# 1,439 Veterans are experiencing homelessness

- 5<sup>th</sup> highest number of Veterans experiencing homelessness nationally in 2017
- 3<sup>rd</sup> highest rate of unsheltered Veterans nationally in 2017

303,689 Oregonians identify as Veterans

- 1 in 13 Oregonians are Veterans
- 25,000 women Veterans live in Oregon
- 53% of Veterans are over the age of 65
- 25<sup>th</sup> highest Veteran population nationally

## Gov. Brown calls for increased investment in state's veteran services



## OHCS and ODVA launched Operation Welcome Home on November 15, 2018 with an end date of July 31, 2019.









Ending and Preventing Veteran Homelessness in Oregon

- A nine-month campaign to help ten communities in Oregon establish the infrastructure to end Veteran homelessness
- Operation Welcome Home had three goals:
  - House 500 veterans across the ten communities
  - Develop and implement a Veterans By Name List
  - Convene and deploy a Veterans Leadership Team to prioritize Veterans for services in the community





The **Operation** Welcome Home Dashboard displays statistics and progress in each participating community.

- Goals based on U.S. Interagency Council on Homelessness Federal Benchmarks and Criteria for Ending Veteran homelessness
  - Create partnerships throughout services structures
- Remote and in-person technical assistance individualized to each community

#### Successful Outcomes:

- 587 Veterans successfully housed during the campaign
- Five communities developed a Veteran By Name List
- All the communities developed a Veteran Leadership Team
- Increased collaboration among service providers, creating a lasting infrastructure

## Successful Outcomes – Person Centered Approach:

- "Mary" is a veteran that recently escaped domestic violence
- She and her two children experienced homelessness
- Central Oregon Veterans Outreach connected her with housing and mental health resources

# Ongoing Work

- Increase in Emergency Housing Assistance funds going to Community Action Agencies to assist more Veterans
- Increase in Document Recording Fee continues to benefit veterans through homeless services, affordable housing development, and homeownership support
- Leveraging all OHCS funds to encourage developers to include Veterans as part of their projects.
- Leveraging Federal VA Programs



# Ongoing Work – Upcoming Awards

- OHCS recently closed a funding opportunity for veteran housing
  - \$1 million for large projects
  - \$3 million for small projects
  - OHCS received 14 applications
  - Oregon Housing Stability Council will approve of awards in January or February

# Next Steps - Document Recording Fee

- 2018 Legislative Session tripled the state Document Recording Fee, of which 25% is dedicated to serving veterans across the housing spectrum
- Expanded use of the Homeownership Assistance Program to serve veteran homeowners in addressing health and safety issues within their homes
- Increased funding to the Emergency Housing Account so communities can serve veterans experiencing or at risk of homelessness



 Funding to build affordable homes through the General Housing Account

## **Next Steps**

- Continued collaboration between ODVA and OHCS
- Intentional engagement with Veteran Service Organizations, elected officials, VA partners with goal of inspiring more collaboration and support for Veteran Advocacy work
- Work with Community Action Agencies on leveraging increased Emergency Housing Assistance Funds
- Leverage VA partners to look at ways to increase utilization rates of the HUD-VASH program
