House Bill 4065

Introduced and printed pursuant to House Rule 12.00. Presession filed (at the request of House Interim Committee on Early Childhood and Family Supports)

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**.

Prohibits child care providers from enrolling in Central Background Registry or providing child care for five years after denial, revocation or voluntary surrender of certification or registration and for five years after denial, removal or voluntary surrender of enrollment in Central Background Registry.

Confers on Office of Child Care continuing jurisdiction over actions against child care facilities. Permits Office of Child Care to issue cease and desist orders.

Directs Office of Child Care to develop progressive enforcement system for rule violations.

Permits Office of Child Care to impose conditions on certification or registration of child care facility.

Increases maximum civil penalty amounts for violations committed by child care providers. Declares emergency, effective on passage.

4 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

5 **SECTION 1.** ORS 329A.030 is amended to read:

6 329A.030. (1) The Office of Child Care shall establish a Central Background Registry and may 7 maintain information in the registry through electronic records systems.

8 (2) A subject individual shall apply to and must be enrolled in the Central Background Registry

9 as part of the individual's application to operate a program or serve in a position described in sub 10 section (10) of this section.

(3) Upon receiving an application for enrollment in the Central Background Registry, the officeshall complete:

The agreement must pro-10 vide for the recovery of administrative, including direct and indirect, costs incurred by the office 11 from participation in the agreement. Any moneys collected under this paragraph shall be deposited 12 in the Child Care Fund established under ORS 329A.010.

(b) Information provided to a private agency or organization facilitating the provision of respite services, as defined in ORS 418.205, for parents pursuant to a properly executed power of attorney under ORS 109.056 about the enrollment status of the persons described in subsection (10)(h) of this section shall be subject to an agreement with the private agency or organization. The agreement must provide for the recovery of administrative, including direct and indirect, costs incurred by the office from participation in the agreement. Any moneys collected under this paragraph shall be deposited in the Child Care Fund established under ORS 329A.010.

(c) Information provided to a private agency or organization about the enrollment status of the persons described in subsection (10)(i) of this section shall be subject to an agreement with the private agency or organization. The agreement must provide for the recovery of administrative, including direct and indirect, costs incurred by the office from participation in the agreement. Any moneys collected under this paragraph shall be deposited in the Child Care Fund established under ORS 329A.010.

(a) Establish a set of progressively higher enforcement actions that the office may take 4 in response to a child care facility's violation of the rules described in subsection (1) of this $\mathbf{5}$ section: 6

(b) Assign progressively higher point values to violations of the rules described in sub-7 section (1) of this section; and 8

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(c) Establish standards for monitoring the compliance of child care facilities with the rules described in subsection (1) of this subsection. 10

1 [(9)] (10) The office, upon good cause shown, may waive one or more of the registration re-2 quirements. The office may waive a requirement only if appropriate conditions or safeguards are 3 imposed to protect the welfare of the children and the consumer interests of the parents of the 4 children. The office may not waive the on-site review requirement for applicants applying for an 5 initial registration or renewal of a registration.

6 [(10)] (11) The Early Learning Council, by rule, shall develop a list of recommended standards 7 consistent with standards established by professional organizations regarding child care programs 8 for child care facilities. Compliance with the standards is not required for a registration, but the 9 office shall encourage voluntary compliance and shall provide technical assistance to a child care 10 facility attempting to comply with the standards.
