

# Senate Bill 896

Sponsored by COMMITTEE ON JUDICIARY

## SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Defines terms related to appeals. Separates provisions relating to appealability from provisions relating to reviewability.

Lists specific judgments and orders that defendant and state may appeal, including trial court denial of restitution or award of restitution in amount less than that requested by state.

Requires nonjurisdictional showing of colorable claim of error in defendant's notice on appeal from certain trial court decisions. Reorganizes provisions concerning appellate procedures. Revises provisions concerning service of notice of appeal on opposing party and filing of notice.

Expands appellate court authority to review sentences in misdemeanor cases. Expressly provides for appellate court authority to review trial court's decision to merge or not to merge determinations of guilt. Describes intermediate decisions of trial court that appellate court has authority to review.

Reorganizes provisions concerning trial court authority to enter corrected judgment or supplemental judgment awarding restitution during pendency of appeal. Describes scope of appellate court authority to review corrected or amended judgments.

Reorganizes and revises provisions describing dispositional authority of appellate court.

## APPEALS GENERALLY

10 **SECTION 1.** ORS 138.005 is amended to read:

11 138.005. As used in ORS 138.010 to 138.310[,]:

12 (1) Unless the context requires otherwise, the terms defined in ORS 19.005 have the meanings  
13 set forth in ORS 19.005.

14 (2) **"Appealable" means, in reference to a judgment or order rendered by a trial court,**  
15 **that the judgment or order is, by law, subject to appeal by a party.**

16 (3) **"Colorable claim of error" means an argument that is plausible, grounded in the facts**  
17 **of the case, and reasonable under current law or a reasonable extension or modification of**  
18 **current law.**

19 (4) **"Reviewable" means, in reference to a particular decision of a trial court on appeal**  
20 **from an appealable judgment or order, that the appellate court may, by law, consider the**  
21 **decision and resolve an issue regarding the decision.**

22 (5) **"Sentence" means all legal consequences established or imposed by the trial court**  
23 **after conviction of an offense, including but not limited to:**

24 (a) **Forfeiture, imprisonment, cancellation of license, removal from office, monetary ob-**

1 **ligation, probation, conditions of probation, discharge, restitution and community service;**

3 **(b) Suspension of imposition or execution of any part of a sentence, extension of a period**  
 4 **of probation, imposition of a new or modified condition of probation or of sentence suspen-**  
 5 **sion, and imposition or execution of a sentence upon revocation of probation or sentence**  
 6 **suspension.**

 8 **APPEAL BY THE DEFENDANT**

9  
 10 **SECTION 2.** (1) Sections 3, 6, 10, 12, 13, 14 and 15 of this 2017 Act are added to and made  
 11 **a part of ORS 138.010 to 138.310.**

12 **SECTION 3.** (1)(a) A defendant may take an appeal from the circuit court, or from a  
 13 **municipal court or a justice court that has become a court of record under ORS 51.025 or**  
 14 **221.342, to the Court of Appeals from a judgment:**

15 **(A) Conclusively disposing of all counts in the accusatory instrument or conclusively**  
 16 **disposing of all counts severed from other counts;**

17 **(B) Convicting the defendant of at least one count; and**

18 **(C) Imposing sentence on all counts of which the defendant was convicted.**

19 **(b) For the purposes of this subsection, if the trial court merges a determination of guilt**  
 20 **on one count with a determination of guilt on another count and imposes a sentence on the**  
 21 **merged determinations of guilt, the trial court has conclusively disposed of the merged**  
 22 **counts.**

23 **(2)(a) A defendant may appeal a judgment ordering payment of restitution but not spec-**  
 24 **ifying the amount of restitution.**

25 **(b) A defendant may appeal a supplemental judgment awarding restitution.**

26 **(3) A defendant may appeal a judgment or order extending a period of probation, imposing**  
 27 **a new or modified condition of probation or of sentence suspension, or imposing or executing**  
 28 **a sentence upon revocation of probation or sentence suspension.**

29 **(4) A defendant may appeal an amended or corrected judgment entered after the judg-**  
 30 **ment of conviction and sentence.**

31 **(5) A defendant may cross-appeal when the state appeals pursuant to ORS 138.060 (1)(d).**

 33 **APPEAL BY THE STATE**

34  
 35 **SECTION 4.** ORS 138.060 is amended to read:

36 138.060. (1) The state may take an appeal from the circuit court, or from a municipal court or  
 37 a justice court that has become a court of record under ORS 51.025 or 221.342, to the Court of Ap-  
 38 peals from:

39 **(a) An order made prior to trial dismissing or setting aside one or more counts in the**  
 40 **accusatory instrument;**

41 **(b) An order allowing a demurrer;**

42 **[(b)] (c) An order arresting the judgment;**

43 **[(c)] (d) An order made prior to trial suppressing evidence;**

44 **[(d)] (e) An order made prior to trial for the return or restoration of things seized;**

45 **[(e)] (f) For a felony committed on or after November 1, 1989, a judgment [of conviction based**

1 on the sentence as provided in ORS 138.222], **amended judgment or corrected judgment of con-**  
 2 **viction;**

3 **(g) For any felony, a judgment, amended judgment, supplemental judgment, corrected**  
 4 **judgment or post-judgment order, that denied restitution or awarded less than the amount**

13 (2) Notwithstanding subsection (1) of this section, when the state chooses to appeal [from] an  
 14 order [listed in paragraph (a) or (b) of this subsection] **described in subsection (1)(a), (b) or (d)**  
 15 **of this section**, the state shall take the appeal to the Supreme Court if the defendant is charged  
 16 with murder or aggravated murder. [*The orders to which this subsection applies are:*]

17 [(a) *An order made prior to trial suppressing evidence; and*]

18 [(b) *An order made prior to trial dismissing or setting aside the accusatory instrument.*]

19 [(3) *In an appeal by the state under subsection (2) of this section, the Supreme Court shall issue*  
 20 *its decision no later than one year after the date of oral argument or, if the appeal is not orally argued,*  
 21 *the date that the State Court Administrator delivers the briefs to the Supreme Court for decision.*  
 22 *Failure of the Supreme Court to issue a decision within one year is not a ground for dismissal of the*

24 **SECTION 5.** ORS 136.120 is amended to read:

25 136.120. (1) If[, *when the case is called for trial,*] the defendant appears **at the time set** for trial  
 26 and the [*district*] **prosecuting** attorney is not ready and does not show [*any*] sufficient cause for  
 27 postponing the trial, the court shall [*order*] **dismiss** the accusatory instrument [*to be dismissed, un-*  
 28 *less, being of the opinion that the public interests require the accusatory instrument to be retained for*  
 29 *trial, the court directs it to be retained*] **unless the court determines that dismissal is not in the**  
 30 **public interest.**

31 **(2) If the court dismisses the accusatory instrument under subsection (1) of this section**  
 32 **and:**

33 **(a) The instrument charges a felony or Class A misdemeanor, the dismissal is not a bar**  
 34 **to another action for the same offense unless the court so orders.**

35 **(b) The instrument charges an offense other than a felony or Class A misdemeanor, the**  
 36 **dismissal shall be a bar to another action for the same offense.**

## 40 PROCEDURE

41  
 42 **SECTION 6.** (1) **If a defendant appeals a judgment of conviction based only on a plea of**  
 43 **guilty or no contest, the notice of appeal must:**

44 **(a) Include a statement that the defendant has reserved an issue for appeal under ORS**  
 45 **135.335; or**

1 (b) Identify a colorable claim of error reviewable under section 13 of this 2017 Act.

2 (2) If a defendant appeals from any of the following judgments or orders, the notice of  
 3 appeal must identify a colorable claim of error reviewable under section 13 of this 2017 Act:

4 (a) A trial court’s judgment or order:

5 (A) Revoking probation;

6 (B) Extending the period of probation;

7 (C) Imposing a new condition of probation;

8 (D) Modifying an existing condition of probation; or

9 (E) Revoking a sentence suspension; or

10 (b) A judgment resentencing the defendant pursuant to a decision by an appellate court  
 11 or a circuit court granting post-conviction relief.

12 (3) The requirements of subsections (1) and (2) of this section are not jurisdictional, but  
 13 the appellate court may dismiss the appeal if the notice of appeal fails to contain the required  
 14 statement or fails to identify the colorable claim of error and the defendant fails to correct  
 15 the deficiency after having been given the opportunity to do so.

16 **SECTION 7.** ORS 138.071 is amended to read:

17 138.071. (1) Except as provided in this section, a notice of appeal must be served and filed not  
 18 later than 30 days after the judgment or order appealed from was entered in the register.

19 (2) If a motion for new trial or motion in arrest of judgment is **timely** served and filed, a notice  
 20 of appeal must be served and filed within 30 days from the earlier of the following dates:

21 (a) The date of entry of the order disposing of the motion; or

22 (b) The date on which the motion is deemed denied.

23 (3) A defendant cross-appealing *[must]* **shall** serve and file the notice of cross-appeal within 10  
 24 days of the expiration of the time allowed in subsection (1) of this section.

25 *[(4) If the trial court enters a corrected or supplemental judgment under ORS 138.083 or under any  
 26 other statutory provision while an appeal of the judgment of conviction is pending and:]*

27 *[(a) A party intends to assign error to any part of the corrected or supplemental judgment, the  
 28 party must file an amended notice of appeal from the corrected or supplemental judgment not later than  
 29 30 days after the party receives notice that the corrected or supplemental judgment has been entered.]*

30 *[(b) A party does not intend to assign error to any part of the corrected or supplemental judgment,  
 31 the party need only file a notice of intent to proceed with the appeal not later than 30 days after the  
 32 party receives notice that the corrected or supplemental judgment has been entered.]*

33 (4)(a) **When an appeal is pending and the trial court enters an amended, corrected or  
 34 supplemental judgment, or an amended or corrected order that is appealable under ORS  
 35 138.060, section 3 of this 2017 Act or any other statutory provision:**

36 (A) **If the appellant intends to assign error to any part of the amended, corrected or  
 37 supplemental judgment, or amended or corrected order that is appealable, the appellant shall  
 38 file an amended notice of appeal from such judgment or order not later than 30 days after  
 39 the appellant receives notice that such judgment or order has been entered.**

40 (B) **If the appellant does not intend to assign error to any part of the amended, corrected  
 41 or supplemental judgment, or amended or corrected order that is appealable, the appellant  
 42 need only file a notice of intent to proceed with the appeal not later than 30 days after the  
 43 appellant receives notice that such judgment or order has been entered. The notice of intent  
 44 to proceed is not jurisdictional.**

45 (b) **As used in this subsection, “appellant” means the attorney of record in the appellate**

1 **court for the appellant or, if the appellant is not represented by an attorney, the appellant**  
 2 **personally.**

3 (5)(a) Upon motion of a defendant, the Court of Appeals shall grant the defendant leave to file  
 4 a notice of appeal after the time limits described in subsections (1) to (4) of this section if:

5 (A) The defendant, by clear and convincing evidence, shows that the failure to file a timely no-  
 6 tice of appeal is not attributable to the defendant personally; and

7 (B) The defendant shows a colorable claim of error in the proceeding from which the appeal is  
 8 taken.

9 (b) A defendant is not entitled to relief under this subsection for failure to file timely notice of  
 10 cross-appeal when the state appeals pursuant to ORS 138.060 [(1)(c) or (2)(a)] **(1)(d)**.

11 (c) The request for leave to file a notice of appeal after the time limits prescribed in subsections  
 12 (1) to (3) of this section must be filed no later than 90 days after entry of the order or judgment  
 13 being appealed. The request for leave to file a notice of appeal after the time limit prescribed in  
 14 subsection (4) of this section must be filed no later than 90 days after the party receives notice that  
 15 the **order or** judgment has been entered. A request for leave under this subsection must be ac-  
 16 companied by the notice of appeal, may be filed by mail and is deemed filed on the date of mailing  
 17 if the request is mailed as provided in ORS 19.260.

18 (d) The court may not grant relief under this subsection unless the state has notice and oppor-  
 19 tunity to respond to the defendant's request for relief.

20 (e) The denial of a motion under paragraph (a) of this subsection is a bar to post-conviction re-  
 21 lief under ORS 138.510 to 138.680 on the same ground, unless the court provides otherwise.

22 [(6) *As used in this section, "party" means the attorney of record in the appellate court for the party*  
 23 *or, if the party is not represented by an attorney, the party personally.*]

24 **SECTION 8.** ORS 138.081 is amended to read:

25 138.081. (1) An appeal shall be taken by causing a notice of appeal in the form prescribed by  
 26 ORS 19.250 to be served:

27 (a)(A) **When the defendant appeals**, on the district attorney for the county in which the  
 28 judgment is entered[, *when the defendant appeals,*] or, if the appeal is under ORS 221.360, on the  
 29 plaintiff's attorney; or

30 (B) **When the state appeals**, on the attorney of record for the defendant[, ] or, if the defendant  
 31 has no attorney of record, on the defendant[, *when the state appeals*]; [and]

32 (b) On the trial court transcript coordinator if a transcript is required in connection with the  
 33 appeal; and

34 (c) On the [*clerk of the*] trial court **administrator**.

35 [(2)(a) *The original of the notice shall be filed with the clerk of the court to which the appeal is*  
 36 *made.*]

37 [(b) *Proof of service of the notice of appeal shall be indorsed on or affixed to the original filed with*  
 38 *the Court of Appeals or the Supreme Court.*]

39 **(2)(a) If the state cannot effect service on the defendant as provided in subsection**  
 40 **(1)(a)(B) of this section, the trial court may order alternative service in accordance with**  
 41 **ORCP 7 D(6) on proof of the state's due diligence in attempting to effect service.**

42 **(b) Alternative service is not perfected until the time established by the court for re-**  
 43 **sponse expires and the state files with the appellate court the affidavit or declaration of al-**  
 44 **ternative service.**

45 **(3) The notice of appeal signed by the appellant, along with proof of service of the notice,**

1 **must be filed with the administrator of the court to which the appeal is taken. Proof of**  
 2 **service of the notice of appeal may either be part of, or accompany, the original notice when**  
 3 **filed.**

4 **SECTION 9.** ORS 138.185 is amended to read:

5 138.185. *[(1) In an appeal to the Court of Appeals, when the notice of appeal is filed, or when the*  
 6 *appeal is perfected upon publication of notice as provided in ORS 138.120, the record in the trial court*  
 7 *shall be prepared and transmitted to the State Court Administrator, at Salem, in the manner and*  
 8 *within the time prescribed in ORS chapter 19.]*

9 *[(2)]* The provisions of ORS 19.250, 19.260, 19.270, **19.365, 19.370, 19.380**, 19.385, 19.390, **19.395**,  
 10 19.435, 19.450 and 19.510 *[and the provisions in ORS 19.425 authorizing review of intermediate*

19 138.210. If the appellant fails to *[appear]* **file a brief** in the appellate court, *[judgment of*  
 20 *affirmance shall be given as a matter of course; but]* **the court shall dismiss the appeal.** The de-  
 21 fendant need not personally appear in the appellate court.

22 **SECTION 12.** **A party may appeal a judgment or order deciding a special statutory pro-**  
 23 **ceeding as provided in ORS 19.205.**

## 24 REVIEWABILITY

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 26  
 27 **SECTION 13.** (1) **On appeal by a defendant, the appellate court has authority to review**  
 28 **the judgment or order being appealed, subject to the provisions of this section.**

29 (2) **The appellate court has authority to review only questions of law appearing on the**  
 30 **record.**

31 (3) **Except as otherwise provided in this section, the appellate court has authority to re-**  
 32 **view any intermediate decision of the trial court.**

33 (4) **On appeal from a judgment of conviction and sentence, the appellate court has au-**  
 34 **thority to review:**

35 (a) **The denial of a motion for new trial based on juror misconduct or newly discovered**  
 36 **evidence; and**

37 (b) **The denial of a motion in arrest of judgment.**

38 (5) **The appellate court has no authority to review the validity of the defendant's plea of**  
 39 **guilty or no contest, or a conviction based on the defendant's plea of guilty or no contest,**  
 40 **except that:**

41 (a) **The appellate court has authority to review the trial court's adverse determination**  
 42 **of a pretrial motion reserved in a conditional plea of guilty or no contest under ORS 135.335.**

43 (b) **The appellate court has authority to review whether the trial court erred by not**  
 44 **merging determinations of guilt of two or more offenses, unless the entry of separate con-**  
 45 **victions results from an agreement between the state and the defendant.**

1       **(6) On appeal from a judgment ordering payment of restitution but not specifying the**  
2 **amount of restitution, the appellate court has no authority to review the decision to award**  
3 **restitution.**

4       **(7) Except as otherwise provided in subsections (8) and (9) of this section, the appellate**  
5 **court has authority to review any sentence to determine whether the trial court failed to**  
6 **comply with requirements of law in imposing or failing to impose a sentence.**

7       **(8) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (9) of this section, for a sentence imposed**  
8 **on conviction of a felony committed on or after November 1, 1989:**

9       **(a) The appellate court has no authority to review:**

10       **(A) A sentence that is within the presumptive sentence prescribed by the rules of the**  
11 **Oregon Criminal Justice Commission.**

12       **(B) A sentence of probation when the rules of the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission**  
13 **prescribe a presumptive sentence of imprisonment but allow a sentence of probation without**  
14 **departure.**

15       **(C) A sentence of imprisonment when the rules of the Oregon Criminal Justice Commis-**  
16 **sion prescribe a presumptive sentence of imprisonment but allow a sentence of probation**  
17 **without departure.**

18       **(b) If the trial court imposed a sentence that departs from the presumptive sentence**  
19 **prescribed by the rules of the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission, the appellate court's**  
20 **authority to review is limited to whether the trial court's findings of fact and reasons justi-**  
21 **fying a departure from the sentence prescribed by the rules of the Oregon Criminal Justice**  
22 **Commission:**

23       **(A) Are supported by the evidence in the record; and**

24       **(B) Constitute substantial and compelling reasons for departure.**

25       **(c) Notwithstanding paragraph (a) of this subsection, the appellate court has authority**  
26 **to review whether the sentencing court erred:**

27       **(A) In ranking the crime seriousness classification of the current crime or in determin-**  
28 **ing the appropriate classification of a prior conviction or juvenile adjudication for criminal**  
29 **history purposes.**

30       **(B) In imposing or failing to impose a minimum sentence prescribed by ORS 137.700 or**  
31 **137.707.**

32       **(9) The appellate court has no authority to review any part of a sentence resulting from**  
33 **a stipulated sentencing agreement between the state and the defendant.**

34       **(10)(a) On appeal from a corrected or amended judgment that is entered before expiration**  
35 **of the applicable period under ORS 138.071 (1) or (2) during which the original judgment can**  
36 **be appealed, the appellate court has authority to review the judgment, including the cor-**  
37 **rections or amendments, as provided in this section.**

38       **(b) On appeal from a corrected or amended judgment that is entered after expiration of**  
39 **the applicable period under ORS 138.071 (1) or (2) during which the original judgment was or**  
40 **could have been appealed, the appellate court has authority to review, as provided in this**  
41 **section, only the corrected or amended part of the judgment, any part of the judgment af-**  
42 **ected by the correction or amendment, or the trial court's decision under section 20 of this**  
43 **2017 Act not to correct or amend the judgment.**

44       **(c) As used in this subsection, "judgment" means any appealable judgment or order.**

45       **(11)(a) On a defendant's cross-appeal under section 3 (5) of this 2017 Act, the appellate**

1 court may, in its discretion, limit review to any decision by the trial court that is  
2 inextricably linked, either factually or legally, to the state's appeal.

3 (b) The failure to file a cross-appeal under section 3 (5) of this 2017 Act does not waive  
4 a defendant's right to assign error to a particular ruling of the trial court on appeal from a  
5 judgment.

6 **SECTION 14.** (1) On appeal by the state, the appellate court has authority to review the  
7 judgment or order being appealed, subject to the provisions of this section.

8 (2) The appellate court has authority to review only questions of law appearing on the  
9 record.

10 (3) Except as otherwise provided in this section, the appellate court has authority to re-  
11 view any intermediate decision involving the merits of, or necessarily affecting, the judgment  
12 or order from which the appeal is taken.

13 (4)(a) Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, on appeal from a judgment  
14 of conviction of any felony, the appellate court has authority to review only the sentence as  
15 provided by subsections (5) and (6) of this section.

16 (b) The appellate court has authority to review whether the trial court erred in merging  
17 determinations of guilt of two or more offenses, unless the merger of determinations of guilt  
18 resulted from an agreement between the state and the defendant.

19 (5) Except as otherwise provided in subsections (6) and (7) of this section, the appellate  
20 court has authority to review the sentence imposed on conviction of any felony to determine  
21 whether the trial court failed to comply with requirements of law in imposing or failing to  
22 impose a sentence.

23 (6) Except as otherwise provided in subsection (7) of this section, for a sentence imposed  
24 on conviction of a felony committed on or after November 1, 1989:

25 (a) The appellate court has no authority to review:

26 (A) A sentence that is within the presumptive sentence prescribed by the rules of the  
27 Oregon Criminal Justice Commission.

28 (B) A sentence of probation when the rules of the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission  
29 prescribe a presumptive sentence of imprisonment but allow a sentence of probation without  
30 departure.

31 (C) A sentence of imprisonment when the rules of the Oregon Criminal Justice Commis-  
32 sion prescribe a presumptive sentence of imprisonment but allow a sentence of probation  
33 without departure.

34 (b) If the trial court imposed a sentence that departs from the presumptive sentence  
35 prescribed by the rules of the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission, the appellate court's  
36 authority to review is limited to whether the trial court's findings of fact and reasons justi-  
37 fying a departure from the sentence prescribed by the rules of the Oregon Criminal Justice  
38 Commission:

39 (A) Are supported by the evidence in the record; and

40 (B) Constitute substantial and compelling reasons for departure.

41 (c) Notwithstanding paragraph (a) of this subsection, the appellate court has authority  
42 to review whether the sentencing court erred:

43 (A) In ranking the crime seriousness classification of the current crime or in determin-  
44 ing the appropriate classification of a prior conviction or juvenile adjudication for criminal

1 (B) In imposing or failing to impose a minimum sentence prescribed by ORS 137.700 or

3 (7) The appellate court has no authority to review any part of a sentence resulting from  
4 a stipulated sentencing agreement between the state and the defendant.

5 (8)(a) On appeal from a corrected or amended judgment that is entered before expiration

9 (b) On appeal from a corrected or amended judgment that is entered after expiration of  
10 the applicable period under ORS 138.071 (1) or (2) during which the original judgment was or  
11 could have been appealed, the appellate court has authority to review, as provided in this  
12 section, only the corrected or amended part of the judgment, any part of the judgment af-  
13 fected by the correction or amendment, or the trial court's decision under section 20 of this  
14 2017 Act not to correct or amend the judgment.

15 (c) As used in this subsection, "judgment" means any appealable judgment or order.

#### 17 DETERMINATION ON APPEAL

19 **SECTION 15.** (1) Except as otherwise provided in this section, the appellate court may  
20 affirm, reverse, vacate or modify the judgment or order, or any part thereof, from which the

10 cerning an act of abuse, as defined in ORS 419B.005, or sexual conduct performed with or on the  
11 child or person with a developmental disability by another, the testimony of the child or person with

1 vious conviction is not valid.

2 (3) If the court determines that the defendant was not previously convicted of the offense that  
3 is the subject of the challenge or that the previous conviction is not valid, the court shall enter an  
4 order prior to trial that so provides and excludes evidence of the previous conviction. The state may  
5 appeal from the order pursuant to ORS 138.060 [(1)(c) or (2)(a)] **(1)(d)**.

6 (4) If the court determines that the defendant previously was convicted of the offense and that  
7 the conviction is valid, or if the defendant does not file and serve a notice under subsection (1) of  
8 this section, the previous conviction shall be admitted at trial or, if the previous conviction is rele-  
9 vant to an enhancement fact described in ORS 136.770 (4) or 136.773 (1), during the sentencing phase  
10 of the proceeding. If the previous conviction is admitted, the defendant may dispute whether the  
11 defendant previously was convicted of the alleged offense but may not challenge the validity of the  
12 conviction. If the previous conviction is a material element of the charged offense or is an en-  
13 hancement fact, the state must prove the previous conviction beyond a reasonable doubt unless the  
14 defendant stipulates to the fact of the previous conviction in accordance with ORS 136.433.

15 (5) For purposes of this section, a previous conviction is not valid if:

16 (a) In the proceedings resulting in the conviction, the defendant was not represented by counsel  
17 and was deprived of the right to counsel in violation of the state or federal Constitution and the  
18 defendant is entitled under either Constitution to challenge the validity of the prior conviction in  
19 the proceeding before the court.

20 (b) Before the defendant committed the charged offense, the previous conviction was vacated by  
21 the court of conviction, reversed or set aside by a court of competent jurisdiction, expunged or  
22 pardoned.

23 **SECTION 23.** ORS 137.020 is amended to read:

24 137.020. (1) After a plea or verdict of guilty, or after a verdict against the defendant on a plea  
25 of former conviction or acquittal, if the judgment is not arrested or a new trial granted, the court  
26 shall appoint a time for pronouncing judgment.

27 (2)(a) The time appointed shall be at least two calendar days after the plea or verdict if the  
28 court intends to remain in session so long. If the court does not intend to remain in session at least  
29 two calendar days, the time appointed may be sooner than two calendar days, but shall be as remote  
30 a time as can reasonably be allowed. However, in the latter case, the judgment shall not be given  
31 less than six hours after the plea or verdict, except with the consent of the defendant.

32 (b) Except for good cause shown or as otherwise provided in this paragraph, a court shall not  
33 delay for more than 31 calendar days after the plea or verdict the sentencing of a defendant held  
34 in custody on account of the pending proceedings. Except for good cause shown or as otherwise  
35 provided in this paragraph, a court shall not delay for more than 56 calendar days after the plea  
36 or verdict the sentencing of a defendant not held in custody on account of the pending proceedings.  
37 If the defendant is not in custody and the court does not pronounce judgment within 56 calendar  
38 days after the plea or verdict, any period of probation imposed as a part of a subsequent judgment  
39 shall begin to run from the date of the plea or verdict.

40 (3) If the defendant is in custody following the verdict, the court shall pronounce judgment as  
41 soon as practicable, but in any case within seven calendar days following the verdict if no presen-  
42 tence investigation is ordered, and within seven calendar days after delivery of the presentence re-  
43 port to the court if a presentence investigation has been ordered; however, the court may delay  
44 pronouncement of judgment beyond the limits of this subsection for good cause shown.

45 (4) If the final calendar day a defendant must be sentenced is not a judicial day then sentencing

1 may be delayed until the next judicial day.

2 (5)(a) At the time a court pronounces judgment the defendant, if present, shall be advised of the  
3 right to appeal and of the procedure for protecting that right. If the defendant is not present, the  
4 court shall advise the defendant in writing of the right to appeal and of the procedure for protecting  
5 that right.

6 (b) If **the trial court sentences** the defendant [*is sentenced*] subsequent to a plea of guilty or  
7 no contest or upon probation revocation or sentence suspension, or if **the trial court sentences** the  
8 defendant [*is resentenced*] after [*an order by*] **judgment of** an appellate court or a post-conviction  
9 relief court, the court shall advise the defendant of the limitations on [*appealability*] **reviewability**  
10 imposed by [*ORS 138.050 (1) and 138.222 (7)*] **section 13 of this 2017 Act in person or, if the de-**  
11 **fendant is not present, in writing.** [*If the defendant is not present, the court shall advise the de-*  
12 *fendant in writing of the limitations on appealability imposed by ORS 138.050 (1) and 138.222 (7).*]

13 (6) If the defendant is financially eligible for appointment of counsel at state expense on appeal  
14 under ORS 138.500, trial counsel shall determine whether the defendant wishes to pursue an appeal.  
15 If the defendant wishes to pursue an appeal, trial counsel shall transmit to the office of public de-  
16 fense services established under ORS 151.216, on a form prepared by the office, information neces-  
17 sary to perfect the appeal.

18 **SECTION 24.** ORS 137.079 is amended to read:

19 137.079. (1) A copy of the presentence report and all other written information concerning the  
20 defendant that the court considers in the imposition of sentence shall be made available to the dis-  
21 trict attorney, the defendant or defendant's counsel at least five judicial days before the sentencing  
22 of the defendant. All other written information, when received by the court outside the presence  
23 of counsel, shall either be summarized by the court in a memorandum available for inspection or  
24 summarized by the court on the record before sentence is imposed.

25 (2) The court may except from disclosure parts of the presentence report or other written in-  
26 formation described in subsection (1) of this section which are not relevant to a proper sentence,  
27 diagnostic opinions which might seriously disrupt a program of rehabilitation if known by the de-  
28 fendant, or sources of information which were obtainable with an expectation of confidentiality.

29 (3) If parts of the presentence report or other written information described in subsection (1)  
30 of this section are not disclosed under subsection (2) of this section, the court shall inform the  
31 parties that information has not been disclosed and shall state for the record the reasons for the  
32 court's action. The action of the court in excepting information shall be reviewable on appeal.

33 (4) A defendant who is being sentenced for felonies committed prior to November 1, 1989, may  
34 file a written motion to correct the criminal history contained in the presentence report prior to the  
35 date of sentencing. At sentencing, the court shall consider defendant's motion to correct the pre-  
36 sentence report and shall correct any factual errors in the criminal history contained in that report.  
37 An order allowing or denying a motion made pursuant to this subsection shall not be reviewable on  
38 appeal. If corrections are made by the court, only corrected copies of the report shall be provided  
39 to individuals or agencies pursuant to ORS 137.077.

40 (5)(a) The provisions of this subsection apply only to a defendant being sentenced for a felony  
41 committed on or after November 1, 1989.

42 (b) Except as otherwise provided in paragraph (c) of this subsection, the defendant's criminal  
43 history as set forth in the presentence report shall satisfy the state's burden of proof as to the  
44 defendant's criminal history.

45 (c) Prior to the date of sentencing, the defendant shall notify the district attorney and the court

1 in writing of any error in the criminal history as set forth in the presentence report. Except to the  
 2 extent that any disputed portion is later changed by agreement of the district attorney and defend-  
 3 ant with the approval of the court, the state shall have the burden of proving by a preponderance  
 4 of evidence any disputed part of the defendant's criminal history. The court shall allow the state  
 5 reasonable time to produce evidence to meet its burden.

6 (d) The court shall correct any error in the criminal history as reflected in the presentence re-  
 7 port.

8 (e) If corrections to the presentence report are made by the court, only corrected copies of the  
 9 report shall be provided to individuals or agencies pursuant to ORS 137.077.

10 (f) Except as provided in [*ORS 138.222*] **sections 13 and 14 of this 2017 Act**, the court's deci-  
 11 sion on issues relating to a defendant's criminal history shall not be reviewable on appeal.

13 138.697. (1) A person described in ORS 138.690 may appeal to the Court of Appeals from a circuit  
 14 court's final order or judgment denying or limiting DNA (deoxyribonucleic acid) testing under ORS  
 15 138.692, denying appointment of counsel under ORS 138.694 or denying a motion for a new trial  
 16 under ORS 138.696.

17 (2) The state may appeal to the Court of Appeals from a circuit court's final order or judgment  
 18 granting a motion for DNA testing under ORS 138.692 or granting a motion for a new trial under

23 (4) A circuit court shall appoint counsel to represent a person described in ORS 138.690 on ap-
