9 “HIGHER EDUCATION COORDINATING COMMISSION

11 “**SECTION 1.** Section 23, chapter 121, Oregon Laws 2014, as amended by section 74, chapter
12 117, Oregon Laws 2016, is amended to read:

13 “**Sec. 23.** (1) For each biennium in which any part of the OHSU Cancer Challenge Article XI-G
14 Bonds remain outstanding, the [*Oregon Department of Administrative Services*] **Higher Education**
15 **Coordinating Commission** shall request that the Governor include in the Governor’s budget to the
16 Legislative Assembly an amount that is sufficient to pay the bond-related costs that become due in
17 the biennium.

18 “(2) The Legislative Assembly shall appropriate to the [*Oregon Department of Administrative*
19 *Services*] **commission** any moneys made available to pay bond-related costs.

20 “(3) Oregon Health and Science University is not obligated to pay the bond-related costs of the
21 OHSU Cancer Challenge Article XI-G Bonds.

22 “**SECTION 2.** ORS 286A.863 is amended to read:

23 “286A.863. (1) The Oregon Department of Administrative Services may, in consultation with the
24 Higher Education Coordinating Commission, adopt rules for the purpose of carrying out ORS
25 286A.830 to 286A.863, including, but not limited to, establishing:

26 “(a) Fees and costs to be paid by public universities or community colleges for administration
27 of higher education bonds, including reasonable fees and expenses of the State Treasurer as provided
28 in ORS 286A.014;

29 “(b) The form, content and timing of information to be submitted by public universities and
30 community colleges to be used by the commission and the State Treasurer to evaluate revenue suf-
31 ficiency for Article XI-F(1) bonds and availability and sufficiency of matching amounts for Article
32 XI-G bonds; and

33 “(c) Standards, terms and conditions for maintaining federal tax benefits related to higher edu-
34 cation bonds.

35 “(2) The department or the commission, or both, may periodically bill a public university or

1 community college, without duplicating costs billed by contract, for the public university's or com-
2 munity college's proportional share of costs incurred by the department, or the commission, in con-
3 nection with higher education bonds, including, but not limited to:

4 “(a) Bond-related costs of higher education bonds issued or proposed to be issued to finance or
5 refinance projects of the public university or community college; and

6 “(b) Costs of legal or financial consultants or advisors, including, without limitation, bond
7 counsel to the State of Oregon, for services that are provided at the request of a public university
8 or community college in connection with higher education bonds that are issued or proposed to be
9 issued.

10 “(3) The department and the commission may each bill at such intervals as may be established
11 in the department's or commission's own procedures and shall deposit the moneys received in the
12 applicable bond fund, bond administration fund or other fund relating to higher education bonds, as
13 the department or commission determines is appropriate. A public university or community college
14 that receives a bill for bond-related costs shall pay the amount billed by the time and in the manner
15 designated in the billing statement.

16 “(4)(a) The department **or the commission** may enter into agreements with Oregon Health and
17 Science University to:

18 “(A) Receive payments from Oregon Health and Science University of amounts used to pay debt
19 service on bonds issued by the State Treasurer to finance joint projects of Oregon Health and Sci-
20 ence University and one or more public universities; or

21 “(B) Administer tax compliance obligations of Oregon Health and Science University.

22 “(b) Solely for the purposes of receiving payments of amounts used to pay debt service and ad-
23 ministering tax compliance obligations related to the bonds, the department **or the commission**
24 may be a successor to, or an assignee of, the Oregon University System under agreements between
25 Oregon Health and Science University and the Oregon University System.

26 “(c) The department **or the commission** may not assume any obligations or liability as the
27 successor to, or assignee of, the Oregon University System under any agreements between Oregon
28 Health and Science University and the Oregon University System, except for obligations or liability
29 relating to the receipt of amounts used to pay debt service and the administration of tax compliance
30 obligations.

32 **“PUBLIC SAFETY**

34 **“SECTION 3. (1)(a) The appropriation set forth in section 7, chapter 673, Oregon Laws**
35 **2017, of moneys to the Oregon Criminal Justice Commission, out of the General Fund, for**
36 **deposit in the Justice Reinvestment Account, is validated.**

37 **“(b) Use of any moneys from the appropriation set forth in section 7, chapter 673, Oregon**
38 **Laws 2017, for the purposes specified in section 9, chapter 673, Oregon Laws 2017, by the**
39 **Oregon Criminal Justice Commission prior to the effective date of this 2018 Act, is validated.**

40 **“(c) The Oregon Criminal Justice Commission is authorized to expend moneys from the**
41 **appropriation set forth in section 7, chapter 673, Oregon Laws 2017, for the purposes specified**
42 **in section 5 of this 2018 Act.**

43 **“(2)(a) The appropriation set forth in section 8, chapter 673, Oregon Laws 2017, of moneys**
44 **to the Department of Justice, out of the General Fund, for the Crime Victims' Services Di-**
45 **vision and services for victims of domestic and sexual violence, is validated.**

1 a fee under this subsection to a financial institution, the fee may not exceed the lesser of \$2,500 or
2 the actual costs incurred by the financial institution in that calendar quarter for conducting the
3 data match. In subsequent calendar quarters, the fee may not exceed the lesser of \$150 or the actual

5 “[*(4)(a) The department may add a fee to the amount of the liquidated and delinquent debt of any*
6 *delinquent debtor.*]

8 *notice to the delinquent debtor of the existence of the debt and of the maximum amount of the fee that*
9 *may be added under this subsection to the debt.*]

10 “[*(c) A fee added under this subsection may not exceed the total data match costs incurred by the*
11 *department in the calendar quarter in which the fee is assessed, divided by the average number of de-*
12 *linquent debtors as calculated over the preceding four calendar quarters.*]

13 “[*(d) As used in this subsection, ‘data match costs’ means the sum of:*]

14 “[*(A) Amounts payable to financial institutions under subsection (3) of this section; and*]

15 “[*(B) Amounts payable to vendors or contractors pursuant to agreements that are reasonably nec-*
16 *essary for the functioning of the data match system.*]

17 “[*(5)* (4) The department may temporarily exempt a financial institution from participation in
18 the data match system under this section if:

19 “(a) The department determines that the participation of the financial institution in the data
20 match system would not be cost-effective for the department;

21 “(b) The department determines that the financial institution’s participation in the data match
22 system would be unduly burdensome for the financial institution; or

23 “(c) The financial institution provides the department with written notice from its supervisory
24 banking authority that it has been determined to be undercapitalized, significantly undercapitalized,
25 or critically undercapitalized, as those terms are defined under 12 C.F.R. 325.103(b) or 12 C.F.R.
26 702.102(a).

27 “[*(6)* (5) Financial institutions, institution-affiliated parties as defined in the Federal Deposit
28 Insurance Act (12 U.S.C. 1813(u)) and institution-affiliated parties as defined in the Federal Credit
29 Union Act (12 U.S.C. 1786(r)) are not liable under state law to any person:

30 “(a) For any disclosure of information to the department under this section;

31 “(b) For encumbering or surrendering any assets held by the financial institution in response to
32 a notice of lien or levy issued by the department; or

33 “(c) For any other action taken in good faith to comply with the requirements of this section.

34 “**SECTION 10.** ORS 18.999 is amended to read:

35 “18.999. This section establishes the right of a plaintiff to recover certain moneys the plaintiff
36 has expended to recover a debt under ORS 18.854 or to enforce a judgment and establishes proce-
37 dures for that recovery. The following apply to this section:

38 “(1) When a plaintiff receives moneys under a garnishment, attachment or payment, the plaintiff
39 may proceed as follows:

40 “(a) Before crediting the total amount of moneys received against the judgment or debt, the
41 plaintiff may recover and keep from the total amount received under the garnishment, attachment
42 or payment any moneys allowed to be recovered under this section.

43 “(b) After recovering moneys as allowed under paragraph (a) of this subsection, the plaintiff
44 shall credit the remainder of the moneys received against the judgment or debt as provided by law.

45 “(2) Moneys recovered under subsection (1)(a) of this section shall not be considered moneys

1 paid on and to be credited against the original judgment or debt sought to be enforced. No addi-
2 tional judgment is necessary to recover moneys in the manner provided in subsection (1)(a) of this
3 section.

4 “(3) The only moneys a plaintiff may recover under subsection (1)(a) of this section are those
5 described in subsection (4) of this section that the plaintiff has paid to enforce the existing specific
6 judgment or debt that the specific garnishment or attachment was issued to enforce or upon which
7 the payment was received. Moneys recoverable under subsection (1)(a) of this section remain re-
8 coverable and, except as provided under subsection (8) of this section, may be recovered from mon-
9 eys received by the plaintiff under subsequent garnishments, attachments or payments on the same
10 specific judgment or debt.

11 “(4) This section allows the recovery only of the following:

12 “(a) Statutorily established moneys that meet the requirements under subsection (3) of this sec-
13 tion, as follows:

14 “(A) Garnishee’s search fees under ORS 18.790.

15 “(B) Fees for delivery of writs of garnishment under ORS 18.652.

16 “(C) Circuit court fees as provided under ORS 21.235 and 21.258.

17 “(D) County court fees as provided under ORS 5.125.

18 “(E) County clerk recording fees as provided in ORS 205.320.

19 “(F) Actual fees or disbursements made under ORS 21.300.

20 “(G) Costs of execution as provided in ORS 105.112.

21 “(H) Fees paid to an attorney for issuing a garnishment in an amount not to exceed \$45 for each
22 garnishment.

23 “(I) Costs of an execution sale as described in ORS 18.950 (2).

24 “(J) Fees paid under ORS 21.200 for motions and responses to motions filed after entry of a
25 judgment.

26 “(K) Amounts paid to a sheriff for the fees and expenses of executing a warrant under ORS
27 105.510.

28 “[L] Fees added to liquidated and delinquent debts under ORS 305.084 (4).]

29 “(b) Interest on the amounts specified in paragraph (a) of this subsection at the rate provided
30 for judgments in ORS 82.010 for the period of time beginning with the expenditure of the amount
31 and ending upon recovery of the amount under this section.

32 “(5) The plaintiff shall be responsible for doing all of the following:

33 “(a) Maintaining a precise accounting of moneys recovered under subsection (1)(a) of this sec-
34 tion and making the accounting available for any proceeding relating to that judgment or debt.

35 “(b) Providing reasonable notice to the defendant of moneys the plaintiff recovers under sub-
36 section (1)(a) of this section.

37 “(6) Moneys recovered under subsection (1)(a) of this section remain subject to all other pro-
38 visions of law relating to payments, or garnished or attached moneys including, but not limited to,
39 those relating to exemption, claim of exemption, overpayment and holding periods.

40 “(7) Nothing in this section limits the right of a plaintiff to recover moneys described in this
41 section or other moneys in any manner otherwise allowed by law.

42 “(8) A writ of garnishment or attachment is not valid if issued solely to recover moneys recov-
43 erable under subsection (1)(a) of this section unless the right to collect the moneys is first reduced
44 to a judgment or to a debt enforceable under ORS 18.854.

1 under ORS 237.645 or 237.650 to become a legislator member of the state deferred compensation plan
2 for the purpose of service in the Legislative Assembly, the Legislative Assembly shall make em-
3 ployer contributions to the plan in an amount that is equal to [*six percent of the member's salary*
4 *plus*] the percentage of the member's salary that would have been contributed to the Public Em-
5 ployees Retirement Board for the member's normal cost under ORS 238A.220, as determined by the
6 actuary under ORS 238.605.

7 “(b) Notwithstanding paragraph (a) of this subsection, contributions made to the plan by the
8 Legislative Assembly under this subsection may not exceed the maximum allowed by federal law.

9 “(2) If a person appointed or elected as a member of the Legislative Assembly elects under ORS
10 237.645 or 237.650 to become a legislator member of the state deferred compensation plan for the
11 purpose of service in the Legislative Assembly, and the person also participates in the state deferred
12 compensation plan in the manner provided by ORS 243.401 to 243.507 as other than a legislator
13 member, the total contributions made to the plan by the person and by the employer under sub-
14 section (1) of this section may not exceed the maximum allowed by federal law governing the plan's
15 tax qualification.

16 “(3) Except for the contributions required by subsection (1) of this section, the Legislative As-
17 sembly may not ‘pick-up,’ assume or pay any contributions on behalf of a legislator member of the
18 state deferred compensation plan.

19 “**SECTION 15. The amendments to ORS 237.655 by section 14 of this 2018 Act become**
20 **operative on February 1, 2019.**

21 “**SECTION 16. Section 4, chapter 578, Oregon Laws 2013, as amended by section 5, chapter**
22 **840, Oregon Laws 2015, and section 15, chapter 725, Oregon Laws 2017, is repealed.**

23 “**SECTION 17.** ORS 171.072, as amended by section 1, chapter 578, Oregon Laws 2013, is
24 amended to read:

25 “171.072. (1) A member of the Legislative Assembly shall receive for services an annual salary
26 [*determined as provided under ORS 292.930.*] **that equals the greater of:**

27 “**(a) One step below the maximum step of Salary Range 1 in the Management Service**
28 **Compensation Plan in the executive department as defined in ORS 174.112; or**

29 “**(b) Seventeen percent of the salary of a circuit court judge.**

30 “(2) The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives each shall
31 receive for services, as additional salary, an amount equal to the salary allowed each of them as a
32 member under subsection (1) of this section.

33 “(3) A member of the Legislative Assembly shall receive, as an allowance for expenses not oth-
34 erwise provided for, a per diem determined as provided in subsection (9) of this section for each day
35 within the period that the Legislative Assembly is in session, to be paid with the salary provided for
36 in subsection (1) of this section. Pursuant to procedures determined by the Legislative Adminis-
37 tration Committee, a member may draw from an accrued allowance.

38 “(4) A member of the Legislative Assembly shall receive, as an allowance for expenses incurred
39 in the performance of official duties during periods when the legislature is not in session, \$400 for
40 each calendar month or part of a calendar month during those periods, to be paid monthly, and
41 subject to approval of the President of the Senate or Speaker of the House of Representatives,
42 mileage expenses and a per diem determined as provided in subsection (9) of this section for each
43 day a member is engaged in the business of legislative interim and statutory committees, including
44 advisory committees and subcommittees of advisory committees, and task forces and for each day
45 a member serves on interstate bodies, advisory committees and other entities on which the member

1 serves ex officio, whether or not the entity is a legislative one.

2 “(5) In addition to the mileage and per diem expense payments provided by this section, a
3 member of the Legislative Assembly may receive reimbursement for actual and necessary expenses,
4 subject to approval by the President of the Senate or Speaker of the House of Representatives, for
5 legislative business outside of the state.

6 “(6) The President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives may delegate
7 to the chairpersons of interim and statutory committees and task forces the approval authority
8 granted to the President and the Speaker by subsection (4) of this section, with respect to expenses
9 incurred in attending any meeting of a particular committee or task force.

10 “(7) Amounts received under subsections (3) to (5) of this section are excluded from gross income
11 and expenditures of the amounts are excluded in computing deductions for purposes of ORS chapter
12 316. If there is attached to the personal income return a schedule of all ordinary and necessary
13 business expenses paid during the tax year as a member of the Legislative Assembly, a deduction
14 may be claimed on the return for legislative expenses paid in excess of the amounts received under
15 subsections (3) to (5) of this section. Expenses of members of the Legislative Assembly who are re-
16 imbursemented by the state for actual expenses for meals and lodging associated with state travel for the
17 same period during which a legislator receives per diem are subject to state income tax.

18 “(8) For periods when the Legislative Assembly is not in session, the Legislative Administration
19 Committee shall provide for a telephone and an expense allowance for members of the Legislative
20 Assembly that is in addition to the amount allowed under subsection (4) of this section. In deter-
21 mining the amount of allowance for members, the committee shall consider the geographic area of
22 the member’s district. The additional allowance shall reflect travel expenses necessary to communi-
23 cate in districts of varying sizes.

24 “(9) The per diem allowance referred to in subsections (3) and (4) of this section shall be the
25 amount fixed for per diem allowance that is authorized by the United States Internal Revenue Ser-
26 vice to be excluded from gross income without itemization.

27 “**SECTION 18.** ORS 292.930 is amended to read:

28 “292.930. Each of the following elective officers shall be paid an annual salary on a monthly
29 basis as determined by the Legislative Assembly each biennium:

30 “(1) Governor.

31 “(2) Secretary of State.

32 “(3) State Treasurer.

33 “(4) Attorney General.

34 “(5) Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor and Industries.

35 “(6) Chief Judge of the Court of Appeals.

36 “(7) Court of Appeals Judge.

37 “(8) Chief Justice of the Supreme Court.

38 “(9) Supreme Court Judge.

39 “(10) Circuit Court Judge.

40 “(11) Tax Court Judge.

41 “[*(12) State Senator.*]

42 “[*(13) State Representative.*]

1 “**SECTION 19.** ORS 292.406 is amended to read:

2 “292.406. (1)(a) The annual salary of the Chief Judge of the Court of Appeals shall be [*\$135,688*
3 *for the year beginning January 1, 2015, and for each year thereafter*] **\$147,560 for the period begin-**
4 **ning on January 1, 2017, and ending on June 30, 2018.**

5 “(b) On [*January 1, 2017*] **July 1, 2018**, the annual salary of the Chief Judge of the Court of
6 Appeals, as adjusted under ORS 292.428, shall be increased by \$5,000.

7 “(2)(a) The annual salary of each other judge of the Court of Appeals shall be [*\$132,820 for the*
8 *year beginning January 1, 2015, and for each year thereafter*] **\$144,536 for the period beginning on**
9 **January 1, 2017, and ending on June 30, 2018.**

10 “(b) On [*January 1, 2017*] **July 1, 2018**, the annual salary of each other judge of the Court of
11 Appeals, as adjusted under ORS 292.428, shall be increased by \$5,000.

12 “**SECTION 20.** ORS 292.411 is amended to read:

13 “292.411. (1)(a) The annual salary of the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court shall be [*\$138,556*
14 *for the year beginning January 1, 2015, and for each year thereafter*] **\$150,572 for the period begin-**
15 **ning on January 1, 2017, and ending on June 30, 2018.**

16 “(b) On [*January 1, 2017*] **July 1, 2018**, the annual salary of the Chief Justice of the Supreme
17 Court, as adjusted under ORS 292.428, shall be increased by \$5,000.

18 “(2)(a) The annual salary of each other judge of the Supreme Court shall be [*\$135,688 for the*
19 *year beginning January 1, 2015, and for each year thereafter*] **\$147,560 for the period beginning on**
20 **January 1, 2017, and ending on June 30, 2018.**

21 “(b) On [*January 1, 2017*] **July 1, 2018**, the annual salary of each other judge of the Supreme

25 *beginning January 1, 2015, and for each year thereafter*] **\$135,776 for the period beginning on**
26 **January 1, 2017, and ending on June 30, 2018.**

27 “(2) On [*January 1, 2017*] **July 1, 2018**, the annual salary of each judge of a circuit court, as
28 adjusted under ORS 292.428, shall be increased by \$5,000.

29 “**SECTION 22.** ORS 292.426 is amended to read:

30 “292.426. (1) The annual salary of the judge of the Oregon Tax Court shall be [*\$128,164 for the*
31 *year beginning January 1, 2015, and for each year thereafter*] **\$139,652 for the period beginning on**
32 **January 1, 2017, and ending on June 30, 2018.**

33 “(2) On [*January 1, 2017*] **July 1, 2018**, the annual salary of the judge of the Oregon Tax Court,
34 as adjusted under ORS 292.428, shall be increased by \$5,000.

36 “**OREGON VOLUNTEERS COMMISSION FOR**
37 **VOLUNTARY ACTION AND SERVICE**
38

39 “**SECTION 23.** ORS 458.555 is amended to read:

40 “458.555. (1) There is established the Oregon Volunteers Commission for Voluntary Action and
41 Service within the [*Office of the Governor*] **Higher Education Coordinating Commission.**

42 “(2) The **Oregon Volunteers Commission for Voluntary Action and Service** shall consist of
43 at least 15 members appointed by the Governor and may consist of not more than 25 members ap-
44 pointed by the Governor.

45 “(3) The term of office of each member is three years, but a member serves at the pleasure of

1 the Governor. Before the expiration of the term of a member, the Governor shall appoint a successor
2 whose term begins on the first day of the next following month. A member is eligible for reap-
3 pointment. If there is a vacancy for any cause, the Governor shall make an appointment to become
4 immediately effective for the unexpired term.

5 “(4) The appointment of the members of the **Oregon Volunteers Commission for Voluntary**
6 **Action and Service** is subject to confirmation by the Senate in the manner prescribed in ORS
7 171.562 and 171.565.

8 “(5) A member of the **Oregon Volunteers Commission for Voluntary Action and Service** is
9 entitled to receive, from moneys available to the commission, actual and necessary travel and other
10 expenses incurred in the performance of official duties as provided in ORS 292.495.

11 “**SECTION 24.** ORS 458.568 is amended to read:

12 “458.568. The Oregon Volunteers Commission for Voluntary Action and Service shall:

13 “(1) Develop programs and provide oversight and administration of programs granted to this
14 state by the Corporation for National and Community Service under the National and Community
15 Service Trust Act of 1993, as amended, (P.L. 103-82).

16 “(2) Prepare state applications to the Corporation for National and Community Service for fi-
17 nancial assistance for state-based service programs.

18 “[*(3) Develop a statewide plan that is designed to meet or exceed the Oregon benchmark on*
19 *volunteerism.*]

20 “[*(4)*] **(3)** Develop projects, training methods, curriculum materials and other materials and ac-
21 tivities related to state service programs that receive assistance directly from the Corporation for
22 National and Community Service.

23 “[*(5)*] **(4)** To engage citizens in service and to strengthen communities, create statewide access
24 for all Oregon citizens to a variety of volunteer opportunities by:

25 “(a) Evaluating the status of volunteerism in the public, private and nonprofit sectors of this
26 state;

27 “(b) Examining methods to strengthen the capacity of volunteer organizations to support citizen
28 involvement; and

29 “(c) Educating all citizens about the importance of citizen involvement and voluntary action.

30 “[*(6)*] **(5)** Encourage youth and young adults to engage in their communities through voluntary
31 action by:

32 “(a) Assisting efforts to inform young Oregonians about opportunities for involvement in the
33 public, private and nonprofit sectors;

34 “(b) Promoting the value of service learning as an educational strategy in the kindergarten
35 through higher educational systems; and

36 “(c) Collaborating with groups to advocate for youth voice in the public, private and nonprofit
37 governing structures.

38 “[*(7)*] **(6)** Promote recognition of volunteerism and service into the daily operation of public,
39 private and nonprofit sectors throughout the state by:

40 “(a) Promoting a statewide volunteer recognition plan open to all sectors; and

41 “(b) Assisting efforts by Oregon communities to encourage citizen involvement in volunteerism.

42 “[*(8)*] **(7)** Biennially submit a report to the Governor and the Legislative Assembly as provided
43 under ORS 192.230 to 192.245:

44 “(a) Detailing commission activities during the preceding two-year period;

45 “(b) Reviewing and summarizing, to the extent the commission deems relevant, the content of

1 reports accepted by the commission on behalf of the Governor;

2 “(c) Assessing the state of [*volunteerism*] **national service** in Oregon; and

3 “(d) Containing specific recommendations for any additional legislation the commission deems
4 necessary to carry out the purpose of the Oregon Volunteer and Community Service Act or to im-
5 prove the effectiveness or efficiency of the commission.

6 “**SECTION 25.** ORS 458.573 is amended to read:

7 “458.573. In accordance with applicable provisions in ORS chapter 183, **the Higher Education**
8 **Coordinating Commission, in consultation with** the Oregon Volunteers Commission for Voluntary
9 Action and Service, may adopt rules:

10 “(1) Establishing standards and guidelines for applications for grants; and

11 “(2) Establishing standards and requirements for administration of programs funded by grants.

12 “**SECTION 26.** ORS 458.563 is repealed.

13 “**SECTION 27.** The amendments to ORS 458.555, 458.568 and 458.573 by sections 23 to 25
14 of this 2018 Act and the repeal of ORS 458.563 by section 26 of this 2018 Act become operative
15 on July 1, 2018.

19 “**SECTION 28.** The unit captions used in this 2018 Act are provided only for the conven-
20 ience of the reader and do not become part of the statutory law of this state or express any
21 legislative intent in the enactment of this 2018 Act.

25 “**SECTION 29.** This 2018 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public
26 peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2018 Act takes effect
27 on its passage.”.
