**PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO
SENATE BILL 64**

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, line 3, delete “161.385,”.

2 In line 4, delete “161.390,”.

3 In line 5, delete “419C.533,” and delete “, 419C.542”.

4 After line 5, insert:

5 “Whereas the current Oregon Criminal Code was written in 1971 and in-
6 cluded the defined term ‘mental disease or defect’; and

7 “Whereas the term ‘mental disease or defect’ has origins in mid-19th
8 century English common law; and

9 “Whereas the term ‘mental disease or defect’ may carry a negative
10 connotation; and

11 “Whereas the meaning of the term ‘mental disease or defect’ has been
12 interpreted in multiple court decisions since enactment into law; and

13 “Whereas the Legislative Assembly intends to preserve the validity of all
14 previous court decisions interpreting or otherwise involving the term ‘mental
15 disease or defect’; and

16 “Whereas the purpose of this 2017 Act is to replace the term ‘mental
17 disease or defect’ with the term ‘qualifying mental disorder’ and to retain the
18 meaning of the replaced term, without making a substantive change to
19 Oregon law; now, therefore,”.

20 Delete lines 7 through 27 and delete pages 2 through 28 and insert:

21 **“SECTION 1.** ORS 131.005 is amended to read:

1 “131.005. As used in sections 1 to 311, chapter 836, Oregon Laws 1973,
2 except as otherwise specifically provided or unless the context requires oth-
3 erwise:

4 “(1) ‘Accusatory instrument’ means a grand jury indictment, an informa-
5 tion or a complaint.

6 “(2) ‘Bench warrant’ means a process of a court in which a criminal
7 action is pending, directing a peace officer to take into custody a defendant
8 in the action who has previously appeared before the court upon the
9 accusatory instrument by which the action was commenced, and to bring the
10 defendant before the court. The function of a bench warrant is to achieve
11 the court appearance of a defendant in a criminal action for some purpose
12 other than the initial arraignment of the defendant in the action.

13 “(3) ‘Complaint’ means a written accusation, verified by the oath of a
14 person and bearing an indorsement of acceptance by the district attorney
15 having jurisdiction thereof, filed with a magistrate, and charging another
16 person with the commission of an offense, other than an offense punishable
17 as a felony. A complaint serves both to commence an action and as a basis
18 for prosecution thereof.

19 “(4) ‘Complainant’s information’ means a written accusation, verified by
20 the oath of a person and bearing an indorsement of acceptance by the district
21 attorney having jurisdiction thereof, filed with a magistrate, and charging
22 another person with the commission of an offense punishable as a felony. A
23 complainant’s information serves to commence an action, but not as a basis
24 for prosecution thereof.

25 “(5) ‘Correctional facility’ means any place used for the confinement of
26 persons charged with or convicted of a crime or otherwise confined under a
27 court order. ‘Correctional facility’ does not include a youth correction facil-
28 ity as defined in ORS 162.135 and applies to a state hospital only as to per-
29 sons detained therein charged with or convicted of a crime, or detained
30 therein after [*acquittal of a crime by reason of mental disease or defect*] **being**

1 **found guilty except for insanity** under ORS 161.290 to 161.370.

2 “(6) ‘Criminal action’ means an action at law by means of which a person
3 is accused of the commission of a violation, misdemeanor or felony.

4 “(7) ‘Criminal proceeding’ means any proceeding which constitutes a part
5 of a criminal action or occurs in court in connection with a prospective,
6 pending or completed criminal action.

7 “(8) ‘District attorney,’ in addition to its ordinary meaning, includes a
8 city attorney as prosecuting officer in the case of municipal ordinance of-
9 fenses, a county counsel as prosecuting officer under a county charter in the
10 case of county ordinance offenses, and the Attorney General in those crimi-
11 nal actions or proceedings within the jurisdiction of the Attorney General.

12 “(9) ‘District attorney’s information’ means a written accusation by a
13 district attorney and:

14 “(a) If filed with a magistrate to charge a person with the commission of
15 an offense, other than an offense punishable as a felony, serves both to
16 commence an action and as a basis for prosecution thereof; or

17 “(b) If filed with a magistrate to charge a person with the commission of
18 an offense punishable as a felony, serves to commence an action, but not as
19 a basis for prosecution thereof; or

20 “(c) If, as is otherwise authorized by law, filed in circuit court to charge
21 a person with the commission of an offense, serves as a basis for prosecution
22 thereof.

23 “(10) ‘Information’ means a district attorney’s information or a
24 complainant’s information.

25 “(11) ‘Probable cause’ means that there is a substantial objective basis for
26 believing that more likely than not an offense has been committed and a
27 person to be arrested has committed it.

28 “(12) ‘Trial court’ means a court which by law has jurisdiction over an
29 offense charged in an accusatory instrument and has authority to accept a
30 plea thereto, or try, hear or otherwise dispose of a criminal action based on

1 the accusatory instrument.

2 “(13) ‘Ultimate trial jurisdiction’ means the jurisdiction of a court over
3 a criminal action or proceeding at the highest trial level.

4 “(14) ‘Warrant of arrest’ means a process of a court, directing a peace
5 officer to arrest a defendant and to bring the defendant before the court for
6 the purpose of arraignment upon an accusatory instrument filed therewith
7 by which a criminal action against the defendant has been commenced.

8 **“SECTION 2.** ORS 135.748 is amended to read:

9 “135.748. (1) All applicable periods of elapsed time as follows are excluded
10 from the time limits described in ORS 135.746:

11 “(a) A period of time during which the defendant is:

12 “(A) Under observation or examination for fitness to proceed under ORS
13 161.365, beginning when the issue of the defendant’s possible lack of fitness
14 to proceed has been raised by the defendant or the defendant’s counsel, until
15 a final determination regarding the defendant’s fitness to proceed has been
16 made by the court;

17 “(B) Determined to be unfit to proceed by the court pursuant to ORS
18 161.360 and 161.370;

19 “(C) Under observation or examination after notice of the issue of the
20 defendant’s **qualifying** mental [*disease or defect*] **disorder**, partial responsi-
21 bility, diminished capacity, insanity or other mental defense is raised by the
22 defendant or the defendant’s counsel, until the trial date; or

23 “(D) Unable to appear by reason of illness or physical disability.

24 “(b) A period of time following the filing of an interlocutory appeal or
25 an appeal from the dismissal of the charge or charging instrument, or that
26 results from a stay issued by an appellate court in a mandamus or habeas
27 proceeding, until the appellate judgment is issued or the stay is lifted by the
28 appellate court.

29 “(c) A period of time between a scheduled court appearance at which the
30 defendant fails to appear and the next scheduled court appearance other than

1 an appearance that occurs for the purpose of addressing a warrant resulting
2 from the defendant's failure to appear.

3 "(d) A period of time during which the defendant's location is known but
4 the defendant's presence for trial cannot be obtained, or during which the
5 defendant is outside this state and resists being returned to this state for
6 trial.

7 "(e) A period of time during which the defendant's location is unknown
8 and:

9 "(A) The defendant has attempted to avoid apprehension or prosecution;
10 or

11 "(B) The defendant's location cannot be determined by due diligence.

12 "(f) A period of time while the defendant is on trial or engaged in court
13 proceedings in an unrelated matter, whether in the same court or a different
14 court, and was therefore physically unavailable for trial.

15 "(g) A period of time between a mistrial on the charging instrument and
16 a subsequent trial on the charging instrument, not to exceed three months
17 for each mistrial. The three-month limit may be extended by the court for
18 good cause upon request from either party or upon the court's own motion.

19 "(h) A period of time between a continuance or a rescheduling of a trial
20 date, granted at the request of, or with the consent of, the defendant or the
21 defendant's counsel, and the new trial date. A defendant who is proceeding
22 without counsel may not consent to a continuance or a rescheduling unless
23 the court has advised the defendant of the defendant's right to a speedy trial
24 within the time limit required in ORS 135.746 and the consequences of the
25 defendant's consent to the continuance or rescheduling.

26 "(2) Any period of time excluded pursuant to subsection (1) of this section
27 from the time limits described in ORS 135.746 that applies to a defendant
28 shall apply to all other defendants charged in the charging instrument.
29 However, if the court finds that it is clearly inappropriate to apply the time
30 exclusion to all of the other defendants, the court may order any relief that

1 justice requires.

2 **“SECTION 3.** ORS 161.295 is amended to read:

3 “161.295. (1) A person is guilty except for insanity if, as a result of a
4 **qualifying** mental [*disease or defect*] **disorder** at the time of engaging in
5 criminal conduct, the person lacks substantial capacity either to appreciate
6 the criminality of the conduct or to conform the conduct to the requirements
7 of law.

8 “(2) As used in chapter 743, Oregon Laws 1971, the [*terms ‘mental disease*
9 *or defect’ do*] **term ‘qualifying mental disorder’ does** not include an
10 abnormality manifested only by repeated criminal or otherwise antisocial
11 conduct, nor [*do they*] **does the term** include any abnormality constituting
12 solely a personality disorder.

13 **“SECTION 4.** ORS 161.300 is amended to read:

14 “161.300. Evidence that the actor suffered from a **qualifying** mental [*dis-*
15 *ease or defect*] **disorder** is admissible whenever it is relevant to the issue of
16 whether the actor did or did not have the intent which is an element of the
17 crime.

18 **“SECTION 5.** ORS 161.305 is amended to read:

19 “161.305. **Qualifying** mental [*disease or defect*] **disorder** constituting in-
20 sanity under ORS 161.295 is an affirmative defense.

21 **“SECTION 6.** ORS 161.325 is amended to read:

22 “161.325. (1) After entry of judgment of guilty except for insanity, the
23 court shall, on the basis of the evidence given at the trial or at a separate
24 hearing, if requested by either party, enter an order as provided in ORS
25 161.327, 161.328 or 161.329, whichever is appropriate.

26 “(2) If the court enters an order as provided in ORS 161.327, it shall also:

27 “(a) Determine on the record the offense of which the person otherwise
28 would have been convicted;

29 “(b) State on the record the **qualifying** mental [*disease or defect*] **disorder**
30 on which the defendant relied for the guilty except for insanity defense; and

1 “(c) Make specific findings on whether there is a victim of the crime for
2 which the defendant has been found guilty except for insanity and, if so,
3 whether the victim wishes to be notified, under ORS 161.326, of any hearings
4 and orders concerning the defendant and of any conditional release, dis-
5 charge or escape of the defendant.

6 “(3) The court shall include any such findings in its order.

7 “(4) Except under circumstances described in ORS 137.076 (4), whenever
8 a defendant charged with any offense listed in ORS 137.076 (1) has been
9 found guilty of that offense except for insanity, the court shall, in any order
10 entered under ORS 161.327, **161.328** or 161.329, direct the defendant to submit
11 to the obtaining of a blood or buccal sample in the manner provided in ORS
12 137.076.

13 **“SECTION 7.** ORS 161.327 is amended to read:

14 “161.327. (1) Following the entry of a judgment pursuant to ORS 161.319,
15 if the court finds by a preponderance of the evidence that a person found
16 guilty except for insanity of a felony is affected by **a qualifying** mental
17 [*disease or defect*] **disorder** and presents a substantial danger to others, the
18 court shall enter an order as follows:

19 “(a) If the court finds that the person is not a proper subject for condi-
20 tional release, the court shall order the person committed to a state hospital
21 or, if the person is under 18 years of age, to a secure intensive community
22 inpatient facility for custody, care and treatment. When the court orders a
23 person committed under this paragraph, the court shall place the person
24 under the jurisdiction of:

25 “(A) The Psychiatric Security Review Board, if the person is a tier one
26 offender.

27 “(B) The Oregon Health Authority, if the person is a tier two offender.

28 “(b) If the court finds that the person can be adequately controlled with
29 supervision and treatment if conditionally released and that necessary
30 supervision and treatment are available, the court shall order the person

1 conditionally released.

2 “(2) When a person is conditionally released under this section, the per-
3 son is subject to those supervisory orders of the court as are in the best in-
4 terests of justice, the protection of society and the welfare of the person. The
5 court shall designate a person or state, county or local agency to supervise
6 the person upon release, subject to those conditions as the court directs in
7 the order for conditional release. Prior to the designation, the court shall
8 notify the person or agency to whom conditional release is contemplated and
9 provide the person or agency an opportunity to be heard before the court.
10 After receiving an order entered under subsection (1)(b) of this section, the
11 person or agency designated shall assume supervision of the person pursuant
12 to the direction of the Psychiatric Security Review Board. The person or
13 agency designated as supervisor shall be required to report in writing no less
14 than once per month to the board concerning the supervised person’s com-
15 pliance with the conditions of release.

16 “(3) In determining whether a person should be conditionally released, the
17 court:

18 “(a) May order evaluations, examinations and compliance as provided in
19 ORS 161.336 (3) and 161.346 (3);

20 “(b) Shall order that the person be examined by a local mental health
21 program designated by the board and a report of the examination be provided
22 to the court if each felony for which the defendant was found guilty except
23 for insanity is a Class C felony; and

24 “(c) Shall have as its primary concern the protection of society.

25 “(4) Upon placing a person on conditional release, the court shall notify
26 the board in writing of the court’s conditional release order, the supervisor
27 appointed and all other conditions of release, and the person shall be on
28 conditional release pending hearing before the board. Upon compliance with
29 this section, the court’s jurisdiction over the person is terminated.

30 “(5) The total period of commitment or conditional release under ORS

1 161.315 to 161.351 may not exceed the maximum sentence provided by statute
2 for the crime for which the person was found guilty except for insanity.

3 “(6) An order of the court under this section is a final order appealable
4 by the person found guilty except for insanity in accordance with ORS 19.205
5 (5). Notwithstanding ORS 19.255, notice of an appeal under this section shall
6 be served and filed within 90 days after the order appealed from is entered
7 in the register. The person shall be entitled on appeal to suitable counsel
8 possessing skills and experience commensurate with the nature and com-
9 plexity of the case. If the person is financially eligible, suitable counsel shall
10 be appointed in the manner provided in ORS 138.500 (1), and the compen-
11 sation for counsel and costs and expenses of the person necessary to the
12 appeal shall be determined and paid as provided in ORS 138.500.

13 “(7) Following the entry of an order described in subsection (1) of this
14 section, the court shall notify the person of the right to appeal and the right
15 to a hearing before the agency exercising jurisdiction over the person in
16 accordance with ORS 161.336 (5) and 161.341 (3).

17 **“SECTION 8.** ORS 161.328 is amended to read:

18 “161.328. (1) Following the entry of a judgment pursuant to ORS 161.319,
19 the court shall order a person committed to a state mental hospital or other
20 facility designated by the Oregon Health Authority if:

21 “(a) Each offense for which the person is found guilty except for insanity
22 is a misdemeanor; and

23 “(b) The court finds that the person is affected by a **qualifying** mental
24 [*disease or defect*] **disorder** and presents a substantial danger to others that
25 requires commitment.

26 “(2) The total period of commitment under this section may not exceed
27 the maximum sentence provided by statute for the crime for which the person
28 was found guilty except for insanity.

29 “(3) If the superintendent of the state mental hospital or the director of
30 the facility to which the person is committed determines that a person com-

1 mitted under this section is no longer affected by a **qualifying** mental [*dis-*
2 *ease or defect*] **disorder** or, if so affected, no longer presents a substantial
3 danger to others that requires commitment, the superintendent or director
4 shall file notice of that determination with the committing court. Upon filing
5 of the notice, the superintendent or director shall discharge the person from
6 custody.

7 **“SECTION 9.** ORS 161.329 is amended to read:

8 “161.329. Following the entry of a judgment pursuant to ORS 161.319, the
9 court shall order that the person be discharged from custody if:

10 “(1) The court finds that the person is no longer affected by a **qualifying**
11 mental [*disease or defect*] **disorder**, or, if so affected, no longer presents a
12 substantial danger to others and is not in need of care, supervision or
13 treatment; or

14 “(2)(a) Each offense for which the person is found guilty except for in-
15 sanity is a misdemeanor; and

16 “(b) The court finds that the person does not present a substantial danger
17 to others that requires commitment.

18 **“SECTION 10.** ORS 161.336 is amended to read:

19 “161.336. (1)(a) When a person is conditionally released under ORS 161.315
20 to 161.351, the person is subject to those supervisory orders of the Psychiat-
21 ric Security Review Board as are in the best interests of justice, the pro-
22 tection of society and the welfare of the person.

23 “(b) An order of conditional release entered by the board or the Oregon
24 Health Authority may designate any person or state, county or local agency
25 capable of supervising the person upon release, subject to the conditions
26 described in the order of conditional release.

27 “(c) Prior to the designation, the agency conducting the hearing shall
28 notify the person or state, county or local agency to whom conditional re-
29 lease is contemplated and provide the person or state, county or local agency
30 an opportunity to be heard.

1 “(d) After receiving an order entered under this section, the person or
2 state, county or local agency designated in the order shall assume super-
3 vision of the person in accordance with the conditions described in the order
4 and any modifications of the conditions ordered by the board.

5 “(2) Conditions of release contained in orders entered under this section
6 may be modified from time to time and conditional releases may be termi-
7 nated as provided in ORS 161.351.

8 “(3)(a) As a condition of release, the person may be required to report to
9 any state or local mental health facility for evaluation. Whenever medical,
10 psychiatric or psychological treatment is recommended, the order may re-
11 quire the person, as a condition of release, to cooperate with and accept the
12 treatment from the facility.

13 “(b) The facility to which the person has been referred for evaluation
14 shall perform the evaluation and submit a written report of its findings to
15 the board. If the facility finds that treatment of the person is appropriate,
16 it shall include its recommendations for treatment in the report to the board.

17 “(c) Whenever treatment is provided by the facility, it shall furnish re-
18 ports to the board on a regular basis concerning the progress of the person.

19 “(d) Copies of all reports submitted to the board pursuant to this section
20 shall be furnished to the person and the person’s counsel. The confidentiality
21 of these reports is determined pursuant to ORS 192.501 to 192.505.

22 “(e) The facility shall comply with the conditional release order and any
23 modifications of the conditions ordered by the board.

24 “(4)(a) If at any time while the person is under the jurisdiction of the
25 board it appears to the board or its chairperson that the person has violated
26 the terms of the conditional release or that the mental health of the indi-
27 vidual has changed, the board or its chairperson may order the person re-
28 turned for evaluation or treatment to a state hospital or, if the person is
29 under 18 years of age, to a secure intensive community inpatient facility. A
30 written order of the board, or its chairperson on behalf of the board, is suf-

1 ficient warrant for any law enforcement officer to take into custody such
2 person and transport the person accordingly. A sheriff, municipal police of-
3 ficer, constable, parole and probation officer, prison official or other peace
4 officer shall execute the order, and the person shall be returned as soon as
5 practicable to the state hospital or secure intensive community inpatient
6 facility designated in the order.

7 “(b) The community mental health program director, the director of the
8 facility providing treatment to a person on conditional release, any peace
9 officer or any person responsible for the supervision of a person on condi-
10 tional release may take a person on conditional release into custody or re-
11 quest that the person be taken into custody if there is reasonable cause to
12 believe the person is a substantial danger to others because of **a qualifying**
13 mental [*disease or defect*] **disorder** and that the person is in need of imme-
14 diate care, custody or treatment. Any person taken into custody pursuant to
15 this subsection shall be transported as soon as practicable to a state hospital
16 or, if the person is under 18 years of age, to a secure intensive community
17 inpatient facility.

18 “(c) Within 20 days following the return of the person to a state hospital
19 or secure intensive community inpatient facility under this subsection, the
20 agency having jurisdiction over the person shall conduct a hearing. The
21 agency shall provide notice of the hearing to the person, the attorney re-
22 presenting the person and the Attorney General. The state must prove by a
23 preponderance of the evidence the person’s unfitness for conditional release.
24 The hearing shall be conducted in accordance with ORS 161.346.

25 “(5)(a) Any person conditionally released under this section may apply to
26 the board for discharge from or modification of an order of conditional re-
27 lease on the ground that the person is no longer affected by **a qualifying**
28 mental [*disease or defect*] **disorder** or, if still so affected, no longer presents
29 a substantial danger to others and no longer requires supervision,
30 medication, care or treatment. Notice of the hearing on an application for

1 discharge or modification of an order of conditional release shall be made
2 to the Attorney General. The applicant, at the hearing pursuant to this
3 subsection, must prove by a preponderance of the evidence the applicant's
4 fitness for discharge or modification of the order of conditional release.
5 Applications by the person for discharge or modification of conditional re-
6 lease may not be filed more often than once every six months.

7 “(b) Upon application by any person or agency responsible for supervision
8 or treatment pursuant to an order of conditional release, the board shall
9 conduct a hearing to determine if the conditions of release shall be contin-
10 ued, modified or terminated. The application shall be accompanied by a re-
11 port setting forth the facts supporting the application.

12 “(6) A person who has spent five years on conditional release shall be
13 brought before the board for hearing within 30 days before the expiration
14 of the five-year period. The board shall review the person's status and de-
15 termine whether the person should be discharged from the jurisdiction of the
16 board.

17 **“SECTION 11.** ORS 161.341 is amended to read:

18 “161.341. (1) If at any time after a person is committed under ORS 161.315
19 to 161.351 to a state hospital or a secure intensive community inpatient fa-
20 cility, the superintendent of the hospital or the director of the secure inten-
21 sive community inpatient facility is of the opinion that the person is no
22 longer affected by **a qualifying** mental [*disease or defect*] **disorder**, or, if so
23 affected, no longer presents a substantial danger to others or that the person
24 continues to be affected by **a qualifying** mental [*disease or defect*] **disorder**
25 and continues to be a danger to others, but that the person can be controlled
26 with proper care, medication, supervision and treatment if conditionally re-
27 leased, the superintendent or director shall apply to the agency having ju-
28 risdiction over the person for an order of discharge or conditional release.
29 The application shall be accompanied by a report setting forth the facts
30 supporting the opinion of the superintendent or director. If the application

1 is for conditional release, the application must be accompanied by a verified
2 conditional release plan. The agency shall hold a hearing on the application
3 within 60 days of its receipt. Not less than 20 days prior to the hearing be-
4 fore the agency, copies of the report shall be sent to the Attorney General.

5 “(2) The attorney representing the state may choose a psychiatrist or li-
6 censed psychologist to examine the person prior to the initial or any later
7 decision by the agency having jurisdiction over the person on discharge or
8 conditional release. The results of the examination shall be in writing and
9 filed with the agency, and shall include, but need not be limited to, an
10 opinion as to the mental condition of the person, whether the person presents
11 a substantial danger to others and whether the person could be adequately
12 controlled with treatment as a condition of release.

13 “(3) Any person who has been committed to a state hospital, or to a se-
14 cure intensive community inpatient facility, for custody, care and treatment
15 under ORS 161.315 to 161.351, or another person acting on the person’s be-
16 half, may apply to the agency having jurisdiction over the person for an or-
17 der of discharge or conditional release upon the grounds:

18 “(a) That the person is no longer affected by a **qualifying** mental [*disease*
19 *or defect*] **disorder**;

20 “(b) That the person, if so affected, no longer presents a substantial dan-
21 ger to others; or

22 “(c) That the person continues to be affected by a **qualifying** mental
23 [*disease or defect*] **disorder** and would continue to be a danger to others
24 without treatment, but that the person can be adequately controlled and
25 given proper care and treatment if placed on conditional release.

26 “(4) When application is made under subsection (3) of this section, the
27 agency having jurisdiction over the person shall require that a report from
28 the superintendent of the hospital or the director of the secure intensive
29 community inpatient facility be prepared and transmitted as provided in
30 subsection (1) of this section. The applicant must prove by a preponderance

1 of the evidence the applicant’s fitness for discharge or conditional release
2 under the standards of subsection (3) of this section, unless more than two
3 years has passed since the state had the burden of proof on that issue, in
4 which case the state shall have the burden of proving by a preponderance
5 of the evidence the applicant’s lack of fitness for discharge or conditional
6 release. Applications for discharge or conditional release under subsection
7 (3) of this section may not be filed more often than once every six months
8 commencing with the date of the initial agency hearing.

9 “(5) The agency having jurisdiction over the person is not required to
10 hold a hearing on a first application under subsection (3) of this section any
11 sooner than 90 days after the initial hearing. Hearings resulting from any
12 subsequent requests shall be held within 60 days of the filing of the appli-
13 cation.

14 “(6)(a) In no case shall a person committed by the court under ORS
15 161.327 to a state hospital, or to a secure intensive community inpatient fa-
16 cility, be held in the hospital or facility for more than 90 days from the date
17 of the court’s commitment order without an initial hearing before the agency
18 having jurisdiction over the person to determine whether the person should
19 be conditionally released or discharged.

20 “(b) In no case shall a person be held pursuant to this section for a period
21 of time exceeding two years without a hearing before the agency to deter-

23 **“SECTION 12.** ORS 161.346 is amended to read:

24 “161.346. (1) When the Psychiatric Security Review Board or the Oregon
25 Health Authority conducts a hearing under ORS 161.315 to 161.351, the
26 agency conducting the hearing shall enter an order and make findings in
27 support of the order. If the agency finds that a person under the jurisdiction
28 of the agency:

29 “(a) Is no longer affected by a **qualifying** mental [*disease or defect*] **dis-**
30 **order**, or, if so affected, no longer presents a substantial danger to others,

1 the agency shall order the person discharged from commitment and condi-
2 tional release.

3 “(b) Is still affected by a **qualifying** mental [*disease or defect*] **disorder**
4 and is a substantial danger to others, but can be controlled adequately if
5 conditionally released with treatment as a condition of release, the agency
6 shall order the person conditionally released as provided in ORS 161.336.

7 “(c) Has not recovered from the **qualifying** mental [*disease or defect*]
8 **disorder**, is a substantial danger to others and cannot adequately be con-
9 trolled if conditionally released on supervision, the agency shall order the
10 person committed to, or retained in, a state hospital, or if the person is under
11 18 years of age, a secure intensive community inpatient facility, for care,
12 custody and treatment.

13 “(2)(a) Except as otherwise provided in ORS 161.349, the Psychiatric Se-
14 curity Review Board shall exercise exclusive jurisdiction over a tier one
15 offender until the board discharges the person from the jurisdiction of the
16 board or the maximum period of jurisdiction expires.

17 “(b) When the board orders a tier two offender committed to a state hos-
18 pital, or a secure intensive community inpatient facility, under ORS 161.315
19 to 161.351, the order shall transfer jurisdiction over the person to the Oregon
20 Health Authority.

21 “(c) When the authority orders a tier two offender conditionally released
22 under ORS 161.315 to 161.351, the order shall transfer jurisdiction over the
23 person to the board.

24 “(d) The authority shall assume jurisdiction over a tier two offender when
25 the person is returned to a state hospital, or to a secure intensive community
26 inpatient facility, under ORS 161.336 (4).

27 “(3) To assist the agency in making the determination described in sub-
28 section (1) of this section, the agency exercising jurisdiction over the person
29 may, at any time, appoint a psychiatrist or licensed psychologist to examine
30 the person and to submit a report to the agency. The report must include

1 an opinion as to the mental condition of the person, whether the person
2 presents a substantial danger to others and whether the person could be ad-
3 equately controlled with treatment as a condition of release.

4 “(4) The agency exercising jurisdiction over the person may make the
5 determination regarding discharge or conditional release based upon the
6 written reports submitted pursuant to this section. If the authority or any
7 member of the board desires further information from the examining psychi-
8 atrist or licensed psychologist who submitted the report, the agency shall
9 summon the person to give testimony. The agency shall consider all evidence
10 available to it that is material, relevant and reliable regarding the issues
11 before the agency. The evidence may include but is not limited to the record
12 of trial, the information supplied by the attorney representing the state or
13 by any other interested party, including the person, and information con-
14 cerning the person’s mental condition and the entire psychiatric and criminal
15 history of the person. All evidence of a type commonly relied upon by rea-
16 sonably prudent persons in the conduct of their serious affairs shall be ad-
17 missible at hearings. Testimony shall be taken upon oath or affirmation of
18 the witness from whom received. The officer presiding at the hearing shall
19 administer oaths or affirmations to witnesses.

20 “(5) The agency exercising jurisdiction over the person shall furnish to
21 the person about whom the hearing is being conducted, the attorney repre-
22 senting the person, the Attorney General, the district attorney and the court
23 or department of the county from which the person was committed written
24 notice of any hearing pending under this section within a reasonable time
25 prior to the hearing. The notice shall include:

26 “(a) The time, place and location of the hearing.

27 “(b) The nature of the hearing and the specific action for which a hearing
28 has been requested, the issues to be considered at the hearing and a refer-
29 ence to the particular sections of the statutes and rules involved.

30 “(c) A statement of the legal authority and jurisdiction under which the

1 hearing is to be held.

2 “(d) A statement of all rights under subsection (7) of this section.

3 “(6) Prior to the commencement of the hearing, the agency shall serve
4 personally or by mail a written notice to each party as provided in ORS
5 183.413 (2).

6 “(7) At the hearing, the person about whom the hearing is being held
7 shall have the right:

8 “(a) To appear at all proceedings held pursuant to this section, except for
9 deliberations.

10 “(b) To cross-examine all witnesses appearing to testify at the hearing.

11 “(c) To subpoena witnesses and documents as provided in ORS 161.395.

12 “(d) To be represented by suitable legal counsel possessing skills and ex-
13 perience commensurate with the nature and complexity of the case, to con-
14 sult with counsel prior to the hearing and, if financially eligible, to have
15 suitable counsel appointed at state expense.

16 “(e) To examine all information, documents and reports that the agency
17 considers. If then available to the agency, the information, documents and
18 reports shall be disclosed to the person so as to allow examination prior to
19 the hearing.

20 “(8) A record shall be kept of all hearings conducted under ORS 161.315
21 to 161.351, except for deliberations.

22 “(9) Upon request of any party, or on motion of the agency conducting
23 the hearing, the hearing may be continued for a reasonable period not to
24 exceed 60 days to obtain additional information or testimony or for other
25 good cause shown.

26 “(10) Within 15 days following the conclusion of the hearing, the agency
27 shall provide to the person, the attorney representing the person, the Attor-
28 ney General or other attorney representing the state, if any, written notice
29 of the order entered by the agency.

30 “(11) The burden of proof on all issues at hearings under ORS 161.315 to

1 161.351 shall be by a preponderance of the evidence.

2 “(12) If the agency conducting the hearing determines that the person
3 about whom the hearing is being held is financially eligible, the agency shall
4 appoint suitable counsel to represent the person. Counsel so appointed shall
5 be an attorney who satisfies the professional qualifications established by
6 the Public Defense Services Commission under ORS 151.216. The public de-
7 fense services executive director shall determine and allow fair compensation
8 for counsel appointed under this subsection and the reasonable expenses of
9 the person in respect to the hearing. Compensation payable to appointed
10 counsel shall not be less than the applicable compensation level established
11 under ORS 151.216. The compensation and expenses so allowed shall be paid
12 by the public defense services executive director from funds available for the

14 “(13) The Attorney General may represent the state at contested hearings
15 under ORS 161.315 to 161.351 unless the district attorney of the county from

27 over the person, upon a hearing, finds by a preponderance of the evidence
28 that the person is no longer affected by **a qualifying** mental [*disease or de-*
29 *fect*] **disorder** or, if so affected, no longer presents a substantial danger to
30 others that requires regular medical care, medication, supervision or treat-

1 ment.

2 “(2) For purposes of ORS 161.315 to 161.351, a person affected by a **qual-**
3 **ifying** mental [*disease or defect*] **disorder** in a state of remission is consid-
4 ered to have a **qualifying** mental [*disease or defect*] **disorder**. A person
5 whose **qualifying** mental [*disease or defect*] **disorder** may, with reasonable
6 medical probability, occasionally become active and when it becomes active
7 will render the person a danger to others may not be discharged. The person
8 shall continue under supervision and treatment necessary to protect the

11 hospital or secure intensive community inpatient facility, conditionally re-
12 leased or discharged, the board and the authority shall have as their primary
13 concern the protection of society.

15 “161.360. (1) If, before or during the trial in any criminal case, the court
16 has reason to doubt the defendant’s fitness to proceed by reason of incapac-
17 ity, the court may order an examination in the manner provided in ORS
18 161.365.

19 “(2) A defendant may be found incapacitated if, as a result of a **qualify-**
20 **ing** mental [*disease or defect*] **disorder**, the defendant is unable:

21 “(a) To understand the nature of the proceedings against the defendant;
22 or

23 “(b) To assist and cooperate with the counsel of the defendant; or

24 “(c) To participate in the defense of the defendant.

25 **“SECTION 15.** ORS 161.365 is amended to read:

26 “161.365. (1) When the court has reason to doubt the defendant’s fitness
27 to proceed by reason of incapacity as described in ORS 161.360, the court
28 may call any witness to its assistance in reaching its decision and shall order
29 that a community mental health program director or the director’s designee
30 consult with the defendant to determine whether services and supervision

1 necessary to safely restore the defendant's fitness to proceed are available
2 in the community. After the consultation, the program director or the
3 director's designee shall provide to the court a copy of the findings resulting
4 from the consultation. If the court determines the assistance of a psychiatrist
5 or psychologist would be helpful, the court may:

6 “(a) Order that a psychiatric or psychological examination of the defend-
7 ant be conducted by a certified evaluator as defined in ORS 161.309 and a
8 report of the examination be prepared; or

9 “(b) Order the defendant to be committed for the purpose of an examina-
10 tion for a period not exceeding 30 days to a state mental hospital or other
11 facility designated by the Oregon Health Authority if the defendant is at
12 least 18 years of age, or to a secure intensive community inpatient facility
13 designated by the authority if the defendant is under 18 years of age.

14 “(2) The report of an examination described in this section must include,
15 but is not necessarily limited to, the following:

16 “(a) A description of the nature of the examination;

17 “(b) A statement of the mental condition of the defendant;

18 “(c) If the defendant suffers from a **qualifying** mental [*disease or defect*]
19 **disorder**, an opinion as to whether the defendant is incapacitated within the
20 description set out in ORS 161.360; and

21 “(d) If the defendant is incapacitated within the description set out in
22 ORS 161.360, a recommendation of treatment and services necessary to re-

24 “(3) Except when the defendant and the court both request to the con-
25 trary, the report may not contain any findings or conclusions as to whether

5 “(5) The report shall be filed in triplicate with the clerk of the court, who
6 shall cause copies to be delivered to the district attorney and to counsel for
7 defendant.

8 “(6)(a) When upon motion of the court or a financially eligible defendant,
9 the court has ordered a psychiatric or psychological examination of the de-
10 fendant, a county or justice court shall order the county to pay, and a circuit
11 court shall order the public defense services executive director to pay from
12 funds available for the purpose:

13 “(A) A reasonable fee if the examination of the defendant is conducted
14 by a psychiatrist or psychologist in private practice; and

15 “(B) All costs including transportation of the defendant if the examina-

26 “**SECTION 16.** ORS 161.370 is amended to read:

27 “161.370. (1) When the defendant’s fitness to proceed is drawn in question,
28 the issue shall be determined by the court. If neither the prosecuting attor-
29 ney nor counsel for the defendant contests the finding of the report filed
30 under ORS 161.365, the court may make the determination on the basis of the

1 report. If the finding is contested, the court shall hold a hearing on the issue.
2 If the report is received in evidence in the hearing, the party who contests
3 the finding has the right to summon and to cross-examine any psychiatrist
4 or psychologist who submitted the report and to offer evidence upon the is-
5 sue. Other evidence regarding the defendant's fitness to proceed may be in-
6 troduced by either party.

7 “(2) If the court determines that the defendant lacks fitness to proceed,

25 of this section, the court may place conditions that the court deems appro-

17 “(a) Immediately notify the committing court if the defendant, at any
18 time, gains or regains the capacity to stand trial or will never have the ca-

20 “(b) Within 90 days of the defendant’s delivery into the superintendent’s
21 or director’s custody, notify the committing court that:

22 “(A) The defendant has the present capacity to stand trial;

23 “(B) There is no substantial probability that, in the foreseeable future, the
24 defendant will gain or regain the capacity to stand trial; or

25 “(C) There is a substantial probability that, in the foreseeable future, the
26 defendant will gain or regain the capacity to stand trial. If the probability
27 exists, the superintendent or director shall give the court an estimate of the
28 time in which the defendant, with appropriate treatment, is expected to gain
29 or regain capacity.

30 “(6)(a) If the superintendent or director determines that there is a sub-

1 stantial probability that, in the foreseeable future, the defendant will gain
2 or regain the capacity to stand trial, unless the court otherwise orders, the
3 defendant shall remain in the superintendent's or director's custody where
4 the defendant shall receive treatment designed for the purpose of enabling
5 the defendant to gain or regain capacity. In keeping with the notice re-
6 quirement under subsection (5)(b) of this section, the superintendent or di-
7 rector shall, for the duration of the defendant's period of commitment, submit
8 a progress report to the committing court, concerning the defendant's ca-

30 of the court and delivered to both the district attorney and the counsel for

2 “(12) If the defendant gains or regains fitness to proceed, the term of any
3 sentence received by the defendant for conviction of the crime charged shall
4 be reduced by the amount of time the defendant was committed under this
5 section to the custody of a state mental hospital, or to the custody of a se-
6 cure intensive community inpatient facility, designated by the Oregon Health
7 Authority.

8 “(13) Notwithstanding the suspension of the criminal proceeding under
9 subsection (2) of this section, the fact that the defendant is unfit to proceed
10 does not preclude any objection through counsel and without the personal
11 participation of the defendant on the grounds that the indictment is insuffi-
12 cient, that the statute of limitations has run, that double jeopardy principles
13 apply or upon any other ground at the discretion of the court which the
14 court deems susceptible of fair determination prior to trial.

16 “163.305. As used in chapter 743, Oregon Laws 1971, unless the context
17 requires otherwise:

18 “(1) ‘Deviate sexual intercourse’ means sexual conduct between persons
19 consisting of contact between the sex organs of one person and the mouth
20 or anus of another.

21 “(2) ‘Forcible compulsion’ means to compel by:

22 “(a) Physical force; or

23 “(b) A threat, express or implied, that places a person in fear of immediate
24 or future death or physical injury to self or another person, or in fear that
25 the person or another person will immediately or in the future be kidnapped.

26 “(3) ‘Mentally defective’ means that a person suffers from a **qualifying**
27 mental [*disease or defect*] **disorder** that renders the person incapable of ap-
28 praising the nature of the conduct of the person.

29 “(4) ‘Mentally incapacitated’ means that a person is rendered incapable
30 of appraising or controlling the conduct of the person at the time of the al-

4 “(6) ‘Sexual contact’ means any touching of the sexual or other intimate
5 parts of a person or causing such person to touch the sexual or other inti-
6 mate parts of the actor for the purpose of arousing or gratifying the sexual
7 desire of either party.

8 “(7) ‘Sexual intercourse’ has its ordinary meaning and occurs upon any
9 penetration, however slight; emission is not required.

10 **“SECTION 18.** ORS 408.580 is amended to read:

11 “408.580. Upon receipt of a certificate of eligibility and available facili-
12 ties, the Oregon Health Authority may cause to be transferred any veteran
13 from any facility to which the veteran has been assigned to a United States
14 veterans facility. No veteran under sentence by any court, or committed by
15 any court after having been charged with any crime and [*acquitted on the*
16 *ground of mental disease or defect*] **found guilty except for insanity**, may
17 be transferred without an order of such court authorizing the transfer.
18 Whenever any veteran, not a convict, has been committed by order of a court
19 and is transferred as provided in this section, the order of commitment shall
20 be held to apply to the facility to which the veteran is transferred as to any
21 other facility to which the veteran could be assigned or transferred under
22 ORS 426.060.

23 **“SECTION 19.** ORS 419C.378 is amended to read:

24 “419C.378. (1) A court may find that a youth is unfit to proceed in a
25 proceeding initiated by a petition alleging jurisdiction under ORS 419C.005
26 if, as a result of **a qualifying** mental [*disease or defect*] **disorder** or another
27 condition, the youth is unable:

28 “(a) To understand the nature of the proceedings against the youth;

29 “(b) To assist and cooperate with the counsel for the youth; or

30 “(c) To participate in the defense of the youth.

1 “(2) A court may not find that a youth is unfit to proceed in a proceeding
2 solely because:

3 “(a) Of the age of the youth;

4 “(b) Of the current inability of the youth to remember the acts alleged in
5 the petition; or

6 “(c) Evidence exists that the youth committed the acts alleged in the pe-
7 tition while the youth was under the influence of intoxicants or medication.

8 “(3) The issue of fitness to proceed must be raised by written motion filed
9 by a party to the proceeding or by the court on its own motion. The motion
10 may be made at any time after the filing of the petition. The court shall stay
11 the proceedings on the petition after the motion is made and may order the
12 youth to participate in an evaluation under ORS 419C.380 to determine the
13 youth’s fitness to proceed if the court determines that:

14 “(a) There is reason to doubt the youth’s fitness to proceed; and

15 “(b) There is probable cause to believe that the factual allegations con-

23 “**SECTION 20.** ORS 419C.386 is amended to read:

24 “419C.386. (1)(a) If a party to a proceeding under ORS 419C.378 raises the
25 issue of fitness to proceed, the party shall file the original report on the
26 evaluation conducted under ORS 419C.380 with the clerk of the court and
27 deliver copies of the report to all parties to the proceeding.

28 “(b) If the court raises the issue of fitness to proceed under ORS 419C.378,
29 the person conducting the evaluation under ORS 419C.380 shall file with the

15 “(d) If the evaluator is of the opinion that the youth is unfit to proceed,
16 the evaluator’s opinion regarding whether there is a substantial probability
17 that the youth will gain or regain fitness to proceed and, if there is a sub-
18 stantial probability that the youth will gain or regain fitness to proceed, the
19 specific restorative services under ORS 419C.396 that are needed and the
20 anticipated duration of those services.

21 “(3) A report filed under this section may not include statements made
22 by the youth about the acts alleged in the petition alleging jurisdiction un-
23 der ORS 419C.005.

24 “(4) Statements made to an evaluator by a youth during an evaluation,
25 or made to persons involved in the evaluation, about the acts alleged in the
26 petition are not admissible against the youth in any proceeding relating to
27 the petition.

15 “(a) Has a serious mental condition; or

16 “(b) Has a **qualifying** mental [*disease or defect*] **disorder** other than a
17 serious mental condition and presents a substantial danger to others.

18 “(7) When a youth is found responsible except for insanity and the court
19 does not make a finding described in subsection (6) of this section, the court
20 may:

21 “(a) Enter an order finding the youth to be within the court’s jurisdiction
22 under ORS 419B.100 and make any disposition authorized by ORS chapter

24 “(b) Initiate civil commitment proceedings; or

25 “(c) Enter an order of discharge.

29 “(1) ‘Conditional release’ includes but is not limited to the monitoring of

1 “(A) Has a serious mental condition; or

3 serious mental condition and presents a substantial danger to others;
4 “(b) The young person can be adequately controlled with treatment ser-
5 vices as a condition of release; and
6 “(c) Necessary supervision and treatment services are available.
7 “(5) The juvenile panel shall order a young person committed to, or re-
8 tained in, a hospital or facility designated by the Department of Human
9 Services or the Oregon Health Authority for custody, supervision and treat-
10 ment subject to ORS 419C.540 if the juvenile panel finds that the young

30 for discharge or conditional release; or

1 “(b) If more than two years have passed since the state had the burden
2 of proving the young person’s lack of fitness for discharge or conditional
3 release, the state has the burden of proving the young person’s lack of fitness
4 for discharge or conditional release.

5 “(7) A person may not file an application for discharge or conditional
6 release under subsection (4) of this section:

7 “(a) Sooner than 90 days after the initial juvenile panel hearing con-
8 cerning the young person.

9 “(b) If another application for discharge or conditional release of the
10 young person was filed during the immediately preceding 90 days.

11 “(8) The juvenile panel shall hold a hearing on an application under
12 subsection (4) of this section within 30 days after the application is filed.

13 “**SECTION 28.** ORS 426.510 is amended to read:

14 “426.510. As used in ORS 426.510 to 426.680, unless the context otherwise
15 requires, ‘sexually dangerous person’ means a person who because of re-
16 peated or compulsive acts of misconduct in sexual matters, or because of a
17 **qualifying** mental [*disease or defect*] **disorder**, is deemed likely to continue
18 to perform such acts and be a danger to other persons.”.
