**PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO
SENATE BILL 5702**

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, line 2, after the first semicolon delete the
2 rest of the line and line 3 and insert “creating new provisions; amending
3 section 21, chapter 786, Oregon Laws 2013, sections 1, 2 and 3, chapter 570,
4 Oregon Laws 2017, and section 5, chapter 748, Oregon Laws 2017; and de-
5 claring an emergency.”.

6 Delete lines 5 through 31 and delete page 2 and insert:

5 **“SECTION 3.** Section 3, chapter 570, Oregon Laws 2017, is amended to
6 read:

7 **“Sec. 3.** The amount authorized, as provided by ORS 286A.035, for issu-
8 ance of certificates of participation and other financing agreements of the
9 state during the 2017-2019 biennium for the Oregon Department of Adminis-
10 trative Services is [*\$110,985,000*] **\$127,985,000.**

11 **“SECTION 4.** Section 5, chapter 748, Oregon Laws 2017, is amended to
12 read:

13 **“Sec. 5.** (1) For the biennium beginning July 1, 2017, at the request of the
14 Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the department consults
15 with the Water Resources Department, the State Treasurer is authorized to
16 issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585 in an amount that
17 produces [*\$20,700,000*] **\$25,850,000** in net proceeds and interest earnings for
18 the purposes described in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional
19 amount estimated by the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related
20 costs.

21 “(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be
22 transferred to the Water Resources Department for deposit in the Water
23 Supply Development Account established in ORS 541.656, in an amount suf-
24 ficient to provide:

25 “(a) \$15 million in net proceeds and interest earnings to provide grants
26 or loans to evaluate, plan and develop in-stream and out-of-stream statewide
27 water development projects.

28 “(b) \$2.5 million in net proceeds and interest earnings to the City of
29 Carlton to reduce sedimentation and increase water storage capacity at the
30 Panther Creek Reservoir.

1 “(c) [\$2] **\$7.15** million in net proceeds and interest earnings to the City
2 of Carlton to replace the city’s finished water supply line and reduce water
3 loss.

4 “(d) \$1.2 million in net proceeds and interest earnings to the Santiam
5 Water Control District to complete the Mill Creek Corporate Center irri-
6 gation conversion and efficiency project.

7 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds
8 will create jobs, further economic development, finance public education or
9 restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and native fish and wildlife,
10 and is authorized based on the following findings:

11 “(a) Having adequate drinking water systems, irrigation, drainage and
12 healthy ecosystems enhances community development and supports Oregon’s
13 economic growth.

14 “(b) Assisting local governments to mitigate losses resulting from reduced
15 water supply for irrigation and retirement of water rights will enhance
16 community efforts to facilitate and promote economic growth.

17 “**SECTION 5.** Section 21, chapter 786, Oregon Laws 2013, is amended to
18 read:

19 “**Sec. 21.** (1) For the biennium beginning July 1, 2013, at the request of
20 the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the department
21 consults with the Department of Transportation and the Oregon Interna-
22 tional Port of Coos Bay, the State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery
23 bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$10
24 million in net proceeds and interest earnings for the purpose described in
25 subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional amount estimated by the
26 State Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related costs.

27 “(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section [*in an amount*
28 *sufficient to provide \$10 million in net proceeds and interest earnings*] must
29 be transferred to the Department of Transportation for deposit in the DOT
30 Economic Development Distributions Fund established in section 24 [*of this*

1 2013 Act], chapter 786, Oregon Laws 2013, in an amount sufficient to
2 provide:

3 “(a) \$7 million in net proceeds and interest earnings for distribution
4 to the Oregon International Port of Coos Bay for the purpose of acquiring,
5 constructing or improving the Coos Bay rail link, as defined in ORS 777.915.

6 “(b) \$3 million in net proceeds and interest earnings for distribution
7 to the Oregon International Port of Coos Bay for acquisition of the
8 Coos Bay rail link rolling stock.

9 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds
10 will create jobs, further economic development, finance public education or
11 restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and native fish and wildlife,
12 and is authorized based on the finding that improvements in **and continued**
13 **operation of** multimodal transportation systems are necessary to facilitate
14 the flow of goods and services to national and international markets through
15 the deep-water port at Coos Bay.

16 “SECTION 6. (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2019, at the re-
17 quest of the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the
18 department consults with De Paul Treatment Centers, the State
19 Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS
20 286A.560 to 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$2 million in net
21 proceeds and interest earnings for the purposes described in subsection
22 (2) of this section, plus an additional amount estimated by the State
23 Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related costs.

24 “(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section in an
25 amount sufficient to provide \$2 million in net proceeds and interest
26 earnings must be transferred to the department for deposit in the
27 ODAS Economic Development Distributions Fund established under
28 ORS 461.553 for distribution to De Paul Treatment Centers for a new
29 treatment center facility.

30 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond

1 proceeds will create jobs, further economic development, finance pub-
2 lic education or restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and
3 native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that
4 individuals increase their potential for self-sufficiency, increase eco-
5 nomic productivity and use fewer public resources when they have
6 access to addiction treatment programs and services.

7 **“SECTION 7. (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2019, at the re-**
8 **quest of the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the**
9 **department consults with Trillium Family Services, the State Treas-**
10 **urer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to**
11 **286A.585 in an amount that produces \$3 million in net proceeds and**
12 **interest earnings for the purposes described in subsection (2) of this**
13 **section, plus an additional amount estimated by the State Treasurer**
14 **to be necessary to pay bond-related costs.**

15 **“(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section in an**
16 **amount sufficient to provide \$3 million in net proceeds and interest**
17 **earnings must be transferred to the department for deposit in the**
18 **ODAS Economic Development Distributions Fund established under**
19 **ORS 461.553 for distribution to Trillium Family Services for con-**
20 **struction of a secure adolescent inpatient facility at the Children’s**
21 **Farm Home Corvallis campus.**

22 **“(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond**
23 **proceeds will create jobs, further economic development, finance pub-**
24 **lic education or restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and**
25 **native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that**
26 **expanding the Children’s Farm Home will create jobs in construction**
27 **and health care.**

28 **“SECTION 8. (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2019, at the re-**
29 **quest of the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the**
30 **department consults with the Higher Education Coordinating Com-**

1 mission, the State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pur-
2 suant to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$9
3 million in net proceeds and interest earnings for the purposes de-
4 scribed in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional amount
5 estimated by the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related
6 costs.

7 “(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section in an
8 amount sufficient to provide \$9 million in net proceeds and interest
9 earnings must be transferred to the Higher Education Coordinating
10 Commission for deposit in the Public University Fund established un-
11 der ORS 352.450, segregated in a distinct subaccount to allow necessary
12 compliance with the Internal Revenue Code, for distribution to East-
13 ern Oregon University to construct a new field house facility.

14 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond
15 proceeds will create jobs, further economic development, finance pub-
16 lic education or restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and
17 native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the following
18 findings:

19 “(a) A new facility is needed in order for the university to have
20 adequate instructional and athletic space.

21 “(b) Having adequate university buildings and facilities is essential
22 to Oregon’s healthy economic growth.

23 “(c) The field house facility will be used as a venue for regional
24 events, providing significant economic benefits to local communities.

25 “(d) Oregon manufactured wood products, including cross-
26 laminated timber, will be utilized in the construction of the field house
27 facility, supporting Oregon’s wood products manufacturing industry.

28 “SECTION 9. This 2018 Act being necessary for the immediate
29 preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is
30 declared to exist, and this 2018 Act takes effect on its passage.”.
