Re: SB 1528 B – disconnect from *federal* pass-through tax – Support

In evaluating specific tax preferences, the League uses the following criteria: whether the tax preference promotes equity and progressivity; and whether the revenue loss from the tax preference is justifiable. The League of Women Voters of Oregon believes any tax proposal should be evaluated with regard to its effect on the entire tax structure and the tax system should recognize responsibility for government services by providing for broad sharing of the tax burden.

Oregon continues to struggle to fund vital programs for education and early learning; safety net programs for vulnerable individuals and families; public safety; natural resources; and so many others areas. We regret that discussions on the merit of disconnecting from the *federal* tax section regarding pass-through taxes has become a contentious issue portrayed as being for or against small-businesses. In fact, business owners may be leaders in advocating for the health and well-being of their own employees and communities. A well-educated and healthy workforce is essential to business success.

While we look forward to a more complete consideration of broadly sharing the tax burden in future legislative sessions, we urge the House Committee on Revenue to move this bill to the House floor this session. Oregon can't afford to lose an estimated \$250 million by connecting to this section of the *federal* tax code. Oregon should address something as straightforward as this *federal* disconnect and then move forward in 2019 or future years with comprehensive bipartisan and bicameral tax reform for sufficient and stable revenue. Oregon's ability to fund essential services must rise above rancor, partisanship—reaching for a higher goal: our communities, our children, our families, our future.
