Dear Chair Barnhart, Vice Chair Smith and Vice Chair Smith Warner:

I am writing to you today on behalf of the Oregon Housing Alliance to express our strong support for concepts included HB 4028 that relate to the Oregon Affordable Housing Tax Credit.

The Oregon Housing Alliance is a coalition of more than eighty organizations from all parts of the state. Our members have come together with the knowledge that housing opportunity is the foundation on which all of our success is built – individual success as students, parents, workers, and community members as well as the success of our communities. We represent a diverse set of voices including residents, local jurisdictions, non-profit housing developers, and organizations working to meet basic needs in every corner of our state.

We believe that all Oregonians need a safe, stable, and affordable place to call home. Today, we simply don't have enough affordable homes for people who need them, and vacancy rates have dropped precipitously towards zero in communities across Oregon. People are struggling with homelessness, housing instability, rent burdens, and to make ends meet and put food on the table. During the last school year, over 22,500 of our school children in grades K - 12 experienced homelessness.

Currently included in HB 4028, Section 4, there is a small technical fix to the Oregon Affordable Housing Tax Credit, or OAHTC. The OAHTC is a proven and effective tool, and since 1989, the OAHTC has helped provide thousands of Oregonians with safe and affordable housing.

One of the uses of the OAHTC is to finance the preservation of manufactured home parks. Manufactured home parks represent a huge source of affordable housing in Oregon. In these instances, the OAHTC would be awarded by Oregon Housing and Community Services to a nonprofit developer, a housing authority, or a manufactured home park resident owned cooperative, who would then use the credit to assist in purchasing the park from a private owner.

The fix included in HB 4028 is intended to allow non-profit developers to use a different ownership structure to purchase and preserve the manufactured home park, ensuring it is available and affordable for residents for decades to come. Today, one of the common financing mechanisms is for non-profit developers to utilize a limited liability company or a limited partnership in which they are the controlling entity to own an affordable housing development – whether it be a manufactured home park or a multifamily apartment building.

The current law regarding the OAHTC does not allow this structure when it is used to purchase a manufactured home park. It does allow this ownership structure for other uses of the OAHTC such as preserving or building a multifamily apartment building.

We are seeking to fix this oversight in order to ensure we can preserve manufactured home parks using this tool. Today, one non-profit organization in Roseburg is seeking to preserve a manufactured home park using this structure, and is not able to complete the work.

The bill, as currently drafted, does need to be amended. The current bill simply eliminates restrictions on who can use the OAHTC to purchase manufactured home parks, and advocates with technical expertise would prefer to specifically allow the above structure, rather than eliminate all restrictions.

We urge your support of HB 4028, with the amendments outlined above.
