#### **Overview - 2015 Toxic-Free Kids Act**

2015 – Toxic-Free Kids Act (Senate Bill 478) enacted

- 2018–2022 statutory deadlines
  - 01/2018: manufacturers with sales greater than \$5 million global sales report children's products with High Priority Chemicals sold in Oregon
  - 01/2022: manufacturers must remove, substitute, or seek a waiver for High Priority Chemicals in a product that is
    - Mouthable
    - A children's cosmetic
    - For children < 3 years-old</li>



## Rulemaking

- Phase 1 (September 2015 December 2015)
  - Adopted High Priority Chemicals list in rule December 29, 2015
- Phase 2 (April 2016 January 2017)
  - Reporting requirements and exemption process adopted in February 2017
    - January 1, 2018 reporting deadline
  - Update to chemicals list adopted January 2019
- Phase 3 Rulemaking (May 10, 2019 present)
- Rulemaking advisory committees included representatives from industry, environmental health, technical experts



# **Toxic-Free Kids Reporting To Date**

- 114 reporters (manufacturers, distributors or retailers)
  - 962 product reports
- 64 chemicals (of 66 possible)
- 221 product categories (e.g., non-powered toy trucks)
- Approximately 75% of reports are for products only subject to reporting requirements
- Approximately 25% of reports are for products requiring removal or waiver by January 2022 (< 3 years, mouthable, cosmetics)



## Other Completed Toxic-Free Kids Actions

#### Online Product Reporting System

Available to manufacturers in October 2017

#### Review of Exemption Requests from Reporting Process

- For contaminants that are manufacturing by-products
- Guidance issued May 2017
- Approved 7 of 9 requests during July 2017–June 2019

#### Outreach to Industry

 Webinars and presentations at Oregon and national trade shows and meetings



#### **Current Efforts**

- Phase 3 Rulemaking (May 10, 2019 present)
  - Addresses removal, substitution, or waiver process for high priority chemicals from certain children's products.

#### Multistate Reporting System

- Allows manufacturers to report once and comply with Oregon,
  Washington, and Vermont statutes.
- EPA grant funded
- Operational November 2019 link at program website
- Publicly searchable
