6 “**SECTION 1.** ORS 350.075, as amended by section 5, chapter 30, Oregon Laws 2016, and section
7 55, chapter 117, Oregon Laws 2016, is amended to read:

8 “350.075. (1) As used in this section, ‘student access programs’ means scholarship, loan, grant
9 and access programs described in ORS chapter 348.

10 “(2) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission shall be guided by the legislative findings
11 in ORS 341.009, 350.001 and 350.005 and the goals and mission of post-secondary education set forth
12 in ORS 350.009 and 350.014.

13 “(3) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission shall:

14 “(a) Develop state goals for the state post-secondary education system, including community
15 colleges and public universities listed in ORS 352.002, and for student access programs.

16 “(b) Determine strategic investments in the state’s community colleges, public universities and
17 student access programs necessary to achieve state post-secondary education goals.

18 “(c) Coordinate the post-secondary elements of data collection and structure, with the advice
19 and recommendation of the state’s independent institutions, community colleges and public univer-
20 sities, as appropriate, in order to construct a state longitudinal data system.

21 “(d) Adopt a strategic plan for achieving state post-secondary education goals, taking into con-
22 sideration the contributions of this state’s independent institutions, philanthropic organizations and
23 other organizations dedicated to helping Oregonians reach state goals. State post-secondary educa-
24 tion goals as described in this section should include, but need not be limited to:

25 “(A) Increasing the educational attainment of the population;

26 “(B) Increasing this state’s global economic competitiveness and the quality of life of its resi-
27 dents;

16 but not limited to reviewing school records, holding administrative hearings and issuing final orders;

18 but not limited to the costs of an investigation or administrative hearing;

19 “(F) Require a school to make full or partial restitution to a student or to cease an act or
20 practice that is challenged in a student complaint;

22 “(H) Enter into agreements to implement the provisions of this subsection.

23 “(b) Any hearing held under this subsection is subject to the provisions of ORS chapter 183.

24 “(c) As used in this subsection:

25 “(A) ‘School’ means a school that meets the requirements of ORS 348.597 (2)(a); and

26 “(B) ‘Student’ means a person who is enrolled or accepted for enrollment at a school for the
27 purpose of obtaining a degree, certificate or other recognized educational credential offered by that
28 school.

29 “(5) In addition to the duties described in subsections (2) to (4) of this section, the Higher Edu-
30 cation Coordinating Commission shall advise the Legislative Assembly, the Governor, community
31 colleges, public universities and other state boards and commissions on policies in order to:

32 “(a) Ensure or improve access to higher education by diverse and underserved populations.

33 “(b) Encourage student success and completion initiatives.

34 “(c) Improve the coordination of the provision of educational services, including:

35 “(A) Transfers and coenrollment throughout the higher education system;

36 “(B) Accelerated college credit programs for high school students;

37 “(C) Applied baccalaureate and other transfer degrees;

38 “(D) Programs and grants that span multiple institutions; and

39 “(E) Reciprocity agreements with other states.

40 “(d) In coordination with the State Board of Education, enhance the use and quality of dual
41 credit, career and technical pathways and efforts to create a culture of college attendance in this
42 state.

43 “(e) In coordination with the State Workforce Investment Board, local workforce investment
44 boards, the Oregon Health and Science University and independent institutions, ensure that the
45 state’s colleges and universities offer programs in high-demand occupations that meet Oregon’s

1 workforce needs.

2 “(f) Improve economies of scale by encouraging and facilitating the use of the shared services
3 among post-secondary institutions in this state.

4 “(6) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission, in a manner consistent with ORS chapter
5 183, may adopt administrative rules.

6 “(7) With the exception of the rulemaking authority granted in subsection (6) of this section, the
7 Higher Education Coordinating Commission may delegate any of its powers, duties or functions to
8 a committee of the commission or to the executive director of the commission.

9 “[8] *The Higher Education Coordinating Commission may establish technical or advisory com-
10 mittees to assist the commission in exercising its powers, duties and functions.*]

11 “[9] (8) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission may exercise only powers, duties and

13 “**SECTION 3.** ORS 350.095 is amended to read:

14 “350.095. (1) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission is authorized to:

15 “(a) Request, as part of the funding request under ORS 350.090, appropriations for budgetary
16 items, including but not limited to education and general operations, statewide public services, state
17 funded debt service, capital improvements, deferred maintenance, special initiatives and investments
18 **or any other purpose listed under ORS 350.075 (3)(e);** and

19 “(b) Allocate moneys, from funds appropriated to the commission and other available moneys,
20 to public universities listed in ORS 352.002.

21 “(2) The commission shall certify to the Legislative Assembly, in any funding request pursuant
22 to subsection (1)(a) of this section for state bonds under Article XI-F(1) of the Oregon Constitution
23 for the benefit of a public university listed in ORS 352.002, its evaluation of the revenue sufficiency,
24 as defined in ORS 286A.830, of the public university that will receive the proceeds of any Article
25 XI-F(1) bonds approved by the Legislative Assembly.

26 “**SECTION 4.** ORS 350.090, as amended by section 57, chapter 117, Oregon Laws 2016, is
27 amended to read:

28 “350.090. [*(1)(a) On or before April 1 of each even-numbered year, each public university listed in
29 ORS 352.002 must submit to an office designated by the Higher Education Coordinating Commission
30 as being responsible for university coordination a funding request applicable to the biennium beginning
31 on July 1 of the following year; and*]

32 “[*(b) On or before May 1 of each even-numbered year, the office designated under paragraph (a)
33 of this subsection shall consolidate the funding requests from public universities listed in ORS 352.002
34 and submit the consolidated funding requests to the Higher Education Coordinating Commission.*]

35 “[*(2)*] (1) On or before September 1 of each even-numbered year, the Higher Education Coordi-
36 nating Commission shall submit a **consolidated** funding request to the Governor on behalf of all the
37 public universities listed in ORS 352.002.

38 “[*(3)*] (2) The Governor’s budget may include the Higher Education Coordinating Commission’s
39 funding request for public universities listed in ORS 352.002. Any funding request approved by the
40 Legislative Assembly must specify that the moneys be appropriated to the Higher Education Coordi-
41 nating Commission for allocation to the public universities listed in ORS 352.002.

42 “(3) **The Higher Education Coordinating Commission may adopt rules necessary for the
43 administration of this section.**

44 “**SECTION 5.** ORS 352.061 is amended to read:

45 “352.061. (1) On an annual basis, the Higher Education Coordinating Commission shall submit

1 to the Legislative Assembly an evaluation of *[each university with a governing board.]* **public uni-**
2 **versities listed in ORS 352.002. Each public university must be evaluated in the manner re-**
3 **quired by this section once every two years. As part of the evaluation submitted to the**
4 **Legislative Assembly,** the commission may make recommendations *[to the Legislative Assembly]*
5 regarding the ability of the university to meet academic goals and fulfill its fiduciary responsibil-
6 ities.

7 “(2) The evaluation must include:

8 “(a) A report on the university’s achievement of outcomes, measures of progress, goals and tar-
9 gets;

10 “(b) An assessment of the university’s progress toward achieving the mission of all education
11 beyond high school as described in ORS 350.014; and

12 “(c) An assessment as to how well the establishment of a governing board at the university
13 comports with the findings set forth in ORS 352.025.

14 “(3) **The Higher Education Coordinating Commission may adopt rules necessary for the**
15 **administration of this section.**

16 “**SECTION 6.** ORS 350.278 is amended to read:

17 “350.278. (1) A public university listed in ORS 352.002 may not disclose the Social Security
18 number of a student who is attending the public university.

19 “(2) Subsection (1) of this section does not apply if the public university discloses the Social
20 Security number:

21 “(a) At the request of a law enforcement agency or an agency providing support enforcement
22 services under ORS 25.080;

23 “(b) After obtaining written permission for the disclosure from the student to whom the number
24 refers;

25 “(c) In the payment of wages or benefits;

26 “(d) In the payment or collection of taxes or of a debt owed by the student to whom the number
27 refers; *[or]*

28 “(e) For purposes of statistical analysis[.]; **or**

29 “(f) **As otherwise required by law.**

30 “**SECTION 7.** ORS 352.025 is amended to read:

31 “352.025. (1) The Legislative Assembly finds that the State of Oregon will benefit from having
32 public universities with governing boards that:

33 “(a) Provide transparency, public accountability and support for the university.

34 “(b) Are close to and closely focused on the individual university.

35 “[*c*] *Do not negatively impact public universities that do not have governing boards.*]

36 “[*d*] (c) Lead to greater access and affordability for Oregon residents and do not disadvantage
37 Oregon students relative to out-of-state students.

38 “[*e*] (d) Act in the best interests of both the university and the State of Oregon as a whole.

39 “[*f*] (e) Promote the academic success of students in support of the mission of all education
40 beyond high school as described in ORS 350.014.

41 “(2) The Legislative Assembly also finds that:

42 “(a) Even with universities with governing boards, there are economy-of-scale benefits to having
43 a coordinated university system.

44 “(b) Even with universities with governing boards, shared services may continue to be shared
45 among universities.

1 “(c) Legal title to all real property, whether acquired before or after the creation of a governing
2 board, through state funding, revenue bonds or philanthropy, shall be taken and held in the name
3 of the State of Oregon, acting by and through the governing board.

4 “(d) The Legislative Assembly has a responsibility to monitor the success of governing boards
5 at fulfilling their missions, their compacts and the principles stated in this section.

6 “**SECTION 8.** ORS 352.027 is amended to read:

7 “352.027. Chapter 768, Oregon Laws 2013, is intended to preserve the autonomy of the **public**
8 universities listed in ORS 352.002 [*whether they are governed by a university governing board or a*
9 *university consortium board*].

10 “**SECTION 9.** ORS 352.029 is amended to read:

11 “352.029. As used in ORS 352.025 to 352.146 and 352.388 to 352.415:

12 “(1) ‘Governing board’ means a governing board of a public university listed in ORS 352.002 that
13 manages the affairs of the university by exercising and carrying out all of the powers, rights and
14 duties that are expressly conferred upon the governing board by law, or that are implied by law or
15 are incident to such powers, rights and duties.

16 “(2) ‘State bonds’ means ‘bonds’ as defined in ORS 286A.001 that are issued by the State Treas-
17 urer.

18 “[*(3) ‘University with a governing board’ means a public university listed in ORS 352.002 that has*
19 *established a governing board.*]

20 “**SECTION 10.** ORS 352.076 is amended to read:

21 “352.076. (1) A governing board for a public university must be formed and maintained as pro-
22 vided in this section.

23 “(2)(a) Except as provided in subsection (3) of this section, the Governor shall appoint all of the
24 11 to 15 members of the governing board, subject to confirmation by the Senate in the manner pro-
25 vided in ORS 171.562 and 171.565.

26 “(b) The governing board must include one person who is a student enrolled at the university.
27 The student shall be a voting member of the board.

28 “(c) The governing board must include one person who is a member of the faculty of the uni-
29 versity and one person who is a member of the nonfaculty staff of the university. For each ap-
30 pointment made under this paragraph, the Governor may appoint the person as either a voting or
31 nonvoting member of the governing board.

32 “(3) The president of the university shall be an ex officio nonvoting member of the governing
33 board.

34 “(4)(a) Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, the term of office for each ap-
35 pointed member of the governing board is four years.

42 of four years, unless it is for corrupt conduct in office.

43 “(e) Vacancies shall be filled by appointment by the Governor for the remainder of the unexpired
44 term.

45 “(5) The faculty and nonfaculty staff members of the governing board may not participate in any

1 discussions or action by the board or attend any executive session of the board involving collective
2 bargaining issues that affect faculty or nonfaculty staff at the university.

3 “(6) The governing board shall select one of its members as chairperson and another as vice
4 chairperson for such terms and with duties and powers as the board considers necessary for the
5 performance of the functions of those offices. The governing board shall adopt bylaws concerning
6 how a quorum is constituted and when a quorum is necessary.

7 “(7) The governing board shall meet at least [*once quarterly*] **four times per year**, and may meet

6 ing, office automation or telecommunications system;

7 “(iii) A renewal of an existing contract for data processing, office automation or telecommuni-

4 “(h) Take, hold, grant, pledge or dispose of mortgages, liens and other security interests on real
5 and personal property.

6 “(i) Spend all available moneys without appropriation or expenditure limitation approval from
7 the Legislative Assembly, except for moneys received by a **public** university [*with a governing*
8 *board*] pursuant to a funding request submitted under ORS 352.089 (3) and the proceeds of state
9 bonds issued for the benefit of a **public** university [*with a governing board*]. The proceeds of state
10 bonds issued for the benefit of a **public** university [*with a governing board*] must be held pursuant

13 “(j) Acquire, purchase, purchase on a contractual basis, borrow, receive, own, hold, control,
14 convey, mortgage, pledge or otherwise encumber, sell, manage, operate, lease, lease-purchase, li-
15 cense, lend, invest in, improve, develop, use, expend and dispose of real property.

16 “(k) Erect, construct, improve, remodel, develop, repair, maintain, equip, furnish, lease, lend,
17 convey, sell, manage, operate, use and dispose of any building, structure, land or project.

42 furnished with the proceeds of bonds issued pursuant to Article XI-Q of the Oregon Constitution for
43 the benefit of a **public university listed in ORS 352.002** [*with a governing board*] must be taken and
44 held in the name of the State of Oregon, acting by and through the governing board. The governing
45 board has custody and control of the personal property and shall care for the personal property

1 owned by the State of Oregon. When the Article XI-Q bonds are no longer outstanding, legal title
2 to the personal property automatically by operation of law transfers to and vests in the **public**
3 university [*with a governing board*] for whose benefit the Article XI-Q bonds were issued.

4 “(4) Unless the State Treasurer has granted prior consent, real or personal property held in the
5 name of the State of Oregon, or in which the State of Oregon has an ownership or other legal in-
6 terest, that was acquired, constructed, improved with or otherwise directly benefited by the proceeds
7 of outstanding state bonds, may not be:

8 “(a) Used by a governing board in a manner that would give rise to private business use; or

9 “(b) Sold, transferred, encumbered, leased or otherwise disposed of by a governing board. The
10 reference to leases in this paragraph does not apply to residential leases that a governing board
11 enters into with students, faculty or employees of the university.

12 “**SECTION 20.** ORS 352.118 is amended to read:

13 “352.118. (1) A governing board may, in its sole discretion, do all of the following:

14 “(a) Police, control and regulate traffic and parking of vehicles on university property.

15 “(b) Establish a police department and commission one or more employees as police officers in
16 the manner and with all of the privileges and immunities set forth in ORS 352.121. When a governing

31 “352.124. (1) A **public university listed in ORS 352.002** [*with a governing board*] shall engage
32 in collective bargaining with local bargaining organizations of the employees of the university.

33 “(2) A **public university listed in ORS 352.002** [*with a governing board*] shall participate in a
34 collective bargaining partnership with other public universities in this state for the purpose of en-
35 gaging in collective bargaining with existing statewide bargaining organizations of the employees

3 *board*] after that date, may be:

4 “(a) Deposited into one or more accounts established by the board in depositories insured by the

13 Treasurer to receive, hold, keep, manage and invest any amounts under the control of the university
14 that the State Treasurer determines should be held by the State Treasurer to provide for payment
15 of state bonds and other state obligations that are to be paid from appropriations described in ORS
16 352.089 (4), revenues of the university or other moneys under the control of the university. The
17 agreement may, at the request of the State Treasurer, require the university to pay the costs in-

26 “**SECTION 23.** ORS 352.138, as amended by section 8, chapter 31, Oregon Laws 2016, is
27 amended to read:

28 “352.138. (1) The following entities are not subject to any provision of law enacted after January
29 1, 2013, that is unique to governmental entities unless the following entities are expressly named:

30 “(a) A **public** university **listed in ORS 352.002** [*with a governing board*]; and

31 “(b) Any not-for-profit organization or other entity if the equity of the entity is owned or con-
32 trolled exclusively by a **public** university [*with a governing board*] and if the organization or entity
33 is created by the university to advance any of the university’s statutory missions.

4 “(b) Notwithstanding subsections (1) and (3) of this section, ORS 279C.800 to 279C.870 apply to
5 an agreement under the terms of which a private entity constructs, reconstructs, renovates or paints
6 an improvement on real property owned by a **public** university **listed in ORS 352.002** [with a gov-
7 erning board] or by a not-for-profit organization or other entity that a **public** university [with a
8 governing board] owns or controls exclusively.

10 its control, adopt standards and specific orders by or through the president of each public university
11 governing access to personnel records of the public university or office, department or activity that

35 “352.388. As used in ORS 352.388 to 352.415:

36 “(1) ‘Bond-related costs’ means:

37 “(a) The costs of paying the principal of, the interest on and the premium, if any, on revenue

39 “(b) The costs and expenses of issuing, administering and maintaining revenue bonds, including,
40 but not limited to, the costs and expenses of:

41 “(A) Redeeming revenue bonds.

11 viding additional credit on or security for a revenue bond.

12 “(3) ‘For the benefit of a **public** university *[with a governing board]*’ means, in relation to state

20 “**SECTION 29.** ORS 352.408 is amended to read:

21 “352.408. (1) A **public university listed in ORS 352.002** [*with a governing board*]:

22 “(a) May issue revenue bonds for any lawful purpose of the university in accordance with ORS
23 chapter 287A.

24 “(b) May issue under ORS 287A.360 to 287A.380 refunding bonds of the same character and
25 tenor as the revenue bonds replaced.

3 “(c) Are not a charge upon any revenue or property of a **public** university **listed in ORS 352.002**
4 *[with a governing board]* unless the revenue or property is pledged to secure the revenue bonds or

6 “(d) Are not payable from, and may not be secured by a pledge of or lien on, any amounts a
7 **public** university *[with a governing board]* is required to:

22 pay, including the payment dates and amounts, or methods for determining the amounts. To prepare
23 the schedule, the State Treasurer may request and rely upon information produced by one or more
24 universities with a governing board or a shared services enterprise of the universities that provides
25 services related to debt management. The schedule must include amounts sufficient to pay principal,
26 interest and premium, if any, on the state bonds, and to pay administrative and other costs of the
27 State of Oregon that are related to the state bonds or other obligations. If the State Treasurer issues
28 state bonds for the benefit of a **public** university *[with a governing board]* on or after August 14,
29 2013, that are intended to be repaid in whole or in part by university revenues or other moneys
30 under the control of the university, the schedule shall be amended to include such state bonds and
31 the amounts to be paid by the university. In the absence of manifest error, the schedule provided
32 by the State Treasurer to a **public** university *[with a governing board]* is binding on the university.
33 The **public** university *[with a governing board]* shall pay the amounts specified in the schedule pro-
34 vided by the State Treasurer on or before the dates specified in the schedule from the legally
35 available revenue of the university and on a pari passu basis with the payment of any revenue bonds
36 of the university issued pursuant to ORS 352.408.

37 “(4) At the request of the State Treasurer, a **public** university **listed in ORS 352.002** *[with a*
38 *governing board]* shall provide the State Treasurer with periodic cash flow projections and other
39 information that allow the State Treasurer to review and approve the sufficiency of the university’s
40 cash flow to pay amounts specified in the schedule described in subsection (3) of this section and
41 to pay amounts owed under loans from state agencies that were funded with the proceeds of state
42 bonds.

43 “(5) Moneys deposited with the State Treasurer or the Oregon Department of Administrative
44 Services in a debt service reserve account or otherwise for the portion of the debt service associated
45 with obligations entered into before August 14, 2013, for the benefit of a **public** university **listed in**

1 **ORS 352.002** [*with a governing board*] must remain with the State Treasurer or the Oregon Department of Administrative Services until the obligations have been retired or defeased. Earnings on
2 moneys described in this subsection must be credited to the account or fund in which the moneys
3 are held.
4

5 “(6) The principal, interest, premium, if any, and any issuance costs of state bonds issued before,
6 on or after August 14, 2013, for the benefit of a **public** university **listed in ORS 352.002** [*with a*
7 *governing board*], and any related credit enhancement device or interest rate exchange agreement,
8 shall be paid from the sources identified in the laws and operative documents authorizing the state
9 bonds. The **public** university [*with a governing board*] for which the state bonds were issued shall
10 pay any other expenses and liabilities, including, but not limited to, legal expenses arising from an
11 inquiry, audit or other action by a federal or state regulatory body, unless the expense or liability
12 results solely from the negligence or willful misconduct of a state agency.

13 “(7) Pursuant to ORS chapter 180, on behalf of the State Treasurer or any other state agency,
14 the Attorney General shall appear, commence, prosecute or defend any action, suit, matter, cause
15 or proceeding arising from any state bond issued for the benefit of a **public** university **listed in ORS**
16 **352.002** [*with a governing board*] and any related credit enhancement device or interest rate ex-
17 change agreement. As soon as practicable after a governing board is established by a **public** uni-
18 versity pursuant to ORS 352.054, the university [*with a governing board*] and the State Treasurer
19 shall enter into an agreement that addresses reimbursement of reasonable costs and expenses asso-
20 ciated with the legal representation of the State Treasurer in connection with state bonds issued for
21 the benefit of the **public** university [*with a governing board*] before, on or after August 14, 2013, and
22 any other topic necessary for the Department of Justice to provide legal representation to the State
23 Treasurer in connection with state bonds issued for the benefit of the **public** university [*with a*
24 *governing board*] and to provide representation related to funds and accounts or services provided
25 under ORS 352.135.

26 “(8) A **public** university **listed in ORS 352.002** [*with a governing board*] shall assume responsi-
27 bility for the indemnity and defense of university officers, agents and employees with regard to, as
28 applicable, claims asserted and actions commenced in connection with state bonds issued for the
29 benefit of the **public** university [*with a governing board*].

30 “**SECTION 31.** ORS 352.442 is amended to read:

31 “352.442. A **public** university **listed in ORS 352.002** [*with a governing board*] may, in its dis-
32 cretion, accept financial assistance and grants, either in the form of money or labor, from the United
33 States or any of its agencies, subject to the terms and conditions thereof, regardless of any laws of
34 this state in conflict with the regulations of the federal government with respect thereto, and may
35 also accept from others any donation or grant of land, to be taken and held in the name of the State
36 of Oregon, acting by and through the governing board, or gift of money or other valuable gift or
37 thing, for any of the purposes contemplated by Article XI-F(1) and Article XI-G of the Oregon Con-
38 stitution and ORS 352.157 to 352.171. Unless enjoined by the terms or conditions of any such gift
39 or grant, the governing board may convert the same, or any of them, into money, through sale or
40 disposal thereof.

41 “**SECTION 32.** ORS 352.450 is amended to read:

42 “352.450. (1) The Public University Fund is established in the State Treasury, separate and dis-
43 tinct from the General Fund. Any interest or other investment income derived from moneys in the
44 Public University Fund is credited to the fund.

45 “(2) Except for moneys otherwise designated by statute or federal law, the governing board of

1 any public university listed in ORS 352.002 may place any or all moneys received by it into the
2 Public University Fund. Once deposited in the fund, the moneys of a public university shall be
3 commingled with other moneys in the fund and are fungible, except to the extent they may be sep-
4 arately accounted for by the public university designated under subsection (3)(a) of this section.

5 “(3)(a) Public universities listed in ORS 352.002 that choose to participate in the Public Uni-
6 versity Fund shall, by agreement or other structure authorized by law, designate the participating
7 public university responsible for the Public University Fund and identify any and all obligations
8 necessary for a participating public university listed in ORS 352.002 to serve as the designated re-
9 sponsible party under this subsection.

10 “(b) The participating public universities shall inform the State Treasurer of the designated
11 public university responsible for the Public University Fund. The participating public universities
12 may change which participating public university is responsible for the Public University Fund.

13 “(c) The State Treasurer may conclusively rely on a written instruction from the public uni-
14 versities as to the designated public university responsible for the fund.

15 “(d) The designated public university shall inform the State Treasurer of the personnel author-
16 ized to provide instructions to the State Treasurer with respect to moneys in the fund. The State
17 Treasurer may rely on instructions from the authorized personnel of the designated public university
18 related to the deposit, withdrawal, investment, transfer, borrowing or lending of moneys in the fund.
19 The State Treasurer is not responsible for or liable to the public universities for any error or
20 omission in the instructions the State Treasurer receives from the designated public university.

21 “(4) All moneys in the Public University Fund are continuously appropriated to the public uni-
22 versity responsible for the Public University Fund, to be used only in a manner consistent with the
23 agreement or other structure authorized by law as described in subsection (3) of this section.

24 “(5) The moneys in the Public University Fund may be invested as provided in ORS 293.701 to
25 293.857.

26 “(6) Public universities that participate in the Public University Fund may, by agreement or
27 other structure authorized by law, direct the public university designated under subsection (3)(a) of
28 this section to establish accounts and subaccounts within the fund when the participating public
29 universities determine that accounts or subaccounts are necessary or desirable. Except when oth-
30 erwise specified by a statute establishing an account, the participating public universities or, as
31 appropriate, the designated public university, may credit any interest or income derived from mon-
32 eys in the fund to any account or subaccount within the fund.

33 “(7) Public universities that participate in the Public University Fund or, as appropriate, the
34 public university designated under subsection (3)(a) of this section, shall keep a record of all moneys
35 deposited into the fund. The record shall indicate by separate cumulative accounts and subaccounts
36 the sources from which the moneys are derived and the individual activity or program against which
37 each withdrawal is charged.

38 “(8) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, public universities that participate in the
39 Public University Fund or, as appropriate, the public university designated under subsection (3)(a)
40 of this section, may transfer or lend the moneys in the fund to other participating public universities
41 listed in ORS 352.002. The Public University Fund may be a borrowing fund for purposes of ORS
42 293.205 to 293.225 and may borrow from the Oregon Short Term Fund established in ORS 293.728
43 or other state funds. Subject to the limitations of Article XI, section 7, of the Oregon Constitution,
44 the Public University Fund may be a lending fund for purposes of ORS 293.205 to 293.225 and may
45 lend moneys to other state funds. The public university designated under subsection (3)(a) of this

1 section shall be the relevant state agency or department for whom the State Treasurer may transfer
2 funds or with whom the State Treasurer may enter into an agreement pursuant to ORS 293.205 to
3 293.225.

4 “(9) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, ORS 293.169, 293.171, 293.353, 293.406, 293.450,
5 293.455, 293.460 and 293.465 to 293.485 apply to moneys in the Public University Fund and to checks,
6 warrants or electronic funds transfers from or to the fund. For purposes of ORS 293.169, 293.171,
7 293.353, 293.406, 293.450, 293.455, 293.460 and 293.465 to 293.485:

8 “(a) The public university designated under subsection (3)(a) of this section is the relevant state
9 agency or department; and

10 “(b) The personnel of the designated public university authorized to provide instructions to the
11 State Treasurer are the relevant state officers.

12 “(10)(a) The State Treasurer may establish separate or commingled funds, or establish separate
13 or commingled accounts within funds established under this subsection. The State Treasurer may
14 establish separate or commingled accounts within other funds in the State Treasury to receive, hold,
15 keep, manage or invest moneys of a **public** university **listed in ORS 352.002** [*with a governing*
16 *board*] pursuant to any agreements entered into by the State Treasurer and the university under
17 ORS 352.135. The moneys in a fund or account established under this subsection may be invested
18 as provided in ORS 293.701 to 293.857 and any interest or other investment income derived from the
19 fund or account shall be credited to the fund or account. All moneys held in a fund or account es-
20 tablished under this subsection are continuously appropriated to the relevant **public** university [*with*
21 *a governing board*] that has entered into an agreement with the State Treasurer under ORS 352.135
22 for the purpose of carrying out the powers and duties of the **public** university [*with a governing*
23 *board*] or the purposes for which the moneys were donated.

24 “(b) Except for moneys held to provide for the payment of state bonds and other state obli-
25 gations described in ORS 352.089 (4), a **public** university **listed in ORS 352.002** [*with a governing*
26 *board*] may transfer or lend the moneys held in the State Treasury pursuant to any agreements en-
27 tered into under ORS 352.135 to other public universities listed in ORS 352.002. A fund or account
28 in the State Treasury that holds moneys of a **public** university [*with a governing board*] pursuant
29 to an agreement entered into under ORS 352.135 may be a borrowing fund for purposes of ORS
30 293.205 to 293.225 and may borrow from the Oregon Short Term Fund established in ORS 293.728
31 or other state funds. Subject to the limitations of Article XI, section 7, of the Oregon Constitution,
32 a fund or account in the State Treasury that holds moneys of a **public** university [*with a governing*
33 *board*] pursuant to an agreement entered into under ORS 352.135 may be a lending fund for purposes
34 of ORS 293.205 to 293.225 and may lend moneys to other state funds. The **public** university [*with a*
35 *governing board*] that has entered into an agreement with the State Treasurer under ORS 352.135
36 is the relevant state agency or department for whom the State Treasurer may transfer funds or with
37 whom the State Treasurer may enter into an agreement pursuant to ORS 293.205 to 293.225.

38 “(c) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, ORS 293.169, 293.171, 293.353, 293.406, 293.450,
39 293.455, 293.460 and 293.465 to 293.485 apply to moneys received, held, kept, managed or invested
40 by the State Treasurer for a **public** university **listed in ORS 352.002** [*with a governing board*] pur-
41 suant to an agreement entered into under ORS 352.135 and to checks, warrants or electronic funds
42 transfers from or to any funds or accounts established pursuant to this subsection. For purposes of
43 ORS 293.169, 293.171, 293.353, 293.406, 293.450, 293.455, 293.460 and 293.465 to 293.485:

44 “(A) The **public** university [*with a governing board*] that has entered into an agreement with the
45 State Treasurer under ORS 352.135 is the relevant state agency or department; and

1 “(B) The personnel of the **public** university [*with a governing board*] authorized to provide in-
2 instructions to the State Treasurer are the relevant state officers.”.
