**PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO  
SENATE BILL 1000**

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, line 2, after the semicolon insert “creating  
2 new provisions; and” and after “ORS” insert “181A.355,”.

3 In line 3, delete “and” and insert a comma and after “401.358” insert “and  
4 408.020”.

5 On page 2, after line 6, insert:

6 **“SECTION 2. (1)(a) A law enforcement unit, as defined in ORS  
7 181A.355, may sponsor a reserve officer of the law enforcement unit  
8 under this section for training as a volunteer in the Oregon State Po-  
9 lice Civil Defense Force or a County Civil Defense Force under ORS  
10 399.035.**

11 **“(b)(A) Notwithstanding ORS 181A.425, the Department of Public  
12 Safety Standards and Training shall increase class sizes as necessary  
13 to train reserve officers sponsored under this section.**

14 **“(B) Notwithstanding subparagraph (A) of this paragraph, class  
15 sizes may not be increased for purposes of this section by an amount  
16 greater than 25 percent of class sizes as of the effective date of this  
17 2017 Act.**

18 **“(2)(a) A reserve officer sponsored under this section may pay for  
19 the costs of courses required for training as a volunteer in the Oregon  
20 State Police Defense Force or a County Civil Defense Force with, in  
21 any combination, cash and any state financial aid as provided in ORS**

1 408.010 to 408.090 to which the reserve officer is entitled.

2 “(b) Upon request, the Department of Veterans’ Affairs shall pro-  
3 vide assistance to reserve officers in obtaining reimbursement for the  
4 costs of courses required for training under this section.

5 “(3) When a reserve officer sponsored under this section has com-  
6 pleted the courses required for training as a volunteer in the Oregon  
7 State Police Civil Defense Force or a County Civil Defense Force, the  
8 reserve officer:

9 “(a) Shall be designated by the reserve officer’s law enforcement  
10 unit as a certified reserve officer; and

11 “(b) May serve as a volunteer in the Oregon State Police Civil De-  
12 fense Force or a County Civil Defense Force under ORS 399.035.

13 “(4)(a) A reserve officer sponsored under this section who has  
14 completed the courses required for certification as a volunteer in the  
15 Oregon State Police Civil Defense Force or a County Civil Defense  
16 Force must remain in the Oregon State Police Civil Defense Force or  
17 a County Civil Defense Force as a certified reserve officer for at least  
18 three years after the reserve officer’s date of certification.

19 “(b) The certification of a reserve officer who does not comply with  
20 paragraph (a) of this subsection may be suspended or revoked pursu-  
21 ant to ORS 181A.630, 181A.640 and 181A.650 if the reserve officer fails  
22 to comply without good cause, as defined by the department by  
23 rule.”.

24 In line 7, delete “2” and insert “3”.

25 In line 32, delete “3” and insert “4”.

26 In line 44, delete “4” and insert “5”.

27 On page 3, line 43, delete “5” and insert “6”.

28 On page 4, line 21, delete “6” and insert “7”.

29 On page 5, line 27, delete “7” and insert “8”.

30 On page 6, line 26, delete “8” and insert “9”.

1 In line 40, delete “9” and insert “10”.

2 On page 7, after line 8, insert:

3 **“SECTION 11.** ORS 181A.355 is amended to read:

4 “181A.355. As used in ORS 181A.355 to 181A.670, unless the context re-  
5 quires otherwise:

6 “(1) ‘Abuse’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 107.705.

7 “(2) ‘Board’ means the Board on Public Safety Standards and Training  
8 appointed pursuant to ORS 181A.360.

9 “(3) ‘Certified reserve officer’ means a reserve officer who has been des-  
10 ignated by a local law enforcement unit, has received training necessary for  
11 certification and has met the minimum standards and training requirements  
12 established under ORS 181A.410.

13 “(4) ‘Commissioned’ means being authorized to perform various acts or  
14 duties of a police officer, certified reserve officer or reserve officer and act-  
15 ing under the supervision and responsibility of a county sheriff or as other-  
16 wise provided by law.

17 “(5) ‘Corrections officer’ means an officer or member employed full-time  
18 by a law enforcement unit who:

19 “(a) Is charged with and primarily performs the duty of custody, control  
20 or supervision of individuals convicted of or arrested for a criminal offense  
21 and confined in a place of incarceration or detention other than a place used  
22 exclusively for incarceration or detention of juveniles; or

23 “(b) Has been certified as a corrections officer described in paragraph (a)  
24 of this subsection and has supervisory or management authority for cor-  
25 rections officers described in paragraph (a) of this subsection.

26 “(6) ‘Department’ means the Department of Public Safety Standards and  
27 Training.

28 “(7) ‘Director’ means the Director of the Department of Public Safety  
29 Standards and Training.

30 “(8) ‘Domestic violence’ means abuse between family or household mem-

1 bers.

2 “(9) ‘Emergency medical dispatcher’ means a person who has responsibil-  
3 ity to process requests for medical assistance from the public or to dispatch  
4 medical care providers.

5 “(10) ‘Family or household members’ has the meaning given that term in  
6 ORS 107.705.

7 “(11) ‘Fire service professional’ means a paid or volunteer firefighter, an  
8 officer or a member of a public or private fire protection agency that is en-  
9 gaged primarily in fire investigation, fire prevention, fire safety, fire control  
10 or fire suppression or providing emergency medical services, light and heavy  
11 rescue services, search and rescue services or hazardous materials incident  
12 response. ‘Fire service professional’ does not mean forest fire protection  
13 agency personnel.

14 “(12) ‘Law enforcement unit’ means:

15 “(a) A police force or organization of the state, a city, university that has  
16 established a police department under ORS 352.121 or 353.125, port, school  
17 district, mass transit district, county, county service district authorized to  
18 provide law enforcement services under ORS 451.010, tribal government as  
19 defined in ORS 181A.680 that employs authorized tribal police officers as  
20 defined in ORS 181A.680, the Criminal Justice Division of the Department  
21 of Justice, the Department of Corrections, the Oregon State Lottery Com-  
22 mission, the Security and Emergency Preparedness Office of the Judicial  
23 Department or common carrier railroad the primary duty of which, as pre-  
24 scribed by law, ordinance or directive, is one or more of the following:

25 “(A) Detecting crime and enforcing the criminal laws of this state or laws  
26 or ordinances relating to airport security;

27 “(B) The custody, control or supervision of individuals convicted of or  
28 arrested for a criminal offense and confined to a place of incarceration or  
29 detention other than a place used exclusively for incarceration or detention  
30 of juveniles; or

1 “(C) The control, supervision and reformation of adult offenders placed  
2 on parole or sentenced to probation and investigation of adult offenders on  
3 parole or probation or being considered for parole or probation;

4 “(b) A police force or organization of a private entity with a population  
5 of more than 1,000 residents in an unincorporated area the employees of  
6 which are commissioned by a county sheriff;

7 “(c) A district attorney’s office;

8 “(d) The Oregon Liquor Control Commission with regard to regulatory  
9 specialists; [*or*]

10 “(e) A humane investigation agency as defined in ORS 181A.340[.]; **or**

11 **“(f) The Oregon State Police Civil Defense Force or a County Civil  
12 Defense Force formed under ORS 399.035.**

13 “(13) ‘Parole and probation officer’ means:

14 “(a) An officer who is employed full-time by the Department of Cor-  
15 rections, a county or a court and who is charged with and performs the duty  
16 of:

17 “(A) Community protection by controlling, investigating, supervising and  
18 providing or making referrals to reformatory services for adult parolees or  
19 probationers or offenders on post-prison supervision; or

20 “(B) Investigating adult offenders on parole or probation or being con-  
21 sidered for parole or probation; or

22 “(b) An officer who:

23 “(A) Is certified and has been employed as a full-time parole and pro-  
24 bation officer for more than one year;

25 “(B) Is employed part-time by the Department of Corrections, a county  
26 or a court; and

27 “(C) Is charged with and performs the duty of:

28 “(i) Community protection by controlling, investigating, supervising and  
29 providing or making referrals to reformatory services for adult parolees or  
30 probationers or offenders on post-prison supervision; or

1 “(ii) Investigating adult offenders on parole or probation or being con-  
2 sidered for parole or probation.

3 “(14) ‘Police officer’ means:

4 “(a) An officer, member or employee of a law enforcement unit employed  
5 full-time as a peace officer who is:

6 “(A) Commissioned by a city, port, school district, mass transit district,  
7 county, county service district authorized to provide law enforcement ser-  
8 vices under ORS 451.010, tribal government as defined in ORS 181A.680, the  
9 Criminal Justice Division of the Department of Justice, the Oregon State  
10 Lottery Commission, a university that has established a police department  
11 under ORS 352.121 or 353.125, the Governor or the Department of State Po-  
12 lice; and

13 “(B) Responsible for enforcing the criminal laws of this state or laws or  
14 ordinances relating to airport security;

15 “(b) An investigator of a district attorney’s office if the investigator is  
16 or has been certified as a peace officer in this or another state;

17 “(c) A humane special agent commissioned under ORS 181A.340;

18 “(d) A judicial marshal appointed under ORS 1.177 who is trained pursu-  
19 ant to ORS 181A.540; or

20 “(e) An authorized tribal police officer as defined in ORS 181A.680.

21 “(15) ‘Public or private safety agency’ means a unit of state or local  
22 government, a special purpose district or a private firm that provides, or has  
23 authority to provide, fire fighting, police, ambulance or emergency medical  
24 services.

25 “(16) ‘Public safety personnel’ and ‘public safety officer’ include cor-  
26 rections officers, youth correction officers, emergency medical dispatchers,  
27 parole and probation officers, police officers, certified reserve officers, re-  
28 serve officers, telecommunicators, regulatory specialists and fire service  
29 professionals.

30 “(17) ‘Regulatory specialist’ has the meaning given that term in ORS

1 471.001.

2 “(18) ‘Reserve officer’ means an officer or member of a law enforcement  
3 unit who is:

4 “(a) A volunteer or employed less than full-time as a peace officer com-  
5 missioned by a city, port, school district, mass transit district, county,  
6 county service district authorized to provide law enforcement services under  
7 ORS 451.010, tribal government as defined in ORS 181A.680, the Criminal  
8 Justice Division of the Department of Justice, the Oregon State Lottery  
9 Commission, a university that has established a police department under  
10 ORS 352.121 or 353.125, the Governor or the Department of State Police;

11 “(b) Armed with a firearm; and

12 “(c) Responsible for enforcing the criminal laws and traffic laws of this  
13 state or laws or ordinances relating to airport security.

14 “(19) ‘Telecommunicator’ means a person employed as an emergency  
15 communications worker as defined in ORS 243.736 or a public safety dis-  
16 patcher whose primary duties are receiving, processing and transmitting  
17 public safety information received through the emergency communications  
18 system as defined in ORS 403.105.

19 “(20) ‘Youth correction officer’ means an employee of the Oregon Youth  
20 Authority who is charged with and primarily performs the duty of custody,  
21 control or supervision of youth offenders confined in a youth correction fa-  
22 cility.

23 **“SECTION 12.** ORS 408.020 is amended to read:

24 “408.020. (1) The Department of Veterans’ Affairs may provide financial  
25 aid to beneficiaries who desire to pursue an approved course of study or  
26 professional training, **including training as a volunteer in the Oregon**  
27 **State Police Civil Defense Force or a County Civil Defense Force under**  
28 **ORS 399.035**, in or in connection with any accredited state or other public  
29 school or accredited private school or accredited college consistent with ORS  
30 408.010 to 408.090.

1       “(2) Financial aid under this section may not exceed \$150 per month for  
2 each month of full-time study or training or \$100 per month for each month  
3 of part-time study or training.

4       “(3) The total number of monthly payments under subsection (2) of this  
5 section may not exceed the total number of months served in the Armed  
6 Forces of the United States or 36, whichever is less.

7       “(4) The Director of Veterans’ Affairs may permit a beneficiary to attend  
8 a school or college outside of this state upon a satisfactory showing that the  
9 training required is not available in an accredited institution within this  
10 state.

11       “(5) A beneficiary may not receive payments or benefits under ORS  
12 408.010 to 408.090 at the same time that the beneficiary is receiving educa-  
13 tional aid under any federal Act based upon prior service in the Armed  
14 Forces. Time spent by a person who applies for benefits under ORS 408.010  
15 to 408.090 in the army specialized training program, the Navy V-12 program  
16 or other like training program may not be counted as service in the Armed  
17 Forces within the purview of ORS 408.010.

18       “**SECTION 13. Section 2 of this 2017 Act becomes operative on July**  
19 **1, 2020.”**

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
