SB 1547 A -A4 STAFF MEASURE SUMMARY

WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

Expands list of qualified health professionals who can provide medical release of a student athlete suspected of having a concussion to include licensed chiropractic physicians, naturopathic physicians, psychologists, physical therapists, occupational therapists, physician assistants, nurse practitioners, and athletic trainers. Specifies requirements for qualified health professionals to obtain a certificate after completion of an online program and other requirements. Becomes operative January 1, 2019. Declares emergency, effective upon passage.

ISSUES DISCUSSED:

- Current protocol for concussed student-athlete return to play
- Variations in concussion protocol by school district
- Athletic trainers' qualifications to be defined and categorized as a health care professional; licensure of athletic trainers; potential conflict of interest for athletic trainers hired by school district to return student-athlete to play more quickly
- Scope of bill for concussed athlete return to non-school affiliated sport
- Medical professional and school liability for returning student athlete to play too early and subsequent injury;
 differences in malpractice liability coverage among types of medical providers and athletic trainers
- Expansion of qualified medical provider list for concussion return to play clearance in other states

EFFECT OF AMENDMENT:

-A4 Removes athletic trainers from the list of qualified health professionals who can provide a medical release to youth athletes who are suspected of having a concussion.

REVENUE: No revenue impact.

FISCAL: Fiscal impact issued (indeterminate).

BACKGROUND:

Current Oregon law allows health care professionals who are licensed physicians (MDs, DOs), physician assistants, nurse practitioners, or psychologists to medically release student athlete with concussions. Athletic trainers often work with qualified health care professionals after a student athlete has been observed or suspected to have sustained a blow to the head or body, and help determine when a student can return to play following a concussion.

In 2017, the Oregon legislature introduced Senate Bill 217 to expand the list of qualified health professionals able to provide a release for a student athlete who sustained a concussion or was suspected of sustaining a concussion. The bill did not pass during the 2017 session. The interim Senate Committee on Health Care convened a work group to develop recommendations on this topic following the 2017 session. The work group met five times to receive reports and presentations. The outcome is a bill based on a set of guidelines established by the work group.

Senate Bill 1547-A expands the list of qualified health professionals who can provide medical release of a student athlete suspected of having a concussion. This includes licensed chiropractic physicians, naturopathic physicians, psychologists, physical therapists, occupational therapists, physician assistants, nurse practitioners, and athletic trainers. Health professionals are eligible to provide medical release of a student athlete suspected of having a concussion if they have successfully completed an online concussion program established by OHSU. Program certificates issued by OHSU are valid for four years and can be renewed with additional training.
