I support National Popular Vote bill that has already passed the Oregon House four times and which <u>Senators have been denied the right to vote on since 2009</u>. I do not support referral BECAUSE . . .

the founders gave the authority to make this decision to state legislators as stated in Article II, Section
I</u>: "Each State shall appoint, in such Manner as the Legislature thereof may direct, a Number of Electors, equal to the whole Number of Senators and Representatives to which the State may be entitled in the Congress . . . "Every law in every state saying how electoral votes should be awarded has been decided by state legislators. This is the job of the legislators as stated in the Constitution.

A referral invites out of state anti-democracy special interest groups to spend millions of dollars in Oregon to influence this campaign. <u>The Koch brothers</u> have pledged to spend 400 million this year on "politics and policy to shape November's midterm elections nationwide." Oregon will see some of this money if NPV becomes a ballot measure.

NPVIC is critically important to me and I will vote for my state senator(or not) based on his vote on this issue. Put this Bill on the floor for a vote <u>in this session</u> and put it up clean, no referral.
