Recycling system issues

- Confusing labels
- Increased contamination
- Higher costs passed on to ratepayers
- Impacts on small and rural communities, and multifamily customers
- Little oversight of processing facilities

- Environmental and social impacts caused by contamination
- Loss of public trust
- Social inequities access to service and employment conditions
- Insufficient involvement from brands and manufacturers

Recycling Steering Committee

Purpose:

- Optimize the environmental benefits of managing materials using a life cycle perspective.
- Create a resilient recovery system that can adapt to changes in supply and demand.
- Restore and maintain public trust in the system.

Advise on important system elements



Provide strong oversight, enforcement and permitting



Key elements of LC 578

- Truth in labeling
- Consistent recycling collection list
- Expand access to collection
- Plastic packaging goal
- Robust education programs
- New standards for processing facilities
- Responsible recycling requirements

- Protect ratepayers from paying more
- Advance equity throughout system
- Incentivize environmentally beneficial design
- Support litter management
- Fund local reuse projects



Major outcomes



- Decrease public confusion
- Make recycling programs easier to use
- Collect cleaner materials
- Increase accessibility and advance equity
- Ensure responsible recycling
- Increase transparency and accountability
- Optimize environmental benefits
