a consent to the adoption of the child by another individual;

29 (B) The party signed a document relinquishing the child to a child-caring agency as defined in
30 ORS 418.205;

31 (C) The party's parental rights were terminated by a court; or

32 (D) In an adjudication, the party was determined not to be the biological parent of the child.

33 (b) Notwithstanding any provision of subsection [(1)(c) or (e)] **(4)(a) or (b)** of this section or ORS
34 432.098 to the contrary, an acknowledgment signed by a party described in this subsection and filed
35 with the State Registrar of the Center for Health Statistics does not establish paternity and is void.

36 **SECTION 4.** ORS 109.239 is amended to read:

37 109.239. (1) **As used in ORS 109.239 to 109.247, "assisted reproduction" means a method**
38 **of causing pregnancy other than sexual intercourse. "Assisted reproduction" includes, but**
39 **is not limited to:**

40 (a) **Artificial insemination as defined in ORS 677.355;**

41 (b) **Donation of eggs;**

42 (c) **Donation of embryos;**

43 (d) **In vitro fertilization and transfer of embryos; or**

44 (e) **Intracytoplasmic sperm injection.**

45 (2) If the donor of [semen] **gametes** used in [artificial insemination] **assisted reproduction** is

1 not the mother's *[husband]* **spouse**:

2 *[(1)] (a) [Such]* **The** donor shall have no right, obligation or interest with respect to *[a]* **any** child
3 *[born]* **conceived** as a result of the *[artificial insemination]* **assisted reproduction**; and

4 *[(2)] (b) [A]* **Any** child *[born]* **conceived** as a result of the *[artificial insemination]* **assisted re-**
5 **production** shall have no right, obligation or interest with respect to *[such]* **the** donor.

6 **SECTION 5.** ORS 109.243 is amended to read:

7 109.243. The relationship, rights and obligation between a child *[born]* **conceived** as a result of
8 *[artificial insemination]* **assisted reproduction** and the mother's *[husband]* **spouse** shall be the same
9 to all legal intents and purposes as if the child had been naturally and legitimately conceived by the
10 mother and the mother's *[husband]* **spouse** if the *[husband]* **spouse** consented to the performance
11 of *[artificial insemination]* **assisted reproduction**.

12 **SECTION 6.** ORS 109.247 is amended to read:

13 109.247. Except as may be otherwise provided by a judicial decree entered in any action filed
14 before October 4, 1977, the provisions of ORS 109.239 to 109.247, 677.355 to 677.365 and 677.990 (3)
15 apply to all persons conceived as a result of *[artificial insemination]* **assisted reproduction**.

16 **SECTION 7.** ORS 416.400 is amended to read:

17 416.400. As used in ORS 416.400 to 416.465, unless the context requires otherwise:

18 (1) "Administrator" has the meaning given that term in ORS 25.010.

19 (2) "Court" means any circuit court of this state and any court in another state having juris-
20 diction to determine the liability of persons for the support of another person.

21 (3) "Court order" means any judgment or order of any Oregon court that orders payment of a
22 set or determinable amount of support money by the subject parent and does not include an order
23 or judgment in any proceeding in which the court did not order support.

24 (4) "Department" means the Department of Justice of this state or its equivalent in any other
25 state from which a written request for establishment or enforcement of a support obligation is re-
26 ceived under ORS 416.415.

27 (5) "Dependent child" means any person under the age of 18 who is not otherwise emancipated,
28 self-supporting, married or a member of the Armed Forces of the United States. "Dependent child"
29 also means a child attending school as defined in ORS 107.108.

30 (6) "Office" means the office of the Division of Child Support or the office of the district attor-
31 ney.

32 (7) "Parent" means:

33 (a) The natural or adoptive father or mother of a dependent child or youth offender[.];

34 (b) **A person whose parentage has been established under section 2 of this 2017 Act; or**

35 (c) *["Parent" also means]* **A** stepparent when the person has an obligation to support a depend-
36 ent child under ORS 108.045.

37 (8) "Past support" means the amount of child support that could have been ordered and accu-
38 mulated as arrears against a parent for the benefit of a child for any period of time during which
39 the child was not supported by the parent and for which period no support order was in effect.

40 (9) "Public assistance" means any money payments made by the state that are paid to or for the
41 benefit of any dependent child or youth offender, including but not limited to payments made so that
42 food, shelter, medical care, clothing, transportation or other necessary goods, services or items may
43 be provided, and payments made in compensation for the provision of the necessities. "Public as-
44 sistance" does not include money payments made by the state to or for the benefit of a dependent
45 child as the result of the child's removal from the parent's home against the wishes of the parent,

1 if the Department of Human Services determines after completion of a child protective services as-
2 sessment that the report of abuse is unfounded according to rules adopted by the Department of
3 Human Services.

4 (10) "Youth offender" has the meaning given that term in ORS 419A.004.

5 **SECTION 8.** ORS 25.020 is amended to read:

6 25.020. (1) Support payments for or on behalf of any person that are ordered, registered or filed
7 under this chapter or ORS chapter 107, 108, 109, 110, 416, 419B or 419C, unless otherwise authorized
8 by ORS 25.030, shall be made to the Department of Justice as the state disbursement unit:

9 (a) During periods for which support is assigned under ORS 412.024, 418.032, 419B.406 or
10 419C.597;

11 (b) As provided by rules adopted under ORS 180.345, when public assistance is provided to a
12 person who receives or has a right to receive support payments on the person's own behalf or on
13 behalf of another person;

14 (c) After the assignment of support terminates for as long as amounts assigned remain owing;

15 (d) For any period during which support enforcement services are provided under ORS 25.080;

16 (e) When ordered by the court under ORS 419B.400;

17 (f) When a support order that is entered or modified on or after January 1, 1994, includes a
18 provision requiring the obligor to pay support by income withholding; or

19 (g) When ordered by the court under any other applicable provision of law.

20 (2)(a) The Department of Justice shall disburse payments, after lawful deduction of fees and in
21 accordance with applicable statutes and rules, to those persons and entities that are lawfully enti-
22 tled to receive such payments.

23 (b) During a period for which support is assigned under ORS 412.024, for an obligee described
24 in subsection (1)(b) of this section, the department shall disburse to the obligee, from child support
25 collected each month, \$50 for each child up to a maximum of \$200 per family.

26 (3)(a) When the administrator is providing support enforcement services under ORS 25.080, the
27 obligee may enter into an agreement with a collection agency, as defined in ORS 697.005, for as-
28 sistance in collecting child support payments.

29 (b) The Department of Justice:

30 (A) Shall disburse support payments, to which the obligee is legally entitled, to the collection
31 agency if the obligee submits the completed form referred to in paragraph (c)(A) of this subsection
32 to the department;

33 (B) May reinstate disbursements to the obligee if:

34 (i) The obligee requests that disbursements be made directly to the obligee;

35 (ii) The collection agency violates any provision of this subsection; or

36 (iii) The Department of Consumer and Business Services notifies the Department of Justice that
37 the collection agency is in violation of the rules adopted under ORS 697.086;

38 (C) Shall credit the obligor's account for the full amount of each support payment received by
39 the department and disbursed to the collection agency; and

40 (D) Shall develop the form referred to in paragraph (c)(A) of this subsection, which shall include
41 a notice to the obligee printed in type size equal to at least 12-point type that the obligee may be
42 eligible for support enforcement services from the department or the district attorney without pay-
43 ing the interest or fee that is typically charged by a collection agency.

44 (c) The obligee shall:

45 (A) Provide to the department, on a form approved by the department, information about the

1 agreement with the collection agency; and

2 (B) Promptly notify the department when the agreement is terminated.

3 (d) The collection agency:

4 (A) May provide investigative and location services to the obligee and disclose relevant infor-
5 mation from those services to the administrator for purposes of providing support enforcement ser-
6 vices under ORS 25.080;

7 (B) May not charge interest or a fee for its services exceeding 29 percent of each support pay-
8 ment received unless the collection agency, if allowed by the terms of the agreement between the
9 collection agency and the obligee, hires an attorney to perform legal services on behalf of the
10 obligee;

11 (C) May not initiate, without written authorization from the administrator, any enforcement
12 action relating to support payments on which support enforcement services are provided by the ad-
13 ministrator under ORS 25.080; and

14 (D) Shall include in the agreement with the obligee a notice printed in type size equal to at least
15 12-point type that provides information on the fees, penalties, termination and duration of the
16 agreement.

17 (e) The administrator may use information disclosed by the collection agency to provide support
18 enforcement services under ORS 25.080.

19 (4) The Department of Justice may immediately transmit to the obligee payments received from
20 any obligor without waiting for payment or clearance of the check or instrument received if the
21 obligor has not previously tendered any payment by a check or instrument that was not paid or was
22 dishonored.

23 (5) The Department of Justice shall notify each obligor and obligee by mail when support pay-
24 ments shall be made to the department and when the obligation to make payments in this manner
25 shall cease.

26 (6)(a) The administrator shall provide information about a child support account directly to a
27 party to the support order regardless of whether the party is represented by an attorney. As used
28 in this subsection, "information about a child support account" means the:

29 (A) Date of issuance of the support order.

30 (B) Amount of the support order.

31 (C) Dates and amounts of payments.

32 (D) Dates and amounts of disbursements.

33 (E) Payee of any disbursements.

34 (F) Amount of any arrearage.

35 (G) Source of any collection, to the extent allowed by federal law.

36 (b) Nothing in this subsection limits the information the administrator may provide by law to a
37 party who is not represented by an attorney.

38 (7) Any pleading for the entry or modification of a support order must contain a statement that
39 payment of support under a new or modified order will be by income withholding unless an excep-
40 tion to payment by income withholding is granted under ORS 25.396.

41 (8)(a) Except as provided in paragraphs (d) and (e) of this subsection, a judgment or order es-
42 tablishing *[paternity]* **parentage** or including a provision concerning support must contain:

43 (A) The residence, mailing or contact address, final four digits of the Social Security number,
44 telephone number and final four digits of the driver license number of each party;

45 (B) The name, address and telephone number of all employers of each party;

1 (C) The names and dates of birth of the joint children of the parties; and

2 (D) Any other information required by rule adopted by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court
3 under ORS 1.002.

4 (b) The judgment or order shall also include notice that the obligor and obligee:

5 (A) Must inform the court and the administrator in writing of any change in the information
6 required by this subsection within 10 days after the change; and

7 (B) May request that the administrator review the amount of support ordered after three years,
8 or such shorter cycle as determined by rule of the Department of Justice, or at any time upon a
9 substantial change of circumstances.

10 (c) The administrator may require of the parties any additional information that is necessary for
11 the provision of support enforcement services under ORS 25.080.

12 (d)(A) Upon a finding, which may be made ex parte, that the health, safety or liberty of a party
13 or child would unreasonably be put at risk by the disclosure of information specified in this sub-
14 section or by the disclosure of other information concerning a child or party to a [*paternity*] **par-**
15 **entage** or support proceeding or if an existing order so requires, a court or administrator or
16 administrative law judge, when the proceeding is administrative, shall order that the information
17 not be contained in any document provided to another party or otherwise disclosed to a party other
18 than the state.

19 (B) The Department of Justice shall adopt rules providing for similar confidentiality for infor-
20 mation described in subparagraph (A) of this paragraph that is maintained by an entity providing
21 support enforcement services under ORS 25.080.

22 (e) The Chief Justice of the Supreme Court may, in consultation with the Department of Justice,
23 adopt rules under ORS 1.002 to designate information specified in this subsection as confidential and
24 require that the information be submitted through an alternate procedure to ensure that the infor-
25 mation is exempt from public disclosure under ORS 192.502.

26 (9)(a) Except as otherwise provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, in any subsequent child
27 support enforcement action, the court or administrator, upon a showing of diligent effort made to
28 locate the obligor or obligee, may deem due process requirements to be met by mailing notice to the
29 last-known residential, mailing or employer address or contact address as provided in ORS 25.085.

30 (b) Service of an order directing an obligor to appear in a contempt proceeding is subject to
31 ORS 33.015 to 33.155.

32 (10) Subject to ORS 25.030, this section, to the extent it imposes any duty or function upon the
33 Department of Justice, shall be deemed to supersede any provisions of ORS chapters 107, 108, 109,
34 110, 416, 419A, 419B and 419C that would otherwise impose the same duties or functions upon the
35 county clerk or the Department of Human Services.

36 (11) Except as provided for in subsections (12), (13) and (14) of this section, credit may not be
37 given for payments not made to the Department of Justice as required under subsection (1) of this
38 section.

39 (12) The Department of Justice shall give credit for payments not made to the department:

40 (a) When payments are not assigned to this or another state and the obligee and obligor agree
41 in writing that specific payments were made and should be credited;

42 (b) When payments are assigned to the State of Oregon, the obligor and obligee make sworn
43 written statements that specific payments were made, canceled checks or other substantial evidence
44 is presented to corroborate their statements and the obligee has been given prior written notice of
45 any potential criminal or civil liability that may attach to an admission of the receipt of assigned

1 support;

2 (c) When payments are assigned to another state and that state verifies that payments not paid
3 to the department were received by the other state; or

4 (d) As provided by rule adopted under ORS 180.345.

5 (13) An obligor may apply to the Department of Justice for credit for payments made other than
6 to the Department of Justice. If the obligee or other state does not provide the agreement, sworn
7 statement or verification required by subsection (12) of this section, credit may be given pursuant
8 to order of an administrative law judge assigned from the Office of Administrative Hearings after
9 notice and opportunity to object and be heard are given to both obligor and obligee. Notice shall
10 be served upon the obligee as provided by ORS 25.085. Notice to the obligor may be by regular mail
11 at the address provided in the application for credit. A hearing conducted under this subsection is
12 a contested case hearing and ORS 183.413 to 183.470 apply. Any party may seek a hearing de novo
13 in the circuit court.

14 (14) Nothing in this section precludes the Department of Justice from giving credit for payments
15 not made to the department when there has been a judicially determined credit or satisfaction or
16 when there has been a satisfaction of support executed by the person to whom support is owed.

17 (15) The Department of Justice shall adopt rules that:

18 (a) Direct how support payments that are made through the department are to be applied and
19 disbursed; and

20 (b) Are consistent with federal regulations.

21 **SECTION 9.** ORS 25.075 is amended to read:

22 25.075. (1) Notwithstanding the provisions of ORS 25.080, the Department of Justice may enter
23 into cooperative agreements with Indian tribes or tribal organizations within the borders of this
24 state, if the Indian tribe or tribal organization demonstrates that the tribe or organization has an
25 established tribal court system or a Court of Indian Offenses with the authority to:

26 (a) Establish [*paternity*] **parentage**;

27 (b) Establish, modify and enforce support orders; and

28 (c) Enter support orders in accordance with child support guidelines established by the tribe or
29 organization.

30 (2) The agreements must provide for the cooperative delivery of child support enforcement ser-
31 vices and for the forwarding of all child support collections pursuant to the functions performed by
32 the tribe or organization to the department, or conversely, by the department to the tribe or or-
33 ganization, which shall distribute the child support collections in accordance with the agreement.

34 **SECTION 10.** ORS 25.082 is amended to read:

35 25.082. (1) When services are being provided under Title IV-D of the Social Security Act, the
36 enforcing agency of this or any other state may subpoena financial records and other information
37 needed to establish [*paternity*] **parentage** or to establish, modify or enforce a support order. The
38 subpoena may be served on a party or on a public or private entity. Service of the subpoena may
39 be by certified mail.

40 (2) A party or public or private entity that discloses information to the enforcing agency in
41 compliance with a subpoena served under subsection (1) of this section is not liable to any person
42 for any loss, damage or injury arising out of the disclosure.

43 (3) Upon request of an enforcing agency of another state, only a court or enforcing agency of
44 Oregon may enforce a subpoena issued by the enforcing agency of the other state.

45 (4) Notwithstanding ORS 192.600, a party or public or private entity that fails without good

1 cause to comply with a subpoena issued under this section is subject to a civil penalty not to exceed
2 \$250. A civil penalty under this section must be imposed in the manner provided by ORS 183.745.

3 (5) The Department of Justice shall adopt rules to implement the provisions of this section.

4 **SECTION 11.** ORS 25.650 is amended to read:

5 25.650. (1) As used in this section, “consumer reporting agency” means any person that, for
6 monetary fees or dues or on a cooperative nonprofit basis, regularly engages in whole or in part in
7 the practice of assembling or evaluating consumer credit information or other information on con-
8 sumers for the purpose of furnishing consumer reports to third parties, and that uses any means or
9 facility of interstate commerce for the purpose of preparing or furnishing consumer reports.

10 (2)(a) Notwithstanding any other law, and subject to rules established by the Department of
11 Justice, for cases in which there is past due support, the department shall:

12 (A) Report periodically to consumer reporting agencies the name of any obligor who is delin-
13 quent in the payment of support and the amount owed by the obligor; and

14 (B) Otherwise make available to a consumer reporting agency upon its request information re-
15 garding the amount of past due support owed by an obligor.

16 (b) The department shall provide advance notice to both the obligor and the obligee concerning
17 the proposed reporting of information to the consumer reporting agencies. The notice must inform
18 both parties:

19 (A) Of the amount of the past due support the department will report to the consumer reporting
20 agencies;

21 (B) That the department will continue to report the past due support amount owed without
22 sending additional notice to the parties;

23 (C) Of the obligor’s right to request an administrative review within 30 days after the date of
24 the notice; and

25 (D) Of the issues that may be considered on review.

26 (c) If an obligor requests an administrative review, the department may not report the past due
27 support amount until the review is complete.

28 (d) A party may appeal a decision from the administrative review under ORS 183.484. An appeal
29 of the decision does not stay the department from making reports to consumer reporting agencies.

30 (3)(a) If [*paternity*] **parentage** has been established and a consumer report is needed for the
31 purpose of establishing or modifying a child support order, the administrator may request that a
32 consumer reporting agency provide a report.

33 (b) At least 10 days prior to making a request under paragraph (a) of this subsection, the ad-
34 ministrator shall notify the obligor or obligee whose report is requested, by certified or registered

18 be declared the father of the child and to assume the responsibilities of a father.

19 (2) If after inquiry under subsection (1)(b) of this section the court finds:

20 (a) That the putative father is the father of the child and is fit and willing to assume the re-
21 sponsibilities of a father, it shall have the power:

22 (A) Upon the request of the putative father, to declare his paternity and to certify the fact of

11 (3) The parent shall include with the petition a certificate regarding any pending support pro-
12 ceeding and any existing support order. The parent shall use a certificate that is in a form estab-

40 (22) "Reasonable and prudent parent standard" means the standard, characterized by careful and
41 sensible parental decisions that maintain the health, safety and best interests of a child or ward
42 while encouraging the emotional and developmental growth of the child or ward, that a substitute
43 care provider shall use when determining whether to allow a child or ward in substitute care to
44 participate in extracurricular, enrichment, cultural and social activities.

45 (23) "Reasonable time" means a period of time that is reasonable given a child or ward's emo-

1 tional and developmental needs and ability to form and maintain lasting attachments.

2 (24) "Records" means any information in written form, pictures, photographs, charts, graphs,
3 recordings or documents pertaining to a case.

4 (25) "Resides" or "residence," when used in reference to the residence of a child, ward, youth
5 or youth offender, means the place where the child, ward, youth or youth offender is actually living
6 or the jurisdiction in which wardship or jurisdiction has been established.

7 (26) "Restitution" has the meaning given that term in ORS 137.103.

8 (27) "Serious physical injury" means:

9 (a) A serious physical injury as defined in ORS 161.015; or

10 (b) A physical injury that:

11 (A) Has a permanent or protracted significant effect on a child's daily activities;

12 (B) Results in substantial and recurring pain; or

13 (C) In the case of a child under 10 years of age, is a broken bone.

14 (28) "Shelter care" means a home or other facility suitable for the safekeeping of a child, ward,
15 youth or youth offender who is taken into temporary custody pending investigation and disposition.

16 (29) "Short-term detention facility" means a facility established under ORS 419A.050 (3) for
17 holding children, youths and youth offenders pending further placement.

18 (30) "Sibling" means one of two or more children or wards related:

19 (a) By blood or adoption through a common legal parent; or

20 (b) Through the marriage of the children's or wards' legal or biological parents.

21 (31) "Substitute care" means an out-of-home placement directly supervised by the department
22 or other agency, including placement in a foster family home, group home, child-caring agency as
23 defined in ORS 418.205 or other child caring institution or facility. "Substitute care" does not in-
24 clude care in:

25 (a) A detention facility, forestry camp or youth correction facility;

26 (b) A family home that the court has approved as a ward's permanent placement, when a child-
27 caring agency as defined in ORS 418.205 has been appointed guardian of the ward and when the
28 ward's care is entirely privately financed; or

38 the court to have suffered direct financial, psychological or physical harm as a result of the act that

7 is a violation, or, if done by an adult would constitute a violation, of a law or ordinance of the
8 United States or a state, county or city.

9 (39) “Youth care center” has the meaning given that term in ORS 420.855.

10 (40) “Youth offender” means a person who has been found to be within the jurisdiction of the
11 juvenile court under ORS 419C.005 for an act committed when the person was under 18 years of age.

4 parties or of the child at issue have been assigned to the state, a true copy of the petition shall be
5 served by mail or personal delivery on the Administrator of the Division of Child Support of the
