Penalty Reductions and Treatment Requirements

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Penalty Reductions

- Decriminalizes possession of small amounts of controlled substances reduced from a Class A misdemeanor to Class E violation
 - Class A Misdemeanor up to 364 day jail sentence and \$6,250 fine
 - Class E violation No jail, \$100 fine or completion of a mental health assessment
- Reduces penalty for possession of larger amounts of controlled substances reduced from Class A, B, or C felony to Class A misdemeanor
- No enhanced penalties for prior convictions of possession
- Presumption that prior conviction can't be used against person in professional license application
- No changes to penalties for manufacturing, delivery, and commercial drug offense

Impacts on Sentencing

- 2019 2,139 misdemeanor convictions and 1,918 felony convictions
- **2021 Expected** 276 misdemeanor convictions and 102 felony convictions
- Conviction disparity affecting Black and Native American Oregonians expected to close

Addiction Recovery Center Grant Program

- Savings from drug offense sentence reductions (including reductions in arrests, incarceration, and supervision) gets combined with Oregon Marijuana Fund revenues in excess of \$11,250,000/quarter fund to newly created Addiction Recovery Centers (ARCs)
- ARCs must provide:
 - 24/7/365 triage to determine acute care needs;
 - Behavioral health needs assessment, including a substance use disorder screening by a credentialed addiction treatment professional;
 - Individual intervention planning, intensive case management, and connection to services;
 - Peer support, including direct engagement with marginalized community members who could potentially benefit from the Center's services; and
 - Outreach to clients who are unable to access the Center.

Addiction Recovery Centers

- The Oregon Health Authority (OHA) must establish a statewide temporary 24/7/365 telephone ARC no later than February 1, 2021
- OHA must form the Oversight and Accountability Council to distribute grant funds and oversee the ARCs by February 1, 2021
- At least one ARC must be established and operational within each coordinated care organization (CCO) service area by October 31, 2021
