## Argument Against Referral of NPVIC Response to SB 1512

Money has corrupted our electoral system and it will corrupt this referral.

You've heard all of the arguments for the National Popular Vote Interstate Compact (NPVIC), so I won't dwell on them, other than to point out how undemocratic it is that one person's vote can have more than 3 times the power of another's, depending on where a person lives. This is anything but one person one vote.

NPVIC is a bi-partisan issue. Either party can achieve a popular vote victory while losing the electoral vote. Coupled with "winner takes all," the electoral college essentially makes half of the votes cast in a state worthless. Once a candidate receives a simple majority plus one vote, all other votes become meaningless. A vote cast by a Republican in a blue state never sees the light of day, and vice-versa. With NPV, though, all votes count equally at the national level and are not wasted.

Primarily, though I want to focus on the status quo, why NPV is so important and why referral is the wrong way to go.

A consequence of the Electoral College is the emergence of "swing states," which effectively determine the winner of a presidential election. With a flood of unlimited money from the likes of the Koch brothers and SuperPACs, a few people can spend large sums in a few counties of a few states and essentially determine who will be president. They have a huge vested interest in keeping the electoral college as-is. With the EC, they don't have to spread their money across the entire country. The payoff in 2016 was a tax "reform" that will net the Koch's and their ilk billions of dollars—quite a return on investment!

With a referral of NPVIC to voters, vast sums will pour into Oregon from these moneyed interests to disseminate misinformation and distortions to defeat the bill. Think Measure 97. The pro-NPV side cannot match this onslaught of dark money, nor should they have to.

The Oregon Legislature should pass NPVIC without referral—it's the right thing to do.
