Re: Rebalance Plan for Agency Reductions of Admin Services for the Advocacy Commissions of Oregon as a means of rebalancing the budget.

Co-Chairs Senate Majority Leader Wagner and Representative Marsh, Senator Heard, Senator Monnes Anderson, Representative Gomberg, Representative Nearman, Representative Smith and Representative Wilde:

On behalf of the Chairs of the Oregon Commission on Hispanic Affairs (OCHA), Oregon Commission on Asian and Pacific Islander Affairs (OCAPIA), Oregon Commission on Black Affairs (OCBA), and Oregon Commission for Women (OCFW), thank you for allowing me to testify today. We deeply appreciate the CFO's and LFO's efforts over the years, along with the Joint Ways and Means legislators, to keep the Oregon Advocacy Commissions Office budget whole as a priority. We have done this together, jointly choosing difficult budget reductions in sustainable ways for the Commissions and the staff, and today is no different in that regard. We consider you and we to have always been good partners in hard economic times and hope you do the same. Looking ahead from the current budget reductions to the upcoming budgeting for the next biennium, will require even

deeper commitments from the legislature, the Governor, and the Advocacy Commissions to keep equity in the forefront, and keep the Advocacy Commissions whole and effective. COVID has shown the kinds of disparities Oregonians face, with the most impacted, in every way, among the constituencies served by the Advocacy Commissions statewide.

There is no more compelling time for equity than now. Each commissions has approximately 9 active, volunteer members who seek the statewide voices and needs of the residents of Oregon on social, political, economic, and health issues of equity, to bring concerns and solutions to the attention of our legislators, and other policy makers in our role as policy advisors, advocates and conduits to the communities. We uplift issues regarding disparities and service needs which are long due for redress and improvement. We support your work to make Oregon work and equity to progress for our communities that face such considerable disparities and challenges. This work is never more important than now. Again, let me say, it is never more important than now. In furthering these efforts, the Oregon Advocacy Commissions Office and Chairs work closely with Governor Brown's leadership on Building a More Equitable Oregon initiative and have pledged to bring enhanced community connections, equity analytics, with our state and community partners, and our policy leadership overall.

And over the past short and long sessions, we have identified and supported with testimony over 55 equity focused bills in our seven priority areas of Jobs/Economy, Health/MH/BH, Education, Stable Families and Housing, Environmental Justice, Justice/Safety/Policing, and Civic Engagement. As the OACO budget stands now it is very slim to meet the growing and valuable work of the Commission, but we have staff savings and identified ways to reduce our services significantly this biennium, as good partners in tough times. But this biennium's allocation reduction will not be sustainable for us into the next. Therefore, as representatives for Commission leadership, we ask that you do all you can to protect funding for the equity work of the Commissions and assure we can continue our vital work of the Commissions and the Oregon Office of Advocacy Commissions thru this current crisis.
