A parents abilities are not determined by the labels that the world has placed on us. Even though I am autistic, if you were to go talk to either of my childrens teachers/doctors/specialists and ask if there is anything else I could be doing to give them a better life/chance at life, they would say no (I know this because I've asked.) Because contrary to what people may believe, my autism helps me understand my children in a way that others do not. I deserve the same right to be judged on my actions or inaction instead of my diagnosis. There are many in the autistic, special needs, disabled etc communities that would love to see change happen (and have ideas on what those changes need to be) but aren't sure how to get involved. I am one of them. Thank you for being a voice for us and fighting to ensure we are given the same rights to our children. We love them just as deeply (and I could even argue even more deeply) as neurotypical and non-disabled people.
