

HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL 4053

By COMMITTEE ON HIGHER EDUCATION AND WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, line 2, after the semicolon insert “creating new provisions;
2 amending section 72, chapter 774, Oregon Laws 2015;”.

3 Delete lines 4 through 28 and delete page 2 and insert:

4 **“SECTION 1. (1) As used in this section:**

5 **“(a) ‘Accelerated college credit program’ has the meaning given that term in section 6**
6 **of this 2018 Act.**

7 **“(b) ‘Credit toward general education’ has the meaning given that term in section 6 of**
8 **this 2018 Act.**

9 **“(2) The Chief Education Office shall prepare an annual report on accelerated college**
10 **credit programs in the manner provided by this section.**

11 **“(3) For the purpose of the report required by this section, the office shall collaborate**
12 **with the Higher Education Coordinating Commission and public post-secondary institutions**
13 **of education in this state to determine the method for providing a representative sampling**
14 **of:**

15 **“(a) Students from each institution who are:**

16 **“(A) Graduates of a high school in this state;**

17 **“(B) Enrolled in the first year at a post-secondary institution of education for the first**
18 **time, except for any enrollment related to an accelerated college credit program; and**

19 **“(C) Seeking a post-secondary certificate or degree.**

20 **“(b) The number of credits from an accelerated college credit program that a student**
21 **attempted to transfer to the post-secondary institution of education.**

22 **“(4) The report required by this section must include the following information from the**
23 **representative sampling based on the previous school year:**

24 **“(a) The number and percentage of students who attempted to transfer a credit from an**
25 **accelerated college credit program to a public post-secondary institution of education in this**
26 **state.**

27 **“(b) Of the students identified under paragraph (a) of this subsection, the number and**
28 **percentage of students whose credits were accepted.**

29 **“(c) Of the credits accepted, the number and percentage that were accepted as credit**
30 **toward general education.**

31 **“(d) Of the students identified under paragraph (a) of this subsection, the number and**
32 **percentage of students whose credits were not accepted.**

33 **“(e) Of the students identified under paragraph (a) of this subsection, the high schools**
34 **from which the students graduated, if available.**

35 **“(5) To the extent practicable, and in addition to the information described in subsection**

1 (4) of this section, the report must include, from all students in this state described in sub-
2 section (3)(a) of this section, the number of students who attempted to transfer a credit from
3 an accelerated college credit program to a public post-secondary institution of education in
4 this state.

5 “(6) To the extent practicable, the information collected under subsections (4) and (5) of
6 this section must be disaggregated by:

7 “(a) The student’s characteristics, including race, ethnicity and gender;

8 “(b) The post-secondary institution of education that accepted or did not accept a trans-
9 fer of a credit from an accelerated college credit program;

10 “(c) The type of accelerated college credit program in which the student participated; and

11 “(d) The class of the accelerated college credit program in which the student partic-
12 ipated.

13 “(7) No later than September 1 of each year, each public post-secondary institution of
14 education must provide to the Higher Education Coordinating Commission the information
15 required under this section. The commission shall provide the information received under
16 this subsection to the office.

17 “(8) No later than December 1 of each year, the report required under this section must
18 be:

19 “(a) Submitted to the Governor, the Department of Education, the Higher Education
20 Coordinating Commission, the interim committees of the Legislative Assembly related to
21 education, the board of education of each community college district in this state and the
22 governing board of each public university listed in ORS 352.002; and

23 “(b) Made available to each school district in this state.

24 “**SECTION 2.** The first report required under section 1 of this 2018 Act must be submitted
25 and made available as provided by section 1 (8) of this 2018 Act no later than December 1,
26 2018, and shall use the most current data available.

27 “**SECTION 3.** Section 1 of this 2018 Act is amended to read:

28 “**Sec. 1.** (1) As used in this section:

29 “(a) ‘Accelerated college credit program’ has the meaning given that term in section 6 of this
30 2018 Act.

31 “(b) ‘Credit toward general education’ has the meaning given that term in section 6 of this 2018
32 Act.

33 “(2) The [*Chief Education Office*] **Higher Education Coordinating Commission** shall prepare
34 an annual report on accelerated college credit programs in the manner provided by this section.

35 “(3) For the purpose of the report required by this section, the [*office*] **commission** shall col-
36 laborate with [*the Higher Education Coordinating Commission and*] public post-secondary institutions
37 of education in this state to determine the method for providing a representative sampling of:

38 “(a) Students from each institution who are:

39 “(A) Graduates of a high school in this state;

40 “(B) Enrolled in the first year at a post-secondary institution of education for the first time,
41 except for any enrollment related to an accelerated college credit program; and

42 “(C) Seeking a post-secondary certificate or degree.

43 “(b) The number of credits from an accelerated college credit program that a student attempted
44 to transfer to the post-secondary institution of education.

45 “(4) The report required by this section must include the following information from the repre-

1 tentative sampling based on the previous school year:

2 “(a) The number and percentage of students who attempted to transfer a credit from an accel-
3 erated college credit program to a public post-secondary institution of education in this state.

4 “(b) Of the students identified under paragraph (a) of this subsection, the number and percentage
5 of students whose credits were accepted.

6 “(c) Of the credits accepted, the number and percentage that were accepted as credit toward
7 general education.

8 “(d) Of the students identified under paragraph (a) of this subsection, the number and percentage
9 of students whose credits were not accepted.

10 “(e) Of the students identified under paragraph (a) of this subsection, the high schools from
11 which the students graduated, if available.

12 “(5) To the extent practicable, and in addition to the information described in subsection (4) of
13 this section, the report must include, from all students in this state described in subsection (3)(a)
14 of this section, the number of students who attempted to transfer a credit from an accelerated col-
15 lege credit program to a public post-secondary institution of education in this state.

16 “(6) To the extent practicable, the information collected under subsections (4) and (5) of this
17 section must be disaggregated by:

18 “(a) The student’s characteristics, including race, ethnicity and gender;

19 “(b) The post-secondary institution of education that accepted or did not accept a transfer of a
20 credit from an accelerated college credit program;

21 “(c) The type of accelerated college credit program in which the student participated; and

22 “(d) The class of the accelerated college credit program in which the student participated.

23 “(7) No later than September 1 of each year, each public post-secondary institution of education
24 must provide to the Higher Education Coordinating Commission the information required under this
25 section. [*The commission shall provide the information received under this subsection to the office.*]

26 “(8) No later than December 1 of each year, the report required under this section must be:

27 “(a) Submitted to the Governor, the Department of Education, [*the Higher Education Coordinat-*
28 *ing Commission,*] the interim committees of the Legislative Assembly related to education, the board
29 of education of each community college district in this state and the governing board of each public
30 university listed in ORS 352.002; and

31 “(b) Made available to each school district in this state.

32 “**SECTION 4.** Section 72, chapter 774, Oregon Laws 2015, as amended by section 14, chapter

8 “**SECTION 5. Section 1 of this 2018 Act is repealed on January 2, 2029.**

9 “**SECTION 6. (1) As used in this section:**

10 “(a) ‘Accelerated college credit program’ has the meaning given that term by rules
11 adopted by the Higher Education Coordinating Commission.

12 “(b) ‘Credit toward general education’ means credits that may be used toward the com-
13 pletion of a post-secondary certificate or degree, as determined based on standards adopted
14 by the Higher Education Coordinating Commission by rule.

15 “(2) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission shall develop statewide standards
16 for public post-secondary institutions of education to make information related to acceler-
17 ated college credit programs available on each institution’s Internet website, including:

18 “(a) The policies, methods and procedures used for determining when to accept credit
19 from an accelerated college credit program and whether the credit will be accepted as credit
20 toward general education;

21 “(b) The process for appealing any determinations related to the acceptance or use of
22 credit from an accelerated college credit program; and

23 “(c) A list of courses, if available, that apply toward the completion of a certificate or
24 degree.

25 “**SECTION 7. This 2018 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public**
26 **peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2018 Act takes effect**
27 **on its passage.”.**

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
